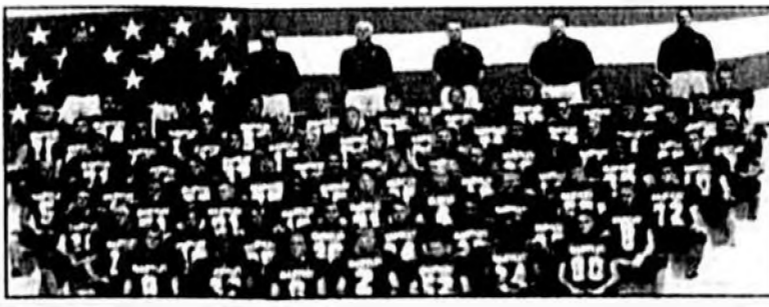

Your endodontic treatment will begin in your very own Linda Tripp month at precisely 11 a.m. They'll be waiting for you.

More than 14 million American teeth receive endodontic treatment every year. Now, your teeth will be among them. Better let Monica know. Tell her to practice good oral hygiene or something like this might happen to her.

Remains found in Oviedo Investigators go to work

OVIEDO - A survey crew discovered some skeletal remains near the Iron Bridge Water Treatment facility in South Oviedo. Seminole County deputies immediately secured the scene on Wednesday.

An investigation to identify the remains has

begun - and may take awhile, deputies said. The medical examiner first must determine if the remains are human. And if so, whose are they?

"We've worked for years on cases like this," said Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett today. "Skeletal remains were found when excavation began for the Seminole Community College. We

County staffer likes to stay busy on job

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Andrea Dennison likes to keep busy. Anyone who knows her can tell you that.

The former Casselberry commissioner and mayor is the customer service supervisor for Seminole County Property Appraiser H.W. "Bill" Suber. It is a position she has held since April of 1997.

"I love it," Dennison says. "It's a nice agency to work for." "It has been an easy transition because I've used the skill sets from the private and public sector," she says.

The county services building is somewhat of a change from the mayor's office in Casselberry's City Hall where Dennison served as commissioner from 1986 to 1989 and mayor from 1989 to 1991.

This was a period of growth for both the city and Dennison. At that time the mayor ran the city until a city manager was hired to run the system.

Dennison said the reason her

new office works so well is that it is focused on customer satisfaction.

"It's a great agency to work for," she said.

She also brings out the experience of her boss Suber, who has held that office since 1980, and is credited by Dennison with putting the "service" into the property appraiser's office.

Another service Dennison brings up is the Geographical Information System (GIS). These maps are high quality and used for such business purposes as real estate research.

This is a computerized mapping system that gives quick and detailed mapping information on properties, by using information such as address, zip codes, longitude and latitude. Also on the computer front they are hoping to be the first appraisal service to have properties on-line. Dennison points out that the office consistently gets high ratings for its customer support.

Plastic surgeons promote breast cancer awareness

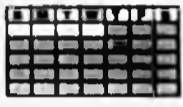
ARLINGTON HEIGHTS, Ill. - One plastic surgeon's association is contributing to breast cancer research by dedicating a portion of proceeds from its annual meeting sales, in Boston this week, to the National Alliance of Breast Cancer Organizations (NABCO).

The role of plastic surgeons in the fight against breast cancer does not end with rebuilding the breast following mastectomy, according to the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons. From working to pass legislation mandating that insurance companies cover breast reconstruction to participating in National Breast Cancer Awareness Month each October, the ASPRS is dedicated to promoting awareness of breast cancer and its victims in a number of ways. In addition, the society is using 40 cent breast cancer awareness stamps for a segment of its mailings. Eight cents of each stamp sale is donated directly to breast cancer research.

Hurricane costs estimated at \$125 to \$135 million

BLOOMINGTON, Ill. - State Farm Insurance projected it will pay its customers in Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Florida an estimated \$125 million to \$135 million to repair or replace damaged property caused by Hurricane Georges.

State Farm, the largest insurer of homes in those states, estimates it will process 35,000 to 40,000 claims for hurricane damage to homes it insures in the four-state area.

