

Failure To Follow Orders Results In Train Collision

1940's Second Major Train Wreck Brings Fiery Death To At Least 43 Persons

Five Children Among Missing Failure To Sidetrack Coach Leads It To Head-on Smashup

AKRON, Ohio, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Railroad investigators today blamed an engineer's failure to follow operating orders for the fiery death of at least 43 persons in 1940's second major train wreck.

They said failure to sidetrack the gasoline-electric coach led it to clash head-on with the 73-car freight train near here last night. The steel coach instantly became a virtual furnace.

Two members of the coach's crew and a trainman leaped to safety. All others aboard were burned to death. Five children were among the victims.

The coach's single engineer, Thomas Murtough, 49, was blamed by L. M. Wolcott of Cleveland, Ohio, for the Pennsylvania Railroad wreck.

Wolcott, seriously injured, was unable to tell his story. Witnesses said that flames from the wrecked coach were so intense that some of the passengers could not escape.

Officials said the coach was sidetracked from the main line to allow a freight train to pass.

All the passengers died. The engine crew of the two freight locomotives were injured, but were not seriously.

Conscription Limit Given Consideration

Proposal Would Give President Power To Call Out Only Half Million In October

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—A proposal to limit the number of men who could be ordered into active training caused the Senate Military Committee to seek further War Department testimony today on the compulsory military service bill.

The limitation, suggested by Senator Lee (D-Okla.) would give the President specific authority to order conscription of 500,000 men between the ages of 21 to 30, inclusive, next October.

The House passed President Roosevelt's \$1,965,151,000 "total defense" bill in record time yesterday and sent it to the Senate where early approval is expected.

The Liner America

Although the United States has never taken part in any competition to see which country could build the largest or fastest ship, the commissioning of the liner America is a proud addition to our merchant fleet.

Displacing 35,000 tons, the America is only about half as big as the Queen Mary or Queen Elizabeth, ships which were designed more for speed and the prestige of bigness than for the practical aspects of paying a profit.

It is an often admitted fact, that the giant vessels of Britain and France never were profitable and that their chief excuse was for the publicity which they garnered for their lines.

However, it is not alone in the matter of economic operation that the America is a superior ship, for the safety factor has been emphasized to the point where it can be said it surpasses any of the bigger liners in this field.

No effort has been spared in making the ship as secure from hazards as possible, and the safety theme has been carried so far that even the upholstery of furniture has been treated chemically making it virtually fireproof.

The vessel is constructed throughout of fire-resisting material and water-tight subdivisions are arranged so that if any three adjacent watertight compartments should be flooded, the vessel would not submerge beyond the margin line, which is three inches below and parallel to the highest continuous water-tight deck.

All in all, the ship represents the finest example of American naval architectural design and construction skill. It isn't the biggest or fastest, two considerations which the builders shunned for practical reasons, but it is a worthy addition to a rapidly growing merchant marine.

Sick And Tired

Infinitely consoling to the mothers of Italy, who see the steady approach of a winter of hunger and disease for their children, must be the knowledge that Il Duca is strong and well.

Il Duca can still ride strenuously for fifteen minutes in the hot sun, and top off the performance with hard play on the tennis courts, despite the fact that he is fifty-seven years of age.

Yet the leader who bade them build their bodies as useful machines for life, had sent them forth to die. Not that the sacrifice might, in some measure, bring closer to reality a world without war; not to defend the things they hold dear but to acquire, perhaps, some square miles of ground, some strategic points from which another and greater war may one day be waged.

Many Italians already have died at Mussolini's behest—in Ethiopia, in Spain, in Albania. Each victory bought with the lives of young men led to another struggle and finally to this present conflict, with all its implications of greater suffering than the world has yet seen.

But somehow it will be stopped—if not by a military defeat of totalitarianism, with all its "dynamic" creed of destruction and yet more destruction, then by the perceiving weariness that even successful war engenders. Some day, the dictator will shout: "Am I sick? Am I tired?" And from millions of his erstwhile dupes will come the answer: "No, but we are!"—New York Herald Tribune.

