Falling On Deaf Ears

A few years ago three men sat down in City Hall and attempted to do something about the impoverished of Seminole County.

They had no personal gains.

No axes to grind.

They simply wanted to help the needy — do something about their rotting teeth — try to get the youngsters better education — their parents better homes — their fathers a decent trade.

That was two years ago.

The three were W. E. Knowles, City Manager of Sanford, Marvin Meltzer, a business leader here and Dr. W. V. Roberts.

And so they helped organize Seminole Community Action — The sole purpose was to get federal funds to aid these depressed people.

They hired a director at a salary of \$9,600. They set up a membership of some 70 people and named an executive board to provide active leadership.

There was public resentment . . . But the three continued their efforts and finally they achieved a measure of success when the first federal funds rolled in.

And now two years later two of the three have resigned . . . As they mentioned earlier this week, they were disgusted with the operation of the "Action" group and with the executive board.

What has happened during the three years?

Nothing!

Last month the board of di-

rectors met in a closed door meeting (A reporter was present but he gave his word not to release anything on what happened).

They all agreed the executive director had fallen down on the job. He would have to be replaced . . . However, they decided to give him another chance and said he would have three weeks to come up with a concrete program of action.

Three weeks went by — and still no programs.

Well, two of the founders apparently had enough of throwing out taxpayers' money on a "political plum."

They said the executive board had failed to stand behind its own policies and allowed a "community action" to "go down the drain."

We agree.

Seminole Community Action is a failure and the major part of the blame is on the shoulders of the Executive Board.

We demand their resignations and asked the organization to regroup and attempt to start again with some fresh blood and urge Knowles, Dr. Roberts and Meltzer to start afresh.

There are some 5,000 people crying for help.

Their cry is falling on deaf ears NOW.

Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most people won't read President Johnson's budget message — it's such a swamp of figures — but it emerges the picture of an America bulging with prosperity and self-confidence.

The self-confidence part of it shows up earliest in Johnson's promise: "In Vietnam, as throughout the world, we seek peace but will provide all the resources needed to combat aggression." That's a big order.

But when Johnson mentions aggression he undoubtedly means Communist aggression.

And this promise to stop Communist aggression anywhere is consistent with American policy in Vietnam.

Johnson and others in his administration from time to time have given what sounded like noble reasons for American involvement in Vietnam, such as preserving democracy there although the people never really had it.

But running through all the Johnson explanations there has also been another reason —

WASHINGTON (NEA)—What- ever the real present vigor of the nation's radical right, very little was evident when one of its constituent elements, the "Liberty Lobby," convened its policy board for two days in Washington.

There was none of the snap of the old Goldwater days. Though the 400 or more right-wingers in attendance could always muster a warm round of applause for a sharp jab at one of their enemies, the blunt truth is that the meeting was fundamentally a meeting to discuss the future of the "Liberty Lobby."

The old "human events" conferences of the early 1960s cracked with celebratory splinters, from Barry Goldwater on down.

The best of the "Liberty Lobby" would do was a couple of southern congressmen, Reps. Albert Watson, South Carolina Republican, and Carl Curtis, Louisiana Democrat, and J. Evetts Haley, the salty Texan who gained some fame in 1964 with his harsh anti-Liberty Lobby paperback, "A Texan Looks at Lyndon."

Liberty Lobby's own great theme, of course, is espousal of the so-called liberty amendment, which would repeal the federal income tax provision contained in the Constitution's 16th amendment.

That note was struck again this time. And so were all the other familiar rights, we're chords: Get the United States out of foreign aid; stop trading with the Red; live or with anyone who does; finish off the Vietnam war with a big military smash; get Castro out of Cuba; watch out for Communists everywhere.

The list of individual enemies embodied no surprises. Aside from the President, Sen. Robert F. Kennedy of New York seemed the favored target. Asked from the floor about Ken-

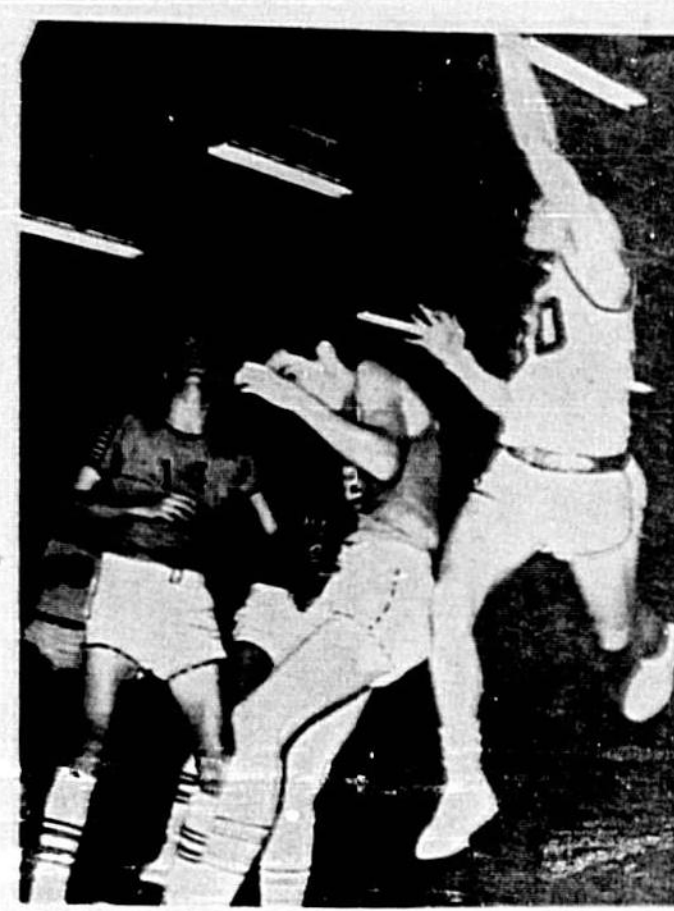

Questions and Answers

Q. Will you please let me know if I am eligible for the \$35.00 a month effective last October, I am 77 and receive \$84.00 social security benefit from my husband's account. A. Our special age 72 benefit is reduced by other federal or government pensions. Since you are entitled to social security benefits greater than \$35.00, you may not receive our special benefit.

