When elected to this position in 1917, he assumed the task of developing the school system in this county—then known as the "baby" counties as separation from Orange County had taken place but four years previous to his election. He has as one looks over Mr. Lawton's accomplishments in the building of a worthy educational system, they marvel at his feats.

Mr. Lawton did not stop when he obtained his successes but endeavored to have the school system progress as the county itself developed. A native Floridian, graduate of Rollins College, a former principal at Orange Public School and Longwood Public School, this man was equipped with first hand knowledge to cope with any school situation. He guided the problem of educating Seminole's youngsters through many critical periods and he has gained state-wide recognition for his accomplishments in the field of education.

While his main interest was Seminole County's educational needs, Mr. Lawton refused to isolate himself from the State organizations. He served efficiently for a number of years as treasurer of the Florida Educational Association and was once president of the South Florida School Officials' Association.

Mr. Lawton has been a dynamic figure in county affairs. A member of the Sanford Kiwanis Club, he is a past president of this service club. He has been claimed county-wide for his excellent results during his tenure as president of the Fernald-Lightfoot Memorial Hospital.

But to the students in Seminole County, Mr. Lawton is more than a leader in county officialdom. He is a man who has an exceptional personality. He is a person who can forget the serious moments of life for a moment and can show that he has a wonderful sense of humor. His talks are considered rare treats by the students because he always has an unusual and humorous speech.

The students and many other people admire Mr. Lawton for his performance on the tennis court. His time spent in tennis is a quality that can be coveted.