"These projections are very preliminary at this time. The number of claims and their costs could change as the civil authorities allow us and our policyholders back into some of the harder-hit areas," said Steve Williams, vice president of claims for State Farm Fire and Casualty Company.

"Our estimates are based on early reports of claims and our initial inspections of the areas that suffered damage and don't include flood damage, which is hard to measure at this point. Right now, we're providing immediate emergency financial assistance to our displaced customers, and we've already mobilized additional personnel to assist our local agents and employees in taking care of all the claims as quickly as possible."

Williams pointed out that flooding may emerge as a major cause of damage. Homeowners with flood damage who have flood insurance with the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) would, in most cases, get their coverage through the NFIP and not their homeowners insurance. Currently, there are no damage estimates available on flooding.

State Farm sent in an additional 800 representatives to the storm area to handle claims. They joined the more than 13,000 State Farm employees, agents and agent staff members who currently live and work in Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Florida.

State Farm insures about one in every three insured homes in Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana, and about one in every four insured homes in Florida.

affectionately called it the 'Mr. Bones' case. We buried 'Mr. Bones' in the pauper's cemetery."

On another occasion, Harriett said a bag of bones was deposited on the front steps of the Sanford Museum. County investigators and experts at the University of Florida identified these skeletal remains of a "Native American."

Harriett said it was anybody's guess how he died or when. Probably 200 or more years ago. "He may have been shot by the cavalry," he

said.

Each case is investigated thoroughly, Harriett said. A law enforcement agency has to develop each clue before it closes a case. Investigators want to find out all they can about remains such as those found in Ovedo Wednesday.

"It's a slow, methodical work," Harriett said. "Cases can be extremely baffling. Our investigators try to come up with as many clues as they can. It's a demanding job."

Florida Gov. Lawton Chiles proclaimed the week of Oct. 4 to be Nurse-Midwifery Week in recognition of their contributions.

In his proclamation, Chiles commended nurse-midwives for their philosophy of nonintervention during normal labor and birth, providing continuity of care, and promoting family involvement.

Florida is a leader in certified nurse-midwifery care with 21,000 births in 1997 attended by Florida's 420 nurse midwives. Nurse-midwives provide a wide variety of healthcare services in addition to prenatal and birth care, including gynecology, family planning, and well woman care. More than half of the care provided by CNMs is to women and families with limited incomes.

Midwives only assist minimal risk mothers with home births.

Liebling, who averages about 50 home births a year, estimates that only about four to five percent of her home births have to be transferred during labor for hospital birth. Liebling said she stays with the mothers to ensure the continuation of quality care.

Liebling said she was drawn to midwifery after hearing stories from other women and realizing how unhappy women were with their birth experiences.

"We honor the natural processes of the body," Liebling said. "We support what the body naturally needs to do to bring forth the baby."

What should have been so natural and affirming an experience, she said, was leaving women feeling powerless and defeated.

"I was sad to see women having their power taken away from them," Liebling said. "They were not giving women the opportunity to know the power within them. The mothers would never understand the incredible strength that they have as women to birth their baby."

Bobbie Hanson, CNM, credits Clyde H. Cline, MD with encouraging her to become a midwife. Hanson worked as a nurse in Cline's gynecology and obstetrics practice. She is

now one of two CNMs that work in the doctor's Longwood, Lake Mary and Ovedo offices.

"He convinced me to look into midwifery and it became a challenge," Hanson said. "When I first started it was a job, but it became a calling. You can't help but get caught up in the spirituality of the process."

Midwives become like a member of the family sharing the miracle of birth, she said. They listen to the family's needs, desires, hopes and fears, and help the family to create a rewarding birth experience.

Midwives develop a rapport during prenatal visits that continues through labor, birth, aftercare, and beyond, she said.

Fathers, siblings and other family members are encouraged to be an active part of the whole experience.

Hanson smiles as she recalls hearing a father retell, with such joy, how he with the delivery.

He was telling someone on the phone how he helped to deliver his child, she said.

Midwifery works with nature, not against it.

