Animal Shelter Clean But Cupboard's Bare

PORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Two months ago most of the abandoned animals housed in the Broward County Humane Society Shelter were sick, filthy and starving. Today they are healthy and clean—but still hungry.

"We don't know where they're going, but I suspect people are stealing them—and the money in them—for spite," the soft-spoken manager said.

She said the all-female staff at the shelter planned to spend their own money to buy today's supply of food—approximately 50 cans.

"But I don't know how long we can take this out of our own pocket," she said.

Miss Stone described the refurbished shelter as "one of the nicest in South Florida."

"It is spotlessly clean, and exterminated twice a month. We have a 24-hour ambulance service, shining cages, fresh-painted walls, and two full-time veterinarians. The carbon monoxide box is gone, and the vets give the animals shots to put them to sleep instantly," she said.

Confirmation System Is In Need Of Revising

MIAMI (AP) — Saying the system is wrong, a state senator called today for revision of the confirmation-rejection process the Senate uses to pass judgment on a governor's appointees.

Sen. Robert Shavin, D-Miami, said the system must be changed so others do not face the same disruptive fate former Secretary of Transportation Michael O'Neil was confronted with when the Senate ousted him after he settled into office.

"How in good conscience can we ask a man to give up his business interests, a home, disrupt a family, move to Tallahassee, and then deny him his office, tell him to go home because he is not running a department like someone would like it run?" Shavin said.

Shavin, an O'Neil supporter in debate which preceded his rejection from the Cabinet post, said the Miami tire dealer was the victim of an "unfair system" and should have been judged on the "merits of the man rather than on the basis of who likes the present governor or who dislikes the present governor."

Shavin said he would propose legislation and call for mandatory confirmation action before a man assumes an appointive position in state government.

"The system is wrong, and not only can happen again, but it will happen again," Shavin said.

"Dr. James Bax has not yet been confirmed by the Senate, although he is now serving as secretary of health and rehabilitative services.

"So, in effect, because the law reads that his confirmation will be made at the next regular session of the Legislature after his appointment, he will be serving in office for one year before he is actually brought up for confirmation," Shavin said.

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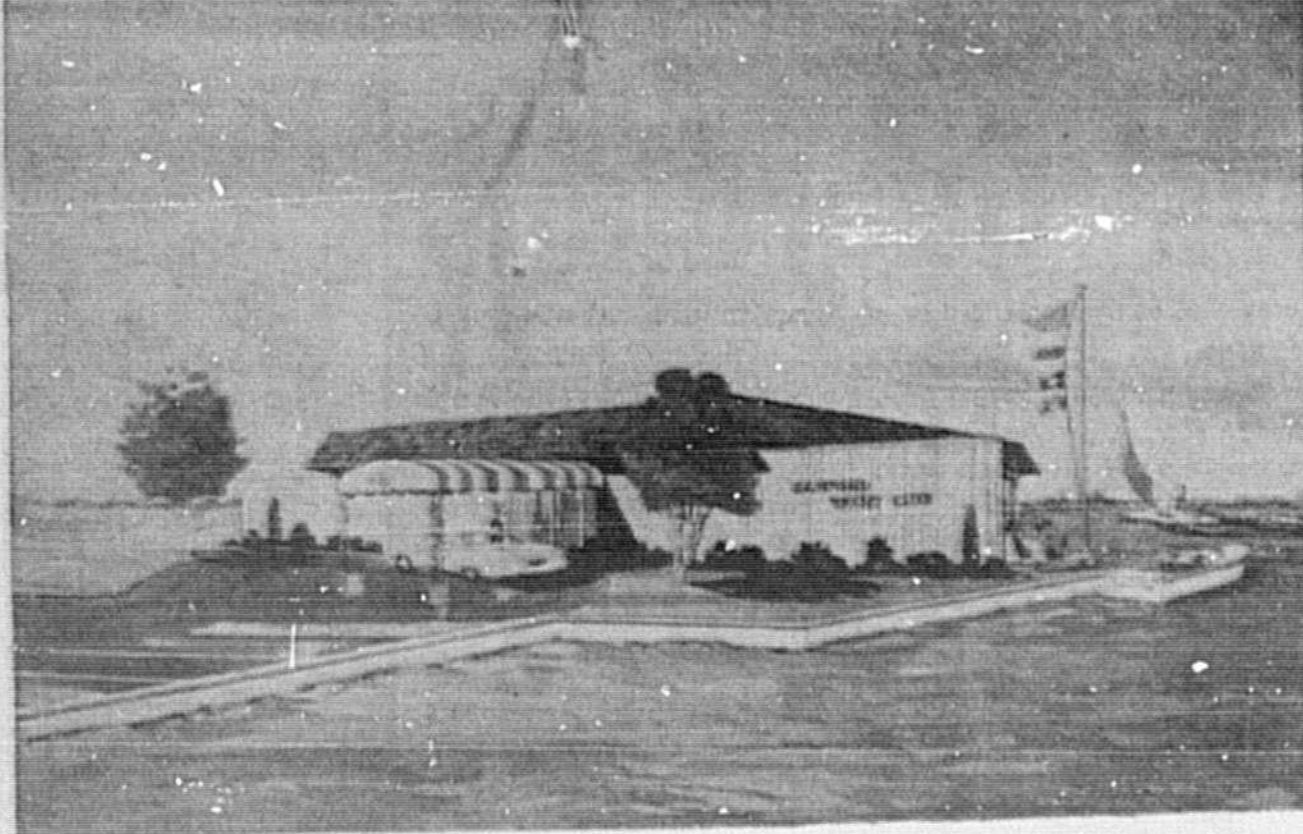

