DAWES TAKING OFFICE WHICH HE DIDN'T SEEK

Will Assume Duties Of Office
Which He Would Have Re-
fused Had It Been Tendered
To Him Six Months Ago

"Hell and Maria" Had
Planned A Quiet Life

Coolidge's Running Mate Has
Been Banker, Soldier, Busi-
ness Man, Philanthropist

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Charles G.
Dawes on March 4 next year will
assume an office which he originally
did not seek and if offered
him six months ago he almost
certainly would have declined. This
statement is made by some of
those closest to the vice-president
elect and by those who know the
inside story of the banker, soldier,
business man, philanthropist, and
economist has come to a place after
March 4, next, where he will be
second in command only to the
president.

Six months also Mr. Dawes re-
turned from Europe after serving as
head of the experts' committee of the
reparations commission which had worked out a plan
for the economic rehabilitation of
Europe. It was his third
period of public service after having
been comptroller of the currency under
President McKinley and Director of the budget under
President Harding.

Mr. Dawes accordingly set about
the settlement of his affairs so as
to spend the remainder of his life
as a private citizen, devoting his
time to his banking and business
interests and the life of a wealthy
man who loves music, art and
books and whose name is connect-
ed with a number of charitable or
near charitable enterprises.

Then the republican national
campaign came along and got its
self into a snarl over the selection
of a running mate for President
Coolidge. Mr. Dawes was down at
Marietta, Ohio, attending a re-
union of his college class and the
interested in the events at

party leaders at the convention
brought him into the limelight and
he was nominated. Mr. Lowden
promptly declined and suggested
Mr. Dawes. With the support of
New Jersey and Nebraska, Mr.
Dawes was brought forward. Some
doubt existed as to whether he
would take the nomination and
some opposition arose over his
selection. He was told at the
move that was taking him and the
future life he would be called to
meet.

party when it arrives from Jack-
sonville at 10:30 o'clock Wednes-
day morning aboard the "Oceania,"
and the governors and their wives

proof and Avon Park, Sebring,
Clewiston and many other resorts,
stopping at many points for lunch-
eon, sightseeing trips and dances.

Little Hope Held For Recovery Of Henry Cabot Lodge

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 7.—
The condition of Senator Henry
Cabot Lodge, who has been un-
conscious since suffering a stroke
at noon Wednesday at a local hos-
pital where he was convalescing
from an operation, is reported un-
changed. Doctors hold out little
hope.

At the time the statement was
made public, Senator Lodge had
been unconscious for practically
30 hours. He was seized with a
stroke yesterday noon which ren-
dered him unconscious, and his
condition pronounced critical by
his physicians at that time, has
varied but little.

Senator Lodge submitted to an
emergency operation July 27, re-
covering quickly. He again rallied
rapidly when a second opera-
tion was performed October 29.
That he would be able to attend
the opening of Congress December
1 had been considered assured,
physicians said in reviewing the
patient's case today. His progress
had been so satisfactory that it
had been expected the senator
would be able to leave the hospital
next week.

What Answer To This Arraignment?

Again an experienced judge of a criminal court lays the responsibility for youthful criminals to the style of education found in American schools.

Judge Alfred J. William Van De Wall, a Pennsylvania state official, says: "Our intellectual life has progressed at a more rapid rate than our emotional development. The struggle of very primitive fundamental instincts, revealing themselves through impulsive emotional demands, with present day conditions and social demands, is claimed by many scientists to be at the bottom of many mental disturbances."

In other words, modern man has an enlightened twentieth century intellect obeying and serving primitive emotions.

Stevenson, in writing "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," advanced the idea that in every man two natures struggle for supremacy, one good, one evil.

The good being is intellectual and spiritual.

The evil being is emotional.

All of us are descended from animals. And their brutish emotions still live in us. We have civilized them, though through long generations we have, to varying extent, balanced them to our best advantage.