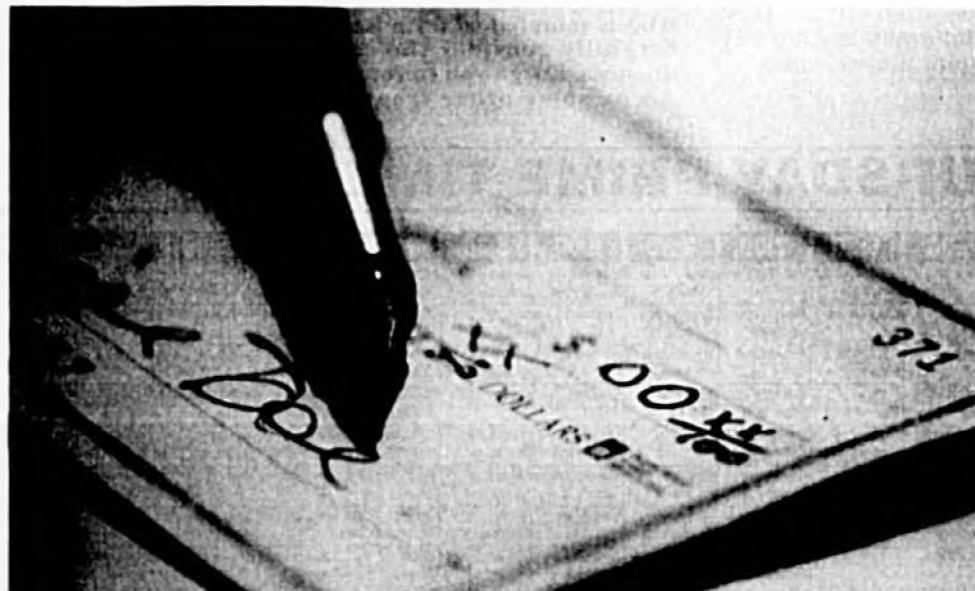
"I really feel we are making a difference in the lives of the people we help," Hanson said. "We have our hands on miracles."