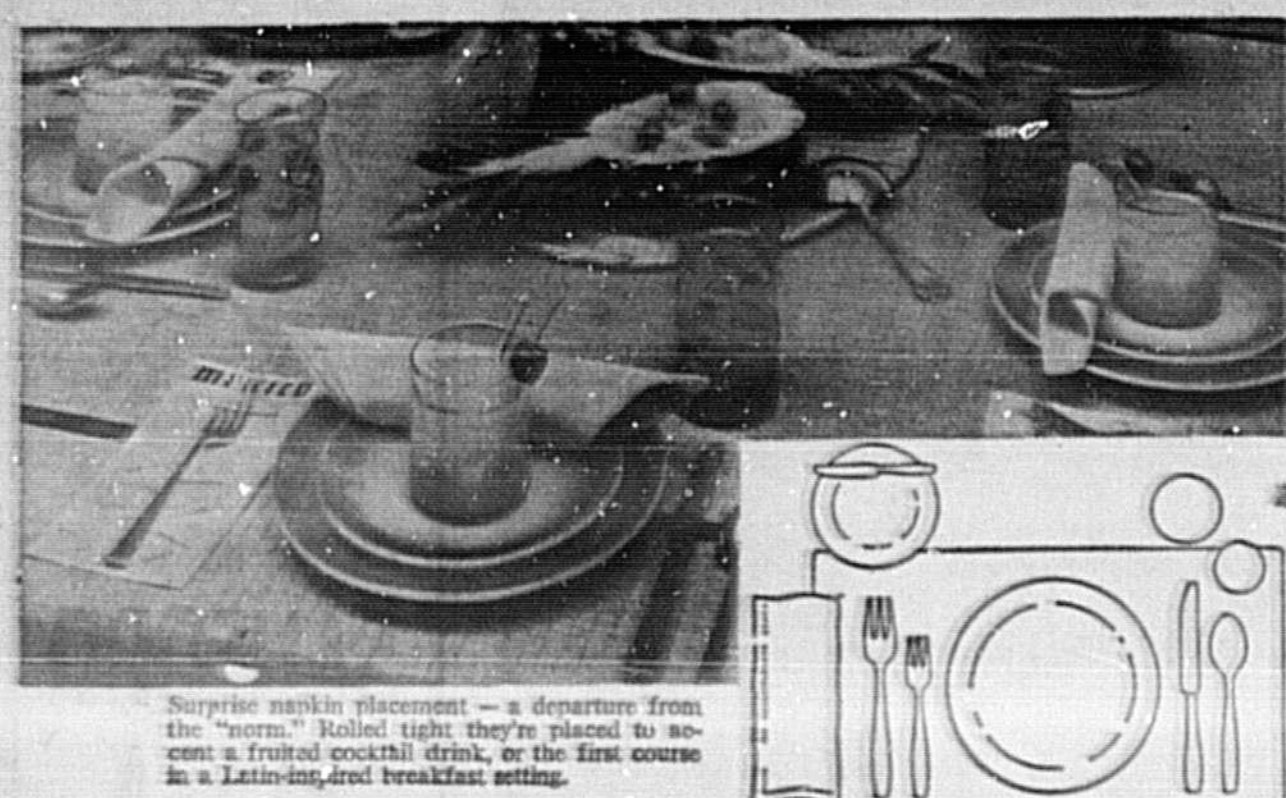

Table Techniques



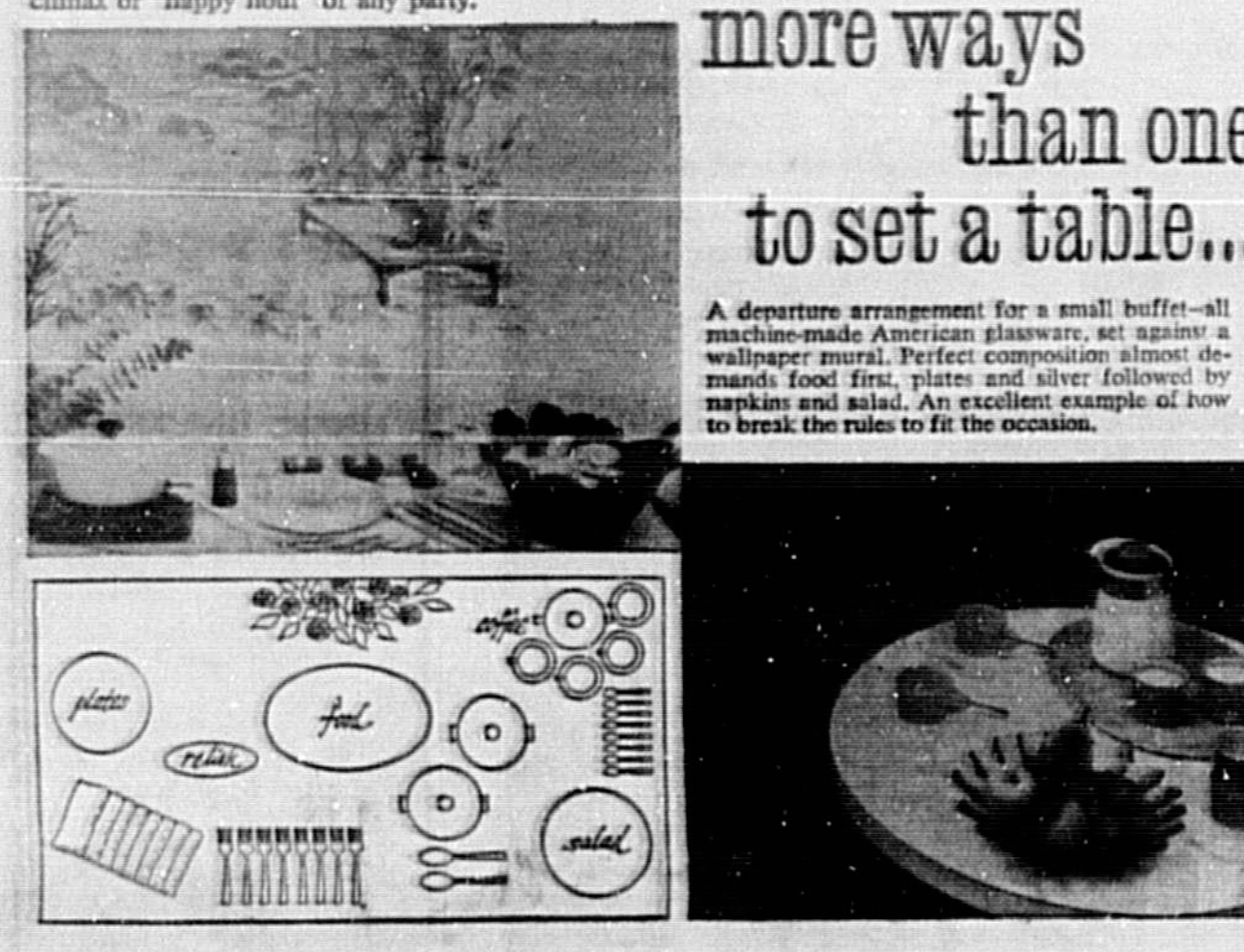
NEW YORK (ED) — How to break the rules and still maintain the good taste of conversation? Actually, it's easy, and all based on convenience blended with a sense of style.

Today's table settings, formal or informal as the occasion demands, are based by a few simple facts. Basic rules don't change and the customs are simple. In a formal (sit-down) setting, silver is placed in order of use. Knife and spoon are placed to the right of the service plate — forks to the left. The soup spoon is to the far right (because it's used first), teaspoon next, then the knife. On the left are forks — depending on your "meal-plan." Salad fork may be either next to the plate, or separated from the plate by the dinner fork.

Placement of glassware usually remains conventional. Water and wine glasses belong on the right of any seated service.

Buffer settings have one important secret — traffic! Right to left, left to right — all the way around a table! Arrange your buffet on the basis of convenience as well as appearance. Napkins — plates — then food. The last pick-up should be silverware. Offer pitchers and tumblers of hot water after your guests have found a spot to sit.

Here it's **MUST** — keep coffee and dessert completely separate from your buffet table. Description is a ritual apart, not to be confused with the buffet dinner. It's a time for conversation — the climax or "happy hour" of any party.

Scott Krick a 112, T. Weber 124. Surely, with scores like that, you're thinking that I erred and should have put a 2 in front of the last two digits.

