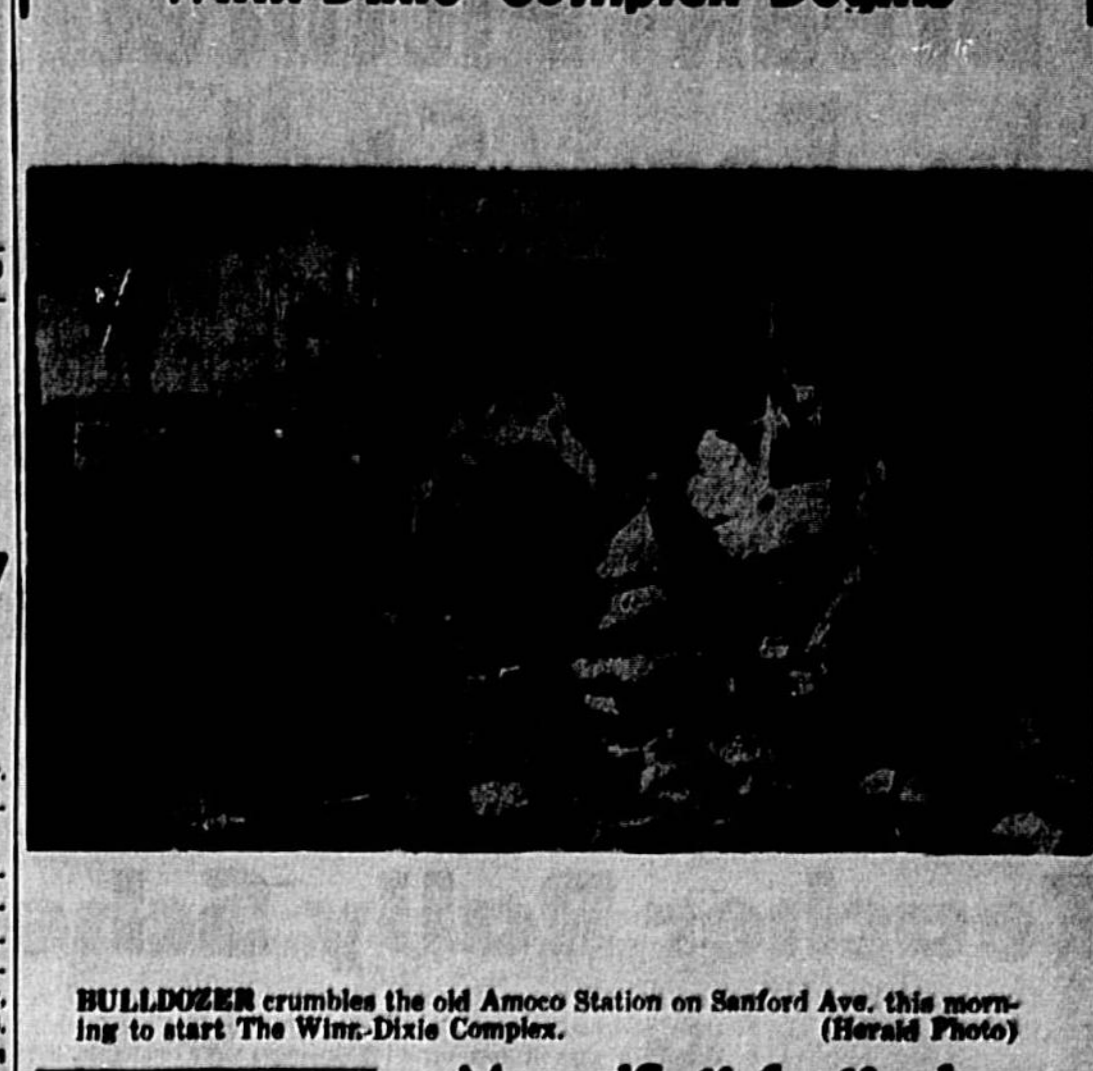
Sanford Sailor Gets Life In Murder Case

Life in Ralston State Prison was meted to a Sanford Naval Air Station sailor Delvin M. Peria, 33, yesterday afternoon when he pleaded guilty to first degree murder before Volusia Circuit Judge Robert H. Wingfield at Deland. Peria had confessed to the slaying of another Sanford sailor, Bobby Ray Sizemore, 29, who, it was claimed, had been paying attention to Mrs. Peria. The Filipino steward also confessed to slaying his wife's throat and dumping her body in Lake County. She recovered. It was brought out in the hearing that Peria had completed his commanding officer, who, in turn, warned Sizemore to refrain from paying attention to Mrs. Peria. Peria followed the couple on Jan. 30, after a squadron party, to a wooded section of Volusia County. He said he knifed Sizemore to death, left his body there and took Mrs. Peria to Lake County. Because of these extenuating circumstances, Judge Wingfield sentenced Peria to life rather than to sentence him to the electric chair.

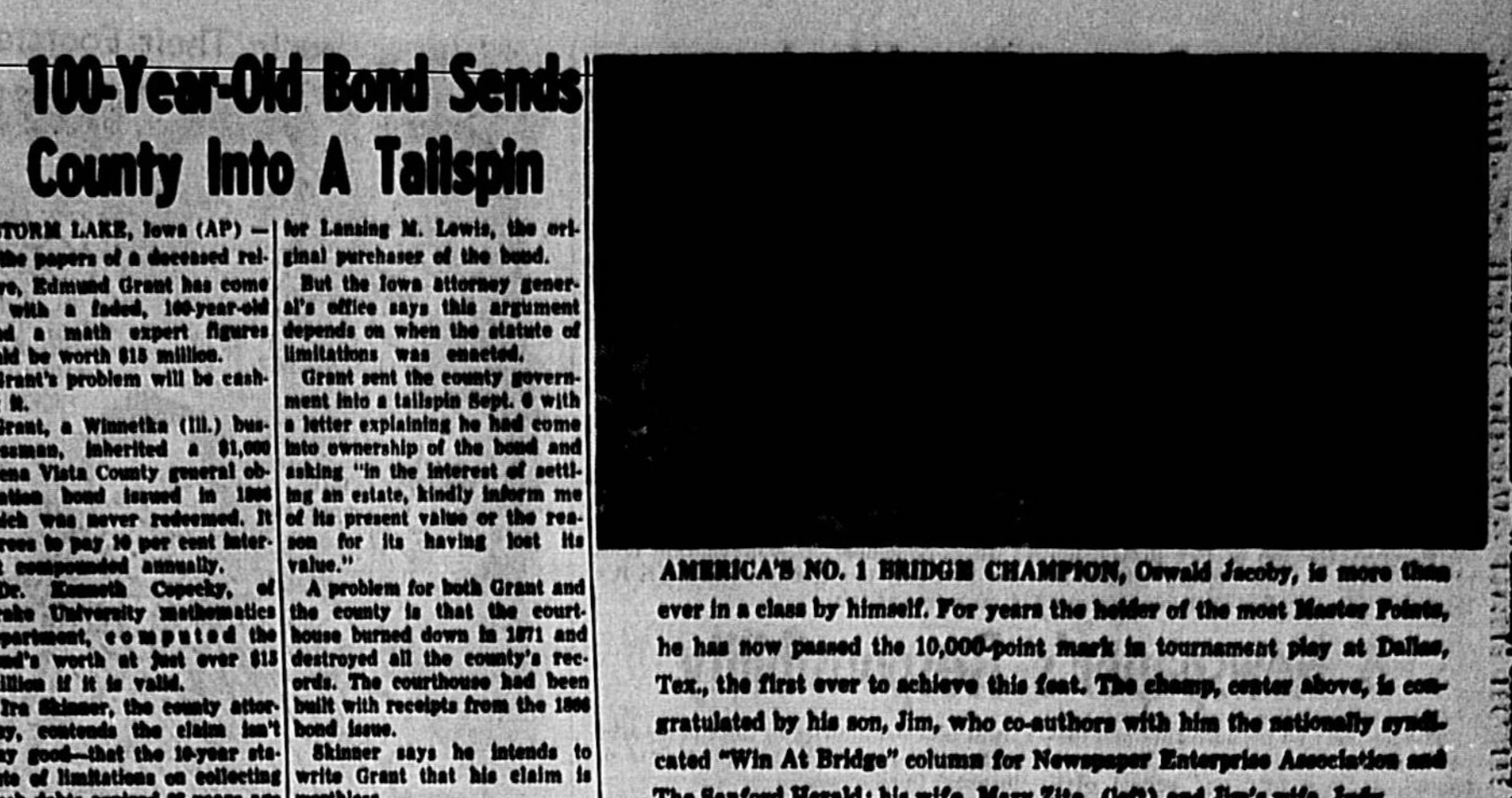

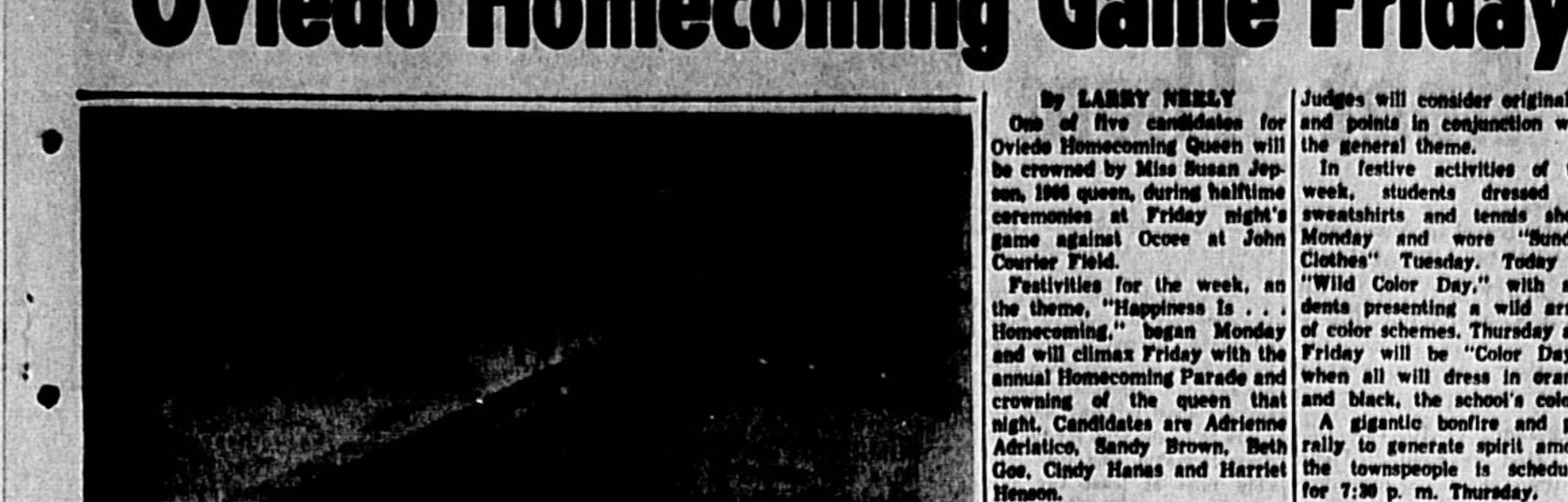

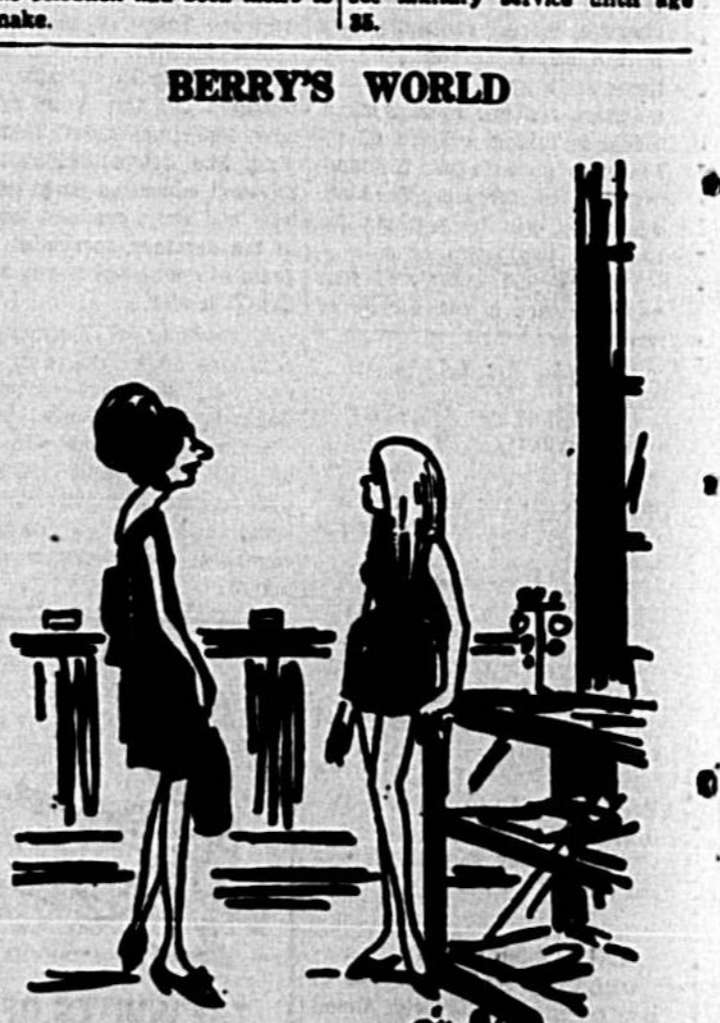

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Reds Turn Big Guns On Marine Posts

SANCON (AP) — Long-range Communist artillery and Red mortars opened up again Tuesday and today on U.S. Marine positions south of the demilitarized zone as sharp fighting was reported up and down both Vietnam.

Seven Marines were killed and 18 wounded in a Communist mortar attack today on a Marine base near Quang Tri City, about 18 miles below the DMZ.

U.S. headquarters said the Marine base at Con Thien and other bases just below the border were hit Tuesday by 14 artillery and mortar shells, and 26 Marines were wounded, most of them slightly.

Half a dozen harassing attacks were reported in the Mekong Delta south of Saigon, the worst against the village of Cal Be a subdistrict headquarters. Red mortars killed four civilians and wounded 15 there in addition to causing widespread damage.

On the coastal plains of Binh Dinh Province about 250 miles above Saigon, American war planes practically wiped out a platoon of guerrillas. They were hit hard late Tuesday and this morning a ground sweep found 37 enemy bodies and 34 shatter weapons on the field.

Heavy weather over North Vietnam limited American pilots to 33 missions Tuesday, about half of them were Marine sorties.

Just 30 miles east of Saigon troops of the U.S. 9th Division continued to bring up thousands of weapons from a five-level guerrilla tunnel complex beneath the jungle in Phuoc Tuy Province. Officers said 675 weapons, 38,000 rounds of ammunition and other supplies have been found.

Only in the plain of North Vietnam did the war flag, heavy clouds and rain kept American planes completely out of the Hanoi-Haiphong area and limited strikes elsewhere to the lowest number in a month.

The big U.S. B-52 strategic bombers made two more raids on suspected infiltration routes in the western part of the northern battle zone today, bringing their total to six raids in three days.

"Next to Page One, and perhaps of even more importance," said he, "is the editorial page. Read it today; you will find it interesting."

Page One, he pointed out, does carry the top news stories and a column of comment that has had the share of being the most important. "It is the editorial page," said he, "that the country is in the midst of a stream of events. And to be able to record some of the happenings and to write about the things as well as the planning."

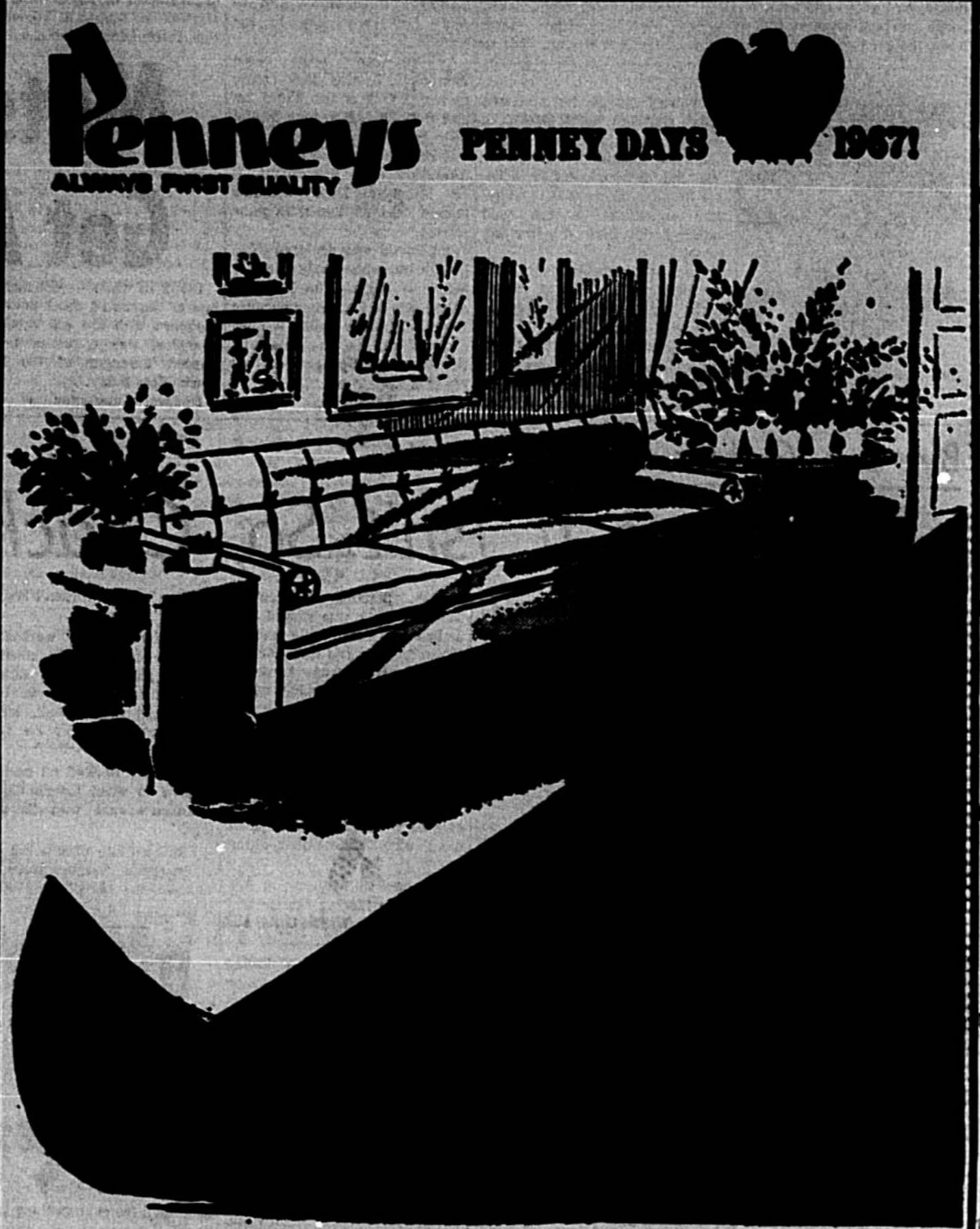

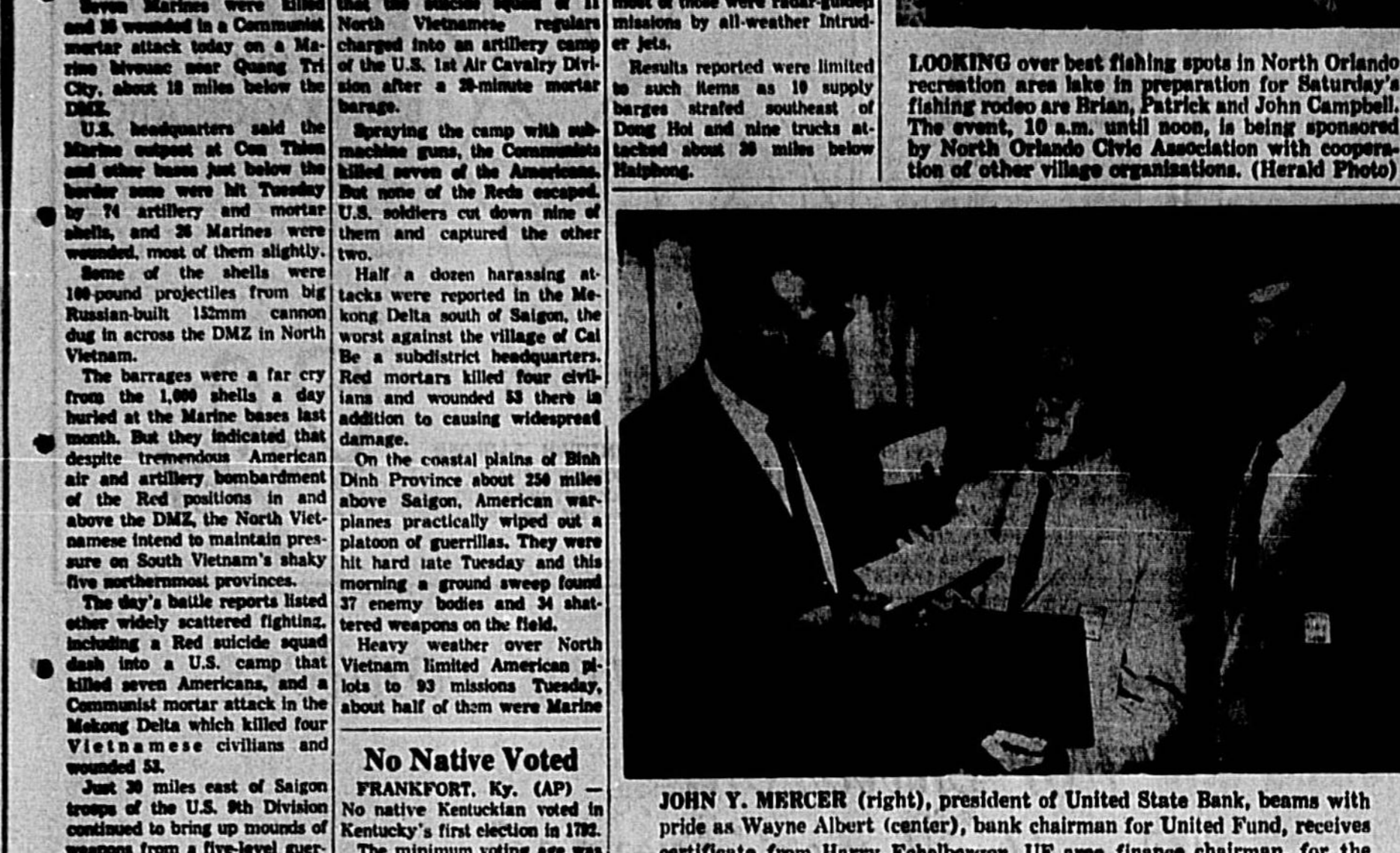

Reds Turn Big Guns On Marine Posts

SANCON (AP) — Long-range Communist artillery and Red mortars opened up again Tuesday and today on U.S. Marine positions south of the demilitarized zone as sharp fighting was reported up and down both Vietnam.

Seven Marines were killed and 18 wounded in a Communist mortar attack today on a Marine base near Quang Tri City, about 18 miles below the DMZ.

U.S. headquarters said the Marine base at Con Thien and other bases just below the border were hit Tuesday by 14 artillery and mortar shells, and 26 Marines were wounded, most of them slightly.

Half a dozen harassing attacks were reported in the Mekong Delta south of Saigon, the worst against the village of Cal Be a subdistrict headquarters. Red mortars killed four civilians and wounded 15 there in addition to causing widespread damage.

On the coastal plains of Binh Dinh Province about 250 miles above Saigon, American war planes practically wiped out a platoon of guerrillas. They were hit hard late Tuesday and this morning a ground sweep found 37 enemy bodies and 34 shatter weapons on the field.

Heavy weather over North Vietnam limited American pilots to 33 missions Tuesday, about half of them were Marine sorties.

Just 30 miles east of Saigon troops of the U.S. 9th Division continued to bring up thousands of weapons from a five-level guerrilla tunnel complex beneath the jungle in Phuoc Tuy Province. Officers said 675 weapons, 38,000 rounds of ammunition and other supplies have been found.

Only in the plain of North Vietnam did the war flag, heavy clouds and rain kept American planes completely out of the Hanoi-Haiphong area and limited strikes elsewhere to the lowest number in a month.

The big U.S. B-52 strategic bombers made two more raids on suspected infiltration routes in the western part of the northern battle zone today, bringing their total to six raids in three days.

