Tax Collections In County Are Up 11 Percent

Information from State shows amount of the 1940 roll of \$342,000.

So far there have been 4,266 tax receipts issued in Seminole County as compared with 3,141 receipts issued during the same period last year. This is an increase of 1,125. Meanwhile Mr. Jenkins stated that taxes due were unpaid last year in the amount of \$115,279.85 and if not paid by April 1, will become delinquent.

The following information was released by Mr. Jenkins concerning tax laws and the payment of taxes:

"Last legislative made drastic changes in the tax laws of Florida and enacted into law a number of bills, one of which requires interest to begin on April 1 on unpaid taxes on real estate, at the rate of 18 percent per annum, with a minimum of three percent, not paid on or before April 1. However the interest did not start until the date of the tax sale."

"Personal property taxes, if not paid on or before Mar. 31, draw interest at the rate of 12 percent per annum beginning with Apr. 1, and the names of those taxpayers with the amounts due are required to be advertised."

"Intangible personal property taxes, if not paid before Apr. 1, draw a penalty of 10 percent on Apr. 1, and interest at the rate of 24 percent per annum, and the names of the delinquent taxpayers and amounts due are required to be advertised."

"Tax warrants and tax executions are required to be issued and placed in the hands of officers for collection on unpaid personal property taxes and unpaid intangible personal property taxes with the notice to be made known and sale of the property foreclosed. Taxes are also apportioned to all other heirs."

NEW YORK. Mar. 18. (Special) "All you need to do, you outfielders, is get on base somehow. The infielders will drive you home!"


Excerpt from club-house notes by National League managers one-two-three years hence, judging by the trend in grand strategy tested in this year's spring warm-

ups. The senior circuit's rookie regiment lines up for 1943 the strongest array of power-driving grounders grabbers ever marshaled in one Spring by one major league.

Traditionally it's the outfielders who furnish the bulk of power in any hitting order. This year in the freshman class it's the infielders who knock the tallies across the dish. For the first time in memory, Los Angeles can pick an all-star infield of rookies, every man the 1941 RBI monarch of his league, Burge, Block, Fernandez and Haas, reading from first to third.

The trend in the National was that way last year. Dolph Camilli, Dodger 4b, was league-leading power driver, and other things that made him the National League's Most-Valuable Player. Babe Young, Giants first baseman, was the only other National Leaguer who knocked in more than 100 tallies.

The 1942 all-star rookie infield starts with Les Burge at first base. Les led the Southern

15 GOING DOWN HILL

Winston Churchill has sent Sir Clifton Crofts to India with a promise of independence after the war—if the government scheme can "win a reasonable and practical measure of self-government."

In 1939 Mahatma Gandhi, nominal head of the Congress Party (Hindi movement to complete, immediate independence rejected talk of protecting minority rights until after freedom was achieved). A year later, Gandhi forced civil disobedience from the Muslim's militant attitude.

Congress Party leaders then threatened civil war to prevent a possible compromise with the Hindu, and Sir Hugh Trenchard, Parliamentary under-secretary for India, told Commons: "It is clear that India would not grant India complete independence. Later that year Britain promised India free and equal partnership in her empire. The India problem goes around and round like a whirling devi.

Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, active leader of the Congress Party, demands freedom without dominion status and says he represents most of India's 210 million Hindus. But the Hindus are divided by their religion which is really a caste system of society.

TAX NOTICE TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY IN SEMINOLE COUNTY

Under the new law enacted by the legislature the following interest and penalties begin on April 1, 1942, on all unpaid taxes assessed for the year 1941.

Washington, Mar. 18. (UPI)—It is becoming more and more

likely that some drastic—and I mean drastic—measures will be taken soon to provide

government agencies with new weapons to combat fifth col-

umnists and spies.

There is no serious criticism of the work being done by existing agencies. But over since

Pearl Harbor, there has been a growing list of disturbed fifth

columnists activities.

FBI agents recently picked up more than 50 suspects in Dallas County. They will come in during the week. Thirty German and Italian aliens, all purportedly in possession of munitions and other suspicious equipment, were picked up near an important air-

plane factory in New Jersey. There were 100 arrests of similar arrests in New Orleans. In San Antonio, suspects were caught with code books, maps of vital military establishments, binoculars, weapons and gas masks.

In Norfolk, Va., federal agents arrested German and Italian spies with short wave receiving sets, cameras and ammunition. Spy trials in New York and Washington have brought out alarming testimony as to pre-war activities of the agents.

On the West Coast, civilian observers stated that just before that submarine shelling port San Francisco, lights flashed from the hills as if signal messages were sent. An employee of the Navy Liggett at Bellvue, District of Columbia, was shot through a traffic charge and through an error was searched. Police said they found secret bomb mechanism, a list of consignments of ammunition to several defense posts.

The deluge has given Washington officials a new jittery. Already a security warrant for the arrest of a spy has been removed. By executive order and justice department rulings, other restrictions against counter-espionage work have been lifted. From the West Coast particularly come complaints that existing measures are inadequate.

I asked a high counter-espionage official where he thought the real problem lies.

“Espionage can be fought effectively,” he said. “It is the social problem that is the real problem. The good fifth columnists are a majority citizens. His very effectiveness depends on it. He may even be contributing to our war effort while waiting to give aid and assistance to the enemy.”

With existing laws, we can deal with the spies and saboteurs. They are saying now that the United States will have to get tough but how to handle the fifth columnists without starting a nationwide witch-hunt is another problem.

Battle Breaks Out In New Fury Off Tip Of North Australia

Nazi "Missionsaries" Reported Leading Jap Invasion Of New Guinea Isle

(By Associated Press)
The battle about Australia's northern tip has been joined by fury today with Allied air attacks on the Japanese at several island points and Japanese raids on northern Australia, and the Solomon Islands, and sensational reports that German "missionaries" are leading the overland Japanese invasion in New Guinea.

Allied bombers continued today their attacks on the Japanese invasion forces gathering in the island approaches to Australia, blasting a heavy enemy cruiser at Rabaul, New Britain, and bombing two other large ships. A Japanese cruiser was badly hit and left belching smoke.

The Japanese stepped up their aerial assault today, raiding Darwin, the Australian northwest coast, and striking anew at Port Moresby, New Guinea. Japanese planes also reconnoitered the islands near Cape York, northeast Australia, and bombed an island in the Solomon Archipelago.

The enemy apparently had gathered considerable invasion strength at Baluanau and Lee, nearly 500 miles from the Australian mainland and the victorious Allied raid may seriously delay the anticipated thrust of the main Japanese invasion under cover of darkness.

Destinations wrought on land installations, including airfields, runways and anti-aircraft batteries.

The price order is effective next Monday, Mar. 23. Violations will be punished upon conviction by maximum fine of \$500 or imprisonment for one year or both, acting Administrator Harry Hanes warned.

The order applies to gasoline stations in Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, Delaware, West Virginia, North Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, and the District of Columbia.