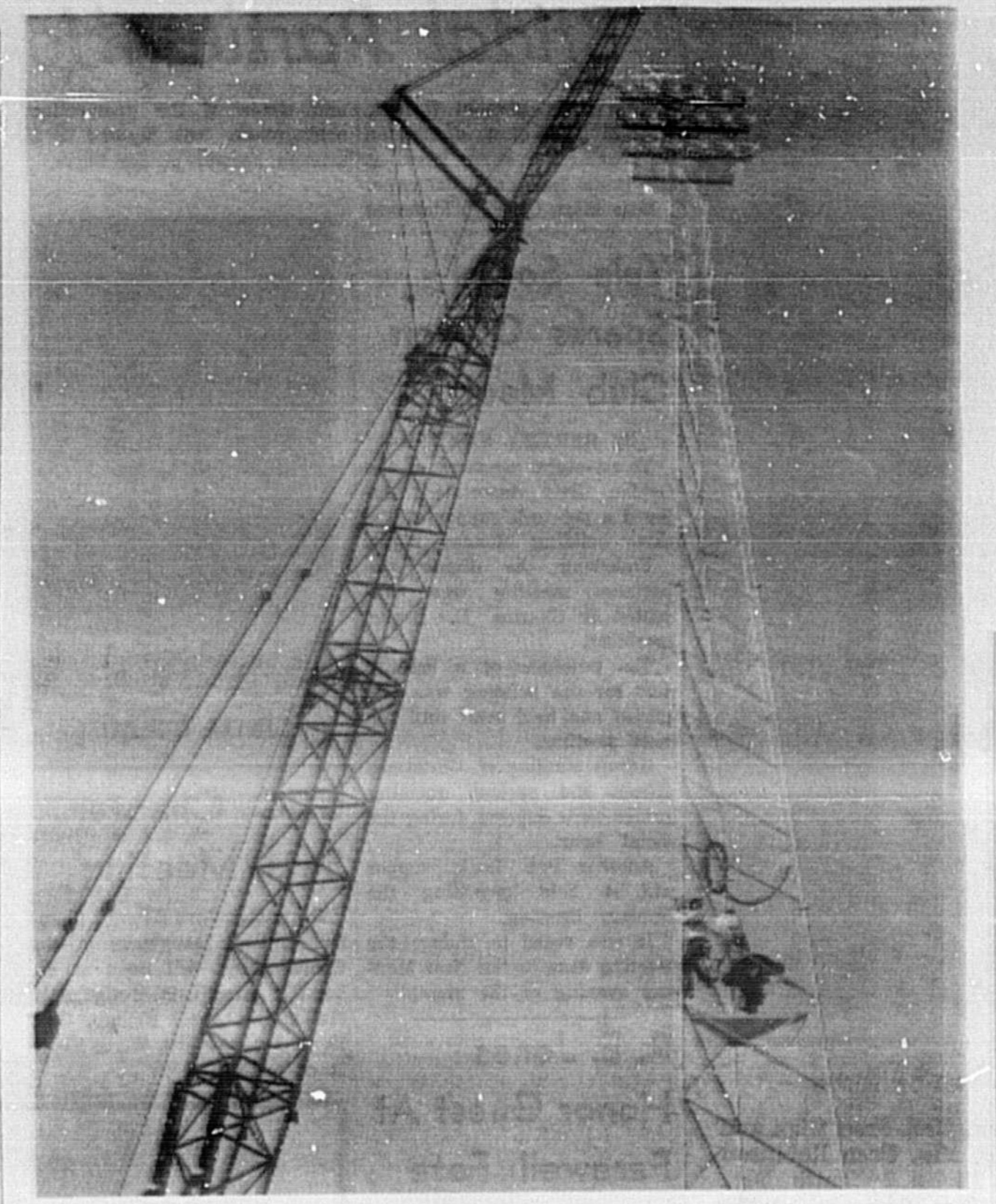

Loophole Is Exploited In Gun Control Law

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal gun control law has missed one of its main targets — curbing the traffic in cheap handguns — because of a loophole unrecognized by Congress but exploited by importers-turned-manufacturers.

When the law went into effect one year ago today, importers quit bringing into the country the small caliber, \$16 to \$26 pistol and revolvers which police call "Saturday night specials."

Instead, an Associated Press study shows, some firms began importing guns from the United States. They then assembled the guns in domestic plants. Other firms stepped up production of cheap handguns from parts made exclusively in the United States.

