Garment Firm Eyes Oviedo Move

INDUSTRY is beginning to take a closer look in the Oviedo area, which, although long a limited farming and grove country, now is waking up to existing opportunities in the area.

The Florida Textile Institute is the prime stimulant of interest in the area. With the arrival of new blood in Oviedo, the industry is beginning to be realized by the citizenry.

One of the new firms eyeing Oviedo is a Daytona Beach garment firm which is owned, in part, by a former resident, Robert Ellis. His firm recently conducted a labor survey in the area to determine if there is sufficient interest in that type of work to encourage a move.

According to Ellis, the interest generated was favorable. People of other communities were even interested in the prospects of the new industry and came from surrounding areas such as Sanford, Maitland, Longwood, Casselberry and North Orlando.

The city of Oviedo itself deserves some credit for the economic outlook. City fathers worked strenuously to prevent the city water system soon to be a reality. It is known industry requires an enormous supply of water which cannot be supplied privately without costing a large amount of money. The new municipal water system will completely eliminate this problem.

C. D. Thompson, new mayor of Oviedo, has pledged his efforts to the development of the community to its utmost. He has recommended an expansion program which would triple the size of the city. Thompson's proposal calls for extension of the city limits south to the Orange Seminole County line. This will benefit the new city itself without a loss to the present permanent residents in the area for a five year period during which the citizens also will receive benefits of the municipal water system along with complete police and fire protection.

For instance, signora, put a bit of green pepper that has been tenderly sautéed in butter into your stew, plus some kidney beans and enough chili powder to favor your family's tastes. Heat piping hot and let the full rich aromas penetrate the kitchen.

Serve corn bread squares and a verdant salad bowl of crisp spinach leaves interspersed with onion rings to carry the meal to full Mexican crescendo.

HACIENDA STEW
2 cup green pepper, cut in 1/4-inch squares
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 can (1 pound 8 ounces each) beef stew
In saucepan, cook green pepper in butter until tender. Add stew, beans, and chili powder. Cook over low heat for 5 minutes. Stir now and then. Serve with bread or chips. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Make Life A Cook Professional

If there's one thing that makes a dedicated cook, it's turning out something that looks professional.

Why? Because you have the lovely feeling that you've earned a compliment and won. In the kitchen, you're in the commercial kitchen—you've learned the technique.

Last, but not least, there's the pleasure of making a family meal. If you follow the directions, they'll look so good and handsome on the sticks that you'll be asked to make them again.

Want to play this cooking game? Here's the recipe:

COGNAC STEAKS
1 1/2 cups sliced regular flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup softened butter or white margarine
1 1/2 cup solid white shortening
1/2 cup processed American cheese spread, sharp variety
7 tablespoons ice water
Extra salt

In a medium mixing bowl sift together the flour, salt and cornmeal. With a pastry blender cut in the shortening and cheese spread until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

Add water; stir lightly only until mixture is dampened. If necessary, add a little more water until dough holds together.

Turn out on a prepared pastry cloth; knead gently for a few seconds. Divide dough in half. Roll out each half to form a 14 by 12 inch rectangle. Cut dough to form six 13 by 2 inch strips, starting with the 14-inch side. Roll each strip to form a long stick. Cut each stick into three equal parts.

Brush with milk. Sprinkle with extra salt.

Bake, placed slightly apart, on ungreased cookie sheet in a 350-degree oven, until golden brown—10 to 15 minutes. Remove at once. Makes 3 dozen.

Home Finance In Good Shape

WASHINGTON (AP) — The housing and home mortgage industries have apparently weathered the first money crisis of the new year and leaders report no evidence the 1966 housing recession will be repeated in 1967.

But industry sources said the potential home-buyer can expect to pay high interest rates throughout the year although some slight reduction is anticipated if Congress raises taxes and cuts federal spending.

They don't foresee interest rates dropping below the six per cent level—a point surpassed in early 1966—in any event.

The industry optimism stems in part from preliminary reports indicating the nation's savings and loan associations—the largest single source of home loan money—escaped a possible large withdrawal of savings early last month.

Economists had in and out of government had feared savers might withdraw money from their accounts in early January for investments paying a higher interest rate.

The turn of the year was the key time since it marked the end of one investment period and the start of another. A saver could collect a dividend on his account at that time and then withdraw the money, thus reducing the amount available for mortgage loans.

The reduced level of deposits in 1966 shrunk the amount of mortgage money and gave the housing industry one of its worst years since World War II.

