





No Connection With Volusia County Drive

Five Sanford Negroes were arrested individually Saturday in a crackdown by police on bolita operations here, Police Chief Roy Williams reported.

The Chief said he does not believe local bolita operations have any connection with the drive in Volusia County "but we don't want it either — that's why we are checking closely here. We do not want to have to report to the grand jury as they are doing at DeLand."

The local investigation is being conducted by Lt. Joe Hickson and Patrolman Carl C. Dodson. They arrested five Negroes, all charged with possession of a share in a lottery. They are:

Conner Next Senate Prexy?

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A move got underway today to nail down the presidency of the 1963 senate for Sen. James E. Conner of Brooksville.

Conner has about 40 written pledges of support (for the powerful position), many more than needed in the 45-member upper chamber.

Sen. Dewey Johnson, Quincy, said he'll recommend that the senate caucus this week and designate Conner. For the past several sessions, the senate has been holding off on this selection until after the senator to be designated has been re-elected to his seat.

"But this thing is muddy, the waters," Johnson said, "and we ought to get it out of the way so we can tackle the important problems facing us."

MOUNT VERNON, N. Y. (UPI)—A former mental patient today shot and killed five persons, including his wife and 4-year-old son, and wounded two other persons. He surrendered a few hours later in an Episcopal minister's parsonage.

Charles Hansen, 33, a radio repairman, a police sergeant said Hansen had been released recently from a hospital as a mental patient. Besides his wife and son, Hansen killed his wife's parents and a relative who lived next door in this New York City suburb. The two persons wounded also were relatives, police said. Hansen fled the shooting scene in an auto and surrendered several hours later in adjoining New Rochelle to the Rev. George M. Davis, 67, of Trinity Episcopal Church. Police said he turned over two guns to the minister who summoned au-

Let's Be First

Wouldn't it be fine if Seminole County could be in the vanguard of something that is truly constructive and humane.

Putting into effect the U. S. Supreme Court mandate for a court-provided attorney to defend those without funds seems to us a splendid opportunity.

We have supported the public defender idea, even before the Supreme Court decision came along. And this newspaper calls upon the officials of Seminole County to act with vigor and imagination in putting the idea into practice as quickly as feasible. The other day we had an inter-

esting talk with an attorney who pointed out that the Ford Foundation has announced three grants, totaling more than \$2,500,000, to improve and extend legal services for indigent persons accused of crimes. A substantial part of this fund is to be used for establishing "test" systems in different parts of the U. S.

Attorneys seem to feel that the courts and the practicing attorneys of Central Florida, in particular this county and Orange, would be receptive to the idea of becoming a test area in this field. We believe that we would have the support and the sympathy of an overwhelming majority of citizens.

Cancer Control Month

April is Cancer Control Month by Presidential proclamation. During this month the American Cancer Society is seeking funds for important programs of research, education and service. It is also seeking something even more important for the immediate present — to communicate.

It would be just as appropriate to designate April as Cancer Communication Month. Why? As a distinguished health officer said recently: "If someone invented a drug that would cure half of the present cases of cancer the excitement would be beyond belief. We have such a drug: It is communication."

An estimated one-half of all cases of cancer could be cured by finding them soon enough and "doing for them what we already know how to do." However, only one-third is being saved, largely because the indi-

vidual does not go to his doctor in time for early diagnosis.

The problem of eliminating the gap between one-third and one-half — of adding 88,000 lives to the 177,000 now saved each year — is difficult and distressing. It is a problem of communication and motivation. It is distressing because we are unable to persuade people to act in their own health interest — to present themselves in time for early diagnosis and treatment of cancer. At minimum, this means a health checkup at least once a year.

During April, volunteers of the American Cancer Society will be calling on you. They will ask for funds to support life-saving programs in cancer control. They will urge you to have a health checkup now — if you have not already had one — and do so every year.

We urge you to do both.

Dear Sir:

It occurred to me that possibly there were many people who, like me, had only a vague idea of the workings of the Children's Home Society of Florida and wondered why it should be included as one of the agencies served by the United Fund of Seminole County. In fact, not until the report of the Children's Home Society was received in our office did I actually know that during the year 1962 four children were placed in permanent adoptive homes in Seminole County.

Six unmarried mothers, permanent residents of Seminole County, received help from the Society and in addition, two unmarried mothers who were not residents of this county were referred to the Society from our county.

