

Large Budget Cut Would Change Our Federal Policies

 WASHINGTON—A large cut in the Federal budget such as Senator Taft has proposed would not be a mere fiscal operation, according to government bureaucrats.

It would necessitate major changes in national policy regarding such vast programs as federal aid to agriculture, reclamation and development of public power. Congress itself would have to shoulder the responsibility.

The Ohio Republican leader advocates a federal budget between 25 and 30 billion—at least seven billion less than the budget which it is reported President Truman will recommend for the coming fiscal year. Taft has not detailed how he would bring expenses down to his figure.

Why It's Difficult

Purely administrative expenses of the government amount to only \$1.9 billion in the current fiscal year. This covers the payroll, office supplies, building rentals and upkeep, travel expenses, etc. A 20 percent cut here would reduce the bill by only 380 million.

Obviously enormous reductions must be made in other categories. If seven billion is to be saved, the choice must be among these items, which comprise the Budget Bureau's breakdown of federal expenditures in the current year:

Included in "national defense" is the cost of terminal leave pay for enlisted men amounting to \$2,000,000,000. "International Finance" includes foreign loans. These items are not continuing expenses.

What Can't Be Cut

The veterans' program, tax refunds and interest are considered by fiscal authorities as "untouchable," not subject to reduction. Nor could most of the expenditures under social security, such as unemployment relief and retirement allowances, be altered, therefore, to one or another of the programs administered by the various departments if substantial savings are to be made.

Since all of the department's work is done by specific authorization of Congress, it is Congress which must decide which program is to be eliminated.

A glance at the Interior Department budget shows that about

half the total consists of construction projects such as extension of Bonneville power transmission lines and the billion-dollar reclamation program in California.

Further Complications

In the Agriculture Department budget the chief items are agricultural research and the various crop adjustment activities, designed to aid the farmer to increase his income. The largest expense in the latter category already has been eliminated—crop subsidies.

Congress could whittle on such activities as the forest service, which controls forest fires, maintains roads, etc.

In the Commerce Department,

Congress would have to decide to curtail or eliminate such agencies as the Weather Bureau, the Coast and Geodetic Survey, the Bureau of Standards, the Census Bureau or the Civil Aeronautics Authority. The department's statistical and informational services for business are minor items.

Some of the government's top administrators definitely oppose a blanket cut, reducing the budgets of all agencies on a flat percentage basis. This would have the effect of spreading their funds thin, they say, and reducing efficiency. They would prefer to see some of the agencies eliminated entirely.

As for the largest single item

in the federal budget, national defense, a sharp reduction there would necessitate a complete re-

versal in our military and international policy.

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Radio Plays Large Part In Education Of Russia's People

By EDY GILMORE, AP Newswriter. MOSCOW—Although it is not generally recognized abroad, Russia has the most powerful, most far-reaching radio system in the world.

The U.S.S.R.'s stations broadcast in 65 to 60 different languages to just the people within this country and in practically all the main centers of the world to those living in other nations.

Thousands of broadcasting stations and its millions of loud speakers play an integral part in the educational and cultural life of the people.

Public meetings, broadcasts, if important enough, are put on at this time. Toward late evening stations often put on jazz bands playing dance tunes.

While all this is going on, Moscow and some other big cities are broadcasting special programs in many languages of the Soviet Union and the languages of foreign countries.

In addition to loud speakers in squares, and in parks. While these do not operate all the time, they are turned on for special occasions and holidays.

Russia is constantly building and rehabilitating its radio, and her biggest stations are among the most powerful in the world.

Children's programs take up a large portion of the morning broadcast. These include the presentation of picture plays, which are stories about the war or the Red revolution.

After the children's hour there are some folk songs, short comedies and stories about the war or the Red revolution.

During the day entertainment is interspersed with the latest news. The afternoon is devoted to interviews, light music, recitations and so forth.

At 7 a. m. another news broadcast is given, generally fuller than the one at 6 a. m. and there are setting up exercises by enthusiastic anonymous gymnasts.

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Puerto Rico Is Beginning To Seek Its Independence

 WASHINGTON—An increasing trend in favor of independence is taking place in Puerto Rico as a result of the end of World War II and the clamor for liberation voiced by dependent people around the globe.

Puerto Rico was a colony of Spain for some 400 years and has been an island possession of the United States since 1898. It has 2,000,000 people.

The increasing independence sentiment has been reported by colonial experts here as the result of the recent formation of a political party in the Caribbean island to seek independence on the basis of:

1. Friendly negotiations with the United States.
 2. Security for the Puerto Rican people under a liberal social and economic domestic policy when independence is achieved.
- Showdown in 1948
- This is the first time a political party with a platform based on independence has been organized in the island. Its strength will be tested in the 1948 elections.
- Independence parties had been formed previously. They failed when they preached hostility or terrorism against the United States, or when they forgot their pledges after coming into power.
- The new independence party of Puerto Rico has been organized to offer evidence to the U. S. Congress and the federal administration that the island wants its freedom.
- Party leaders say President Truman called upon Congress to allow Puerto Ricans to choose its political future but that they do not expect Congress to authorize a plebiscite.
- These leaders do not blame Congress. They feel the problem to be considered was of such magnitude that they prevent a speedy and conscientious solution. Since they believe that a plebiscite authorized by Congress would be hard to obtain, independentists want to have their own referendum.
- The Popular party, in control in Puerto Rico, does not advocate any particular form of government. It is committed not to seek any. The Republican and Socialist minority parties advocate statehood. The Liberal party, also a minority, wants a plebiscite.
- One independentist leader visiting here recently said, "If the people vote us into power, it will mean a majority of the voters are in favor of independence."
- Could Embarrass Congress
- With this support from the voters, the party could ask Congress to grant Puerto Ricans its independence on the ground that the people

want it. They give considerable importance to the fact that the party, if voted into power, would have a resident commissioner speaking for independence in the U. S. House of Representatives.

