Appreciating what makes Sammy run

Sammy Sosa hit 66 home runs this year; Sammy Gibson was hit by a mad-man's bullet. Sammy Sosa snags fly balls for the Chicago Cubs; Sammy Gibson snags druggies for the City County Investigative Bureau.

Sammy Sosa is the MVP in the National League; Sammy Gibson was Lake Howell High School's backup second baseman in 1979.

Sammy Sosa earns \$9 million a year for playing baseball; Lt. Sammy Gibson earns considerably less for maintaining law and order in Seminole County.

Sammy Sosa was on the Jay Leno show Thursday night; Sammy Gibson watched.

Sammy Sosa probably has a half-dozen good seasons in his career; Sammy Gibson has a half-dozen years before being eligible to retire with 25 years in law enforcement. He began at age 18.

Sammy Sosa may become a coach or manager; Sammy Gibson says he may become an attorney and prosecutor.

"And he'll be a good one," says John Ross, legal counsel for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "Who would you rather have in the state attorney's office - a kid just out of law school or someone like Sammy who's been in law enforcement, who's been the commander of the City County Investigative Bureau?"

Gibson, 37, worked in the sheriff's legal office this summer while recovering from being shot on July 6 in the 13-hour stand-off between Alan Singletary and the law. Singletary killed one deputy and injured two others before being killed himself.

Gibson still has bullet fragments in his foot. He was supposed to be on crutches six weeks. He was off after four. He was supposed to have a walking cast for two months. He cut that to four weeks. The lieutenant has shown he can play hurt. He's in the starting lineup every day.

It is important, Gibson says, for him to be a good role model for his 8 and 11-year-old boys and others he coaches them in Little League baseball and Pop Warner football. Sammy Gibson may not have hit 66 home runs like Sammy Sosa did in 1998, but he may be credited with that many or more "saves."

Run, Sammy, run.

Rescue teams face challenging year with storms and fires

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Most Floridians should realize the significance of "Fire Prevention Week" this year more than ever. The state has been ravaged by wildfires, tornadoes and recently by Hurricane Georges.

Emergency teams not only have answered calls in their own communities but responded to crises in areas hundreds of miles away. A Seminole County engine went to the Florida Keys two weeks ago to help hurricane victims.

"One of the first things our crew had to do was respond to a 2-story house fire on Grassy Key," said Seminole County Fire Chief Terry

Schenk. "There's never been a year like this one. Everyone's been busy. Whatever could happen, has happened. Even our regular emergency calls are up."

Lt. Tim Grenz, firefighter George Burkett and firefighter/paramedic Terry Daniels of the Seminole County rescue division and Lt. Tom Martin from the Sanford Fire Department formed the team that went to the Keys.

In the wake of the devastation by the wildfires and other emergencies, Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford is encouraging Floridians to participate in a number of "Fire Prevention Week" activities.

Former mayoral candidate arrested

LAKE MARY - Myer Michael Burg, who had once hoped to become mayor of Lake Mary, was arrested earlier this week for retail theft.

The 69-year-old retired entrepreneur was taken into cus-

tody on Monday after he tried to leave a grocery store without paying for the items in his cart, sheriff's deputies said.

This is not the first time he has run into trouble with the law in recent months. According to records, Burg of 856 Eagle Claw Court in Lake Mary,

Winter Springs mayor to veto proposed budget

WINTER SPRINGS - In a move that could potentially halt city government in Winter Springs, Mayor Paul Partyka said he would veto the proposed city budget at this Monday's meeting.

Partyka left notes in city commissioners' mailboxes this week announcing his intentions.

"It's a careless and irresponsible act," said Cindy Gennell,

vice mayor and commissioner. Commissioner Eddie Martinez called the move, "a political ploy."

"He's trying to hold a hammer to the Commission so we can stop the appeal," Martinez said.

The appeal was filed by Commissioners after Partyka filed suit over whether he had the right to fire City Attorney Frank Kruppenbacher. The attorney had come under fire by the mayor for not attending

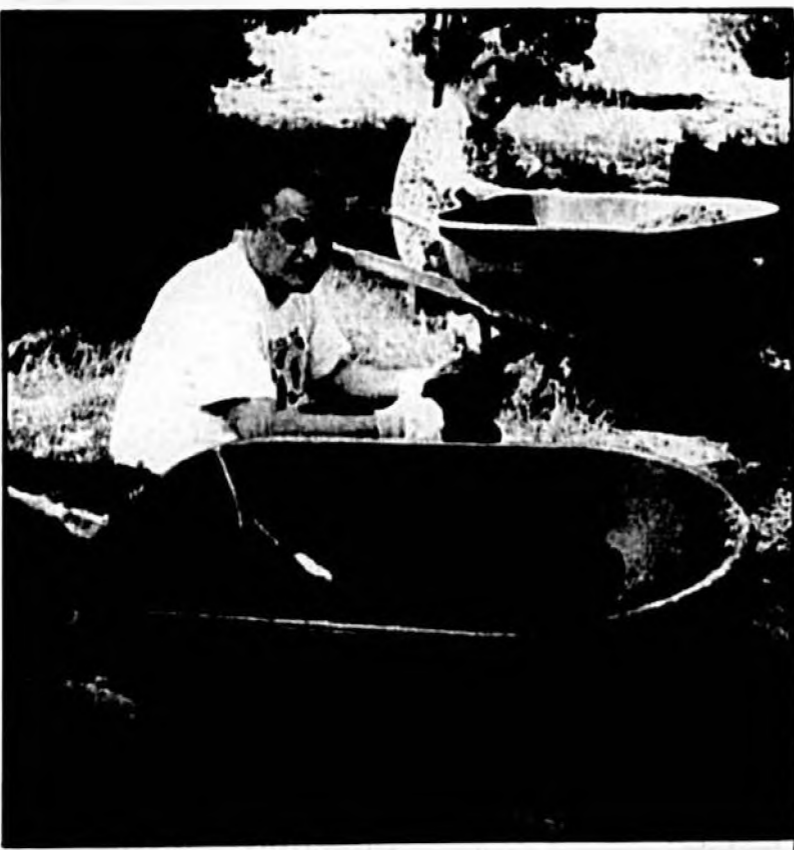

Group must now raise \$8, 682.50 in matching funds

SANFORD — The Sanford Historic Trust has received a Historic Preservation Grant from the Bureau of Historic Preservation, Division of Historical Resources, Florida Department of State, to create a guide to a historic district walking tour.

"This grant is a first for the Trust and an important step in helping visitors and residents recognize the significance of this treasured part of Central Florida," said Roberta "Bert" Padgett, president of the Sanford Historic Trust. "Many people don't realize that both the Sanford downtown area and residential historic district are on the National Register of Historic Places. This grant will allow us to create a user-friendly guidebook which people can use as they tour the area to identify historically significant places in Sanford."

"Our organization is now faced with the challenge of

raising the other half of the funds necessary to complete the project," Padgett continued. "We will have a number of special events and activities which will not only raise funds but also help raise awareness of our historic area."

After a judge ruled in Paryka's favor, the Commission chose to appeal the decision.

The crux of the issue, Paryka said is the legal meaning of the charter.

"We are spending an excessive amount of money (between \$30,000 and \$40,000) on legal fees for the appeal of the summary judgment," he said.

The proposed budget for the city is \$25,241,904 with a 3.5496 millage rate.

Remains discovered in Oviedo belong to man

OVIEDO - Seminole County sheriff's deputies are getting some high tech help in solving a crime that may be a decade old.

According to Deanna Brown, spokeswoman for the sheriff's office, forensic scientists from the University of Florida will take the remains found Wednesday in southern Oviedo back to Gainesville to study them and to recon-

struct how the man, who died between five and ten years ago, may have met his end.

