A film and lecture on problems of vision, presented by Dr Richard Dougherty, local optometrist and president of the All Souls Home and School Association, highlighted the January meeting of the group in the social hall of All Souls Catholic Church. It was pointed out that among

More startling is the fact that three of the top 15 groups have actually lost members since 1956, despite the huge population increase; the A.B.C., the Disciples, and the United Church of Christ.

One problem in interprating these figures is that some denominations count all baptized infants, while others only count confirmed or adult members. Various explanations could be offered for losses on the part of some groups. Twenty per cent of all America moves every year. Some people move across several states to places like Florida, where many denominations do not operate. Many of these people join other Here are the 15 largest Protestant bodies:
