Schools, U. S. To Seek Solutions To Problems

Seminole County schools have been asked by the U.S. Justice Department to meet at Jacksonville Thursday for a conference on school desegregation problems with U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW).

State Education Commissioner Floyd Christian made known the Justice Department request today in a telegram to John Angel, county school superintendent.

Christian asked that Angel, Douglas Stenstrom, board attorney, and a member of the school board meet with HEW officials in an effort to discuss problems involved with integration and to seek out possible solutions to the problems.

Seminole is one of the 20 counties in Florida having difficulties with the federal government on desegregation plans for 1970-71 year.

Christian said, "I am hopeful we can bring about a restoration of funds to those counties where they have been cut off and prevent the termination of assistance to counties where there has been a federal deferral pending final determination of hearings into school desegregation plans."

The Thursday session is set for 2 p.m. and representatives of schools in Baker, Flagler, Lafayette, Taylor, Bradford, Gadsden, Gulf, Hamilton, Hendry, Highlands, Jackson, Lake, Madison, Pasco, St. Johns, St. Lucie, Sumner and Wakulla also have been requested to appear at the conference.

Seminole County is still awaiting final review board decision of an earlier finding by an HEW examiner into the county's 1970-71 school desegregation plan. Until the decision is announced, \$68,000 in federal funds have been cut off and this could become a permanent loss if the review-board makes its initial decision.

City Mulls Harbor Expansion

Sanford City Commissioner Gordon Meyer wanted action on solving the problem evolved from the dismantled marina docks and has pressed that point on his fellow commissioners for several past meetings, but last night the commission was forced to defer into the situation of who would repair the Lake Monroe boat harbor facility when Meyer had the subject on the commission agenda for discussion.

Meyer insisted that Monroe Harbor, Inc., lessee of the city-owned marina facilities, "quit dragging their feet and do something" about restoring the public facilities that were built with taxpayers' money but less than a month ago.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts observed to Meyer, "We don't solve things by fighting. We could all here and blow this whole thing up and end up having to operate the thing ourselves."

Mayor Lee P. Moore turned the attention to himself when he related a conversation with Harold Slama, Monroe Harbour official, about the pier and Slama, who Moore said, did not want to be tied down to admitting liability, indicated if the city would repair the present facilities and add 56 more boat slips and a breakwater in the west harbor, then the lessee would approve an increase in marina lease rates for next 36 years to amortize the costs.

Moore said city would have to borrow the money to make repairs as requested.

Roberts said this was a fair proposition by the lessee and indicated acceptance of the proposal. (Continued on Page 5A, Col. 4)

County Operated Clinic is Favored

In spite of an impassioned plea by Robert Daehn, president of Seminole County Mental Health Association, for \$15,000 county funding for the Mental Health Center in Longwood Plaza, it was the consensus of the Board of County Commissioners this morning that the program should be county-operated with an advisory committee from the mental health association.

The county will explore immediately funding with the state which will appropriate matching funds and the Seminole County School Board, which has indicated willingness to help fund the facility by contributing \$15,000.

Chairman John Alexander stated that the clinic could be located elsewhere or that the county could sub-lease the present facility if the board of directors was amenable. Daehn was in apprise the board of directors of the decision and the interim Alexander will contact the School Board.

Alexander further advised that if county participants in running the operation would jeopardize the operation of the facility, and if the Seminole County Mental Health Association wished to pursue the endeavor without county funding, the county would "back off."

In announcing the decision of the board, Alexander said that since county tax moneys would be involved, the board had a responsibility to "have a lot to say" in the clinic's operation and that final responsibility in the matter, if county funding were involved, must rest with elected officials.

The allegations that there was a public health nuisance at Seminole Turf Club with relation to breeding of stable dog flies was apparently well founded.

In a letter to county Commissioners, Dr. Frank Leone advised that there was fly breeding due to the measure being spread too thickly. He stated that he noticed maggots and that a sanitary fly in the track area had improperly covered garbage also contributing to fly breeding.

Dr. Leone, county health director, advised the board that he had outlined corrective measures to track officials which he said must be implemented.

Alexander maintained that the Seminole County health department should proceed with the issuance of a corrective notice to the Turf Club and that, if it is not complied with, legal action will be taken.

No charges have been made.

Georgetown Paving Public Hearing Set

Sanford City Commission at last night's meeting agreed to absorb an expected \$45,000 in interest and other costs associated with the paving of the Georgetown area's north-south streets.

W. C. Hutchison, city attorney, before reading a resolution he had prepared outlining the regulations governing the street paving to be paid by street residents of the area by special assessment, said the resolution provided only for the actual paving costs to be charged off over the five-year period to the area residents shutting the streets at \$11 a running foot.

That amount came to a \$274,416.11 total, which the city will borrow to fund construction costs and which will be repaid by assessing those property owners.

"The interest costs which amount to about \$16,000 the first year and decreases in interest each additional year must be borne by the city and cannot be charged off to the paving costs," Hutchison commented. Commissioner Thomas McDonald said city had about \$45,000 in contingencies and could meet the costs.

Next step before action construction is a public hearing for area residents set for May 11.

Commission last night authorized Mayor Lee P. Moore as agent for city in making an application for a federal grant to help defray \$1.5 million costs for the secondary sewage treatment plant that must be added by the city to conform with orders of State Pollution Board, which charged the city is polluting Lake Monroe by dumping sewage into the waterway.

Commission in another action set up a tour of the selected urban renewal area in Goldboro with city building officials before making final designation of renewal area to be forwarded to U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) together with a request for a survey grant to fund costs of actual survey of the area.

In other actions, the commission set April 29 at 9:30 a.m. for trip to study Leesburg community antenna system before making final decision on which applicant will receive city franchise for CATV.

Tabled a request by Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce to share portion of funds originally appropriated for Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) industrial director.

Approved at \$1,300 cost 25 new street lighting projects.

Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts commented that private enterprise would not be allowed the conditions that were involved at the dump and said, "I think we should take steps to solve the problem, so master the cow."

This brought on a discussion of the dump area which Knowles said would be filled in another four months. He said a 75-acre site has been located for sale but costs were too high for city.

Commissioner J. H. Crapps suggested the city use old Navy landfill area on airport property.

After still more discussion, commission voted to table the problem until more information is available.

