City has full plate

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary city commissioners Thursday ap-proved unanimously three of four agenda items, with Com-missioner Thom Greene dissenting on a vote to amend the future land use of commercial property south of Anderson Lane.

In a related vote, commis-sioners approved the change in zoning designation from Ag-ricultural-1 to Commercial-1. a designation for professional / office sites.

In an amended "developer's agreement," Windover will not be allowed to use the property to house an adult congregate living facility, nor food-and-beverage outlets like restaurants or nightclubs.

The developer will have to preserve existing trees and vegetation in all buffer and setback areas and keep a watchful eye on new land-scaping so that it, within three years, covers about 80 percent of the building facing lake-side, per an "opacity" clause. Greene questioned the en-

forceability of the capacity clause, which cannot be guaranteed because of the use of vegetation. Severe live drought, heavy rains and even freezes could affect the outcome of the landscaping effort. When Greene questioned the city attorney, Donna McIntosh, on whether the city would be able to enforce the clause, she answered, "Probably not."

Beware of calls asking for money

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - The ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - The Altamonte Springs Fire De-partment on Thursday issued a warning prompted by com-plaints from citizens receiving phone calls requesting dona-tions to "their local fire de-partment." The telemarketing scam may also be targeting other local cities and counties, according to fire department seconding to fire department spokesman Alan S. Harris.

Harris said his department received two complaints on Wednesday and that "they started pouring in" on Thurs-day, regarding a telemarketing scam now taking place, where callers request money to be sent to a specific location as donation to a local fire department.

SANFORD - Residents in a Sanford apartment complex are complaining about termites, exposed wiring and other problems.

Tanya Williams, who lives in apartment 110 of the Ridge-wood Villas Apartments near Seminole High School, said that a portion of her roof collapsed Tuesday. She said her apartment has exposed electrical wiring, weak walls, and a problem with roaches and termites.

"All these apartments need to be rewired," Williams said. Things need to be fixed. It's

This is a 15-hour turn-around, and they're still complaining," Bumbalugh said.


Williams and Pasley said they tried to call Bumbalugh about the ceiling Saturday and Sunday, but could not reach him.

Our Views Getting a grip on the country's pastime

The sportswriter Grantland Rice once wrote: "It matters not who wins or loses but how you play the dame.

The phrase has changed:

"It matters not who wins or loses but how you sell your name.

We saw it coming and did nothing to stop the onslaught. Some 225 hitter decided he'd charge 10 bucks for his autograph. When the late Joe DiMaggio heard this, he said he'd charge \$200 for his.

Baseball players endorsed products even in Grantland Rice's day. Babe Ruth sold caps, underwear and suspenders. But the real selling didn't get going until 25 years ago when sports sold its soul to the devil.

This is an age when no revenue stream is unexplored. Yes, kids who want autographs may have to pay for them. Yes, watch out now for commercials up the arms. Just like the auto racers and the soccer players wear. Baseball has another chance to eash in,

Games are played in stadiums and arenas with corporate names. There are advertisements on the walls, on the grass on the ice - and worst of all on the players. On their shoes, their spikes, their skates, their sticks and bats.

Major League Baseball now is considering allowing teams to self advertising space on a player's uniforms. MLB, the official sponsor of Fidel Castro's Communist Cuba, scores again.

That friendly game last Sunday with Castro's cadets and the Baltimore Orioles had everything to do with hypocrisy and nothing to do with sports. The teams will play again in Baltimore. Fidel won't be there. But we suspect the vendors may be hawking cigars and latigues. All endorsed by MLB.

The problem is that there just aren't enough bucks to satisfy the players and the owners. There won't be any Pittsburgh Pirates or Montreal Expos much longer. And in 25 years or so, there may be no more professional baseball in America.

Our children's children are going to wake up and realize it's time to return sport to its rightful owners athletes who play for the love of the game and fanwho know it's not okay to put a commercial endorsement on the performance-enhanced arm of their favortte ballplayer.

Opening Day is here. Let's Get a Grip on the Game.

Help children now

Florida's frequent voters, many of whom are seniors, are getting it about children. In Florida Children's Campaign statewide poll, voters said loud. and clear that children who are abused, failing in school, and have few job skills need our immediate attention and action.

