MacArthur's New Command

Best news from the Far East in many a day was the appointment of General Douglas MacArthur to supreme command of all Allied forces in the southwest Pacific and his successful flight from beleaguered Bataan peninsula. The conclusion is inescapable that a strong offensive against the Japanese will be launched from Australia and that American troops will have a leading part in it. No good purpose whatever could have been served by leaving MacArthur in the Philippines though it undoubtedly took a Presidential order to get him out. He has fought a delaying action which ranks with the greatest in all history and he has successfully pinned down more than 200,000 Japanese for a period of over three months who might have been disastrously employed elsewhere. But he could do little more.

To have left him on Bataan would have meant his inevitable capture if he managed to escape the bombs of enemy warplanes. We may rest assured that the Japanese would have planned more in MacArthur's capture than in the silencing of the fortresses on Corregidor. It would have been out of the fighting for the duration and no conceivable transfer of prisoners would ever have gotten him back. The plight of the Allies is such that it has no men whatever of MacArthur's caliber to spare; "We have long prided ourselves in not being among the 'have not' nations, but if there is one thing which we now find we have not it is great military leaders. Though the United Nations combined have most of the natural resources in the world, there is not a Lee, a Wellington, or a Napoleon in the bunch. MacArthur comes the nearest to it. As the war develops, if he is given free rein and escapes unforeseen tragedies, we have no doubt he will go down in history as the greatest strategist and leader of men that this war has developed. He has the dauntless courage, the strategic genius, the magnetic personality and the dramatic qualities possessed by the greatest warriors of all times. The people may well rejoice that his rare qualities were not to be upon the Australians and that their appeal to President Roosevelt to loan him to Australia. It may well be time for another Japanese general to stand on the beach.

A novel explanation for the appointment of numerous coordinators for various sporting activities in connection with civilian defense has been advanced by Henry M. Tamm, who sees in it a means not entirely of bad-tempered American morale but of undermining the morale of the enemy.

Low morale in the enemy is just as important as high morale on our own side, he explains, and the delight of our morale is in recovering the bad news from the Far East and simply knock the Japanese for a whole lot of howling alley pines. But this is the way M. Tamm put it.

Japan overruns Singapore and we answer it with an appointment of a weight lifting coordinator. Java falls and we order a national drop-the-hankerchief week with a coordinator for every hankerchief. The Allied nations lose the bloodiest sea battle in history and we wave our ping pong paddles defiantly, shake our heads in their faces, and return to paddling with renewed vigor.

Such after distrust for defeat is bound to shake the confidence of our enemies. What manner of people are these Americans? they must be taking themselves. We are six months ahead of the most daring military schedule in history. The Pacific is nearly ours and those Americans, those cultured men who speak only plain Japanese, scorn our triumphs with quietude, they know something that we do not know. It is that they, as only they are a superior race and can beat us with half hearted war efforts.

This business of naming coordinators every time we get hit is simply devastating to enemy morale, M. Tamm says. The Japanese can't understand it. Fewer Clothes Will Be Rationed British

LONDON, Mar. 18. (AP) Britons were told by their government Tuesday they would have to get along with fewer clothes and less fuel. The double-barreled tightening-up was announced by Hugh Dalton, president of the Board of Trade, who said that beginning June 1 the clothes ration would be reduced about one-fourth and that the rationing of coal, gas and electricity would be introduced immediately. The clothing allowance will be cut from 66 coupons a year to a rate slightly over 61. The plan of issuing extra coupons for children and workers with special needs will continue.

Battle Breaks Out In New Fury Off Tip Of North Australia

Nazi "Missionaries" Reported Leading Jap Invasion Of New Guinea Isle

(By Associated Press) The battle over Australia's northern tip breaks into new fury today with Allied air attacks on the Japanese at several island points and Japanese raids on northern Australia and the Solomon islands, and striking reports that German "missionaries" are leading the overland Japanese invasion in New Guinea.

(By Associated Press) Allied bombers continued today their attacks on the Japanese invasion force's gathering in the island approaches to Australia, blasting a heavy enemy cruiser at Rabaul, New Britain, and bombing two other large ships. A Japanese cruiser was badly hit and left belching smoke.

The Japanese stepped up their aerial assault today, raiding Darwin, the Australian northwest coast, and striking again at Port Moresby, New Guinea. Japanese planes also reconnoitered the islands near Cape York, northeast Australia, and bombed an island in the Solomon Archipelago.

The enemy apparently had captured considerable quantities of supplies at Port Moresby, and the Australian mainland and the victorious Allied raid were seriously delaying the Japanese advance on the mainland. Under the leadership of General MacArthur, the United States Army Air Force is now conducting a series of air attacks on Japanese air bases, airfields, and anti-aircraft batteries.

Lieut. Gen. Brett said in an interview that Australian and American fighters were fighting as a single unit, using identical planes and equipment, and that he had recommended that the U. S. take over the task of providing all aircraft for Australia.

Gen. Brett, now deputy supreme commander of the Allied forces in the Southwest Pacific in addition to his air force command, declared:

Filling Station Prices For Gas Frozen by OPA

WASHINGTON, March 19.—The Office of Price Administration has frozen the filling station prices for gasoline in the District of Columbia and 18 states along the Atlantic coast and in the Pacific Northwest at the levels of last Friday.

The emergency 60-day price ceiling covers the area where a 20 percent curtailment in deliveries to retailers is required by the sinking of tankers and the diversion of shipping to war uses. This curtailment takes effect at midnight tonight.

The price ceiling is effective next Monday, Mar. 23. Violations may be punished upon conviction by a maximum fine of \$500 or imprisonment for one year, or both, under Administrative Law.

The order applies to gasoline stations in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, Delaware, West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Florida, and Washington and the District of Columbia.