The net result, about the same number of cheap handguns are going into the market today as before the law's enactment.

VA Hospitals Hit

 WASHINGTON (AP) — Mental casualties of the Vietnam war are being "chemically lobotomized" by substitution of tranquilizing drugs for proper psychiatric care at Veterans Administration hospitals.

Congress has been told "You can see such men at any mental hospital. Dr. Louis J. West, medical director of the University of California at Los Angeles Neuropsychiatric Institute, said Monday.

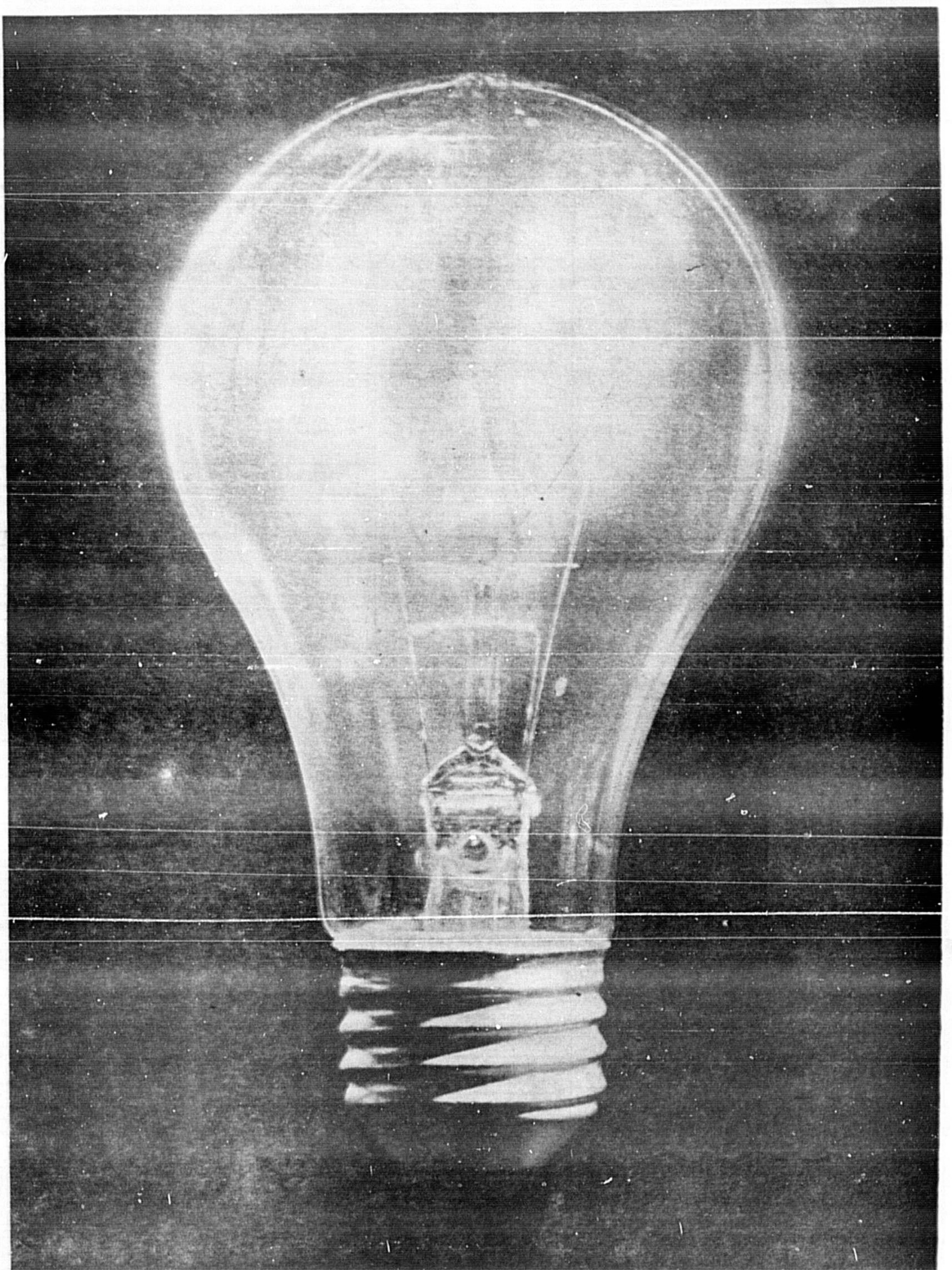
But his testimony before a Senate veterans affairs subcommittee concentrated on VA institutions.