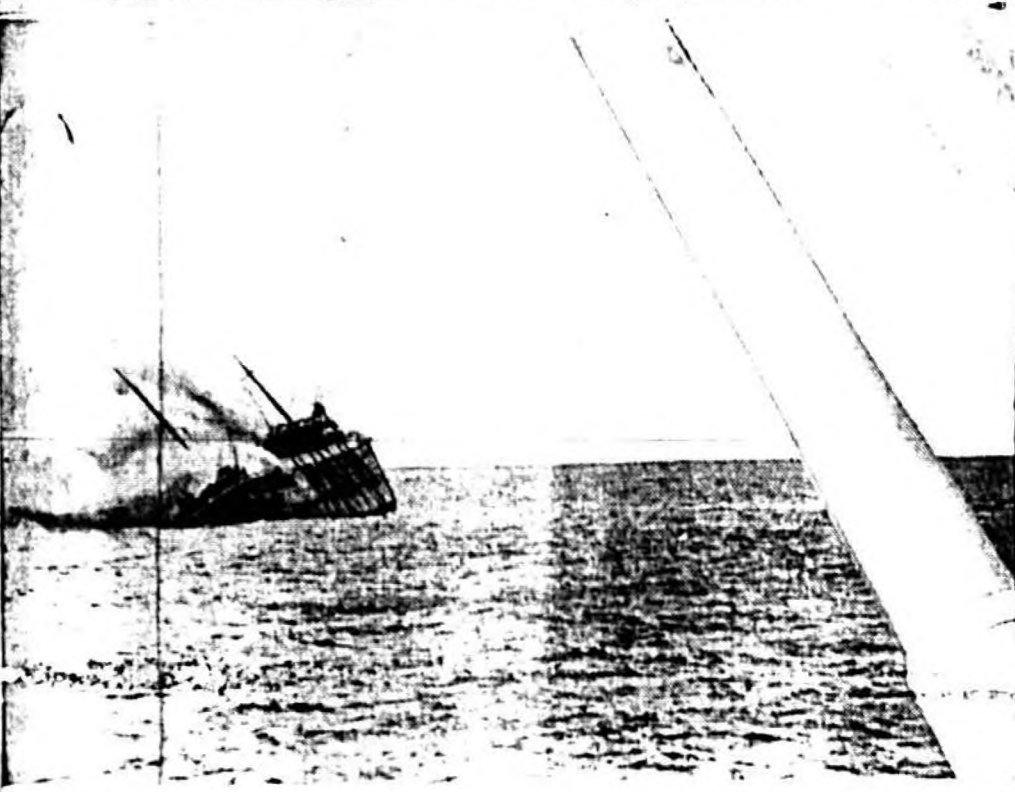

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Roosevelt Not Party's Choice Hardee Claims

Governor Says Draft Movement Planned By FDR

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 1.—(AP)—"Mr. Roosevelt was not drafted by the Democratic Party for a third term; he himself drafted the nomination," said A. Hardee of Live Oak, Florida yesterday after being named the titular head of the Democratic Party in Florida, in a statement here yesterday.

"In all this maneuvering I have seen the five Italian hands at work," Hardee said.

Hardee's statement follows: "Mr. Roosevelt was not drafted by the Democratic Party to run a third term. He himself drafted the nomination. Since the nomination of a President is the duty of the party, and the great presidents declined to run, the third term tradition has become an unwritten law with a binding force almost sacred as the Constitution itself."

Something had to be done to save this sentiment of the people, the President, with such a reputation, and such a record, as Hopkins, Wallace, et al., had planned the draft movement. Of course, Hardee did not say, at any time, that he was a candidate. He of course, had to delicately intimate that he did not want the nomination. He suddenly saw to it, however, that no other man in the party was built up for the nomination. When another man was prominent, he was knocked by letters or some other means. In some cases he had put up a straw man and he knocked him down at the

coating and the light appears as a blue glow. The rays are placed together in the darkness of an airplane camera. The light is called "black light" because it is invisible to the human eye.

