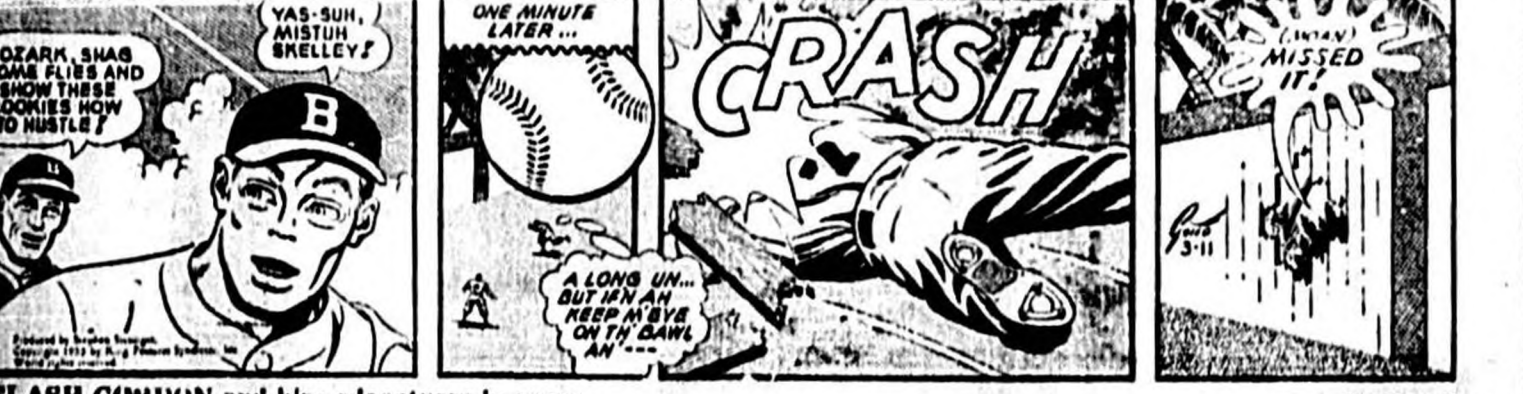

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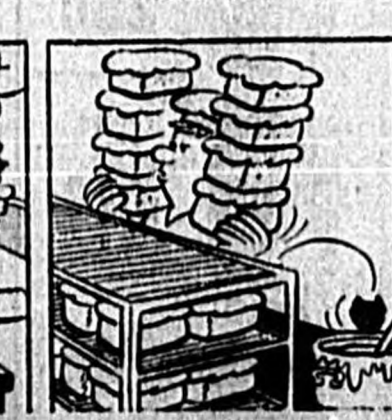

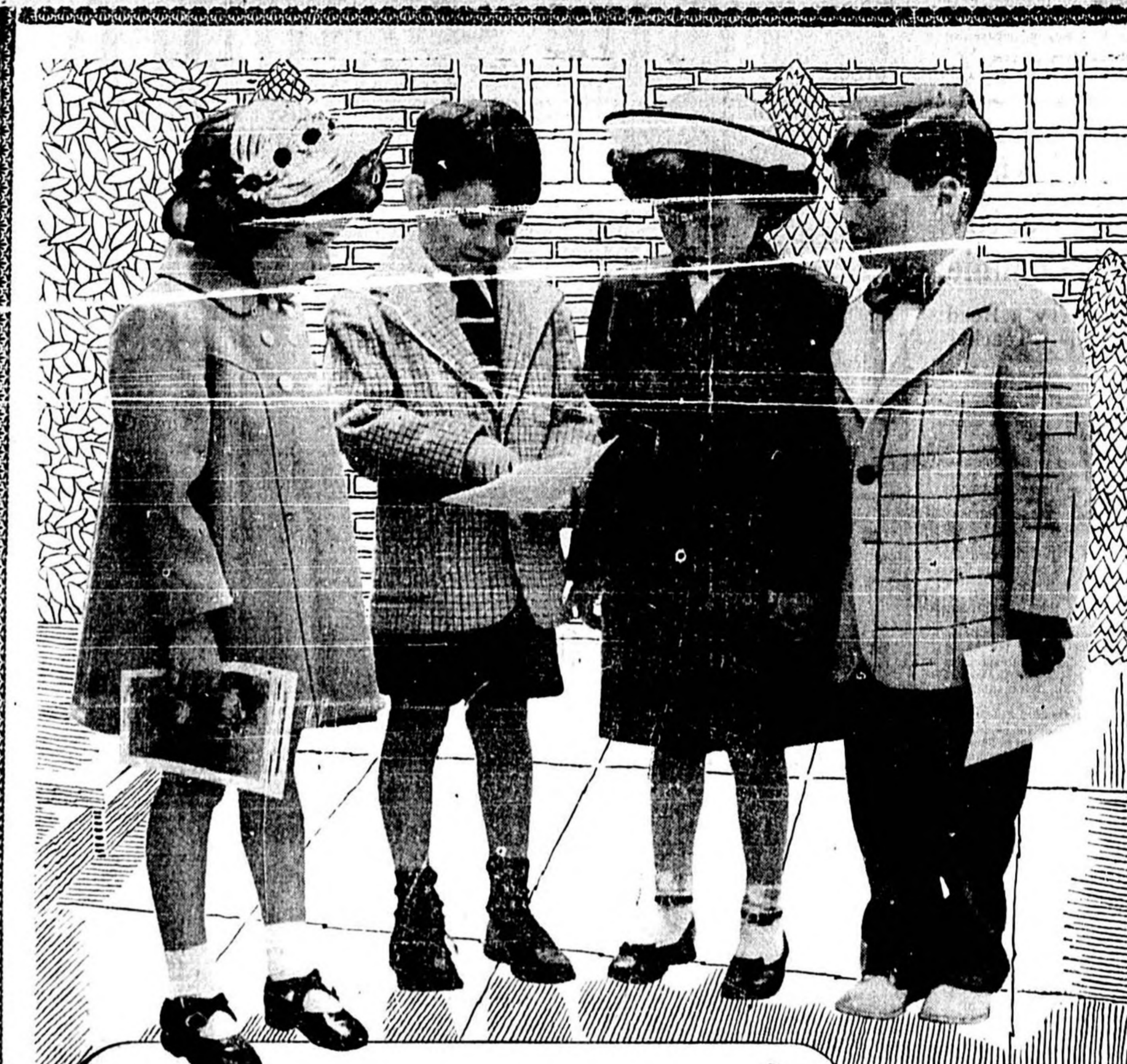
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That a total expenditure not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars is hereby authorized to cover the cost of paving and hard-surfacing of the above described thoroughfares to a width of 20 feet, which said improvement, that two-thirds of the total cost of said improvement shall be assessed against all property abutting the Florida Boulevard from its intersection with Hermit Trail, northerly and westerly around Lake Florida to its intersection with Lake Street, Florida, and Hermit Trail from a point opposite the northerly boundary of Lot 21, Block 25, SAN ANTONIO, a subdivision as recorded in the Public Records of Seminole County, Florida, northerly to its intersection with Florida Boulevard, to be so improved by the said paving and hard-surfacing of the above described thoroughfares, and that one-third of the entire cost of said improvement shall be paid from the General Fund of said Town.

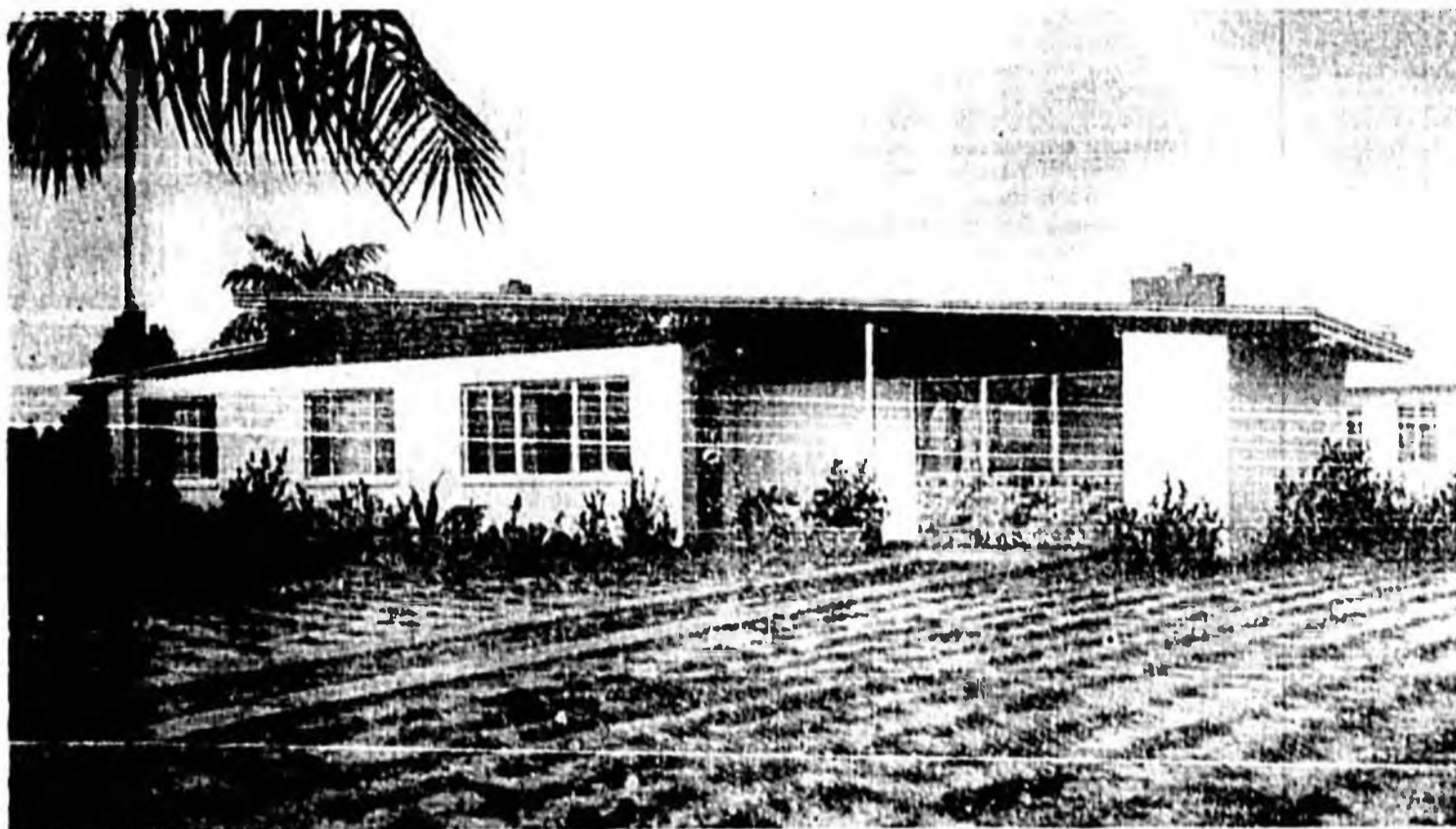

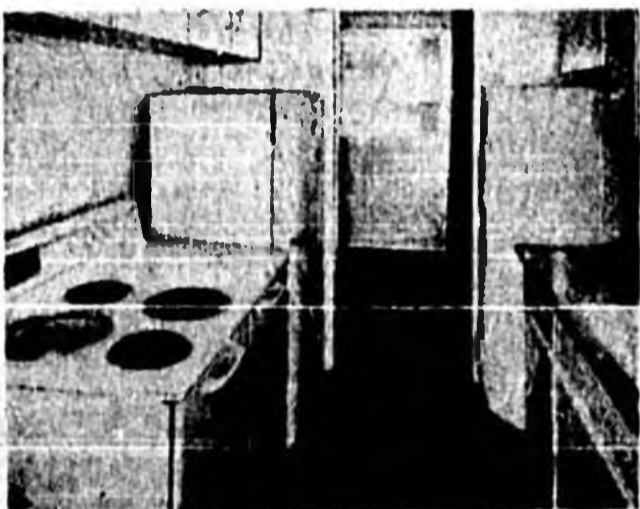

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**Russian Provocations**

Russian flares have shot down another Allied plane over German territory, this time with the death of four British fliers, proving the Red's utter contempt for the Western powers, and giving the lie to the new Russian Premier Malenkov's protestations of peace.  
One's first reaction to these unprovoked provocations is to flinch back. House Speaker Martin says: "We can't be expected to let them raid our territory without doing something about it," and one American diplomat says, "You can't rule out anything, indicating that we have taken about all we can take and anything might happen now."  
Sober second thought, however, would suggest a continuation of the policy pursued. Precipitate action at this juncture could only bring war, a war which we are not prepared to fight, and one in which our allies would be even less prepared than we.

### Motor Vehicles Are Major Killers In Accident Field

JACKSONVILLE (Special) — Motor vehicles continued to be the major killers in the field of accident deaths in Florida during 1952, still inching ominously upward as the sum total of all accident fatalities showed a slight decline, the Florida State Board of Health said today.

State Health Officer Wilson T. Sowder stated that preliminary figures for the year just past noted that of the 2,088 persons who died of accidental causes, 912 deaths were due to motor vehicle mishaps. This figure compares with 901 such deaths in 1951 and 893 auto fatalities in 1950.

Meanwhile it was noted that the sum of all accident deaths in 1952 was 88 less than the 2,120 who died in this fashion in 1951.

While hazards of road and highway were claiming 912 victims, industrial accidents were snuffing out only 118 lives, a report prepared by the state health agency's Bureau of Vital Statistics revealed.

