## Dawes Vote Causes Adjournment Date To Be Put Forward

ice President Casts Deciding Ballot To Keep Congress From Adjourning Tuesday

pplaus Greets Senate's Action

onsiderable Jockeying Attends Voting On Important Issue

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(INS)—Under dramatic circumstances Vice President was today defeated the adjournment resolution to adjourn Congress at five o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Although the House adopted the adjournment resolution by a big majority, the Senate voted 40 to 40 on the question of adjourning home tomorrow. This gave Vice President an opportunity.

"The vote is 40 ayes and 40 nays," said Dawes. "The result is a tie; the chair casts his vote and the chair voice casts his vote."

He was defeated, the resolution.

There was a wide outbreak of applause in the galleries while administration leaders sat stunned in their seats.

The surprise was all the greater because the Senate previously had rejected a amendment to keep Congress in session until June 5, and then, until the 2.

The action of the Senate with Vice President's aid, left administration leaders in a quandary. The Senate had refused to remain in session until next Tuesday by a vote of 39 to 41, defeating an amendment to effect, proposed by Senator Johnson (R) of California.

Then the Senate declined to remain in the house until next Saturday, by a vote of 38 to 42. Finally, it voted to adjourn tomorrow.

There were considerable jockeyings on the three votes: Senator Dill (D) of Florida, and Glass (D) of Virginia, after voting against Congress, here until June 5, and voted against the 2 date.

Senator Dill (D) of Washington, who voted against June 5, voted for June 2. On the final vote, Senators Cutting (R) of New Mexico, and Coffey (R) of Michigan, voting against extending the date of adjournment, suddenly left and voted against adjourning tomorrow. This meant that the three votes broke by the adjournment adjournment.

In the final roll call, all party leaders were destroyed. There were twenty Republicans, and twenty Democrats, voting to adjourn to June 5, while nineteen Republicans, twenty Democrats, and a few Laborites voted against it.

The action was a victory for supporters of Boulder Dam legislation under the leadership of Senator Johnson (R) of California, provided that the Senate remains until a vote is granted the swing Johnson Bill.

Despite their victory, Boulder Dam advocates were convinced that the bill cannot reach a vote in the Senate at this session. They voted by Johnson just prior to adjournment he asked unanimous consent to have his bill laid aside one minute before 5 o'clock tomorrow.

## Many Ocean Liners Are Delayed By Fog

NEW YORK, May 28.—(INS)—More than 2500 passengers on fifteen incoming liners today were within hearing distance of their destinations, but the ships were fogbound in the lower bay. The mist spread a murky curtain at quarantine that brought pilots to a quick decision anchorage. The President Garfield of the Dollar Line, was returning with tourists from France. Two emerald, the Corinthia and the Lancastria from English ports, lay near the Garfield. Other trans-Atlantic ships that swung in idleness were the Frederick VIII, from Copenhagen; New York of the Hamburg American Line; the Red Star liner Arabic; the California of the Anchor Line; the Atlantic Transport Minnetonka and the Furness Bermuda boat, Port Victoria.