Frank figures on S&L savings won't be available until next month but he said the industry cannot say they foresee the chance of a net gain rather than a decline for 1967.

The National League of Licensed Savings Associations called the early-January report "a warning industry source called it 'way, way favorable.'"

Frank, however, and others don't see a remarkable amount of withdrawal. Cautions and savings are still on the order of the day.

What's In The Lunch Box!

Fresh fruit always has been the favorite mainstay of the lunch box—and it still is.

One of the best choices is the fresh and juicy pear. But when you want to surprise the lunch-box carrier, why not take Pear Turnovers? Make a batch for the whole family and serve them piping-hot for dinner, but save one to pack into a lunch box for the next day. These flaky triangles of pastry with their delectable pear filling really are a special treat.

Yes, the pastry will be flaky if you follow this recipe. In some circles this particular formula—which calls for the addition of an egg and vinegar plus the usual ingredients—is called Foolproof Pastry. We think it deserves the name.

Please follow our advice about having the pastry rolled out and cut before you put the pears, or you will have a soggy mess. If you don't, the mixture may be too juicy.

And another caution. Bake these pear turnovers thoroughly. For best eating, the pastry should be golden-brown and crisp.

Two varieties of pears—Anjou and Bosc—are available for winter turnovers. A third variety, the fragrant Comice, is with us, too. But the Comice is best used "as is" because of its delicate flavor and texture.

PEAR TURNOVERS
2 cups unbleached regular flour
1 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup solid white shortening
1 large egg
1 teaspoon cider vinegar
1 tablespoon ice water
Fresh Pear Filling (see recipe)
1 tablespoon butter or margarine

In a medium mixing bowl stir together the flour and salt. With a pastry blender, cut in the shortening until particles are fine.

In a small bowl beat together just enough to blend the egg, vinegar and water; with a fork, stir into flour mixture. Turn out on transparent plastic wrap and form into a ball; wrap tightly and chill.

On a prepared pastry cloth, roll out chilled dough to an 8-inch square, 1/4 by 1/4 inch thick. Using a pastry wheel or a sharp knife, cut into nine 4 1/2-inch squares.

Now, and only now, prepare the Fresh Pear Filling. At once, without letting the filling stand, spoon it over half of each pastry square; dot with butter. Moisten edges of pastry squares with water; fold over and seal by pressing edges with the tines of a fork. Cut around sides in the top of each turnover.

Place turnovers, a few inches apart, on a cookie sheet. Bake in a 350-degree oven until golden-brown—about 20 to 25 minutes. With a wide spatula remove as many from cookie sheet—a little juice may have leaked out.

Serve hot or warm, although some eaters prefer the turnovers cold.

Makes 9 servings.

FRESH PEAR FILLING
3 firm medium-size pears, sliced
1/4 pound
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Remove stems from pears; peel and halve. With a small sharp knife remove seeds and stem structure. Dice into about 1/2-inch pieces; turn into a medium bowl. Sprinkle with lemon juice and gently mix. Rubable with sugar, salt and nutmeg; gently but quickly mix. Use at once (to prevent moisture from accumulating and becoming jelly) as directed in Pear Turnover recipe.

Hospital Care Lengthened

By BRUCE BISHOP — WASHINGTON (NEA) — Beginning in 1968, you can get some extra hospital care under your Medicare hospital insurance program but the additional cushion is called a "lifetime reserve." Once used up, it is gone forever. Your basic protection provides up to 90 days of care in a hospital for a single illness, with the patient paying the first 40 days of charges and paying \$10 for each day after the first 60.

Under the revisions of late 1967, you hereafter have a reserve of 60 more benefit days. You can draw upon it, on top of your original 90 days of care, up to the full 60. In that extra care period, your hospital insurance pays all but the first \$50 a day of your covered hospital expenses.

Thus, conceivably a man 65 or older could enter a hospital and be protected under hospital insurance for 150 straight days. But thereafter he could never count on protection for more than 90 days at a time, since his 60-day reserve would have been entirely consumed.

In any discussion of Medicare hospital insurance, it is necessary to understand what is meant by a single "spell of illness."

Such a spell starts the day a patient is admitted to a hospital, a qualified nursing home, or other extended-care facility. It ends once a patient has been outside a hospital or care facility for 60 straight days. After such an interval, the patient is eligible for another basic 90 days of care in a hospital, or comparable in other facilities.