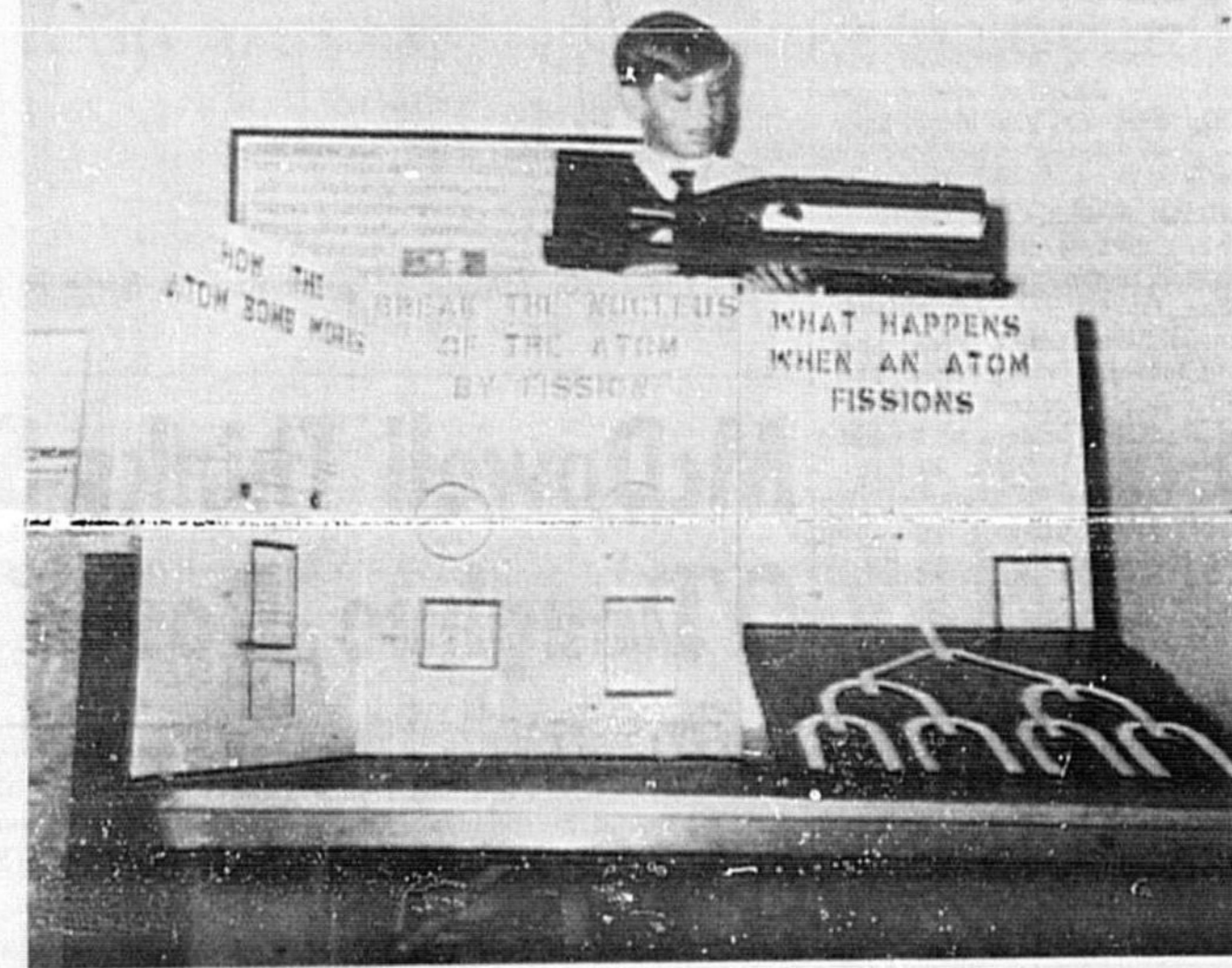

