King said he purchased the property for \$32,000. "If I am not able to build apartments," he avered, "we have an al-ternative of utilizing the seven acres for the construc-tion of 28 homes with FHA tion of 28 homes with FHA financing."

When questioned about FHA insuring the loan for the apartment complex, King said that information which had indicated the FHA would insure his loan from Provi-dent Mutual through General Guaranty of Orlando was er-roneous. "This," he stressed "is strictly a conventional type loan. But if I build houses I will be forced to get

FHA backing." The Lake Kathryn residents, however, for the most part opposed the project on the grounds that 84 more families on the lake would create unnecessary conges-tion on the lake. Stenstrom said that the 48-acre lake presently is surrounded by some 30 homes. There is a potential of about 30 homes. "I believe," Stenstrom ex-plained, "that residents gave King every opportunity to present his case in an effort to ward off the opposition which is brewing. However, it's my opinion that he was not successful. We are pre-paring petitions which will be circulated very shortly to try to stop the annexation and the resoning of this pro-perty. We cannot ase where such a project will do any-thing to enhance the Lake Kathryn community and, therefore, since it was zoned R-1 eriginally we can find no reason for the zoning to be amended." said that the 48-acre lake be amended."