Though scientists are not sure of the nature of his cause of death, they are hoping that a more detailed study of the bones and the surrounding area where they were found will help them make a determination about who he was and how he died.

Sheriff's officials said the remains, found by a survey crew working in the wooded area of S. Eeon Circle near

the Iron Bridge Water Treatment Plant, have not been identified.

The bones were found on the ground in the wooded area covered only in a light layering of moss.

In the meantime, however, the forensic scientists have already set to work trying to find out as much as they can based on the evidence on hand.

The skeletal remains are those of an adult male who was about five feet, eight

inches tall, they have already determined. They believe he was probably a slender man. He was wearing white New Balance 1300 tennis shoes. He had had some dental work done and had a partial upper plate.

His shorts had a Quicksilver label and his T-shirt bore a label of "Instinct."

Though deputies are treating the finding as suspicious, there doesn't appear to have been any trauma to the body.

was arrested in August on a Seminole County warrant on charges of insurance fraud. He had reportedly reported his van as stolen and then collected the insurance money for the vehicle. The vehicle was in the driveway at the time of his arrest. He was also arrested for being in possession of a stolen vehicle and attaching a tag not assigned.

Burg, who ran an unsuccessful campaign for the top government position in Lake Mary two years ago and who

made a brief foray into newspaper publishing when he tried to start a weekly publication in Lake Mary, allegedly filled his grocery cart with miscellaneous items, totaling \$367.48 and then attempted to leave the store without paying for the merchandise.

A store employee, looking down from the second floor office of the Publix supermarket on Lake Mary Boulevard, saw Burg leave without paying and informed store security personnel. Burg was stopped just

outside the store and offered no resistance when confronted by the employees, deputies said.

According to the arrest report, Burg told deputies that he would not make any comments related to the incident until he had consulted with his attorney.

Deputies said Burg complained of chest pains shortly after he was handcuffed during his arrest. Emergency medical workers checked his heart and recommended that he be

transported to Central Florida Regional Hospital rather than to the John E. Polk Correctional Facility so that his medical needs could be adequately addressed.

Burg was issued a trespass order from the store and ordered by deputies to appear in court to face the charge of retail theft.

According to a spokesman for Central Florida Regional Hospital, Burg was released from the hospital after treatment.

There's already been a wildfire prevention exhibit in Chuluota, and on Oct. 17, Smokey Bear and the Forest Rangers are going to be at Pine Castle in Orlando. Such activities are interesting for children and concerned parents, of course.

More important, though, is the advice from fire/rescue officials.

"No. 1, everyone should make sure they have a smoke detector - this can be a huge factor in saving lives," Schenk said.

"No. 2 is to develop and exit plan. Families ought to have a drill. Each person should know

what to do and where to go. There should be designated area to meet. This will help alleviate confusion should there be a real fire.

"No. 3 is to be sure to evacuate the home, and then call 911," Schenk said. "Sometimes people call 911 first and then find themselves overcome by smoke. Get out and then call 911."

Crawford said that the louder the message is this year the better Floridians can focus and try to avert a "catastrophe" in the future.

Every week, he suggested, should be "Fire Prevention Week."

You've got it in writing...a court order that states your former spouse is 100 percent responsible for paying off those credit card bills. So why are bill collectors hounding you? Because you are still legally liable for those bills—even when a judge orders your ex-spouse to pay them. Why? Because the divorce decree does not erase the contract you (and your ex-spouse) made with the credit card company. So get ready to protect yourself.

DO...close any joint accounts. Call your creditors and ask if you can have the existing balance transferred to the new account of the person responsible for paying the bills.

DO NOT...assume your ex-spouse will pay the bill. Late payment or nonpayment can be reported on your credit record as well. Make sure at least the minimum amount is paid on all bills or risk ruining your credit file.

DO...get a copy of your credit

report. Review your credit record to make sure that accounts you closed do not still appear as open.

DO...establish your own accounts. Paying your new bills on time is the key to building (or re-building) a positive credit profile. Consider getting a "secured" credit card from an FDIC insured bank if you're having trouble getting credit. "Secured" cards are linked to a savings account that you maintain as security for the bank.