Voters care deeply about families under stress, the cross-generational needs of children and elderly grandparents, and the shocking number of problems caused by alcohol and drug abuse.

Pult respondents were mostly older, with grown children, and with deep roots in Florida:

A clear majority (56%) were over the age of 51, 71% did not have children in the home. Only 19% had children in public schools 73% had lived in Florida more than five vears.

For these Florida voters, protecting children is far more important than tax cuts. Given the choice between paying lower local or state taxes and more help for kids, nearly 3 of every 4 voters (73%) chose more help for kids. And when given the choice between lower corporate taxes and more help for kids. 8 of every 10 voters (80%) chose more help for kids.

These poll findings represent an earth-shaking shift in voter optition about the best use of state resources. In the context, of a continuing strong economy, voters are saying they support accountable and results oriented solutions to help children survive and succeed.

The link between the unmet needs of children and high levels of school failure and crime is clearly connected in voters minds. This view is further supported by these facts: 95% of voters want their sher-

iffs and police chiefs to emphasize crime prevention as much as crime fighting 84% say better pre-school development of kids would do a lot

to help our education system. The power of these poll findings portends an exciting new political debate that will carry through the year 2000. Never before have voters spoken with such a unified voice, in this volume, about children. We hope the voice of the sot-

ers - to help children now becomes too compelling for any elected official, candidate. or political party to ignore.



Congressional flag desecrators are back

Last year, while Congress was debating whether to diminish the First Amendment by punishing desecration of the flag, Keith Kreul-an Army veteran and a past national commander of the American Legion-lestilled before the Senate Judiciary Committee. He was angry at this move to amend the Bill of Rights for the first time in our history:

"Our nation was not founded on devotion to symbolic idols. but on principles, beliefs and ideals expressed in the Constitution and its Bill of Rights. American veterans who have protected our banner in battle have not done so to protect a golden calf.' Instead they carried the banner forward with reverence for what it represents-our beliefs and freedom for all. Therein lies the beauty of our flag."

Kreul also told the Senate Judiciary Committee: "A patriot cannot be created by legislation."

Nonetheless, the House roared forward and passed a constitutional amendment-by a whopping 310-114 empowering the Congress to prohibit the desceration of the flag. In the Senate, a move to

bring the amendment to the floor under limited debate was blocked, in accordance with Senate rules, by Sens. Robert Kerrey (D-Nrb.) and Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.).

Had there been a vote, two or three senators could have permanently changed the Constitution-the vote was that close.

In a previous hearing before the Senate Judictary Committee, Russell Feingold (D-Wis.) had told his colleagues there are indeed countries that punish desceration of the national flag. Iran, he said, provides a punishment of up to 10 years; Hatti mandates a life sentence at hard labor for such heretics; and the more tolerant Cuban sanction is imprisonment for up to one year.

Feingold asked if the Senate wanted to add the United States to that list of governments unfettered by a Bill of

Rights. He did not get a standing ovation

Res. 33, which proposes a flag desceration amendment to the Constitution that will be attached when it is ratified by three-fourths of the state legislatures within seven years after the date of its submission. for ratification.

This emulation of the patriotte values of Iran. Hatti and of these truants were subject Cuba now has at least 269 cosponsors in the House. The historic assault on the First Amendment is scheduled for a hearing before the Subcommittee on the Constitution, chatred by Charles Canady (R-Fla.), on March 23. During the impeachment proceedings, Canady was an impressive constitutionalist but he is apparently not immune to more than a touch of jingoism.

How he can see from the inside

A man who is blind and his grandmother have a couple of more weeks to live in their rented home here. Grandma has decided to move to New Jersey. She is giving up most of her possessions. She won't even be able to keep her rocking chair.

The man said he may try his luck in Santa Barbara, Calif.

A few months shy of 36. the man has no one to turn to for help. He has heard good things about Santa Barbara. He has been sent copies of the Santa Barbara News Press the past few weeks. Grandma has read him the apartment ads and community news.

'It's a long way to go but it may well be worth the effort," he said. "When you're blind, you need to live in a community that cares about your needs. Central Florida the Orlando area - Isn't that community. That's why I have to move."

The man is down on the area's transportation system. Not being able to drive, he has to rely on what's known. as Lynx's A+Link Service for the disabled lie said he never knows when the service will come for him. If he needs to be picked up by 9 o'clock, he asks for 8 o'clock. "And chances are they'll still come after 9," he suid.