"At first I thought I was inventing a plane with 'black light' coating," Garstang said. "They were afraid it. They had heard too much about the mysterious effects of violet rays."

"But we proved with the help of army aeronautical engineers that 'black light' was not harmful. You see, the rays are near the ultra violet rays, but above the actual ultra violet and below the harmful band."

So impressed was the U.S. army officials by the invention of "black light" that they ordered installation of the invention in every fighting plane. Contraband from every major airplane manufacturer in America also has been ordered to install it.

"This device isn't new," Garstang says. "Do you know how they used to make the lenses in the old cameras? They were made of quartz. Quartz was a very expensive material. I discovered that phosphorus was a much better material. This is applied to the dial of the instrument panel of airplanes."

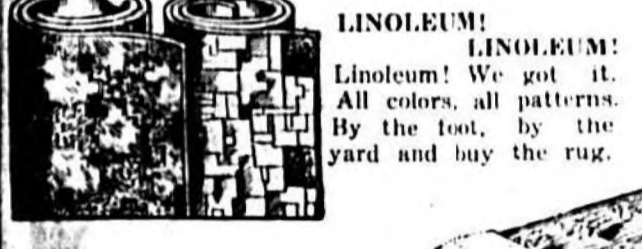

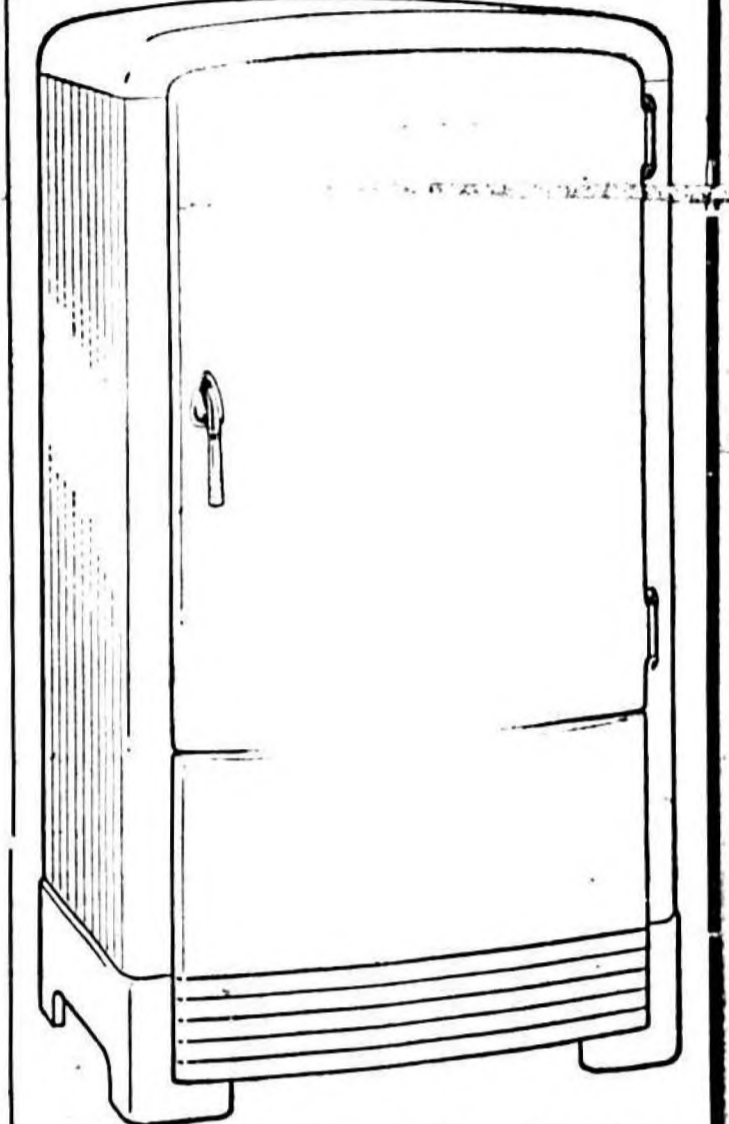