Q. I am a widow woman 77 years old. I do not get any social security or any welfare, or any kind of help from anybody. I have read that citizens and residents age 72 and over will qualify for social security coverage of \$35.00 a month. I would like to know if I am entitled to this benefit and what I will have to do to get it. I have not enrolled for Medicare.

Q. It seems you will be eligible for the special age 72 benefit. Since you say you have not enrolled for Medicare, it will be necessary for you to apply. You will also need evidence of your age.

Q. Does the \$35.00 benefit for people over age 72 apply to persons receiving part support under the State Old Age Pension Plan?

A. No. Welfare money payments are a bar to our \$35.00 special benefit.

Q. May a retired Florida school teacher receiving a pension from the State Department of Education of \$206 a month also receive social security benefits?

A. Retirement benefits from social security are in no way affected by retirement payments from other sources.

Q. Please tell me if a wife who worked during part of her married life has to continue working in order to draw full social security. I have my full quota, but quit work in 1957 because of other responsibilities and poor health. I am 55. Will my benefit decrease if I do not go back to work? My husband will retire under Railroad Retirement in due time.

A. Just like a male wage-earner, a female worker will suffer a loss in benefit amount as a result of long-continued absence from work. The fact that you have enough quarters to be fully and permanently insured only assures that a minimum benefit will be payable. The amount of your benefit depends on your average

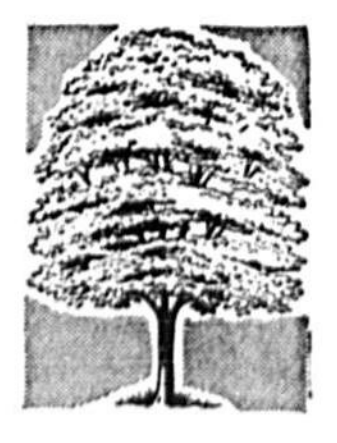

Beauty after Forty

Recently I saw "Freedom's Finest Hour" at the Gallery of Modern Art in New York. This is a magnificent achievement and truly something for all Americans.

It's the pictorial story of the American Revolution and it is illustrated with paintings and documents of the period.

Two brothers created this unusual, dramatic film. Also and Sam Thomas worked for four years doing the research and, as also Thomas told me, "When we started the project, I found that ever so many people didn't even know where Valley Forge is located." He and his brother worked and directed the film and they spent a great deal of time and effort in its production.

The introduction is by Robert Taylor, the narration by Ronald Reagan, who in his typical American voice, relates the story of an "unknown soldier" who does not appear on the screen; the color background and the fine historic paintings literally glow on film.

The New York Historical Society, the U.S. Naval Academy and the London Fashioners Guild, among others, permitted the Thomas brothers to photograph their possessions. The famous "Washington Cross" being the Delaware, which hangs in New York's Metropolitan Museum," is shown in all its glory.

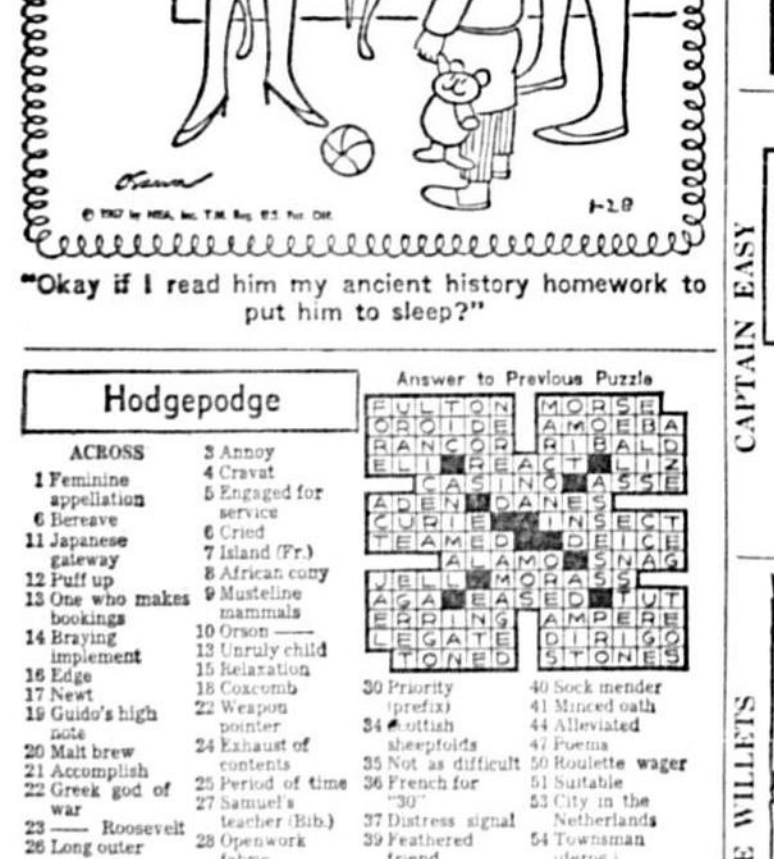
