Although the United States has never taken part in any competition to see which country could build the largest or fastest ship, the commissioning of the liner America is a proud addition to our merchant fleet and represents the very latest word in comfort, safety, and speed, commensurate with economical operation.

It is an often admitted fact, that the giant vessels of Britain and France never were profitable and that their chief excuse was for the publicity which they garnered for their lines. Their carrying capacity was so large that practically every trip was made with scarcely half the cabins filled. Their speed was so high that the excessive horsepower needed to attain the speed made them burn oil many times faster proportionately to the more moderately fast boats.

However, it is not alone in the matter of economic operation that the America is a superior ship, for the safety factor has been emphasized to the point where it can be said it surpasses any of the bigger liners in this field. No effort has been spared in making the ship as secure from hazards as possible, and the safety theme has been carried so far that even the upholstery of furniture has been treated chemically making it virtually fireproof.

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

### Roosevelt Not Party's Choice Hardee Claims

#### Governor Says Draft Movement Planned By FDR

JACKSONVILLE, Aug. 1.—(AP)—"Mr. Roosevelt, was not drafted by the Democratic Party for a third term; he himself drafted the nomination," said A. Hardee of Live Oak, Fla., in a statement here yesterday.

"In all this maneuvering, it was the fine Italian hand of a super politician," Hardee stated.

#### INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 1.—(AP)—In a small garage in downtown Indianapolis, tells the inventor of a light that shines no light to the human eye, but infinite light for the aviation industry.

He is William Garstang, and his invention is known as "black light."

Corresponding with the rays of the bulb, an organic phosphorus material has been developed by his laboratory. This is applied to the dial of the instrument panels of airplanes.

"At first I thought of a plane with 'black light' coating. They were afraid it. They had heard too much about the mysterious 'black light' rays.

"But we proved with the help of army aeronautical engineers that Wright field that the light is not harmful. You see, the rays are near the ultra violet rays, but above the normal ultra violet and below the harmful band."

So impressed was the U. S. army officials by the invention of "black light" that they ordered installation of the invention in every fighting plane. Contractors from every major airplane corporation in America also have been ordered to install the invention in their planes.

"This device isn't just an invention," Garstang says. "It is a practical device. It is a device that is used to check the interior of the old aircraft, saving only a handful of dollars in the case of damage. That was the main principle. Our light is just a little more technical."

"You see, 'black light' is just an application, not an invention. There was a lamp used for years in the navy, especially in the dark, to inspect the interior of the aircraft. Each unit of "black light" costs about \$125 for installation. According to Garstang, most "black light" units are used in the cockpit where they are placed in a small white plastic case, such as flying fortresses, and as they sit to 10 miles.

France Orders Large Estates Taken Over

Those named in the list of them who have fled to the United States will lose not only their fortune and property but their French citizenship as well unless they appear and provide "good reasons" for their flight, it was stated.







## FDR Believes Training Bill Is Essential

Declares He Favors Selective Service Bill For Adequate National Defense

## Says Profits Tax Should Be Enacted

Reports That U. S. Beginning To Get More Equipment

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—President Roosevelt today declared he was "distinctly in favor of a selective service training bill and I consider it essential to adequate national defense."

The President made his statement at a press conference after a reporter had asked him opinions. The report said there was a report going around that the chief executive was "not so hot" about conscription.

The President also announced that he and the Democratic tax leaders in Congress agree that the excess profits tax should be enacted without delay. In a lengthy conscription discussion, he said that lessons of the present war show that defense means total defense. Under modern circumstances that means a lot of new machinery, equipment which the nation hasn't got but is beginning to get.

## Lakeland Building Of Air School Starts

LAKELAND, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Work has started on Lakeland's air corps cadet training school which is scheduled to start operation Sept. 15.

Paul W. King, engineer in charge for Hal S. Darr, Chicago, president of Florida Aero Tech, Inc., announced that the contract for construction of three large buildings to house the school has been awarded to the J. L. Ewell company, Lakeland. Other bidders, King said, were the John E. Ballinger Construction company, W. E. Harrow and John Tompkins Lumber company, all of Lakeland.

While figures were not released, it was said the general contract calls for expenditures of more than \$100,000 for building and heating plant. Furnishings and equipment are not included in this amount.

The buildings include two three-story dormitories two stories high and a large cadet hall which will house the dining room, kitchen and recreation rooms. There will be facilities for a student body of 500 college men who come here as second lieutenants and take primary training before going to Randolph or Kelly field for advanced training.

The school campus is located just southeast of the present airport boundaries.

The army air corps is to send 50 or more planes here for use of students, it is understood. The city is to provide hangars and also is furnishing the site for the school.

With only 48 days before school opens, it may be necessary to house the first contingent of students in hotels for a time.

## Replegle Says State Will Vote Republican

## House To Act On Med Fly Bill Soon

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The long awaited House vote on a Florida resolution to set up a committee to adjudicate claims of Florida growers arising from the fruit fly eradication in 1938-39 was expected to be reached next week, possibly Wednesday or Thursday, Congressman Peterson said yesterday.

The resolution was placed on the House calendar by Majority Leader Raborn under terms of a special rule granted several weeks ago. Peterson said he obtained Raborn's definite pledge of House action.

The resolution already has been passed by the Senate. It would set up a joint House-Senate committee to adjudicate claims of the growers and the joint committee would classify them and recommend the payment of valid claims to Congress next year. Additional legislation would be required in appropriate funds for payment of the claims.

A special survey board estimated the damage claims at \$7,171,800 last year, but Congress recommended that final because of conflicting majority and minority reports.

## Knott Given Salary Boost By Tribunal

Supreme Court rules 3-2 In Favor Of Increasing Salary As Provided In Bill

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 2.—(AP)—State Treasurer W. V. Knott won a Supreme Court order today for \$1,000 annual salary increase, effective as of Oct. 1, 1939.

The court divided 3-2, with Justice Rufus Singleton, in ordering Comptroller Lee to pay the increased amount on the basis of the 1939 Legislature's appropriation, "not only on the basis of the 1939 Legislature's appropriation, but also on the basis of the fact that other chief officers also may get their salaries raised from \$5,000 to \$6,000 a year. The Governor's salary may be increased from \$7,500 to \$8,000, the salary of the secretary of State is identical because of the appropriation bill's words, with that in Knott's case."

Knott plans to return when his term expires and he will receive \$1,000 a year retirement pay, or half of his salary at retirement.

Knott's annual report, published yesterday, showed that receipts in the first five months of the fiscal year ended June 30 were \$77,491,091 and the total fiscal year will reach \$310,780,000. The fiscal year will end June 30.

Comparative figures for the preceding year were \$75,879,211 received and \$296,222,170 paid out. Balance in the Treasury on June 30 reached \$12,121,147, compared with \$8,811,144 the preceding year.

The Treasury statement does not include Knott's salary. Comptroller J. M. Lee, which had not cleared through the Treasury ledgers on June 30. Figures were not immediately available on the total of such payments.

No hope remained that any of the five still-missing employees of the E. M. Hollingshead company paint factory survives. A worker said a fireman and the other firefighter of the disaster, Fire Chief John H. Lenox said it was caused by a spark from a repairman's wrench that ignited a tank of benzene.