During the period 1950 to 1961 the Society averaged placing three children each year in permanent homes in Seminole County. Children referred to the Society for adoption placement were taken to Jacksonville to be cared

for in their foster homes until the permanent adoptive homes are selected. A special feature of the Society's services is the adoptive placement of older, school age children who usually are referred to the Society through the State Department of Public Welfare. These children are cared for in the Children's Center in Jacksonville during the adoption period in preparation for adoption placement.

In 1962 the Society placed a total of 337 children in permanent adoptive homes throughout the State of Florida and services are provided on a state-wide basis. At present there are Division and Chapter Offices located in Miami, Fort Lauderdale, Tallahassee, Pensacola and Jacksonville.

Plans are under development for the establishment of a Mid-Eastern Division Office to be located in Central Florida. It will have Seminole County in conjunction with five other counties in this area of the State.

The Society has been a member agency of the United Fund of Seminole County since 1958.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON—(NEA)— House Democrats have done a complete turnaround in the case of Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, D-N. Y., chairman of the Committee on Education and Labor.

The majority party has closed ranks in support of its often-far-and-awayward colleague, and the case is closed. He gets off without even a slap on the wrist.

True, funds for operation of the committee he heads have been cut by about 40 per cent to \$200,000 for this year. And the chairman has been limited to control over a mere \$50,000.

But the cuts can be restored next year after all the furor is forgotten.

When Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., first recited chapter and verse into the Congressional Record on the New York congressman, it looked as though the Democrats had a first class scandal on their hands.

To maintain any kind of a reputation for ethical conduct and clean party government, an example would have to be made of Powell. This was freely discussed in party councils, although there were no very firm ideas of what punishment would fit or how it would be administered.

Then it began to be apparent there were a hundred or more congressmen who also were guilty of the more spectacular old charges Williams had enumerated—travel abroad on government-furnished foreign currencies and putting relatives on the government payroll.

Since that time the Congressional Record has carried a number of reports from both Senate and House committee chairmen, listing in great detail the foreign moneys spent in each country visited by their members and staffs.

So far there has been no case of a congressman's conscience bothering him to such an extent that he has refunded these advances. But even forced confessions are good for a legislator's soul and make good reading.

But if one congressman were to be made the villain for free and easy ways with public funds, then all would

merit the same treatment. So just didn't want to hurt anyone's feelings."

This touch of tenderness from the usually hard-boiled Rules Committee is a trait few Washington observers seem to have known was there.

It must be recognized, of course, that Powell is not only a congressman from Harlem, but also is political boss of his district and a big man to all voters of his race.

The Democratic party needs those voters. It needs them especially in New York state. It can use them anywhere.

The national leadership of the party is doing everything it can to get more Negro voters registered in the South and see that they vote.

The long run objective, obviously, is to hold the South for the party, even if the day should ever come when a majority of its present voters should go all the way Republican. That's politics.

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Jacoby On Bridge By Oswald Jacoby

"Win at Bridge" is my first bridge book in more than 20 years. It outlines the simple method of bidding and play that I have found most effective after 35 years of play from the White House to a tent in Korea.

Here is a hand that illustrates how declarer may occasionally be just as sure of where a key card is as if he were looking right in the opponents' hands.

South looks over dummy carefully and counts 12 top tricks at no-trump with a two-way finesse for the queen of hearts to make his grand slam.

sometime or other, but the correct technique is to acquire as much information as

possible first. South wins the opening club lead and cashes nine more tricks in spades, diamonds and clubs.

He watches the fall of the cards and notes that East has to discard on the second club. This means that West started with seven clubs. He also notes that West follows to three spades and two diamonds so 12 of West's 13 cards are known to be other than hearts.

This leaves West with one heart. South leads a heart to dummy's king. West plays the four of hearts and East is marked with the queen just as surely as if South had peeked.

A food store chain has decided to stop issuing trading stamps, because a survey revealed that its customers would prefer a cash discount to stamps.

Maybe the customers think they would. But if they are mostly women, things may not work out quite as the food store chain managers hope they will.

A woman's mind may tell her that a cash discount is better than a fistful of trading stamps to be passed in a book and eventually turned in for some gadget for the home.

But a woman doesn't always rely on common sense in matters of finance. She can't always afford to.