DO NOT...fall for advertisements offering credit cards or loans, even if you have bad

credit or no credit, and requiring upfront payment of fees. These may be scams designed to take your last dime.

DON'T...jump into bankruptcy. Filing for bankruptcy stays on your credit record for up to 10 years. Consider it only as a last resort.

For tips on how to protect your credit record when separating from your spouse, you can request a free pamphlet, "Divorce & Credit", from Experian (formerly TRW). Break cycle of shame in abuse

Dear Mary,

My 18-year-old daughter is driving me nuts. She's in an alcohol treatment center right now. She became pregnant when she was 15, had an abortion, then attempted suicide. Now she says that she was sexually abused by her stepfather from the time she was 7-years-old until we divorced last year. I knew she didn't like him, but I thought it was because he punished her when she disobeyed or had temper tantrums. I asked her why she didn't tell me sooner, and she said she was too ashamed and thought it was her fault. She said she was also afraid that I wouldn't believe her or that we might make her go away for causing trouble in the family.

I hate to admit this, and I've never told a soul, but the same thing happened to me when I was a kid. I still have nightmares about it and don't really enjoy sex because I still feel like a victim, even when I love the guy I'm with. I want to help my daughter, but I'm having trouble dealing with this, plus all the other heartache and trouble she's caused me. I don't know where to turn or how to start.

Dear Broken-hearted,
You are experiencing one of the awful truths about sexual abuse: it runs in families and

often goes from one generation to the next. If someone doesn't break the cycle of shame, silence and secrecy, it simply continues to shatter lives. Sexual abuse violates a child's boundaries in every conceivable way—physically, emotionally, and sexually. Your daughter's pattern of behavior these past few years is all too tragically common among sexual abuse victims. Victims almost always blame themselves for sexual abuse and feel terribly guilty, but powerless to make it stop. The other nearly universal consequence of sexual abuse is low self-esteem for the victim. She feels deeply ashamed because she thinks it must be her fault that it is happening.

The first thing you must do before you can help your daughter is to deal with the reality of your own experience; stop protecting the abuse, regardless of who it was, or

whether they might deny that it happened. You will gain strength from breaking the conspiracy of silence that has gone on too long. As you become open and honest about your experience, your daughter will begin to have the courage to heal and hopefully change her destructive behavior.

Contact your health-care provider or the mental health clinic for the names of support organizations in the area. Remember, the best way to help your daughter is by having the courage to help yourself.

Mom's demands will fall on deaf ears

DEAR ABBY: I have a friend I'll call Irene who has many wonderful qualities. She's warm, friendly, funny — and if you were hungry, she'd share her last biscuit with you.

Her one flaw: She treats her children like indentured servants. Irene thinks nothing of calling a nearby son or daughter to venture out at midnight in this dangerous city to bring her a cup of coffee.

She calls her children dally, demanding they chauffeur her here and there, do her laundry or make repairs.

Abby, despite her health problems, Irene is a big, strong woman, and she's married to a perfectly healthy man.

I've been present on several occasions when one or more of Irene's 10 children were present, and I've yet to hear her compliment her sons. She shouts at them, calls them "stupid," and criticizes whatever they have done for her. She pokes her nose into their business and disagrees with every decision they make. I suspect this is displaced anger toward her first husband, who was a womanizer.

Irene's daughters are not treated so badly, but they mimic their mother's behavior toward her sons; they treat their brothers as badly as Irene does.

Irene constantly complains that her children don't share their good fortune with her, but most of them are struggling to survive. They do share with her to some degree, but never as much as she wants them to. She never fails to bring up the "sacrifices" she's made for them. Abby, all mothers make sacrifices for their children, but it's the love and support the children remember — not the sacrifices.