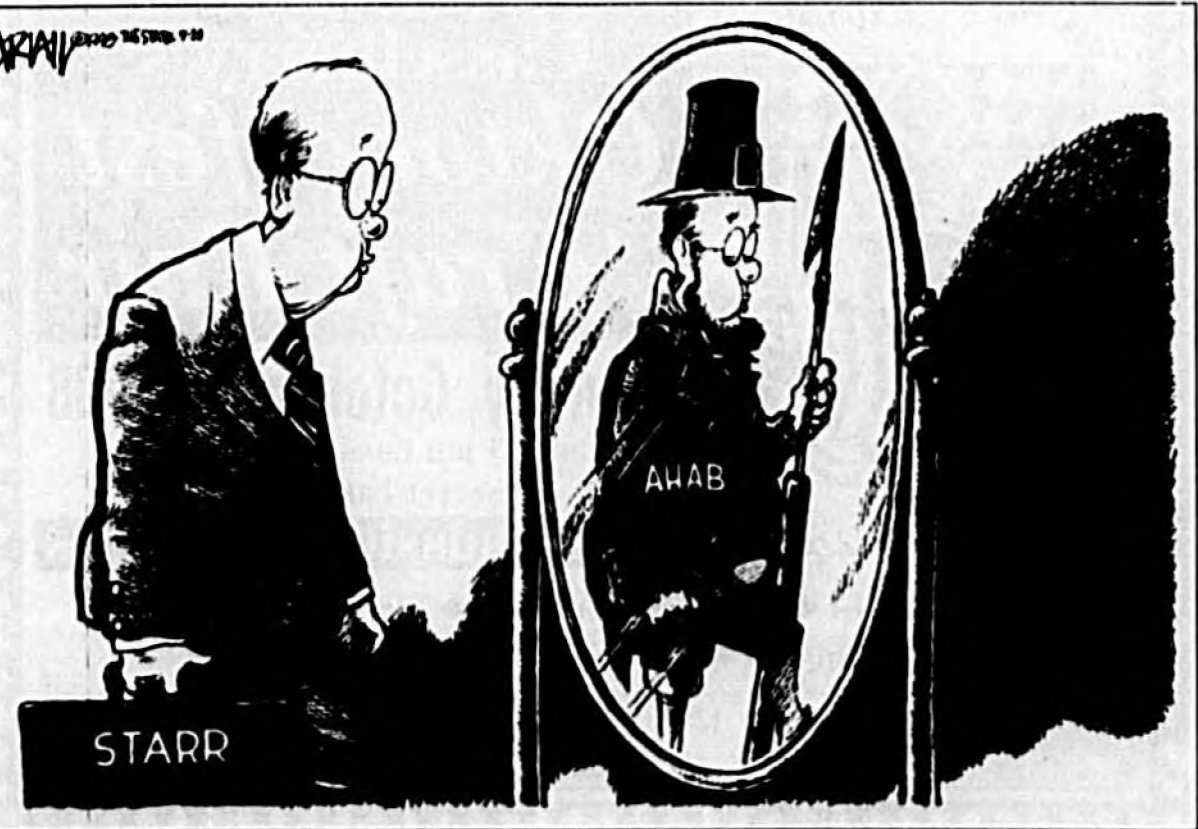

DEAR ABBY: I have a message I would like to pass on to teen-agers. I hope you will print it.

1. A career in the Air Force because after six years, I wanted to drink beer instead of report for duty.
2. An accounting career because I stole from my employer to buy beer.
3. A close relationship with my parents and sister because they don't drink.
4. A son and daughter. They have refused any contact with me for 11 years. I last tried to talk with them in October 1997, but they wanted no part of me.
5. A close relationship with my wife and another son because my wife doesn't drink.
6. Friends. I used and abused them until they had enough and cut me off.
7. A secure future. I'm 53 with no savings, assets or insurance.
8. My driver's license.
9. Medical care. I fear what a doctor may find.
10. My self-respect. I'm a loser and there's no reason to be sober.

In the 1970s I attended AA and stayed sober for two years, but it didn't last. Thirty-three years ago when I drank my first beer, I had dreams and plans. I had no idea that I'd be a common laborer and a drunk in 1998. Before you start drinking, think where it may land you in 33 years.

Abby, I am one of the lucky ones. You may ask why I think I'm lucky. Well, I'm alive and my drinking hasn't killed anyone — yet. I wish there were a foolproof cure, but there's not, so the only way to avoid ending up like me is to never risk drinking that first beer. Believe me, it's not worth it.

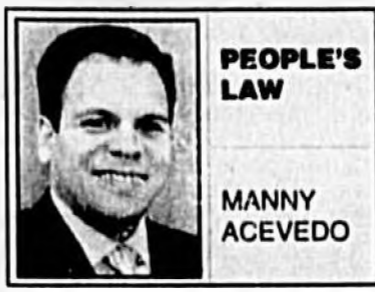
You may use my first name, but please don't use my last name because I don't want to embarrass my family any further.

DEAR DONALD: Your letter is quite sobering. I hope it will prompt every young person who is tempted to try a beer to carefully consider the consequences. I urge you to return to AA or some other treatment

It is the intent of the Florida legislature to provide children with: 1) protection from abuse, neglect, and exploitation; 2) a permanent and stable home; 3) a safe and nurturing environment, shelter, and adequate nutrition, clothing, and clothing. In order to help provide these essentials, Florida law places on its citizens the duty to report, to the Department of Children and Families, knowledge or reasonable suspicion of the abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child. Reports can be made any time, day or night, by calling the central abuse registry. (1-800-96ABUSE)

When a person reports the abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child by calling the registry, the person answering the phone will request basic

information regarding the alleged abuse, abandonment, or neglect. This basic information will include the following: 1) the name, birth date, sex, address, and race of the child; 2) the nature of the alleged abuse, abandonment, or neglect; 3) the harm suffered by the child; 4) how long the alleged abuse, abandonment, or neglect has

persisted; 5) the name(s) of the person or persons responsible for the alleged abuse, abandonment, or neglect; 6) the relationship(s) of the persons or persons allegedly responsible for the abuse, abandonment, or neglect; and 7) the identity of the reporter.