An interesting development in the formation of the new party is that it found itself with a three-vote minority in the Legislative Assembly without ever going to the polls. This three-vote minority is stronger than those of the other minority parties.

This is what happened:

The Popular party controlled 54 of the 68 seats in both Senate and House. It elected several assemblymen strongly in favor of independence, but the executive body of the party decided that none of its members could belong to any organization supporting independence and to the party at the same time.

The three legislators belonged to the Congress of Puerto Rican Independence, a non-partisan organization assisting in favor of liberation. When the alternatives were put up to them, they resigned from the party, joined the new independence party but did not resign their seats in the legislature.

Washington officials who deal with Puerto Rican affairs feel that the United States may be embarrassed if the independence movement takes control of the island government.

HOW PARTIES LINE UP AS 80th CONGRESS CONVENES



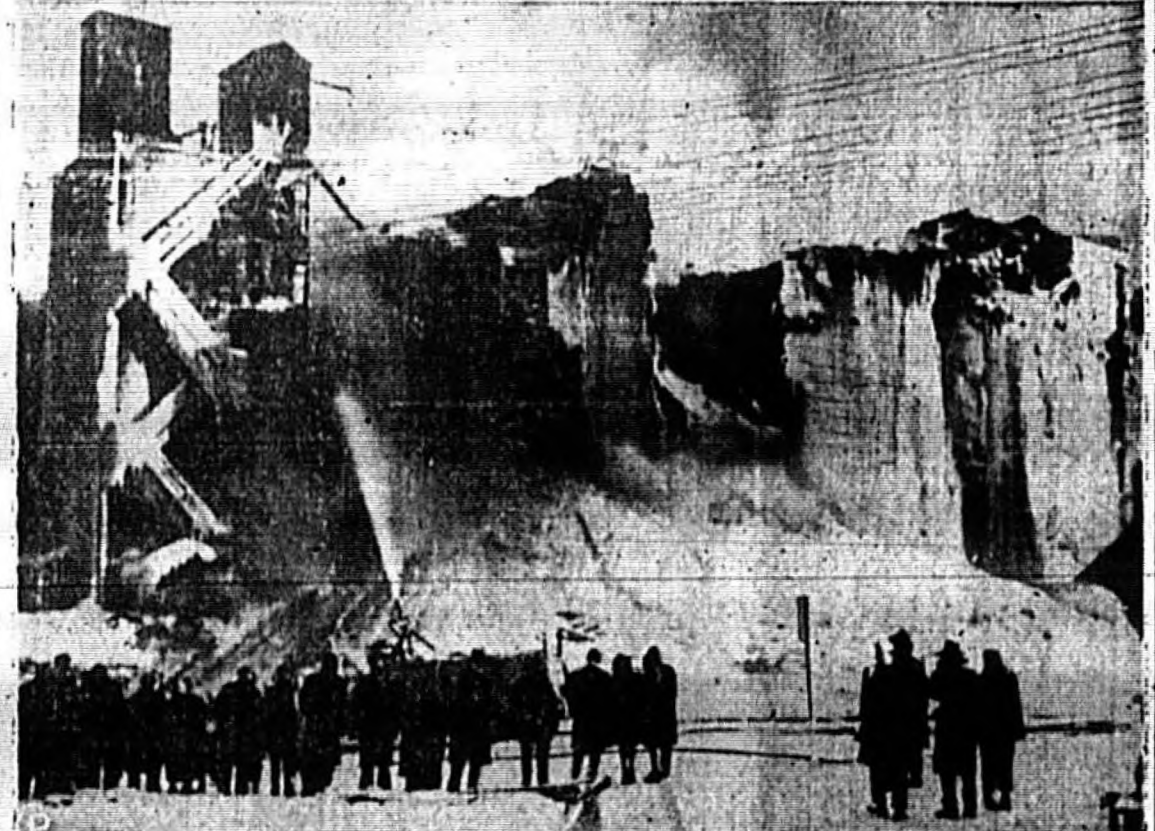

Luis Munoz Marin, Senate president and leader of the Popular party, who has advised the people that the new party will create problems to the United States in its international relations.

He has told the people that the island's political future is the exclusive problem of the United States and Puerto Rico and that it will be up to him and his party to solve the problem when the time comes.

Puerto Rico got its first native governor in 460 years of Spanish and American colonial rule last August. This step, the people were told, was in line with both the Popular party's and the federal administration's policies toward self-government.

Independentists, however, have conceded no importance to the appointment. They say it does not solve any of the fundamental political, social or economic problems of the island.