Several of her children have told me they dread hearing her voice on the telephone, and they make any excuse they can to avoid going to her home because her hand is

always out. Irene is growing older, and I can see the handwriting on the wall. When the day comes that she truly needs their help, her children will put her in a boarding house with strangers and visit her for an hour now and then out of duty. She'll sit there with nothing to do but feel sorry for herself, bitter over her "ungrateful" children.

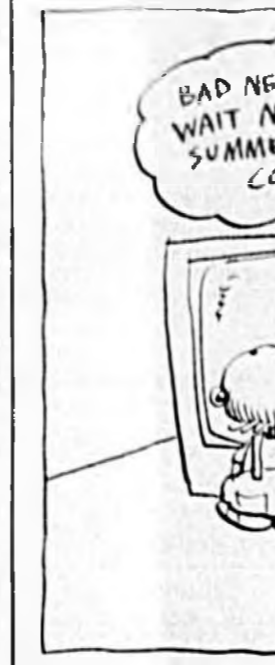

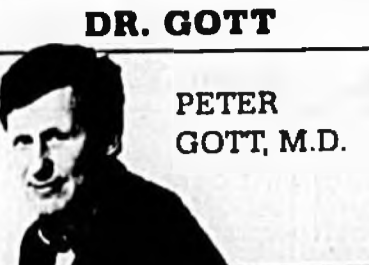

Support stockings ease swelling

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have had chronic swelling in my left foot for years, following removal of a vein from the leg for coronary artery bypass surgery. I have been told that the arterial circulation to my leg is normal, but the only relief I get is by elevating it and applying ice packs. What could be causing the problem? How can it be treated?



DEAR DR. GOTT: What causes hemorrhoids?
DEAR READER: A hemorrhoid is a stretched (dilated) vein in the anal area. When such a vein distends, it may cause discomfort or itching and can be seen and felt as a squishy pink lump. In addition, hemorrhoids often bleed. If a blood clot forms in the vein (thrombosis), the situation can be painful.

DEAR READER: After removal of a major leg vein, periodic foot swelling may develop because the venous blood is unable to find alternate channels back to the heart. When blood is trapped in an extremity, the fluid in the blood leaks out into the tissues, producing edema, an accumulation of liquid that gravity pulls to the lowest portion of the body. This is why your foot is less swollen when you elevate it; you are using gravity to empty the leg of excess fluid.

Elastic support stockings will help the situation by exerting gentle but firm external pressure (against gravity), which prevents pooling of blood in the extremity.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor told me I have Type IV hyperlipoproteinemia. What is this? I'm 58-years-old, 5 feet 5, and 187 pounds.

DEAR READER: This subject is complex. I'll try to give a concise answer, at the risk of oversimplifying. The fat that circulates in the bloodstream is composed of two primary types: triglyceride and cholesterol. Triglyceride is lighter than cholesterol, behaves differently in the body and, until recently, was not considered to be as important in causing heart disease.

These blood fats circulate as lipid-protein complexes called lipoproteins, which are synthesized in different parts of the body and probably have different functions. The lipoproteins are classified by density (weight) — hence, by the amount of fat that each type contains — as high-density lipoprotein (HDL — highest in cholesterol) and low-density lipoprotein (LDL — lowest in cholesterol).

LDL is clearly associated with heart disease, while HDL appears to protect against it. Therefore, the important issue is not so much the level of blood cholesterol but whether that cholesterol is in the LDL or HDL molecules.

Excess triglyceride can be a consequence of obesity, diabetes, excessive alcohol consumption, kidney disease, liver abnormalities and certain medicines. Your lipoprotein problem, Type IV, is of this type. You can probably reduce your triglyceride level if you follow your doctor's advice for exam-

ple, lose weight, eat less dietary fat, increase your level of exercise, and moderate your intake of alcohol. Lipoprotein classes I, II and III reflect other ratios of the protein/fat mix within the lipoprotein molecule.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Asking for a stopper

By Phillip Alder

The next use of a cue-bid isn't well-known among less experienced players. An opponent has bid a suit. You are desperate to get into three no-trump, but you don't have a stopper in that opponent's suit. How do you ask partner if he has a stopper? Answer: You cue-bid the opponent's suit. This is often called a Western cue-bid, sometimes a directional asking bid.