With the exception of a few groups of persons, a reporter is not required to reveal his or her identity. Naturally, if a reporter reveals his or her identity, that information will be kept confidential. It will not be released to anyone other than agents of the Department of Children and Families, law enforcement, and the office of the state attorney, unless the reporter consents.

It is important to note that the knowing and willful failure

to report the abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child, as well as preventing another person from reporting the alleged abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child is a second degree misdemeanor punishable by up to 60 days in the county jail.

Conversely, knowingly and willfully making a false report of abuse, abandonment, or neglect is also a second degree misdemeanor. However, a person who makes a report in good faith is immune from any civil and criminal liability. Additionally, if an employee such as a teacher or child caretaker makes a report to the Department, in good faith, and his or her employment is adversely affected because of the making of the report, the employee will have a cause of action against the employer. The cause of action will include not only those damages suffered by the employee but punitive damages as well.

All citizens have a legal duty to report the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of abuse, abandonment, or neglect of a child, and, as discussed above, any person who makes such a report will be immune from any liability, civil or criminal, if such report is made in good faith. In the coming weeks we will discuss what happens after a report is made as well as other aspects of dependency law.

Tonight: Lake Mary at Lake Brantley, 7:30 p.m.

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - The Patriots are on a roll and Lake Mary, an arch-rival of the Patriots, should be little more than a speed bump on the road.

Lake Brantley is currently ranked 10th in the state Class 6A poll (see story at right) and has beaten two of its main contenders - Deland and Seminole.

Last week the Patriots defense stuffed the high-powered Seminole offense and moved a step closer to an unbeaten season.

Patriot coach George Clayton has to be concerned that his team isn't looking past the lowly-regarded Rams before facing powerful foes such as Lake Howell, West Orange and Oviedo.

Football team ranked 10th by FSWA in 6A State Poll

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - The FSWA (Florida Sports Writers Association) Class 6A rankings came out Tuesday and there it was.

Number 10, Lake Brantley. But, if it's all the same, Patriots' coach George Clayton would rather keep that quiet for now.

"We're trying to play it down," Clayton said. "It's a great thing for the team but we can't look ahead any more than one game at a time. It's a compliment to Lake Brantley but we're just looking at it as something you see in the newspaper."

The Patriots entered the season considered a middle-of-the-road Seminole Athletic Conference team, but put everyone on notice with a win over defending district champion Deland in the second week of the season and an impressive rout of Seminole last week.

So how is Clayton keeping things quiet for now?

After every Lake Brantley practice, the Patriots have "positive time" when they get together to discuss what ever is on their mind.