And that isn't all.

For years, the man said he has begged for members. of churches or civic organirations to visit his residence and read to him. He said that usually he is given the run-around. That no one is available. That he should try to get some books on tape.

He requires frequent medical attention. He has diabetes and suffers from A-Plastic Anemia. He needs to have a therapeutic phiebotomy each month. This proc-

It depresses him that he gets so depressed. His best moments are when he can talk to or visit friends - or listen to Do wop music on the radio. His fondest dream is to encee his own Do-wop show. He's contacted area stations without success.

"You can push so far," he said. "Whether you're blind or disabled, you're treated. differently than those who can see or are able-bodied. People, talk to you as if you were a child or as if you. weren't intelligent. Some think they're being kind, but they're not?

He said he is thankful that he had sight ever so poorfor nearly 25 years. He was able to see the colors of the world, able to look into the eyes of his friends. He was able to see movies. Able to read from a book.

Hurled into darkness, he can now imagines colors. He said he can feel who is friends are even if he can not see them. He enjoys movies that he can hear but not see. He watched Pleasantville with a friend last weekend. Amazingly, he sensed whenever a character went from black & white to color.

"You've seen this before," his friend said.

"No, I haven't," he answered.

"How can you tell, then?" "I see from the inside," he said.







Continued from Page 1A rently in rentable status, according to Bruce Bumbalugh, the live-in manager of the complex. Management at the complex said that the problems are being addressed.

Bumbalugh said that workers respond as fast as possible to complaints.

"We can only do one job at a time," Bumbalugh said. "We have limited manpower and funds. We do the best with what we've got."

The city's Code Enforcement Board on Feb. 9 found Ridgewood Villas in violation of operating a business without a current city occupational license. The city is fining Ridgewood Villas \$25 per day, according to the Sanford Building Department.

An inspection of Ridgewood Villas by the Sanford Fire Department on Oct. 27, 1998 found the complex in compliance with city codes.

Residents have not complained to the City of Sanford

about the Ridgewood Villas Apartments, officials at the Sanford Building Department said.

Regina Thompson, who lives in apartment 229, said that her floor is in weak condition and she lacks hot water. She said she worries about weak steps in the complex that shake when people walk on them

them. Lillian Williams, who lives in apartment 211, said her floor is decaying in front of the sliding glass door, her porch is shaky, the food disposal and dishwasher do not work, the walls are in poor condition, the roof has cracks, there is faulty wiring, and her fire extinguisher has expired. She said poor air conditioning has made her infant daughter ill.

Management has spent \$4,000 for heat and air conditioning repairs this year, Bumbalugh said.

Bumbalugh said that residents have not complained to him of a termite problem. "If they don't tell me how do I know," Bumbalugh said. "I have not seen evidence of termites."

The swimming pool is closed until repairs can be completed. Bumbalugh said the pool does not pose a health hazard. He said the pool has 40 pounds of chlorine shock, and that it is not a breeding ground for mosquitoes.


Bumbalugh said that much of the problem in the condition of the apartments lies in abuse by the tenants.


"Most of the apartments are in good condition when the tenants move in." Bumbalugh said. "When they move out, it's another question."

Bumbalugh said that many of the tenants complain about repairs that need to be done to avoid eviction.

"A lot of times they don't tell me anything until I come up to them for their rent," Dumbalugh said.




Throughout the school term, Fisher and her husband chaperone various Key Club eventsfund raisers, service projects and leadership activities such as the annual Key Club convention.

SANFORD - Eugene Story, head custodian of Midway Elementary School, has been selected to represent Seminole County in the Florida School-Related Employee of the Year Program.



Before we invest, we should determine what we want our investments to do for US.

When we invest. we're using money in the hope of making more money. I seldom receive any argument over this. However, the money we use for investing should be extra money that represents surplus savings or income not needed for essentials.

We might choose to invest these funds in mortgages. real estate, life insurance or securities (stocks and bonds). They're all basically different, and no one fits the needs of every person.

Since we're discussing mainly securitles, let's focus on some of the reasons why we might want to invest in stocks or bonds. Many people prefer them because they can be readily bought and sold. Lake Brantley romped, 16-6, as its strack dominated throughout against an Oviedo defense that was fired up Thursday but suffered a letdown Friday.



