



SEMINOLE COUNTY - Most Floridiana should realize the significance of "Fire Prevention Week" this year more than ever. The state has been ravaged by wildfires, tornadoes and recently by Hurricane Georges

Emergency teams not only have answered calls in their own communities but responded to crises in areas hundreds of miles away. A Seminole County engine went to the Florida Keys two weeks ago to help hurricane victims.

"One of the first things our crew had to do was respond to a 2-story house fire on Grassey Key," said Seminole County Fire Chief Terry

Schenk. "There's never been a year like this one. Everyone's been busy. Whatever could happen, has happened. Even our regular emergency calls are up."

Lt. Tim Grenz, frefighter George Burkett and firefighter/paramedic Terry Daniels of the Seminole County rescue division and Lt. Tom Martin from the Sanford Fire Department formed the team that went to the Keys.

In the wake of the devastation by the wildfires and other emergencies, Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford is encouraging Floridians to participate in a number of "Fire Prevention Week" activities. Please see Rescue, Page 3A

"And he'll be a good one," says John Ross, legal counsel for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "Who would you rather have in the state attorney's office - a kid just out of law school or someone like Sammy who's been in law enforcement, who's been the commander of the City County Investigative Bureau?"

Gibson, 37, worked in the sheriff's legal office this summer while recovering from being shot on July 6 in the 13-hour standoff between Alan Singletary and the law. Singletary killed one deputy and injured two others before being killed himself.

Gibson still has bullet fragments in his foot. He was supposed to be on crutches six weeks. He was off after four. He was supposed to have a walking cast for two months. He cut that to four weeks. The lieutenant has shown he can play hurt. He's in the starting lineup every day.

It is important, Gibson says, for him to be a good role model for his 8 and 11-year-old boys and others he coaches them in Little League baseball and Pop Warner football. Sammy Gibson may not have hit 66 home runs like Sammy Sosa did in 1998. but he may be credited with that many or more "saves."


commissioners' mailboxes this week announcing his intentions.





Remains discovered in Oviedo belong to man

OVIEDO - Seminole County sheriff's deputies are getting some high tech help in solving a crime that may be a decade old.

According to Deanna Brown, spokeswoman for the sheriff's office, forensic scientists from the University of Florida will take the remains found Wednesday in southern Oviedo back to Gainesville to study them and to recon-

struct how the man, who died between five and ten years ago, may have met his end.

Though scientists are not sure of the nature of his cause of death, they are hoping that a more detailed study of the bones and the surrounding area where they were found will help them make a determination about who he was and how he died. Sheriff's officials said the

remains, found by a survey crew working in the wooded area of S. Econ Circle near

the Iron Bridge Water Treatment Plant, have not been identified.

The bones were found on the ground in the wooded area covered only in a light layering of moss.

In the meantime, however, the forensic scientists have already set to work trying to find out as much as they can based on the evidence on hand.

The skeletal remains are those of an adult male who was about five feet, eight

inches tall, they have already determined. They believe he was probably a slender man. He was wearing white New Balance 1300 tennis shoes. He had had some dental work done and had a partial upper plate.

Ilis shorts had a Quicksilver label and his T-shirt bore a label of "Instinct."

are Though deputies treating the finding as suspicious, there doesn't appear to have been any trauma to the body.

Burg was issued a trespass order from the store and ordered by deputies to appear in court to face the charge of retail theft.

According to a spokesman for Central Florida Regional Hospital, Burg was released from the hospital after treatment.

There's already been a wildfire prevention exhibit in Chuluota, and on Oct. 17, Smokey Bear and the Forest Rangers are going to be at Pine Castle in Orlando. Such activities are interesting for children and concerned parents, of course. More important, though, is

the advice from fire/rescue officials.

"No. 1. everyone should make sure they have a smoke detector - this can be a huge factor in saving lives," Schenk said.

"No. 2 is to develop and exit plan. Families ought to have a drill. Each person should know

what to do and where to go. There should be designated area to meet. This will help elevate confusion should there

"No. 3 is to be sure to evacuate the home, and then call 911," Schenk said. "Sometimes people call 911 first and then find themselves overcome by smoke. Get out and then call 911."

Crawford said that the louder the message is this year the better Floridians can focus and try to avert a "catastrophe" in the future.