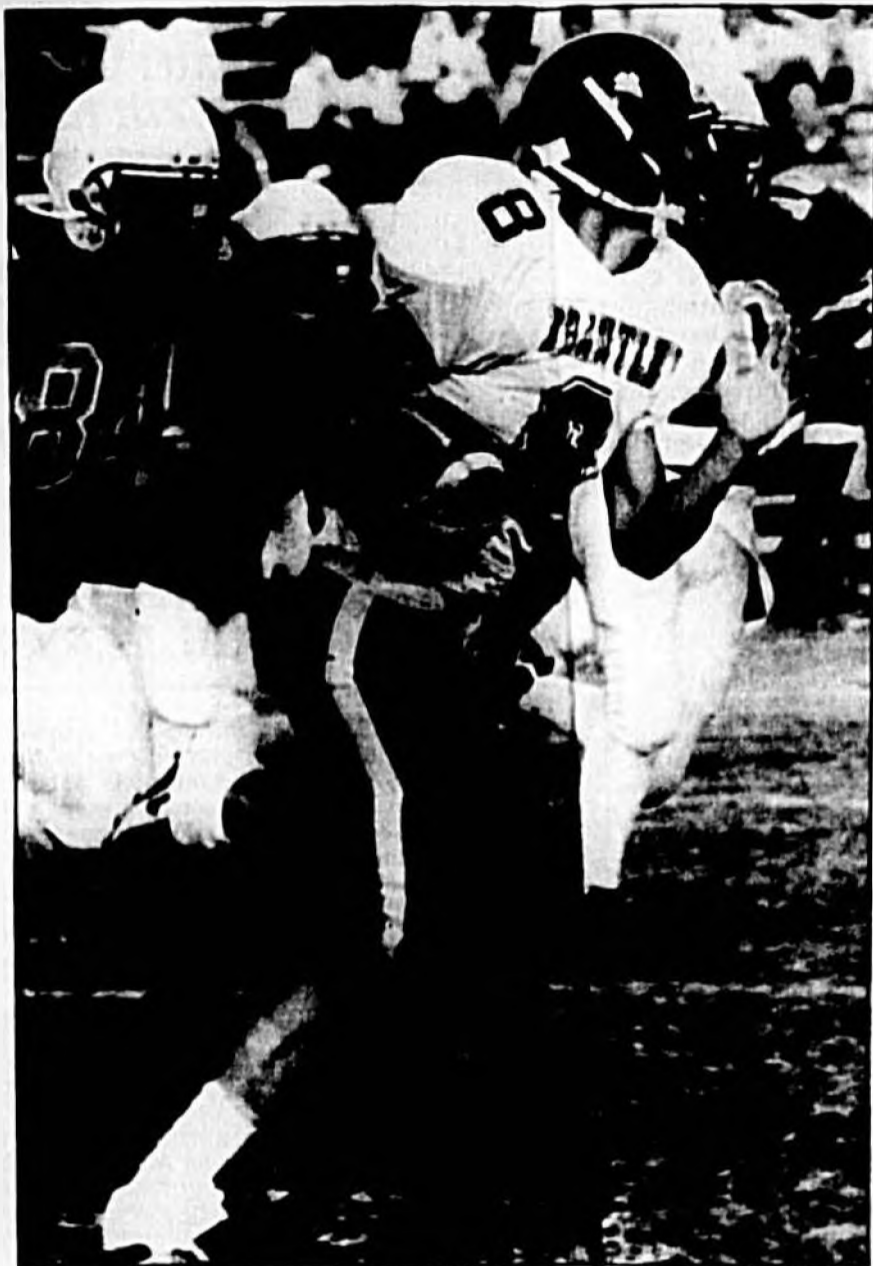
Of course the number 10 ranking was mentioned.

Bye week couldn't come at a better time for Buccaneers

TAMPA - This week the Buccaneers are taking a much needed rest.

The ills that have plagued the team this season should come to an end after an off week and then three of the next four games at home.

The battered receiving corps should be healthy by the October 18th game against Carolina and the struggling offensive line will have time to work out its problems.

In an uncharacteristic move, the usually stoic head coach Tony Dungy told his team that the New York game last week was a must-win situation.

A 1-4 start could have made for a turbulent bye week and prompted some drastic changes. While last Sunday's 20-3 victory was not pretty, the team stepped up to the task handed down by the coach.

The most encouraging thing to come out of the game was the play of the defense.

For the first time since Dungy arrived in 1996, the defense scored a touchdown when safety Charles Mincy returned a punt for a score.

The key is solid play from the defensive front. The secondary is decent, but can become very good when Warren Sapp and the rest of the line force opposing quarterbacks into mistakes.

Speaking of quarterbacks, Trent Diller has been injured with a separated shoulder since

the first week of the season and is looking to the off week to rest his sore arm.

Also, receiver Bert Emanuel has already resumed running and is expected to play in the Carolina game. Since Emanuel went down with a sprained ankle in the season opener, the team hasn't had anything close to a go-to receiver.

On offense, the lack of production from the receivers has allowed other teams to concentrate on stopping the run.

With key players like Emanuel and Diller healthy and a week of rest for the entire team, the Bucs winning streak in the new stadium could continue and with three home games scheduled, their 2-3 record could improve dramatically.

NOTES:

After five games in 1997, the Bucs had 18 sacks with defensive tackle Warren Sapp recording 4.5. This year, Tampa Bay has only seven. Only Washington and the New York Jets have fewer. After getting two sacks against Green Bay in week 2, Sapp has recorded zero.