Student museum remains a place of wonder, discovery

SANFORD - It didn't take long for Lawton Elementary School fourth-grader Joseph Filosa to scan the historically-accurate classroom at Seminole County's Student Museum and miss a common item found in modern classrooms -- a computer.

Filosa and 25 of his classmates in Lisa Farmer's class recently "attended" the school with 16 students from the school. They spent

This same class recently donated a 'History of Florida" quilt to the museum. Created from 24 individual men's handkerchiefs (there are now two additional students), the quilt was then sewn together by a volunteer parent-Part of a Florida Studies project, the quilt represents some historical high points for the state. The students also created a book describing the quilt and its backgrounds, according to Farmer.

In 1911, the red-brick schoolhouse became Satilord Grammar School until 1984, when the Student Museum and Center for the Social Studies forged a new mission for the two story red brick schoolhouse. Now, it swaths in history 5,000 fourth-graders yearly from throughout Seminole County, and on Wednesdays, private- and home-school students as well.



tab. An "American Ingenuity" room is now under development.

While the curriculum focuses on a threehour visit from county fourth anoders. Each explains that students in other grades often visit for project-specific assignments. Programs are scheduled daily, except Wednesdays until about 1:30 p.m., when the school opens for public visits until 4 p.m. A museum wish list includes requests for a hand-cranked ice cream churn, metal skates and key (pre-rollerblade models which fit over standard shoes and sneakers) and Dick and dane books. They also appreciate donations of standard items, like No. 2 pencils, paper and miscellaneous office and garden supplies. Volunteers are sought to provide gardening help, clerical assistance, or, as in the case of Boardman, to serve as museum docents. Boardman, a former school teacher in Jacksonville, now lives in Lake Mary and helps out often, according to school administrator Gladys Prevatt, Visitors must always check in with Prevatt at the museum office.

a few hours in their own time warp, under the watchful tutelage of teacher Serena Fisher. instructional assistant Dee Gouchenour and docent Arlene Boardman, who took them back more than a full millennia to learn about life in the real heart of Florida.

In a re-creation of a Timucuan village -- the Native American room -- Fisher leads students to consider life in this area 1200 years ago, through the eyes of the Timucua Indian.

Just down the hall, Boardman helps students experience some of the furnishings of the turn-of-the-century classroom first used when the museum opened its doors as San-ford High School in 1902 -- a portable manual typewriter, an inkwell and an American flag with 45 stars.

Out in the lobby, Gouchenour's group learns about the man for whom their school is named -- Thomas Willingham Lawton, Earning his "Life Graduate State Certificate" for elementary English, mathematics, history and Latin on Oct. 13, 1925, Lawton served as public school superintendent from 1916 to 1953.

Beginning Monday, Seminole Community College will offer a General Education Diploma (GED) class free of charge to the pubhe. Running Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., the class "will bring full circle the old Sanford High School," according to

According to Fisher, the school is a source of alumni pride for at least one Seminole county school administrator. Dec Schumacher, director of curriculum and instruction attended the elementary school. So did Seminole Herald photographer Tommy Vincent, a student in the early 1960s.

Described in literature as "an interpretive center and teaching museum," the Student Museum is funded and operated by Seminole. County Public Schools. Other displays include the Pioneer room, Grandma's Allic, Georgetown Exhibit, doll collections and a geography

Outside, a Demonstration Garden, conceived and operated as a cooperative effort between the public school system. Seminole County master gardeners and the county's Cooperative Extension Service, is nurtured by the county's master gardener, Walt Padgett. Sown and reaped for students to experience agriculture at the turn of the century, the pioneer garden includes gourds, mustard and collard greens, and the a local cash crop for many decades, celery.

A domation of 15 historical rose bushes from Ixora Garden Club of Sanford will provide the focal point for an antique rose garden currently being designed, with an anticipated May 15 dedication. Fisher describes a path and a trellis to set a "turn-of-the century" entrance to the back of the building at 7th and Elm Streets in Sauford.

She looks forward to refurbishment under way at George Touby Park across the street from the school which will help put the finishing touches on that particular part of historic Sanford.