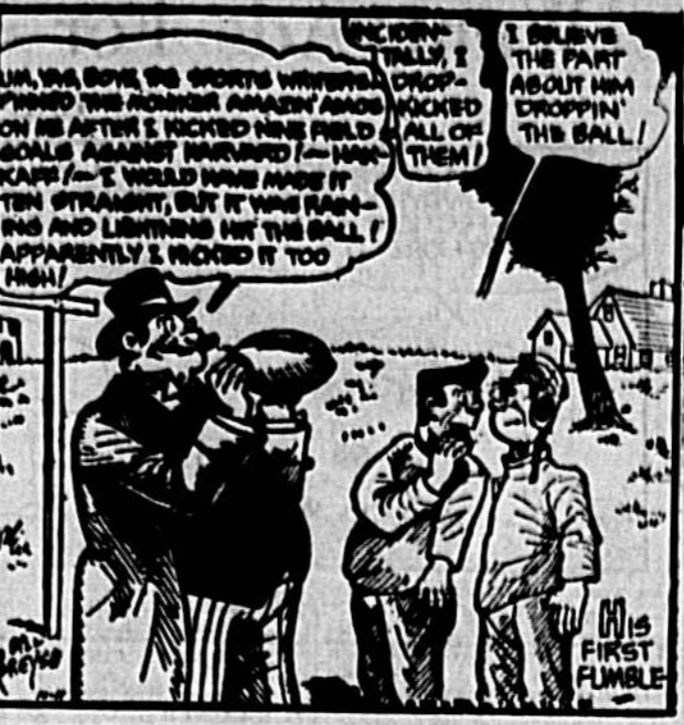

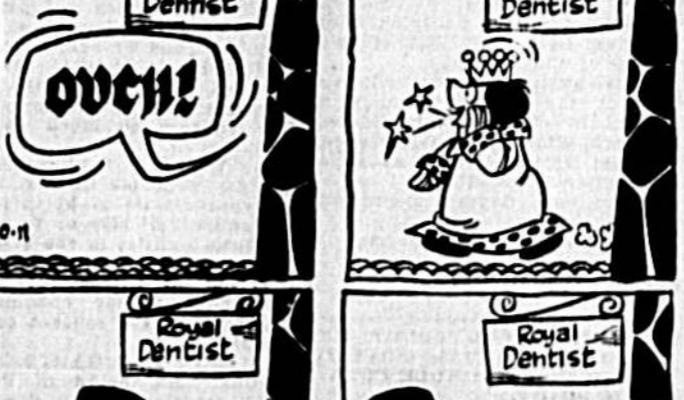

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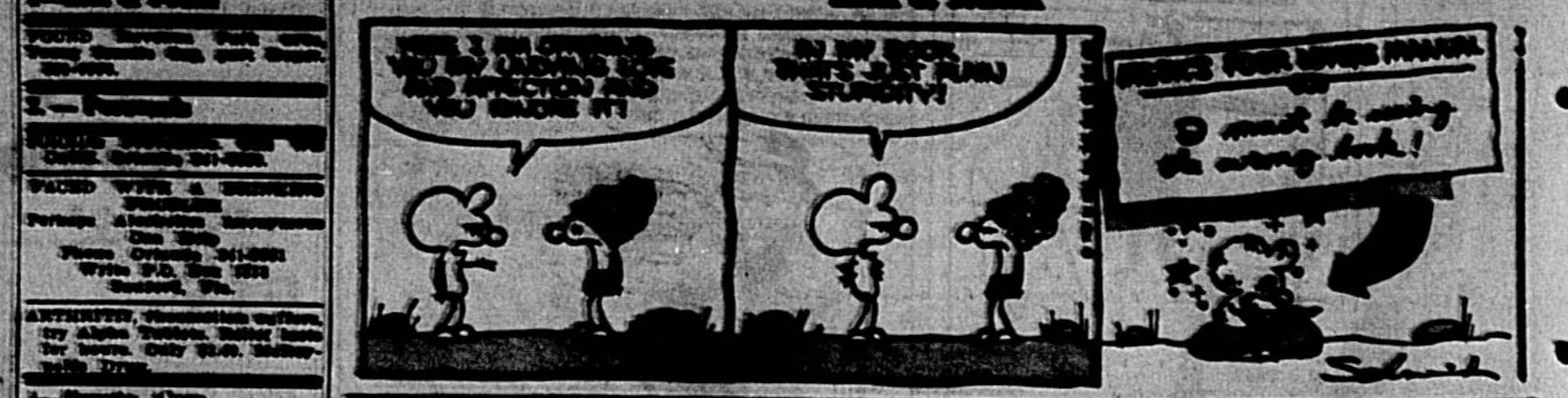

Surprise Her With Anchovy Chicken

Every woman has one or two favorite chicken dishes at which she excels. Never try to duplicate them or outdo her in the way she cooks chicken - you won't succeed. If you try, you'll never again cross the threshold of her kitchen.

However, chicken is versatile and can be prepared in a new, exciting, hurry way. So, next time you entertain your girl friend, surprise her with Chicken and Anchovies.

Buy a small fryer (not less than two pounds and not over three) and have the chicken cut into eight pieces. You'll also need a head of garlic, containing one bulb and parsley flakes, four stalks of olive oil, a small bag of regular flour, a can of beef gravy, a four-ounce can of mushroom pieces and stems, a bottle of wine vinegar and one of the small long tins of instant anchovies.

When checking out your groceries, be sure to ask the clerk for a small paper bag. And on the way home pick up a bottle of white wine (Chablis or Sauvignon).

Chill the wine in the refrigerator. Open the olive oil, beef gravy, flour, mushrooms, wine vinegar and anchovies. Drain all the liquid from the mushrooms and remove the bottom from the refrigerator so it'll drain a bit.