The irresistible lure of trading stamps is that when she

saves enough of them a woman can get something she wants, something she can't conscientiously stretch the budget to buy.

"It didn't cost a cent; I got it with trading stamps," she tells her husband when she brings home a lamp or an electric can opener or a bedspread from a trading stamp redemption centre.

What if she has paid a little more, perhaps, for the groceries that paid for the trading stamps? That is just part of her grocery bill, which her husband isn't going to question.

Meanwhile, she is hoarding those little stamps to spend in any way she pleases — often for something her husband would claim she didn't need if she went out and

bought the thing.

So while a woman's common sense may tell her that a cash discount is better than trading stamps, the minute some other woman shows her something splendid she just got with trading stamps, common sense may have a tough time of it.

Maybe the grocery chain that listened to what women say they want has a right to believe the ladies. Only time will tell.

But somehow, I'd hate to bet against trading stamps, now that women have discovered that when they spend money they are spending — but when they spend trading stamps, they are spending what rightfully belongs to them.

Two beautiful silver bowls were presented to the club by two Sanford banks.

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

Many cold-hardy plants do well in this area, and these should be used in the basic plantings such as corners and doorways." He urged the members, however, to keep Florida in the picture by scattering tropical plants among them.

"April Showers bring May flowers," or so the saying goes, but first you have to remember to get the plants started, if many of you are like me the first time you think of May flowers is when you see the brilliant display of blooms in your neighbor's yard.

If you cherish a colorful garden this summer, and who reading this article doesn't, let's see what steps need to be taken to achieve this goal. First here are the names of some of the flowers it now time to start in Central Florida; sweet alyssum, cosmos, dahlias, marigolds, zinnias and salvia.

Next, when you buy your flower seeds, remember you

get what you pay for, the best plants and finest quality flowers come from the highest priced seeds of individual colors. So go to a reliable distributor to purchase good seeds or your flowers will be inferior regardless of all your hard work. Small seeds do well if sown in a shallow box, called a flat, with bottom holes to permit drainage. The seeds germinate well in a good type of potting soil, high in organic matter. The general rule is to plant a seed its own thickness deep, that is covered by its own thickness of soil.

A newspaper or croker-sack covering the flat holds moisture in the soil and allows watering without removing the paper or sack. As soon as the seeds begin to sprout the paper or sack must be removed. Light is not needed for

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Nicklaus Aims For Grand Slam

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — There's no rest for the weary, so it'll be more golf today for Masters champion Jackie Nicklaus, who has chased all those "butterflies" in his belly but now has a "grand slam" on his mind.

Still weary from his spectacular \$20,000 one-stroke victory over the muddy Augusta National Course, the blonde, heavy-set 23-year-old Nicklaus will keep a date to play in a pro-amateur tournament at nearby Atlanta today.

Confessing to nervousness and butterflies in his stomach before he fired his final round 72 for a winning 296 total Sunday, Jackie came up with a quick quip regarding his possibility of a grand slam

this year.

"I guess I'm the only one who has a chance to win it," he said.

He hit that, like most of his tee shots, right on the button inasmuch as a golfer must win the Masters, the U. S. Open, the PGA and the British Open to complete a grand slam.

Arnold Palmer, who finished in a ninth place tie in the Masters Sunday, has been trying for that elusive slam several years now but never has made it.

The majority of golf experts feel Nicklaus can, however.

"If that 66 I shot in the second round wasn't my best," he grinned, "it sure is pushing the leaders."

It followed a first round 71 and tied young Jack for second place with Jay Herbert after 36 holes. Then, when virtually all the other leaders faltered in the heavy rain and mud of the third round, Nicklaus took a one-stroke lead with a 74 and maintained it throughout the pressure-packed final round.

In addition to being the youngest player ever to win the Masters, the Ohio shot-maker also was the first reigning Open king to lead home the field in this tournament.

Possibly the two biggest Masters surprises were 29-year-old Tony Lema of Oakland, Calif., who finished second with 287 even though it was his first appearance in

the event, and the 288 that tied 31-year-old Sam Snead for third place with Julius Boros.

"I kept looking at Tony because I knew he was even with par all day," Nicklaus admitted, "and I could tell by the scoreboard Sam was doing all right, too."

When Lema, who finished with a two-under-par 70, birdied the 18th, Nicklaus, coming up two twosomes behind him, knew he would have to par the 18th, a par four 420-yarded, or face a playoff.

