St. Johns Fish Dying In Drought

Action from the state level to save the fish in the St. Johns River and in Lake Jessup was urged today by a group of local sportsmen. The drought and Army Engineers were blamed for the wholesale death of the fish.

Telegrams urging action by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission were being forwarded by Maj. Olan V. Boutwell, Mrs. John Crim, operator of a fishing camp, and the Seminole Sportsman's Club. The wires were being sent to State Sen. Kenneth Plante and State Rep. Jan Fortane.

"The river is so low, because of the drought," Mrs. Crim stated, "that the fish are being isolated in pockets and are dying from lack of oxygen. This is principally so," she said, "in the Hatill Park or hammock area of the St. Johns, between Ponce Lake and Herz, 50 bridge. Local fishermen, re-

TALLAHASSEE (Sp.) — Five bills affecting Seminole County have been reported favorably by committee and placed on the House of Representatives calendar. It was reported today by Rep. E. Pope Bassett (R-Altamonte Springs). These included:

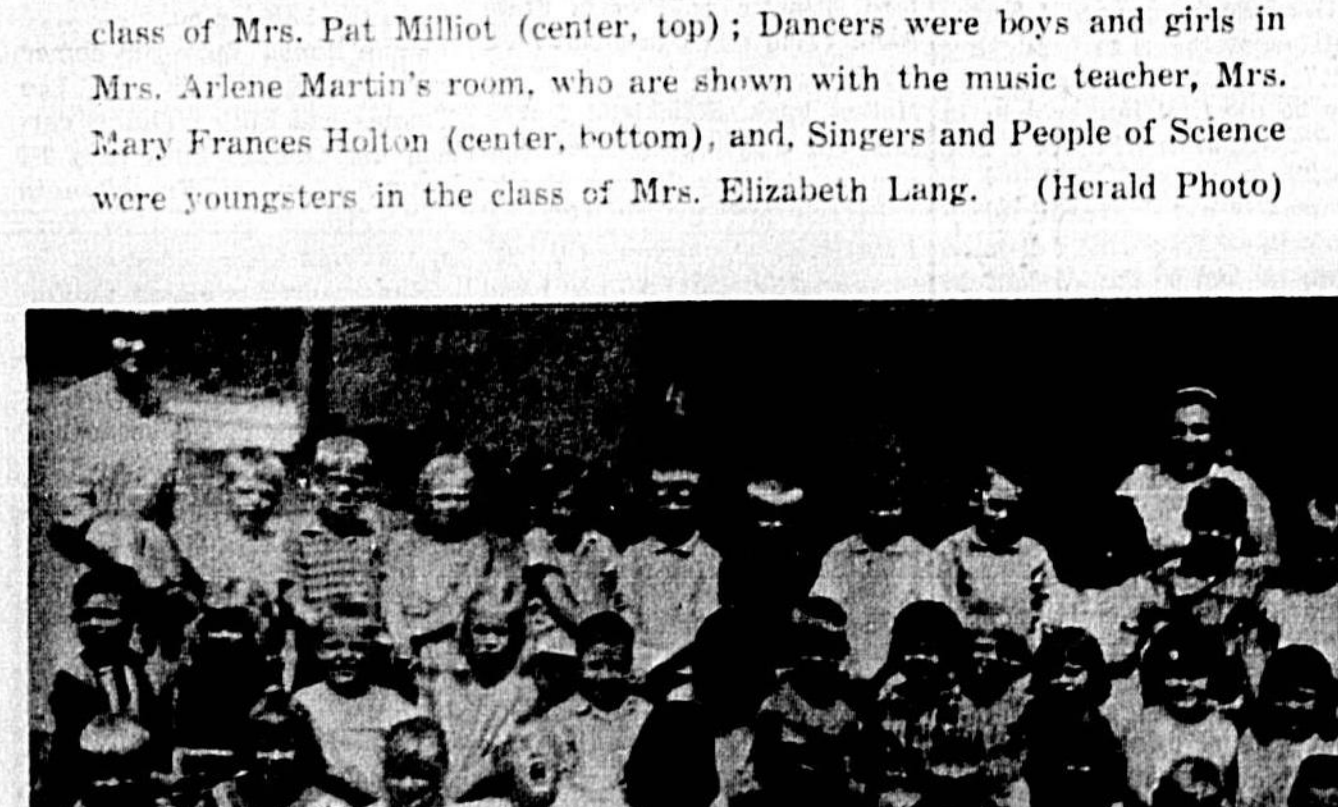

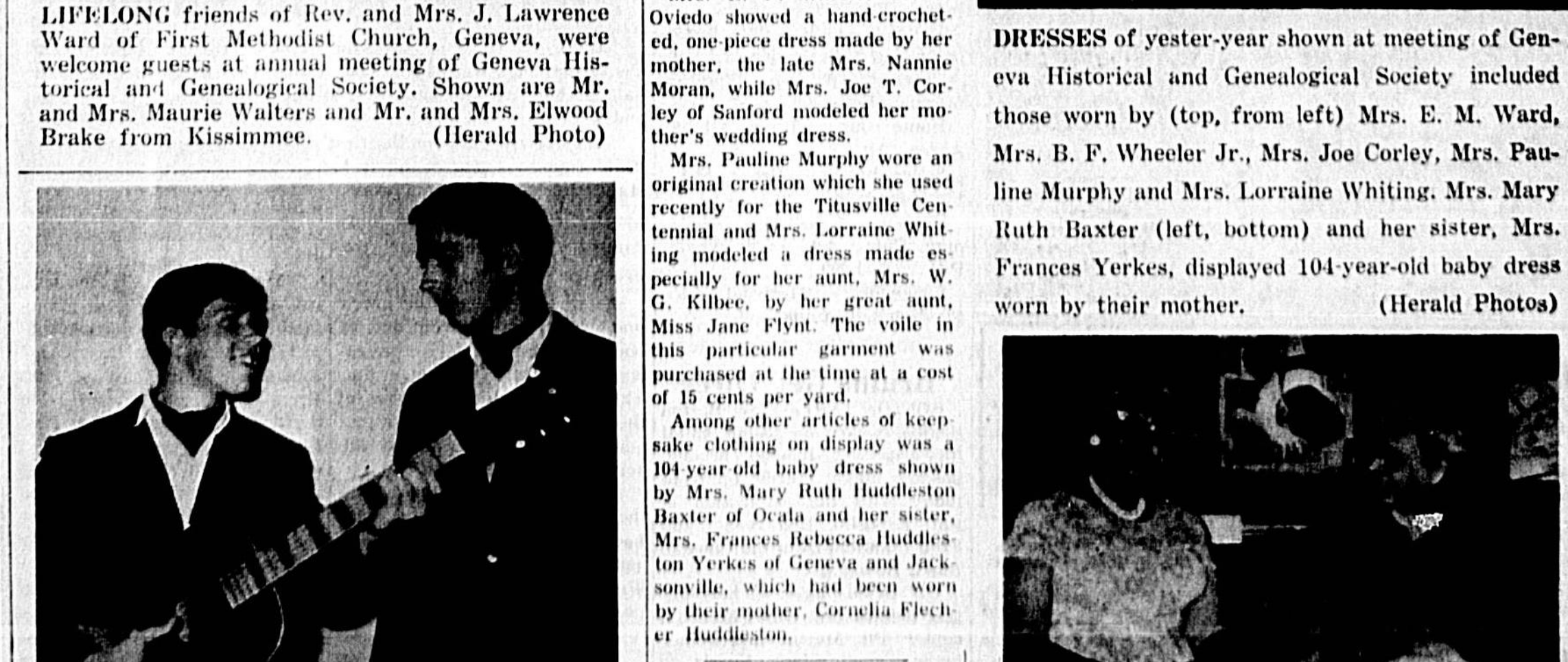