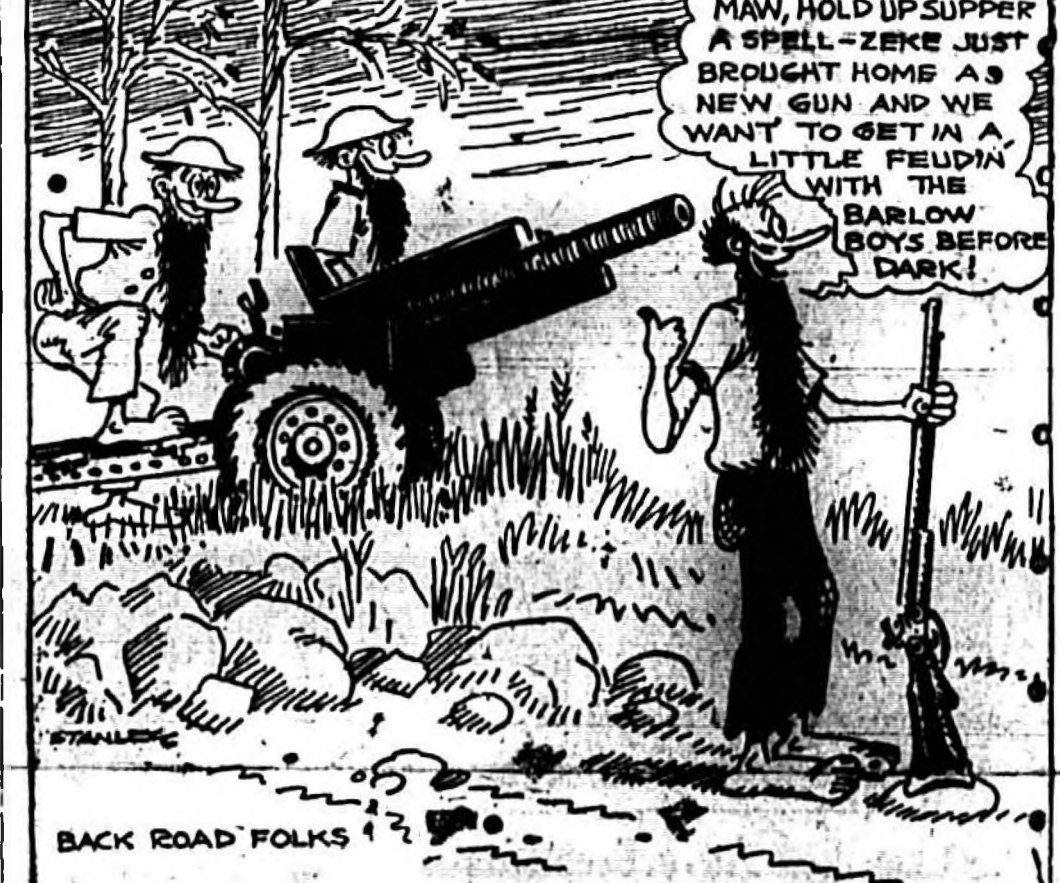

Chinese Try Strategy To Ease Jap Pressure In Chekiang Sector

Nips Break Silence On Midway Battle, Claim Three U. S. Warships Are Sunk

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The Navy declined comment today on reports that the United States aircraft carrier USS Yorktown was sunk at Midway. A spokesman indicated that the statement was made for information on the disposal of the fleet units—comment similar to this have been made several times before and have proved unavailing.

(By Associated Press.) A Chinese column operating beyond Japanese lines today advanced to a point 12 miles west of Nanchang, the Japanese occupied capital of the Kiangsi province. The move is said to be an evident attempt to force the Japanese to withdraw part of their troops now thrusting toward the Chekiang province, thus relieving the pressure in that sector.

Meanwhile, the Japs broke their silence today, claiming three United States warships were sunk and 184 planes downed in the Dutch Harbor and Midway raids. They admitted the loss of an aircraft carrier, with an other damaged and 35 planes. They claimed troop landings on the Aleutian Islands in an unconfirmed report.

Chinese forces still in possession of the island of Iwo Jima today reported that they had captured three Japanese planes in three days, and that they had destroyed more than 1,000 Japanese planes. The Chinese command announced last night that the Japanese were making good attacks after another attack at the "inner and outer rings" of the city's defenses, a communiqué said, and an army spokesman declared that the defenders had full possession of the important center after wiping out an enemy unit which penetrated one section during the week-end.

6 Local Men Get Jobs As Airplane Engine Mechanics

Six men who completed the airplane engine mechanics course at the Vocational Defense Training School have been placed at the Orlando base this month, and 25 others have sent applications to Army sub-departments and expect to obtain positions soon, Alex Johnson, school director, announced today.

This course will fit persons to start in as mechanics, which covers the 100 hour service on airplane engines, qualifying men for "ground crew" work at airports. It is expected that many graduates of this class will obtain such positions at the base here in the future.

The six men who have gone to the Orlando base are Cecil Jones, B. H. Williams, H. A. Hall, Albert Kitzinger, Fred Jones and C. E. Brooks. They receive from \$125 to \$135 per month with time and a half for overtime work. "This work is especially suitable for boys just completing high school," the director said, as he urged those interested to apply immediately to join the class.

Dudley McGowan is the instructor. The course runs daily from 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. The school has two auto mechanics classes that prepare men to take the airplane engine course. Under W. C. Cornell, they run from 8:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. and 9:00 P.M. to midnight.

Mail Confirmations Abroad Ruled "Out"

WASHINGTON, June 10, (AP)—For reasons of national security the Office of Censorship has ruled that individuals in Germany and Italy are prohibited from the practice of sending mail confirmations to relatives in the United States and from receiving such mail.

Axis Capture Of Bir Hacheim In Northern Africa Is Reported

Re-adjust Lines For Caucasus Thrust; RAF Planes Blast Northern France

The Germans reported the capture of Bir Hacheim in northern Libya today after days of bitter fighting against the British and Free French.

London sources acknowledged the report probably is true, but military circles believe the fall of the inland

crushing blow to the Allies. British armored columns with artillery and infantry moved with Axis forces east of Bir Hacheim yesterday to relieve pressure on that beleaguered French fortress which has withstood a steady two-week battering.

Axis land and air forces smashed against the stronghold Tuesday with redoubled fury—direct orders from Berlin and Rome, it was reported by prisoners taken by the British.

Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini—apparently annoyed by the brilliant defense of the inland anchor of the British desert line by soldiers of a country they thought they had made impotent, sent orders that the post must be taken at any cost.

As many as 50 Nazi Junkers bombers rained bombs on the Bir Hacheim compound. Forty Stuka dive bombers also participated, without forming the Free French flank.

Axis land forces led by the German-Italian tank formations moved forward from the ring of mines and barbed wire, but the French artillery and machine gun fire repulsed them.