In the first 18 months of Medicare's life, some 5.7 million elderly folk made use of their hospital insurance. They did not become involved directly in the payment of their hospital bills. Settlements are arranged by the hospital, acting through some intermediary agency like Blue Cross to submit the charges to the federal government.

There was no official announcement that the freeze had ended, but congressional committees were notified of the action Monday-opening day of the new session—and a Budget Bureau spokesman later confirmed it.

Congressional sources pointed out, however, that the two agencies, which are concerned chiefly with various types of water projects, still must live within financial limitations of a resolution Congress passed last year directing the administration to cut domestic spending \$4.1 billion.

Congress demanded spending cuts as a condition of passage for President Johnson's proposed 10 per cent income tax surcharge but that measure still hasn't cleared the House Ways and Means Committee.

In the case of the Army Engineers, the spending cut amounts to \$97 million.

But relatively few projects actually were slowed down because winter is the slack season for construction. One Army Engineers official said "a lot of them wouldn't have got under way anyway."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Johnson Administration has lifted a public works freeze it imposed last October on Army Engineers and Reclamation Bureau projects.

The freeze applied to construction contracts for new projects of the two agencies and to contracts for new features of projects already under way.

Huge Lakefront Park Unveiled

By JACK LIVELY
 The feasibility of a huge Lake Monroe Park, embracing 1,632 acres and stretching from I-4 to downtown Sanford was revealed today by William Reck, chairman of the promotions committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce at a luncheon held at the House of Beef overlooking Lake Monroe.

Running along the Lake Monroe south shore and bounded on the south roughly by the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad and an irregular property line parallel to First Street, the eastern portion of the proposed park would include portions of downtown Sanford and tie in with Fort Mellon Park's existing facilities.

Part of the comprehensive long-range plan for all of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Planning Commission, the Lake Monroe Park is eligible for a high percentage of funding from the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1965, under Title VII. It was revealed by members of the commission, of which Vernon Mize Jr. is chairman.

In addition to other committee members attending today's meeting, were: John Alexander, chairman of the county commission; Sanford Mayor W. Vincent Roberts; Art White, assistant planner for the Orange-Seminole Committee, and John Kridler, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

It was revealed that the western half of the park site is a large and scenic swamp, wooded mainly with cypress but containing many hardwood trees and native palms. East of the swampy area is a band of truck farms extending almost to the city limits of Sanford. The eastern section of Lake Monroe Park is in the city limits and consists of mostly barren land.

The eastern portion of the park already has been proposed as a relocation area for the Sanford Zoo. West of this section is the narrowest part of the proposed park and this would house a major stadium with extensive parking facilities. Just west of the stadium area would be an 18-hole golf course for the public, again located on the shores of Lake Monroe.

The committee holds that west of the golf area the landscape should be preserved in its natural state as far as possible, but leaved with "winning nature trails and spotted with campsites and picnic tables."

Along the waterfront proper, horse trails and a livery stable for the rental of horses would be situated between 17-92 and the shore line. Similarly a pedestrian walkway would follow the waterfront past the new courthouse and connect with Fort Mellon Park.

According to the former investigator for the Governor's "Kelsey" information, a responsible public official at the JP office in Oviedo. However, after the investigation was completed, no action was taken against Johnson.

The Oviedo JP played a role also in the investigation of Hugh Duncan in Sanford. Johnson had stated to the press on a prior occasion that Duncan had overstepped his authority by issuing a warrant from his office in Sanford for an Oviedo resident and not making it returnable to Johnson's office.

Johnson charged that the particular case involved a migrant farm worker who came to him to have a warrant issued against her husband for non-support. Johnson said that he felt there was not enough evidence, or reason, to substantiate issuing a warrant in the case. The woman then allegedly went to Duncan to take out the warrant against her husband. He also allegedly did not make it returnable to the Oviedo Justice of Peace.

Johnson said that he had not expected subpoena in either the Duncan or the Kelsey hearing as the only part he had played in either investigation was in opening his records to the investigating authorities.

Schools Look To Future

Each received a map of the county on which he and his building projects planned within the next five years, so that the number and location of future schools can be determined.

The state now furnishes \$200 for each new pupil which is matched by the county. It has been proposed that the legislature increase this amount to \$1,200.

Phillips said that in his opinion a bond issue is the only fair way to finance new schools as it gives new concerns a chance to share in the cost rather than putting the burden on older residents.
