Dawes Vote Causes Adjournment Date To Be Put Forward

President Casts Deciding Ballot To Keep Congress From Adjourning Tuesday

Plausible Greeting Senate's Action

WASHINGTON, May 28.—(INS)—Under dramatic circumstances, Vice President Dawes today defeated the adjournment resolution (S. J. 100) which would have adjourned Congress at 10 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Although the House adopted the adjournment resolution by a big majority, the Senate voted 10 to 10 on the question of adjournment tomorrow. Vice President Dawes cast the deciding vote.

The action of the Senate with Vice President Dawes' aid, left administration leaders in a quandary. The Senate refused to remain in session until next Tuesday by a vote of 33 to 21, defeating an amendment to effect, proposed by Senator Jones (R) of California. Then the Senate decided to remain in session until next Saturday, by a vote of 48 to 22. Finally, it voted to adjourn tomorrow.

Austria Will Crusade Against Immorality

VIENNA, May 24 (INS)—The Index of Prohibited Books, the State Commission on Public Morals, the Jail for Immoral and Immoral, a severe censorship and rigid press laws should be reintroduced in Austria as a part of a crusade against vice and especially against immorality of the stage and in the press, according to a bill introduced in the Austrian Bundestag (parliament) today by the Austrian Senator, Dr. Berni Pichl, an ardent Christian Socialist.

3 RECORDS FALL IN TRACK GAMES, STANFORD LEADS

California University Slated To Capture Intercollegiate Meet At Cambridge For Her Second Successive Victory

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., May 25.—Three championship records were already cut down and haveaved us the final rounds of the intercollegiate track and field title games this afternoon and, according to popular belief the pruning and the shearing was only begun. Today, they were to be cut there, with a grain reaper.

The decapitation of as many as five game records was regarded as a distinct possibility before nightfall. Among the accepted probabilities was the defeat of the world's best 100 yard mark by Lee Barnes, Southern California, at Sahin Park, Calif., or both.

The latter half of the sprint and indoor events at 10, 20 and 40 feet and 100 yards respectively will be worked also when Barnes bettered both by a fraction of an inch in a coast meet. The meeting of this pair in the finals today, therefore, fore-cast the setting of a world record.

Stanford, with Eric Krenz and his companions ready for another trial in the field events, was believed to have the team title ready for shipment. E. O. B. Palo Alto, California, it will be Stanford's second successive championship year, to find its way into California.

Krenz was one of the main dependences of those who predicted further records today. His 50 feet 1 inch in the shot put and 154 feet 11 inches in the discus may be improved by himself. It was argued, particularly in the event that a warm sun prevailed.

Money Sought For Purchase Historic Fort In Wyoming

CHEYENNE, Wyo., May 25.—(INS)—A campaign is under way in Wyoming to raise funds with which to purchase the famous Fort Bridger in southwestern Wyoming, a western frontier outpost established in 1843 and used until 1860.

The state historical marking commission, upon visiting the old fort, found it in an excellent state of preservation. It consists of the old guard houses, commissary, officers' quarters, Jim Baker's cabin site, parade grounds, and thearrison wall built as protection from the Indians. As many as five hundred soldiers were stationed there at one time.