"I didn't try to play conservative golf at any time," Nicklaus explained, "but neither was I about to get reckless on the 18th."

"This was no time to flirt with the trees on the right

so I aimed my tee shot to the left," he went on. "The ball landed in sand and mud and I got a free drop."

"I dropped the ball in a muddy lie, then went for my six iron. I sure wasn't going to be short."

He wasn't.

The 205-pound Ohioan put all his muscle and might into that six iron shot and belted the ball onto the green about 30 feet past the flagstick.

Faced with a downhill putt, Jackie studied the green closely. He then stroked it three feet past the cup. His second putt made it.

"I was kind of surprised when my first putt didn't go in," Nicklaus said. "And I was even more surprised when my second one did."

The annual "advance openers" will send the 20 big league teams off in a coast-to-coast, round-the-clock tournament of 1,620 games during which 18 teams will try to prove that the New York Yankees and the Los Angeles Dodgers are not the best teams in baseball. The experts and the odd-makers predict the 18 teams will fail to prove their point.

President Kennedy will be presiding at his third presidential opener when he tosses out the first ball before the American League opener between the Baltimore Orioles and Washington Senators. A crowd of more than 42,000 is expected at the 1:30 p. m. game time and the forecast is for sunny and warm weather.

Governors James A. Rhodes of Ohio and Bert T. Combs of Kentucky head the list of guests at Crosley Field, Cincinnati, where the Reds start the National League against the Pittsburgh Pirates. The ceremonial first ball will be thrown out by Susan Schroeder, 8, Cincinnati's Easter Seal child.

A forecast of possible showers was made for Cincinnati.

Bank Robbed Of \$100,000



MARIANNA (UPI) — Two masked bandits brandishing nickel-plated pistols pulled a smooth bank robbery here early today and escaped with two laundry bags full of cash.

Estimated in some quarters to be the take at nearly \$100,000, but the bank vice president who filled the hand-denim bags would say only that it was "a considerable amount."

The early-morning robbery occurred at the Citizens State Bank in this Florida panhandle community of 5,900 just south of the Georgia line.

The men escaped in a bank employee's car and were last seen heading south on State Highway 71. Roadblocks were immediately thrown up by the highway patrols in Florida and Alabama.

The men, heavily clothed and wearing construction-type helmets, walked into the bank at about 8:45 a. m. EST, shortly before it opened, and forced the six employees to lie on the floor.

"I don't even remember what they said, I was so worried about our people," said Vice President Bowers Sandusky.

"But they were sure of themselves . . . not the least bit nervous."

"They made me go to the vault and all the cashiers' drawers and fill up those bags. They looked like the kind of laundry sacks the Navy uses," Bowers said.

Sanford Trio Pleads Innocent On Mortgages

GAINESVILLE — Circuit Court trials for a trio of Sanford "home" repairmen were set for April 29 after each pleaded innocent Monday to charges that they "stole a mortgage." All three were associated with the now defunct Nova Builders.

They are William Cletus Braden and William A. DeMoss, one-third partners in the firm, and Horace Richard Barnard, a salesman. The third partner, Glen Jones Jr., still is being sought on a similar charge.

Braden and Barnard have been jailed here for several weeks, on a plea to make bond. Braden is held in lieu of \$5,000, and Barnard, \$1,000.

DeMoss was arrested Friday night in Orlando and posted a \$1,000 bond.

Sheriff Joe Cresvase of Alachua County had alerted Orlando police that DeMoss might be in their area. Cresvase said DeMoss came to Orlando each weekend from Atlanta where he was working a home repair business.

Charges against the trio stem from a job Nova Builders contracted to do on the home of Mrs. Bonnie Reed, an elderly widow who lives west of Gainesville.

Mrs. Reed got \$1,300 in cash and repairs in return on a \$1,500 mortgage, investigators said. The terms of the contract never were met, according to Cresvase. Estimators hired by the investigators said the entire job—including interest, carrying and insurance charges—couldn't have cost more than about \$2,600.

3 VAH-7 Pilots To Return Home

Three Heavy Attack Squadron Seven pilots will return to Sanford this week to keep dates with new duty assignments, the Navy announced today.

The three, who are returning ahead of the squadron's scheduled homecoming, are Ledr. Charles Wilson, Ledr. Donald E. Parrish and Ledr. Charlie N. James.