How do you distinguish this from the strength-showing cue-bid mentioned yesterday? Well, normally the Western cue-bid occurs on the second or third round of the auction, not the first. And it typically arises after an opponent overcalls (though it can be used after an opponent opens).

Look at the North hand. What should be bid on the second round? He has the values for game, but doesn't like spades. Also, we never go out of our way to play in a minor when no-trump is feasible. Yet North doesn't have a heart stopper. Let the Western cue-bid ride to the rescue. Two hearts asks partner to bid no-trump with a stopper.

West leads the heart seven.

If East has both missing aces, the contract is surely dead. But if West has only two hearts — as the bidding suggests — and one of the aces, the contract is makable as long as declarer ducks the first trick. South wins the heart return and plays a diamond. Here, when West wins with the ace, he doesn't have another heart to lead. (Note in passing that if South starts with a club, not a diamond, at trick three, West should play the jack. Then East should win with his ace and return a club, defeating the contract.)

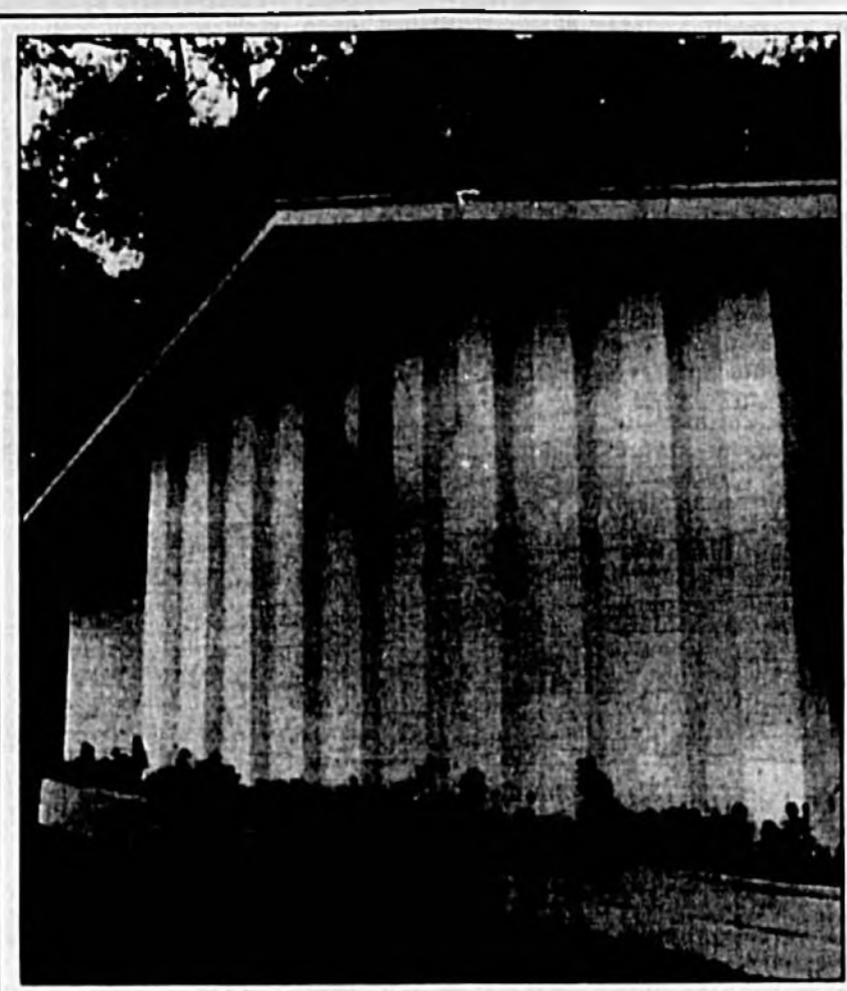