"We have abandoned the practice of lobotomy," West said, "but we are chemically lobotomizing thousands and thousands of patients, and we can't keep it up for years."

Lobotomy, a form of brain surgery, has been used in the past to make mental patients docile.

The subcommittee headed by Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., is probing treatment of mentally and physically wounded veterans.

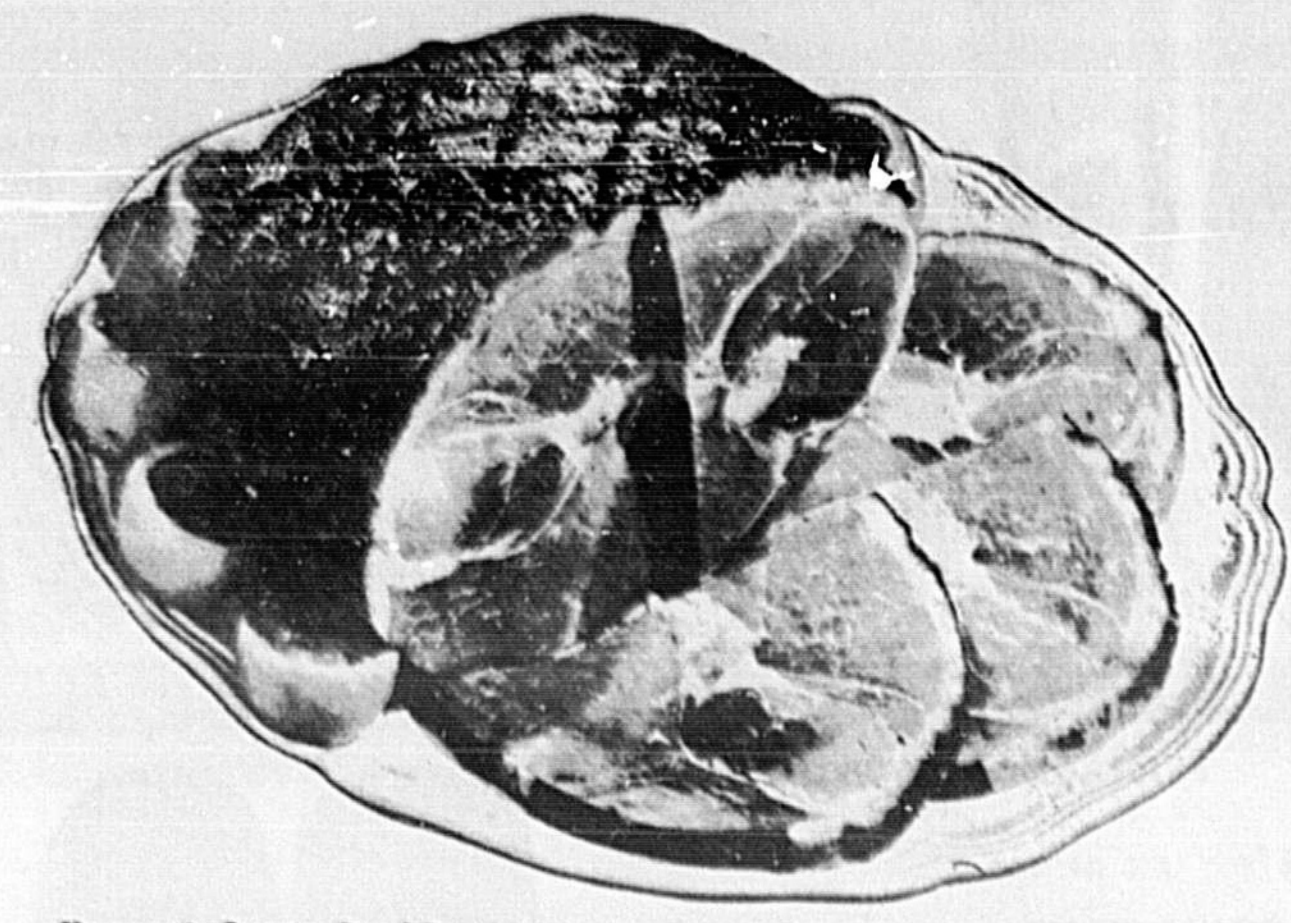

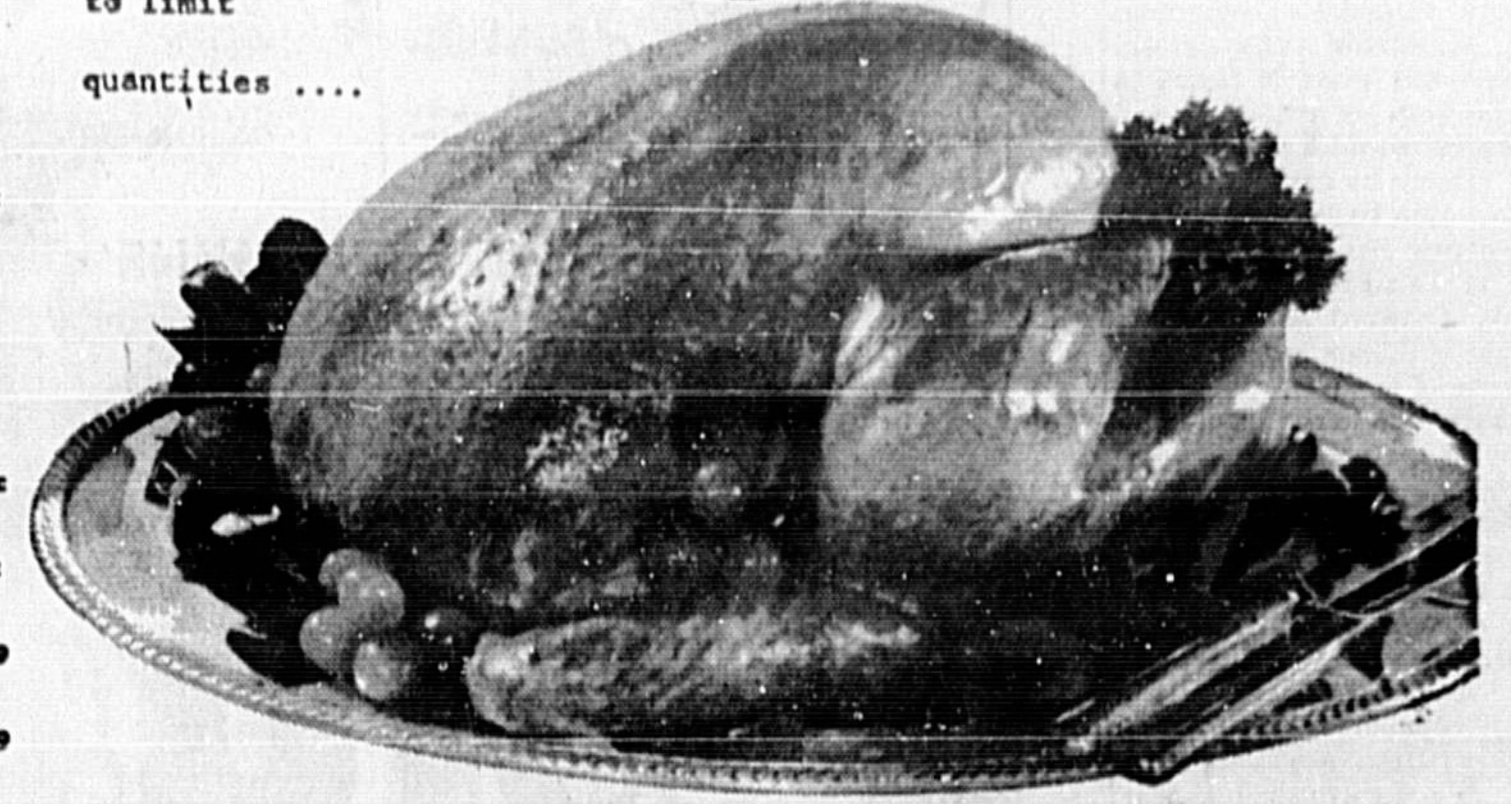

Husky Soup To Warm His Bones

From the beginning of time, man has turned to soup for courage, comfort and sustenance. Along the rivers and gulches, the French often make an entire meal of these hearty soups. Such irrepressible concoctions as minestrone with grated cheese and pasta in Italy, a hearty brew of red beans and macaroni so thick the spoon almost stands by itself are synonymous with Italian cuisine.

America has become famous for the Yankee and Navy bean soups. Spurred in the lumber camps of Maine and the chain wagons of the West, these bean delights now are featured in some of the nation's finest restaurants.

Chowder is a byword in the eastern part of the United States. It has long been a subject of controversy between the New Englander who will eat only the creamed variety and the "southerner" from New York who put tomatoes, green peppers and carrots into a clear broth, along with the chopped clams.

New Orleans has its tangy crawfish bouillabaisse and Philadelphia its peppery soup with honeycombed tripe. Both have become favorites overseas.

Half a world away on Formosa, the Chinese serve a soup as a backdrop for a multi-course meal. Chinese diners may lead off with a shark's fin or bird's nest soup. In between courses clear soups are served as palate cleansers.