Auto Traffic In State Is On Fast Downward Spin

TALLAHASSEE, June 11 (AP)—Florida automobile traffic, which increased steadily from 1934 to 1941, is on a downward spin of a scale exceeding that of any other State.

Gasoline consumption is off 17.5 percent for the first four months of 1942, reflecting a greater proportionate decrease in travel than in city street traffic.

Traffic decreases for April, contrasted with April of 1941, ranged as high as 45.5 percent at a checking station on U. S. 17 near the St. Johns River at Sanford. The station counted an average daily traffic flow of 1,322 vehicles.

The research and records division of the State Road Department reported yesterday that the traffic counts for February were 24.6 percent less than for the corresponding months of 1941. The average decrease for all States was 24 percent.

Walter Parker, director of the records division, noted U. S. 92 near Plant City as the highway with the most traffic in Florida. The count for February was 4,722 vehicles daily in April, but this was 12.1 percent less than the year before.

Nazi Vengeance Squads Wipe Out Czech Village

LONDON, June 11 (AP)—German vengeance squads, which wiped out Lidice, a Czech village of 1200 persons Wednesday, killing all the men and deporting the women and children on the ground that the population harbored the two assassins of Reinhard Heydrich, the late German ruler of Bohemia-Moravia.

Complaining that this most savage single act of repression in the history of German occupation of continental Europe, Gestapo and German soldiers razed the village, leaving nothing but rubble, the German-controlled radio announced from Prague.

Lidice is a small village of coal-miners and woodworkers a few miles west of the Czech capital and not far from where Heydrich, the "gangster" who fell by a bomb, was killed by two patriots driving along a winding road two weeks ago.

The assassins, who leaped upon Heydrich's car with a roadside pistol and bomb, have not been caught.

Shortly after Prague and Berlin radios had announced the fate of Lidice "as the hiding place of the Heydrich murderers," German authorities in Prague disclosed that 25 more Czechs had been executed today in the capital and 25 in Brunn for a total of 508—exclusive of the Lidice dead—to be slain since the attack on Heydrich.

In London, authorities of the Allied and exiled governments of the continent estimated that 500,000 persons had been shot or hanged in all Europe since the beginning of the German conquest.

Only yesterday during Heydrich's elaborate funeral rites in Berlin, Gestapo Chief Himmler vowed continuing vengeance on the killers. The slaughter of Lidice was his meagre sequel.

House Group Boosts Tax On Cigarettes

WASHINGTON, June 11 (AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee today decided to increase the Federal tax on cigarettes from 5-1/2 to 7 cents a pack.

Chairman Douglas said the committee planned to disallow the Treasury request to exempt the tax on cigars and other smoking devices designed to raise another \$40,000,000.

The committee rejected the Treasury request to be established by a tax differential to be established between 10 and 15 cent brands of cigarettes.

Nazis Shift Attack Back To Kharkov

Fall Of Inland Defense Anchor May Not Be Bad Blow To United Nations

(By Associated Press) The United States, Britain and Russia officially disclosed today they have reached a full understanding on the urgent task of creating a second front in Europe in 1942.

A White House announcement issued simultaneously with the British statement in London said President Roosevelt and Russian Commissar Molotov have reached an agreement. It didn't state specifically when or if the powers decided to open a second front. Simultaneously, the British announced the signing of a 20-year mutual security pact with Russia.

(By Associated Press) The Germans, held off at Sevastopol, have taken the offensive in the Kharkov sector, 100 miles north of Moscow, re-adjusting their lines for an eventual thrust at the Caucasus.

Meanwhile, the weather held the RAF from Germany for the second consecutive night. Nazi leaders in the low countries and northern France were blasted. Rome reported a raid on the Taranto naval base.

German troops have started another offensive on the Kharkov front after last month's heavy fighting in which the Nazis had claimed the "annihilation" of three entire Red armies there. The Soviet announcement early today.

Elsewhere, the Russians said no important changes had occurred.

All available reports indicated the front still centered around Sevastopol, and at the end of six days of increasingly savage warfare the Russians were reported holding their main line.

Nimitz reported the loss of one American destroyer damaged to one United States aircraft carrier, and the loss of an undetermined number of planes.