Every week, he suggested, should be "Fire Prevention Wcck.*



You've got it in writing...a court order that states your former spouse is 100 percent responsible for paying off those credit card bills. So why are bill collectors hounding you? Because you are still legally liable for those bills--even when a judge orders your exspouse to pay them. Why? Because the divorce decree does not erase the contract you land your ex-spouse) made with the credit card company, So get ready to protect yourself.

DO...close any joint accounts. Call your creditors and ask if you can have the existing balance transferred to the new account of the person responsible for paying the bills.

DONT...assume your exspouse will pay the bill. Late payment or nonpayment can be reported on your credit record as well. Make sure at least the minimum amount is paid on all bills or risk ruining your credit file.

Dear Mary,

DO...get a copy of your credit



report. Review your credit record to make sure that accounts you closed do not still appear as open.

DO...establish your own accounts. Paying your new bills on time is the key to building (or re-building) a positive credit profile. Consider getting a "secured" credit card from an FDIC insured bank if you're having trouble getting credit. "Secured" cards are linked to a savings account that you maintain as security for the bank. DONT...fall for advertise-

ments offering credit cards or loans, even if you have bad

ing upfront payment of fees. These may be scams designed to take your last dime.

DONT...jump into bankruptcy. Filing for bankruptcy stays on your credit record for up to 10 years. Consider it only as a last resort.

For tips on how to protect your credit record when separating from your spouse, you can request a free pamphlet, "Divorce & Credit", from Experian (formerly TRW). 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Break cycle of shame in abuse

My 18-year-old daughter is driving me nuts. She's in an alcohol treatment center right now. She became pregnant when she was 15, had an abortion, then attempted suicide. Now she says that she was sexually abused by her stepfather from the time she was 7years-old until we divorced last year. I knew she didn't like him, but I thought it was because he punished her when she disobeyed or had temper tantrums. I asked her why she didn't tell me sooner, and she said she was too ashamed and thought it was her fault. She said she was also afraid that I wouldn't believe her or that we might make her go away for causing trouble in the family.

I hate to admit this, and I've never told a soul, but the same thing happened to me when I was a kid. I still have nightmares about it and don't really enjoy sex because I still feel like a victim, even when I love the guy I'm with. I want to help my daughter, but I'm having trouble dealing with this, plus all the other heartache and don't know where to turn or how to start.




often goes from one generation to the next. If someone doesn't break the cycle of shame, silence and secrecy, it simply continues to shatter lives. Sexuai abuse violates a child's boundaries in every conceivable way--physically, emotionally, and sexually. Your daughter's pattern of behavior these past few years is all too tragically common among sexual abuse victims. Victims almost always blame themselves for sexual abuse and feel terribly guilty, but powerless to make it stop. The other nearly universal consequence of sexual abuse is low self-esteem for the victim. She feels deeply ashamed because she thinks if

whether they might deny that it happened. You will gain strength from breaking the conspiracy of silence that has gone on too long. As you become open and honest about your experience, your daughter will begin to have the courage to heal and hopefully change her destructive behavior.

Contact your health-care provider or the mental health clinic for the names of support organizations in the area. Remember, the best way to help your daughter is by having the courage to help yourself.

She calls her children daily, demanding they chauffeur her here and there, do her laundry or make repairs.


Abby, despite her health problems, Irene is a big, strong woman, and she's married to a perfectly healthy man.

I've been present on several occasions when one or more of Irene's 10 children were present, and I've yet to hear her compliment her sons. She shouts at them, calls them "stu-pid," and criticizes whatever they have done for her. She pokes her nose into their business and disagrees with every decision they make. I suspect this is displaced anger toward her first husband, who was a womanizer.

Irene's daughters are not treated so badly, but they mimic their mother's behavior toward her sons; they treat their brothers as hadly as Irene does.

Irene constantly complains that her children don't share their good fortune with her, but most of them are struggling to survive. They do share with her to some degree, but never as much as she wants them to. She never fails to bring up the "sacrifices" she's made for them. Abby, all mothers make sacrifices for their children, but it's the love and support the children remember - not the sacrifices.

Several of her children have told me they dread hearing her voice on the telephone, and they make any excuse they can to avoid going to her home because her hand is



always out. Irene is growing older, and I can see the handwriting on the wall. When the day comes that she truly needs their help, her children will put her in a boarding house with strangers and visit her for an hour now and then out of duty. She'll sit there with nothing to do but feel sorry for herself, bitter over her "ungrateful" children.

She hasn't asked me for advice, so I haven't offered any, but I hope she sees my letter in your column and recognizes herself before it's too late to become more considerate and appreciative of her children. Sign me,