South of the border, soup making has been developed into a fine art. In Mexico, they make a delicious bean soup. In Portugal, the heavier soups are eaten in two installments. The hard-boiled egg in the Portuguese and the solids are brought in on plates and biassed in a rich sauce that often takes longer to prepare than the soup itself.

One soup, which combines heartiness with glamor, is creamed chestnut, popular in both Latin America and Europe. With the onset of cold weather, this is a perfect holiday soup. The following recipe combines the influences of France and Brazil:

CREAMED CHESTNUT SOUP
 1 pound chestnuts
 2 carrots, chopped
 2 leeks, chopped
 2 celery stalks, chopped
 1 onion, chopped
 1 tablespoon butter
 6 cups chicken stock
 6 sprigs parsley
 1 pound potatoes, sliced
 1/2 pound ham sliced finely
 2 ounces heavy cream
 1 ounce brandy
 Boil chestnuts until they shell easily, about half an hour.
 In a large saucepan, brown carrots, leeks, celery and onion in the butter for five minutes. Add chicken stock, chestnuts, parsley and potatoes, and simmer at least one hour, or until vegetables and nuts are very soft. Put soup through fine sieve or puree in a blender.
 Return puree to the pan and add cream and brandy. Adjust the seasoning to taste and heat to boiling point. Garnish with chopped ham and serve.

Exposure Of Meats Proposed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—The Florida housewife should be able to see all parts of the meat she is buying from a food chain store and not just the good cuts, says the leader of the recent Bravard County meat boycott.

"I propose legislation to be sent to require all meat packaged in the State of Florida show all parts of the meat with equal exposure," said Sen. Stophlett as he submitted a proposed consumer protection package to legislators.

The proposed legislation was sent to Sen. Fred Karl, D-Daytona Beach, chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee on Consumer Protection.

Mrs. Stophlett is vice president of the Florida Consumers Association. She and a boycott by housewives in Bravard County during August, in protest of meat prices.

Mrs. Stophlett's proposals were aimed primarily at food chain stores, which she said seem to be clear of federal supervision and beyond the reach of the average citizen.

"But if I must pay the penalty for living in Florida," she wrote, "at least state legislation can be passed to protect the consumer from many unfair practices of meat chains here."

Mrs. Stophlett's other proposals called for legislation: —Requiring that all advertising and labeling of beef in store state its grade: USDA choice, USDA good, USDA standard-tendered. —Requiring that all labeling of beef adhere to basic names of cuts as listed by the State Department of Agriculture. —Requiring uniform pricing within any one given food distribution center — be it chain or independent — on the same cut of meat even though sliced to different thickness. —Providing for periodic and regular, though unscheduled, inspection of display advertising specials.

Mother-in-law (troubled) Fred's young wife to court.

"That horrid woman has been selling my Fred some terrible tales about me," she complained. "I want a stop order against these lies. I want an injunction to keep her quiet from now on."

But the court refused to issue such an order. The judge said the wife would have to let the mother-in-law do her talking — and then sue her for defamation of character.

To the young woman, the judge's advice was scented comfort. And to anyone facing vilification by another person, an ounce of prevention is surely better than a pound of cure.

Yet, as a rule, courts will not forbid a falsehood in advance — mainly for fear of stifling the free speech guaranteed by the Constitution. The law's usual remedy, instead, is to let the lie come out in the open, and then make the liar suffer the consequences of his good name.

But again the court refused to interfere, saying the organization would have to follow the slower path of a damage suit for defamation.

Nevertheless, a stop order may be issued when, in addition to the libel, there is some extra element of financial injury — something more than mere personal discomfiture.

A motorist, disabated with his car, demanded a new one from a dealer near his home — even though he had bought the car somewhere else. When the dealer said no, the motorist painted a large white elephant on each side of his car and began cruising around near the dealer's showroom.

This time when the auto dealer went to court, the judge did issue a stop order against the motorist. Not only was his "white elephant" message deceiving, said the court, but it also was an effort to force a new car out of the dealer by a sort of blackmail.