Wilson and Parrish have orders to the Navy's Post-Graduate school in Monterey, California. James will remain in Sanford with Heavy Attack Squadron Three.

All had been deployed aboard the USS Enterprise with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

Wilson and Parrish were among the first pilots to join the fleet as qualified pilots in the USA Vigilante super-sonic attack bomber. Each was with VAI-7 when the "Peacekeepers" received their first Vigilante last spring.

James, a three-year veteran of Sanford Heavy Attack aviation, joined the squadron soon thereafter.

Crack In Hull

ORLANDO (UPI) — An investigation continued today into the robbery of the King Discount Department Store here late Sunday night in which thieves fled with about \$5,000 in jewelry, but were unable to open a safe containing between \$10,000 and \$15,000 in cash.

The sheriff's office said a coroner's jury would be empaneled to consider the deaths of Leonard Chester Shenanski, 37, and Terrill Gamble, 11, both of DeLand. They were riding a bicycle which was struck by Jackson's car Sunday.

Canal Right-Of-Way Offered Free By Property Owners Along Route

Right-of-way for the proposed St. Johns-Indian River Canal has been offered free of charge by property owners along the route between Lake Harney and the head of the Indian River.

This information was conveyed to the County Commission this morning in a letter addressed to Chairman J. C. Hutchinson from Sen. Bernard Parrish.

The letter follows a published statement last Friday by Commissioner James P. Avery Jr. protesting that Parrish and the St. Johns-Indian River Navigation Committee had by-passed the County Commission in its planning. Parrish's letter follows, in part:

"Things have been so rushed the past few weeks that I have depended on the Canal Committee to work and report their findings. You know what has happened. They chose a route from Lake Harney to the head of the Indian River. As soon as we realized that the greatest portion was in Volusia County it was a must to get the reaction from the people in that county.

"Almost as soon as the route was chosen the people who owned the property along the route promised a free right-of-way. This right-of-way can be appraised and the value will constitute the local contribution. We can ask the State for an amount equal to this value and apply it to the engineering and right-of-way survey costs.

"Would you be good enough to meet with John Krider, John Brunley and Mack Cleveland to discuss this matter?" (Krider is chairman of and Brunley a member of the navigation committee. Cleveland is Seminole's state senator.)

Parrish's letter concludes: "If your board agrees and the commissioners of Ir-

re, Orange and Volusia wish to do so we can ask the Cabinet to set up a Canal District under authority of the 1961 Act, the Governor will appoint a board to manage the district and we will be on our way in an official manner to get this canal." A lengthy progress report on the canal project from Krider also was read into the minutes of the meeting. Krider's report was written before Avery's published complaint last week.

Two more letters in the matter were received today by S. B. (Jim) Crowe, operator of a fishing camp.

Parrish wrote Crowe: "I delayed writing you until after we had received recommendations for the St. Johns-Indian River Canal. Engineers have laid out a route that will be shorter than using the river as it runs and which they are sure will not disturb the shad. I wanted to be sure that this information was correct so that your fears that dredging would ruin the industry of shad fishing might be allayed."

Crowe said that Parrish "has not allayed my fears."

Gov. Farris Bryant wrote this to Crowe: "I do not know of any public presentation which is scheduled in Tallahassee on this project." Krider presented it to the State Board of Conservation two weeks ago at Tallahassee.

"Perhaps," the Governor wrote further, "you were referring to the discussion of the County Commissioners of Seminole County. This is, of course, a matter for their study and review before making a recommendation to the State Board of Conservation."

Electra Dives To Miss Jet; Five Injured

DETROIT (UPI) — Five persons were injured Monday night when an American Airlines Electra with 52 passengers aboard dived to avoid colliding with an Air Force F101 Voodoo jet fighter.

The near-collision five miles in the sky occurred near Syracuse, N. Y. The airliner was bound from Boston to Detroit.

The pilot, Mel Biederman of Ann Arbor, Mich., took violent evasive action when the jet loomed on a collision course, the airline said.

The sudden plunge came at dinner time, Passenger Ralph McKenney, 17, of Grassboro, Mich., said dikes and coffee flew all over the plane.

"In the back of the plane, by the tail section, people were thrown into the aisles," he said. None appeared to be injured seriously.

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