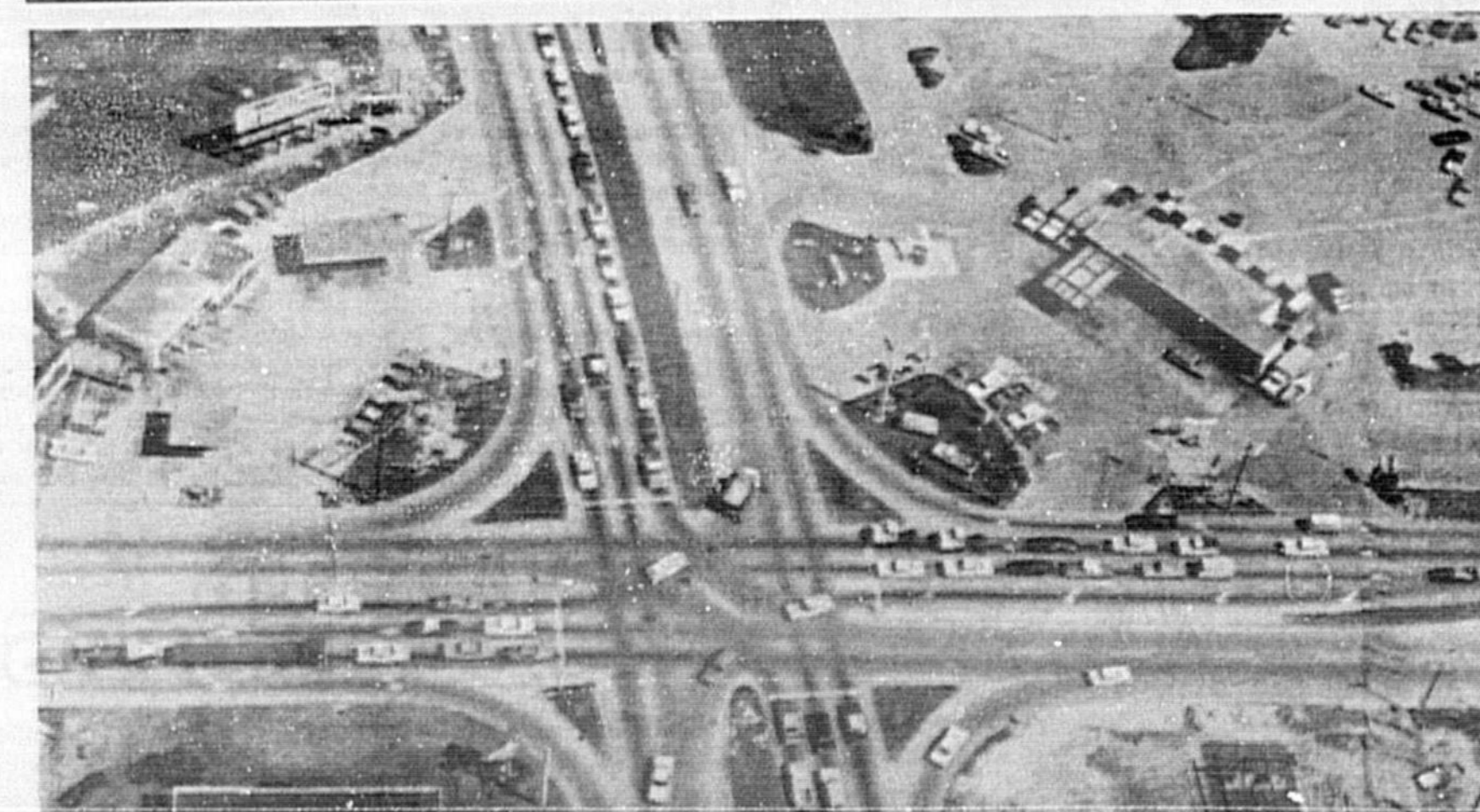

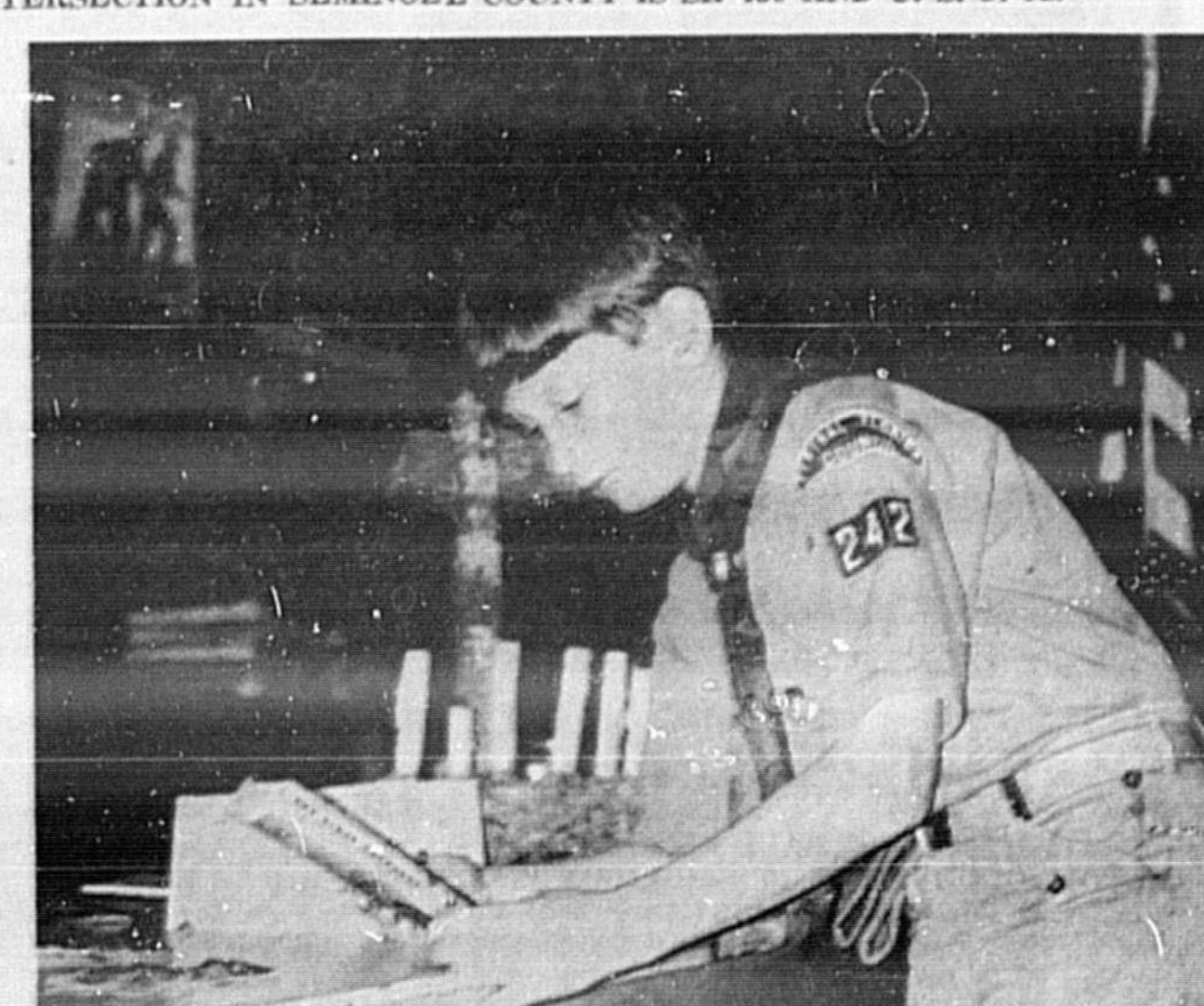