A total of 537 persons died of accidents in the home, while an additional 430 persons were killed outside the home. There were 91 other accident deaths for which the location was not stated.

Falls were the leading cause of accident deaths in the home, totaling 218. Such mishaps hit the older age group heavily, with 166 victims in this category being 65 or more years of age.

Youth had its perils in deaths caused by fires, explosions of combustible materials and hot substances. Of the 146 deaths in this category, 62 were caused to children under 15 years of age.

Some other causes of fatal home accidents were: poisoning by gases, 32; mechanical asphyxiation, 30; firearms, 28; and solid and liquid poisons, 21.

Deaths led the list of outdoor accident fatalities exclusive of motor vehicle accidents, with 117 succumbing in this manner, ninety-three of these persons were less than 25 years of age. Other outdoor accident deaths included transportation services, 148; firearms, 29.

More than half of all public accidents, the statistics bureau commented, "occurred during recreational activities such as swimming, boating, fishing, hunting, etc."

Construction work, with 32 deaths, led the field of occupational fatalities, doubling the 16 deaths caused by manufacturing operations and a similar number in agriculture.

Other occupational accident deaths included: transportation, 7; trade, 6; mining and quarrying, 6; public utilities, 5; service trades, 4; and other industries, principally fishing and forestry, 29.

What opinions have bureau personnel formed as a result of their statistical tabulations of the accident victims? Says Bureau Director Everett Williams:

"Since most accidents can be prevented, and since accidents occur in all age groups, much remains to be accomplished in accident prevention. Accidents cause more loss of years of life than any other cause of death."


