# The Forgotten Wends

Germans are not the only inhabitants of Germany. In Western Saxony there are Wends, a Slavic group known also as Lusatian Sorbs. They have just appealed to the Council of Foreign Ministers for autonomy on the ground of self-determination, saying that they have been ruled by Germans long enough.

What they want is a small triangle near the Czech and Polish borders. In numbers there may be anywhere from 140,000 to 300,000, some living in this triangle, others scattered throughout Germany. They all want home rule, some under Czech supervision and some under Polish. Others are content to remain under German rule if they can manage their own local affairs, and above all have schools conducted in the Wendish language.

If the Wends have been able to keep their race consciousness and language through centuries of strict alien rule, they are evidently a feal nationality, whose modest requests deserve to be granted.

## War Came Close

A war secret, just revealed, is that a German plane flew-over United States territory during the war. A modified Focke-Wulf 200 in 1943 made an air reconnaissance over Boston, New York and other Atlantic seaboard