Flu season still lingers

SEMINOLE COUNTY - An increasing number of patients are reporting cases of influenza to their doctors during an unusually late flu sca-SOD.

influenza is a potentially fatal illness, especially among individuals most at risk of complications such as the elderly, children, and individuals with chronic illnesses and compromised immune symptoms, as well as pregnant women.

There's still a lot of influenza in Central Florida," Dr. Bob Hudson, medical director of ZymteTx, Inc., sponser of the National Flu Surveillance Network, said.

The NFSN is declaring that the state of Florida is under an Influenza Warning due to the increase in flu cases. Doctors are reporting increasing numbers of influenza cases on a daily basis, officials said.

The important thing is for people to realize there is treatment for influenza," Hudson said. Anti-virals can be effective if given within 48 hours of the symptoms appearing." Officials estimate that 20,000 influenza-

related deaths occur in the U.S. on average per year. In 1994, an estimated 30 million people contracted influenza nationwide, costing nearly 70 million lost workdays.

Influenza is the sixth leading cause of death in the U.S. so far in 1999, ahead of diabetes. It is the third leading cause of death for people over age 80, Hudson said.

This year's strand of influenza is the Type A Sydney Virus, known for causing respiratory complications, bronchitis, and viral pneumonia, Hudson said.

"It's a bad actor," Hudson said.

Viral pneumonia brought on by a complex strand of influenza that hit the U.S. starting in May, 1917 and running through early 1918 caused an estimated 500,000 deaths in the U.S., and 30 million deaths worldwide, Hudson said.

The influenza virus was initially spread by soldiers fighting in World War I. At the time. doctors were unable to determine the cause of


the pandemic. "Who knows when the next pandemic will strike," Hudson said.

Influenza season in the U.S. typically runs from Nov. to April. It is spread by simple contact and is most contagious in its early stages, often before infected individuals are aware they are carrying the virus. The incubation period for influenza is one to four days, offcials said.

Symptoms of influenza include fever, cough. headache, muscle aches, and weakness, officials said.

Any person who thinks they are coming down with influenza symptoms should immediately contact their personal physician for an evaluation. Anti-viral medication can shorten the course of influenza and reduce the possibility of complications, Hudson said.

"Influenza is the most under diagnosed, under treated, and trivialized virus that any of us see every day," Hudson said. "It is hard, clinically, to make the diagnosis."



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Prevent heartburn

HOUSTON--Some relatively simple lifestyle and diet changes can prevent heartburn before it even starts.

"Hearthum refers to a sennation of warmth behind the breast cone and is caused by stomach contents that backflow, or reflux," said Dr. Gulchin Ergun, medical director of the Reflux Center at Baylor College of Medicine and the Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Heartburn can also be accompanied by a sour taste, burning and pressure that can last for hours. These symptoms often become cating



More than 15 million Americana suffer from heartburn, which is one of the common symptoms of Gastroesophageal Reflux Disease (GERD). While the symptoms can usually be alleviated with over-thecounter antacids, there are other ways to avoid the discomfort of heartburn.

"Foods that are acidic and direct irritants to the csophagus should be avoided," Ergun said. She lists orange, grapefruit and pineapple juices, foods that contain large amounts of vinegar, aspirin, alcohol, caffeine, tomato products, and chocolate as potential "heart burners."

Ergun also recommends staying away from large or excessively fatty meals and not eating two to three hours before lying down.

However, there is a point when heartburn can become more than a nuisance, warns Ergun. If symptoms occur more than two to three times a week, are present for long periods of time, do not respond to treatment with over-the-counter medications, or include vomiting blood, excessive pain and swallowing difficulties, she recommends consulting a physician for further evaluation.

Those who have a chronic problem with reflux will probably have it in some version or another their whole lives," Ergun said.

However, there are options. 'People who do not respond well with diet modification might find relief with prescription medications, or they might choose to correct the problem with surgery."

Anesthesia Services Act

Sharing Congressmen Jim Nussle (R-IA) and William J. Coyne's (D-PA) believe that all patients, especially those covered by Medicare and Medicaid, should be able to receive safe, high quality anesthesia care anywhere in the United States, the American Association of Nurse Anesthetists (AANA) has enthusiastically endorsed their bill H.R. 804, The Access to Anesthesia Services Act."

The Nussle-Coyne bill would allow states to decide for themselves whether it is necessary for Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) to be supervised by physicians when providing anesthesia care.