Put two large cloves of garlic in three or four small ones. Cut each clove in half.

Unwrap the chicken and pick out the back (that's the lumpy place with little meat), neck and the giblets (heart, gizzard and liver). Wrap these in wax paper and store them in the freezer.

You can use these parts later along with more of the same for a good bone for chicken soup.

If the chicken pieces are dripping wet pat off the excess moisture with paper toweling. The chicken should be moist, not dripping.

Open the paper bag and in it put about a cup of flour and a sprinkle of salt and pepper.

Put a piece of chicken into the bag, hold the top closed and shake. After each piece of chicken is coated this way, shake lightly to get off the excess flour. Place the chicken on a plate.

Using a fork, pick up two of the anchovies and put them into a cup. Take a teaspoon and with the back of the bowl mash the anchovies into a paste.

Cover the bottom of a large frying pan with olive oil and heat over medium heat. Add the pieces of garlic and the anchovy paste. Sprinkle two pinches of salt into the oil and stir.

When the garlic halves are brown, remove them. They have served their purpose by flavoring the oil and anchovies.

Add the chicken pieces side by side and sprinkle light with salt and pepper. This is also the time to add a pinch of parsley flakes. Cook for 15 minutes over medium heat. Then turn the chicken and repeat the process.

While it's cooking, dip the chicken every five minutes or so to keep it from sticking to the pan.

When the chicken is cooked for 30 minutes, remove the pieces to a plate, turn the heat up another notch and add a four-ounce glass of wine vinegar, the olive oil and a few minutes - just until there's no more vinegar aroma. Lower the heat to medium and add half a cup of beef gravy plus a lump of butter. Stir slowly until the butter has disappeared; put the chicken back into the pan and mix in the canned mushrooms.

Turn down the heat and let cook for about 10 minutes. Voilà! It's done.

A package of quick-cooking rice (simple to prepare), oven-warmed French bread and a tossed salad will complete the meal.

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) - The state government has decided to move the Sydney fruit and vegetable markets from Haymarket to the southern end of the city to Flemington, a suburb nine miles outside.

The present 25-acre site causes traffic congestion in the early mornings, and there is no room for expansion. Cost of the move to the 47-acre Flemington site is estimated at between \$18,782,000 and \$14,794,000.

The Department of Technical Education has proposed development of the present market area group of education buildings.

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Versatile Veal
Bakes in Ring,
Loaf, Patties

When the family wants a change from roasts, meat loaf, plus on making one with veal and pork.

Veal is deliciously flavored. It's well used with pork which has a slightly more pronounced flavor. Season with salt even more than you would use with beef.

This recipe can be used in several different ways, paties and chops, meat loaf, etc.

Bake in a loaf pan or ring mold or shape and place on a rack in a shallow pan so you would be able to drain the fat that will collect in the pan. For an even shorter cooking time, make it in portions as suggested in the variations.

Roast-Topped Veal Loaf
1½ lbs. ground veal
¼ pound ground pork
¼ cup onion dry bread crumbs
1 egg, unseasoned salt
3 eggs, slightly beaten
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon celery salt
2 slices ham

Combine meat, pork, bread crumbs, milk, eggs, lemon juice and seasonings. Pack into a greased loaf pan. Bake in a 350 deg. F. oven for 1½ hours. Slice and place on top of loaf. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 1½ to 1¾ hours. (30 to 3 servings.)

Variations
Bake in a greased 1½-quart ring mold in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 1 hour.

Shape meat mixture into 6 patties. Use 16 slices of bacon instead of 2. Do not chop. Lay bacon slices one across the other to form 8 crosses. Place a meat patty on the center of each cross. Shape bacon slices around patty. Place patties on a rack in an open roasting pan so that the ends of the bacon slices are underneath the patties. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) 45 to 60 minutes.

Beef and Sausage Pyramids
1½ pounds ground beef
1 pound pork sausage links
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
8 tomato slices, cut ¼ inch thick
1½ teaspoons instant minced onion
1 can (4 ounces) mushroom caps, drained
Combine ground beef, salt and pepper. Shape into 8 patties, approximately ¼ inch thick. Top each with a tomato slice, sprinkle with instant onion and parsley. Place 2 sausage links on each patty and arrange on a rack in a shallow roasting pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and place mushroom caps on top, using a wooden pick to hold in place. Return to oven and continue baking for 15 minutes. Serve hot, 8 servings.
