What Answer To This Arraignment?

Again an experienced judge of a criminal court lays the responsibility for youthful criminals to the style of education found in American schools.

Judge Alfred J. Talley, of General Sessions, New York City, the oldest and probably the busiest judge of a criminal court in the United States, is the latest authority to contribute to what is becoming an imposing collection of opinions all charging the schools with turning out citizens that have had nothing in the way of religious or moral training.

"I am not attacking the public school as such," Judge Talley is quoted in a New York newspaper, "but that style of education is hopeless, unrounded and incomplete which trains the mind and excludes the training of the heart and will. The loss of religion has left a gap not only in personal lives but in the moral life of the community. The State is responsible for the conditions, and it is up to the state to make the deficiency in training good. The only way to form character is through religion, and we've been so much afraid that one religion would get the jump on another that we have adopted cowardly course of eliminating all religion from our schools."

Judge Talley was undoubtedly fully aware when he made that assertion that it is hopeless nowadays to call upon the homes for the religious training boys and girls should be receiving. He sees a chance for the state to put such training into the courses of study of the public schools, and make such training compulsory. The homes must be left to go on in their careless, irreligious fashion, until a generation of fathers and mothers come that have been led back to God by the already over-burdened school teachers.

If the churches, of course, could get in the habit of using their church plants seven days and seven nights each week, there would be less need for religious training in the public schools. If attendance at Sunday School and church were not regarded as a once-a-week dress-up affair, with scarcely an hour all told devoted to genuine learning of the great truth that keeps men in the paths of virtue and honor, there would be a better chance for young people to be trained in "heart and will."

Most of the earnest judges of criminal and juvenile courts in the country are denouncing the lack of religious training in America. What are the answers from the schools, the homes, and the churches?
