Chinese Try Strategy To Ease Jap Pressure In Chekiang Sector

Nips Break Silence On Midway Battle, Claim Three U. S. Warships Are Sunk

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The Navy declined comments similar to those it has claimed that two United States aircraft carriers and a large transport were sunk at Midway. A spokesman indicated he was not prepared to accept the statement as accurate. "Nothing can be given for information on the disposal of the fleet units—comments similar to this have several times before and have proved unfounded."

(By Associated Press) A Chinese column operating beyond Japanese lines today advanced to a point 12 miles west of Nanchang, the Japanese occupied capital of the Kiangsi province. The move is said to be an evident attempt to force the Japanese to withdraw part of their troops now thrusting toward the Chekiang province, thus easing the pressure in that sector. The Chinese, who have broken silence today, claiming three United States warships were sunk and 184 planes downed in the Dutch Harbor and Midway raids. They admitted the loss of an aircraft carrier, with an other damaged and 28 planes. They claimed troop landings on the Aleutian Islands in an unconfirmed report.

"Chinese forces still in possession of the western type of Chinese have killed or wounded 2,000 Japanese in three days. Chinese enemy casualties to more than 1,000 in furious but thus far futile assaults upon the key port of Tsinan, the Chinese command announced last night.

The Japanese were making open attack after another on the Chinese at the "inner and outer rings" of the city's defenses, a communiqué said, and an army spokesman declared that the defenders had taken possession of the important center after wiping out an enemy unit which penetrated one section during the week-end.

Alex Johnson, school director, said today the class advised the club that the Boy Scouts raised \$641.50 over their quota in their recent drive and that the Kiwanis Club credited with \$123, topped the district.

Farm Implements Can Be Repaired At School Shop

No Charge Is Made For Service, Growers Must Do Work

All farmers in the Sanford vicinity will have the opportunity to use the shop and equipment on hand at the Future Farmers' Building at Seminole High School to repair any of their farm machinery, Alex Johnson, agriculture teacher, announced yesterday.

This step is being taken as aid to the war effort by aiding farmers in getting their equipment in shape for use in the fall. Mr. Johnson stressed the fact that all farmers are invited and also that there is no charge for the service, except for materials actually consumed by the farmers.

The shop will be open every day next week, starting Monday.

"The farmers will have to do their own work or bring in someone to help them and they will have to pay for parts that the machines may need."

The shop will provide the equipment and a supervisor who will show them how to do the work," Mr. Johnson stated. "We also will assist any growers in getting parts on material they may need. I advise as many as can to come out early morning."

Considerable equipment is available at the shop, and work can be accomplished in repairing tractors, plowing and similar jobs.

Among the machines that can be repaired are ploughs, including hand ploughs, discs on tractors or tractors, power tills, including truck bodies, fertilizer distributing, truck mowing machines, hay rakes and other farm implements.

When the superintendentship was made to the Florida Baptist Children's Home held in Panama City last January Mr. Johns told the convention it was the best annual report the home has ever had, because it was the first one to show this institution of the United States from the mother country, he said.

"This course will fit persons to start in as mechanics, which covers the 100 hour service on airplane engines, qualifying men for aircraft service work at airports.

It is expected that many graduates of this class will obtain such positions at the base here in the future.



Auto Traffic In State Is On Fast Downward Spin

TALLAHASSEE, June 11 (AP)—Florida automobile traffic, which increased steadily from 1934 to 1942, is on a downward spin at a rate exceeding that of any other state.

Gasoline consumption is off 17.8 percent for the first four months of 1942, reflecting a greater proportionate decrease in highway travel than in city street traffic.

Traffic decreases for April contrasted with April of last year, ranged as high as 42.5 percent at a checking station on U. S. 17 near the St. Johns River at Sanford. The station counted an average daily traffic flow of 1,822 vehicles.

The research and records division of the State Road Department reported yesterday that the traffic counts for February were 24.6 percent less than for the corresponding month of 1941. The average decrease for all States was 7.6 percent.

The German-controlled Nazis themselves claimed to be destroyed three entire Russian armies—totaling roughly 100,000 men—and that 240,000 were captured.

Elsewhere, the Russians said no important changes had occurred.