"States like lowa know how difficult it is to attract physicians to rural and medically under-served areas," said Rep. Nussle, who is co-chairman of the House Rural Health Care Coalition. "If a CRNA can administer anesthesia or provide other healthcare treatments safely, we must not allow federal rules and bureaucracy to stand in the way. We can't wait for the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) to change its rules."

Introduction of the Nussle-Toyne bill comes 14 months

after HCFA itself proposed eliminating the federal supervision requirement and deferring to the states on this issue. Currently, in anesthesia cases involving Medicare patients, nurse anesthetists must be supervised by physicians in order for hospitals to be reimbursed. However, for the nurse anesthetists themselves to be reimbursed. Medicare docs not require physician supervision.

*Congressman Nussle and Coyne obviously recognize the

valuable contributions of CRNAs in healthcare today, particularly in rural communitics," said AANA President Linda R. Williams, CRNA, JD. "In approximately 65 percent of rural hospitals, CRNAs are the sole anesthesia providers, affording these medical facilities obstetrical, surgical, and trauma stabilization capabilitics. In fact, CRNAs actually administer nearly two thirds of all anesthetics provided to patients in this country each year."

Rep. Nussle said. "I trust other states will follow the lead of lowa and 28 other states which understand that if you require physicians to be present when administering anesthesia you are further re stricting access to healthcare."

The guest speaker for the



March meeting was Lisa Davis. Lisa works in rehab at the Florida Hospital Senior Health and Resource Center in Lake Mary. Lisa came to talk about the health benefits of exercising. Everyone knows that exercising is good for you. But not everyone knows why it's good for you.

Exercising can help avoid and/or minimize disease. Heart disease, stroke, high blood pressure, arthritis, osteoporosis, and depression can all be avoided or minimized with exercise. Diabetes can lead to vascular disease because of a decrease in blood flow. Exercise can minimize this. Exercise can also reduce the risk of colon and breast cancer.

But don't go out and run 20 miles if you haven't exercised in a while. If you've been a bit of a couch potato, you need to consult your doctor before you being an exercise program. Then you need to start slowly and work up to a full schedule.

The four components of physical fitness are: aerobic conditioning, body fat, flexibil-ity and strength. For aerobic conditioning, you need to know your target heart rate range. Take the number 220, subtract your age and multiply that number by 65% and then by 85%. The answer is your range. For example, if you're 60, it would be 220 - 60 = 160. 160 x 6596 = 104, $160 \times 8596 = 136$. That means your target heart rate range is 104 to 136. When you participate in aerobic conditioning, you want to get your

heart up to at least 104, but not go over 136.

And the good news about acrobic conditioning is that you don't have to work out for 30 to 45 minutes at a time. You can get good results by starting out with as little as 5 or 10 minutes a couple of times a day for cardiovascular health. If your goal is to lose weight, you should do at least 20 minulcs at a time.

For a woman, you body fat should be between 15 and 25% of your weight. Your doctor or someone who works in the fitness field, can help you determine what your percentage is. If it's over 25%, you should lose weight.

Flexibility is something you can't get overnight. You have to start slow with stretching exercises and increase them slowly. Over time, your flexibility will improve.

Strength training is also very Important. Working out with weights or bands two to three times a week gives you stronger muscles and tendons. With stronger muscles and tendons, your bones are better protected.

There are eight basic tips to help you get started on the right path to exercising.

1. Whatever you do, don't over do it. A common cause of injury is exercising too aggressively, "too much, too soon". 2. "No pain, no gain" is a myth. Pain is a warning sign to stop! Exercise does not have to "burn" to do any good. 3. Une adequate footwear. Improper or worn-out shoes increases your risk of injury to hips. knees, ankles and feet. 4. Control your movements -- if you can't, slow down. Rapid, jerky movements overstress joints and can lead to injury. 5. Watch your form and posture. Stress injuries can result from poor form, such as landing on the balls of your feet instead of the heels. 6. Don't bounce while stretching. Gradual stretching helps muscles, bounce stretching can increases chance of muscle tears and soreness. 7. Avoid highimpact aerobics. High impact aerobics can lead to shin, calf, lower back, ankle and knee injuries. Choose low impact aerobics instead. 8. Warm up, and cool down. Take the time to do this properly and you'll reduce your risk of exercise

related injuries.





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


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