Diller's injured shoulder doesn't put him in jeopardy of breaking his streak of 53 consecutive starts for Tampa Bay. The off week falls just at the right time to give him some much needed rest.

There were skeptics when Coughlin was hired away from Boston College at the team's inception and given total control of the franchise, but his personnel moves have been impeccable.

Consider the four drafts since 1995.

1995: Tony Boselli, the best offensive lineman in football and running back James Stewart who emerged as one of the best backs in the league before landing on injured reserve after the win over

Baltimore two weeks ago. Bryan Schwartz (second round) has started when healthy and Chris Hudson (third round) is a playmaker in the defensive secondary.

Rob Johnson was drafted in the fourth round and traded to Buffalo for a 1997 first-round pick which turned out to be AFC Rookie of the Month for September, Florida's Fred Taylor.

In 1996, the Jags took Kevin Hardy with the second pick in the draft and he's been one of the most improved players in the league after a so-so start.

Tony Brackens and Michael Cheever came in the second round. Brackens is a force on the defensive line and will step into the starting role against Miami Monday night after a high ankle injury and Cheever was penciled in as starting center until he was lost for the season with an injury.

Aaron Beasley (third round) emerged as a leader in the secondary, beating out high-price free-agent Deon Figures for a starting job, and Reggie Barlow (fourth round) has taken over for Willie Jackson as the team's possession receiver and return specialist.

In 1997, Renaldo Wynn was the first pick and he's started every game on the injury-depleted defensive line. Fourth-rounder Seth Payne has been a steal on the defensive line.

Damon Jones (fifth round) can be a star at tight end, where the Jaguars desperately

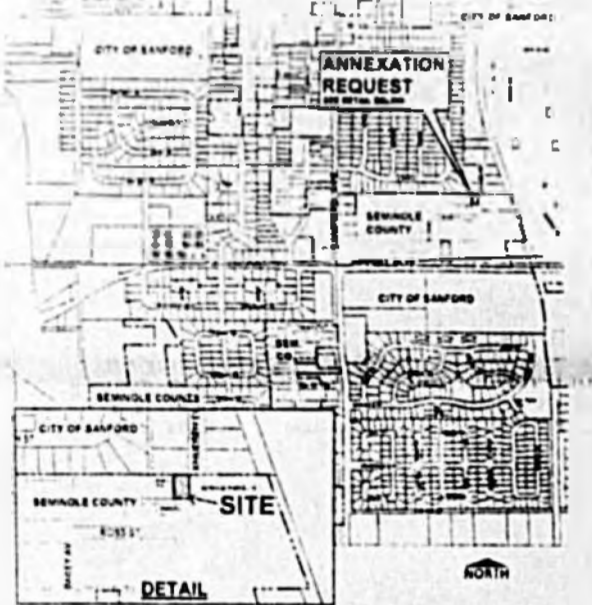

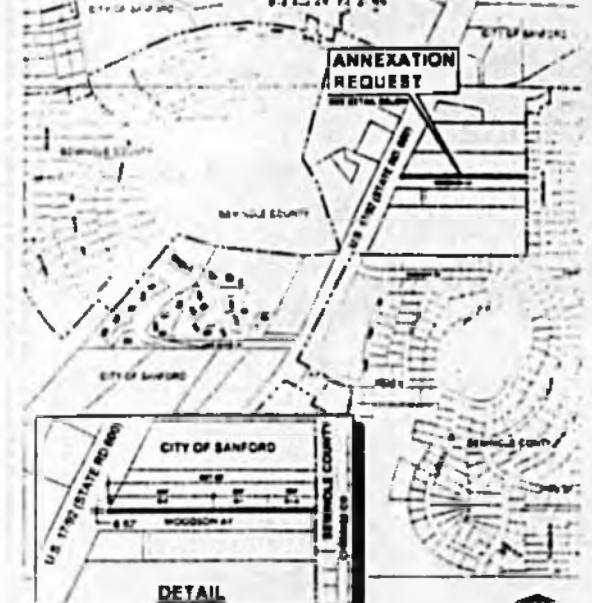

Sorry: Aging still inevitable

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 61-year-old male who has always been super active: biking, walking, windsurfing and skiing. However, I'm losing stamina and strength as I grow older. This depresses me. I suppose this is what aging is all about but how can I forestall the inevitable?