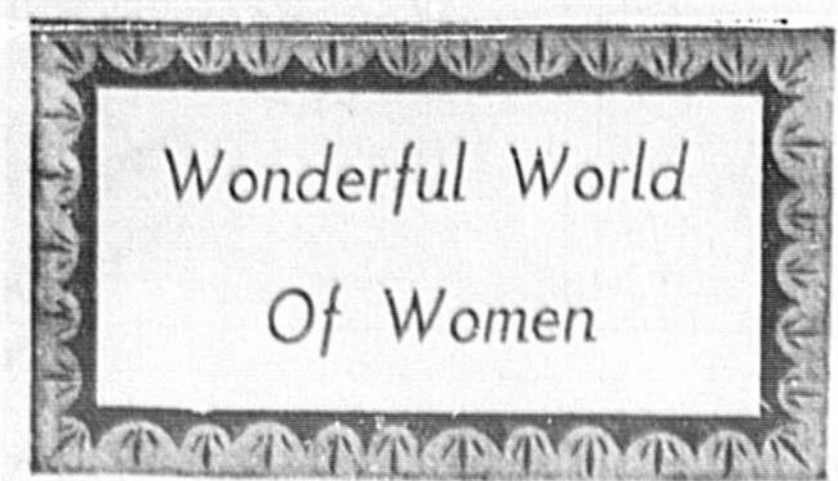
