Court Sets New Policy

Delays Are 'Curtailed

The right of appeal guaranteed to persons who are convicted of a crime has degenerated into a time consuming process, in which the scales of justice are often tipped of

Following conviction, almost immediately, defense attorneys file an appeal with the district court of appeal in their particular area. Quite often this appeal consumes two or three

Should the decision of the appellate court be to uphold the defendant may, and often does, appeal to the Florida Suprame Court, and, of course, if the trial decision is still upheld, can appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court. Should the decision be reversed, as has been the case, a new trial is ordered. Circuit judges constantly guard against reversible errors for this reason

during trial. The journey through the appellate courts has been known to last as much as five years and, if a new trial is subsequently granted, new problems arise. Among these is the fact that often state's witnesses cannot be located, testimony is vaguely remembered with the passage of time and, in some cases, circumstances change the lives of the witnesses, making them reluctant to testify and amenable to a "deal" with the state for a plea by the defendant. Therefore, when a new trial is granted, often the defendant is convicted of a lesser offense

or is completely exonerated, However, a new era is dawning in that, according to a letter sent to Circuit Judge Dom chief judge of Fourth District Court of Appeal, the judges of this court are becoming "increasingly troubled with the inordinate amount of time used in processing certain criminal appeals." The judge notes that under Florida appellate rules, precedence is given to appeals emanating from criminal cases. In searching for a solution to the problem, Judge Reed says





Two of the bogeymen mustered by the opponents are simply that these taxes would be passed on to the consumer by the large corporations and the threat of

a personal income tax. Remembering that this proposed tax is designed to bring about a fair share division of the tax levy by including the multistate big corporations, which now escape such taxation of their profits although subject to it in 44 other states, any passing-down to the consumer of the cost (estimated at about 2.5 per cent) seems minimal.

It is also most important that the provisions in HJR 7-B to protect the small corporation from any erendum to produce.

can be increased but not lowered. The smaller corporations, advocates of the corporate profit tax, point out, usually pay out all of their profits in salaries and compensation to their officers.

As for the multistate corporations, these are the one who will pay the taxes to correct the present imbalance. Out of the \$100 million expected to be produced should the corporate profit tax be legalized, \$98 million will be paid by the largest five per cent of the

corporations operating in the United States. Voters should be clear that in every instance, when this referendum is the topic, the emphasis

should be on the taxation of profits. The other bug-a-boo that the opponents of the corporate profit tax enjoy bringing out is the threat of a personal income tax, which Florida does not have and which would require another constitutional ref-

which should fall by its own weight. In the first place HJR 7-B has been analyzed by a committee of the Florida Bar and found that it "could not, under any reasonable construction or interpretation, authorize the imposition of a personal income tax . . ."

Governor Askew, of course, does not advocate any personal income tax. For the Askew policy on taxes is to take the burden from the individual and find other sources for the new tax dollars the state must have to progress.

This issue will, quite properly, continue to be a hot topic. It does give those who would like to cast 3 a shadow on the burgeoning Askew administration, an opportunity to raise doubts as to its wisdom in this approach to a fair share tax system,

This controversy also will demand from each voter an open-minded and balanced attitude. For to the taxpayer there are few issues which can be so clouded as taxes!