DEAR READER: Huh? You want me to give you the key to anti-aging? In this column? Listen, if I had the answer you seek, I'd be sitting on Mount Olympus clipping coupons.

Seriously, you know the drill: As we age, muscles become weaker and less bulky, we tire more easily, our stamina diminishes. Even active older people will experience a decline in performance and strength. This is an unavoidable consequence of aging.

Nonetheless, we can do much to slow the inevitable decline. Physical exertion is not only beneficial for heart, lungs, circulation and altitude; studies have proved that regular exercise will maintain muscle mass. Therefore, although such activity will not roll the clock back, it will at least help you remain active and independent. Keep at it — and accept, however reluctantly, the progressive restrictions of aging.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 5 feet 3 inches and weigh 180. I've tried everything from diet pills to weight loss groups. My husband has given me an ultimatum: If I don't lose significant weight in the next 12 months, he'll leave me. He says if I really loved him, I'd trim down. What can I do?

DEAR READER: Ultimatums can be hard to deal with, as the "either/or" options they give are often unreasonable or inappropriate. For example, your husband is probably incorrect in assuming that if you loved him you would slim down. You undoubtedly do love him — and can't lose weight. Therefore, the lose-weight-or-else doctrine is not only scary, it's unreasonable. I believe that your best approach is to put yourself under the care of a doctor. There may be a metabolic abnormality underlying your weight problem, or you may need evaluation by obesity specialists at a teaching hospital to which the doctor can refer you.

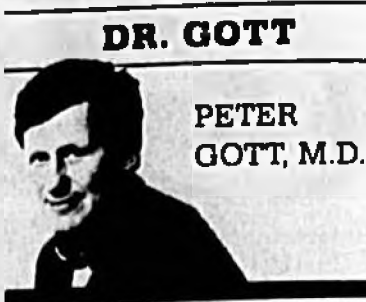
You may also need some counseling to help you manage stress, problems with self-image — and your husband's demands.

In addition, you may want to look into marriage counseling. If your husband agrees to go with you, he may be able to learn more effective ways to handle his anger and the grandiose concept that he can somehow control

your life. Someone should point out to him the corollary of his ultimatum: If he loved you, he would stick with you regardless of your weight.

For most obese people, help is available. I am certain that you will feel relieved at obtaining reputable medical assistance. At the same time, the dynamics of your marriage need attention, too.

WIN AT BRIDGE

A competitive cue-bid

By Phillip Alder

As I mentioned Monday, the word "cue-bid" is used in several different situations. Today, let's look at one of the most common. Your partner has made either an overcall or a takeout double, and you wish to tell him that you have an unexpectedly strong hand. How would you do it?

You could smile broadly, but that is illegal; also, partners mustn't look at each other during a deal. (You may look at an opponent — perhaps to check that he isn't peeking at his partner.) Instead, you bid the opener's suit. This announces 12-plus high-card points (maybe a bit less with divine distribution).

If partner has overcalled, some 99.37 percent of the time — approxi-

mately! — the cue-bid also shows three-card or better support for partner's suit.

If partner has doubled, the cue is purely point-showing. After it, both partners bid suits trying to find a fit — as in this deal.

When North doubles, South could blast into four spades, but what's the hurry? A slam might be on. So, he cue-bids the opener's suit to show 12-plus points. North bids his heart suit, South mentions his spades, and North jumps to game in the known fit.

West starts with three rounds of hearts, East ruffing away dummy's queen. Back comes a diamond. If you were South, how would you continue?

Based on West's opening bid, the diamond finesse stands no chance, but the club finesse is a certainty. Also, to get home you need the club finesse to succeed. So, win with the diamond ace, draw trumps, and run the club jack. The diamond queen disappears on dummy's third club winner.