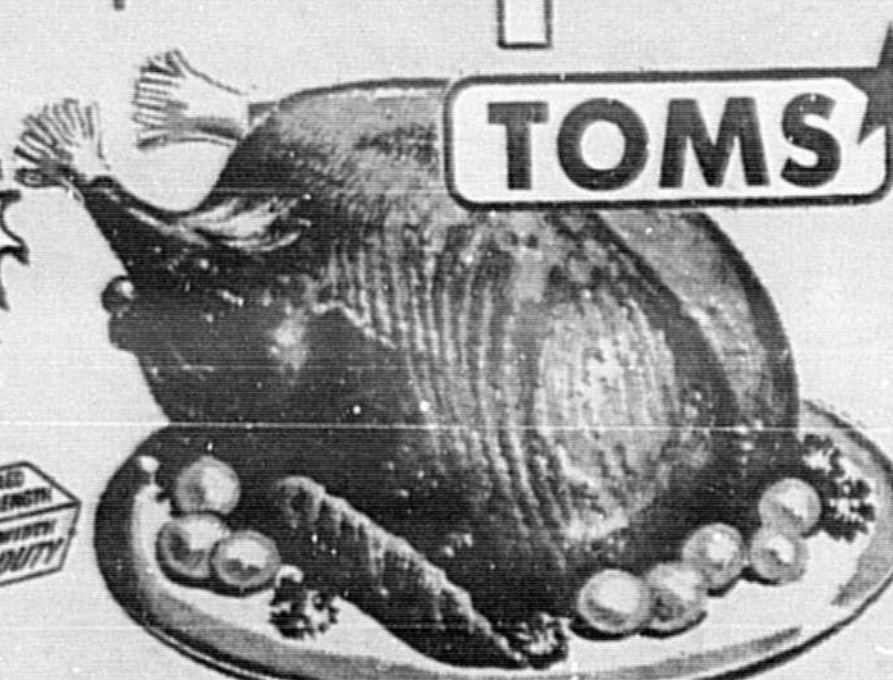

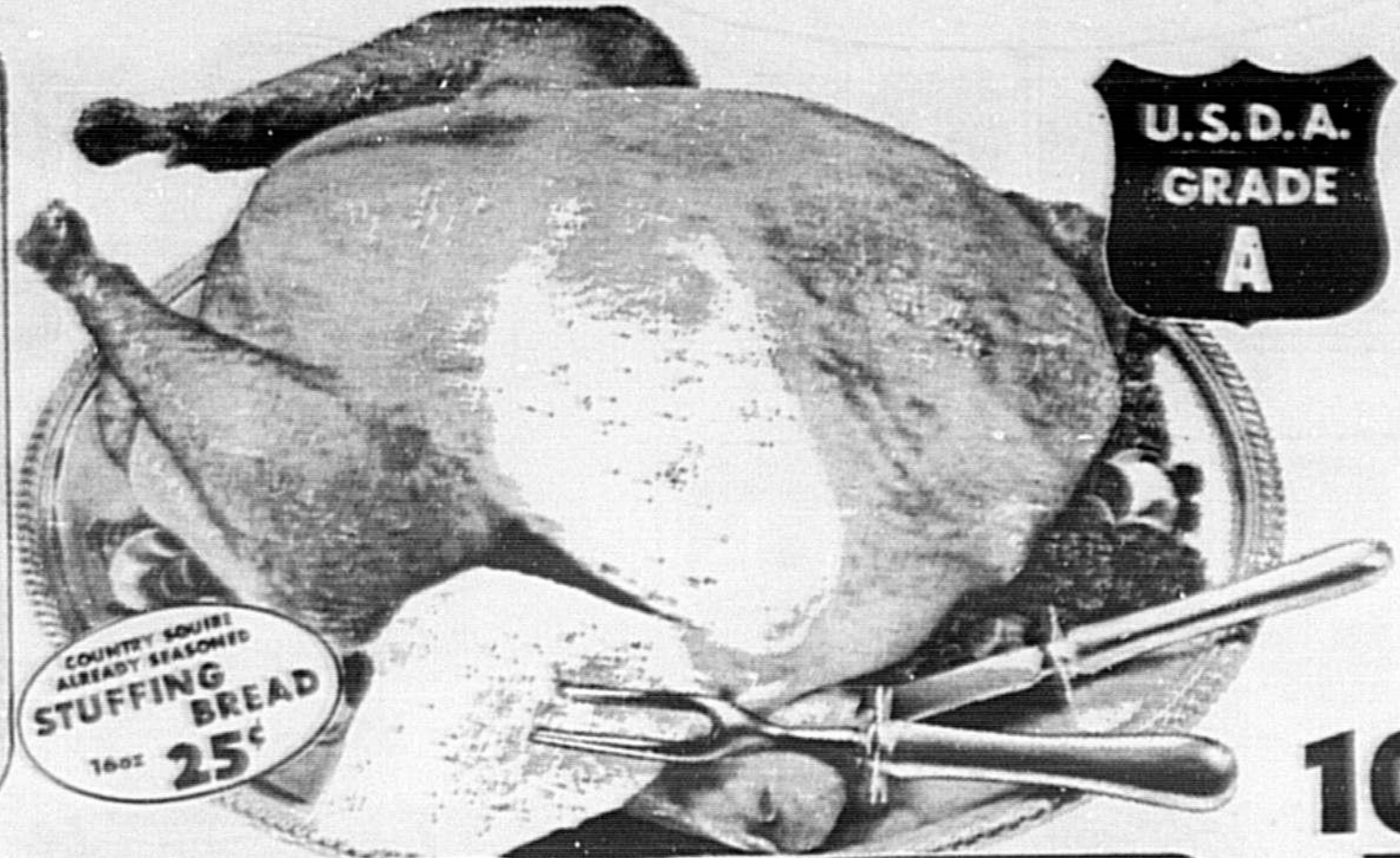

Boy Saves Family As Home Burns

A 16-year-old, long-haired Longwood youth was credited by W. A. Vinton, county deputy, with saving the lives of the boy's mother, two younger brothers and a sister after an early morning fire gutted their Rolling Hills home at 15 Roberts Street.

Vinton said Donald E. Christianson Jr. at 3 a.m. today, awoke to find his home in flames.

The deputy reported the boy leaped out of his back bedroom window, ran around to the front of the house and knocked on the door to awaken his mother, Eddie, 31, and Glenn, 8, his two brothers, and Cathy, a 12-year-old sister.

The family was hustled out of the burning home by Donald, who received back burns in the process.

The youth's father, a paint salesman, was at Jacksonville at the time of the blaze that destroyed completely the \$12,000 dwelling and estimated \$3,000 in furniture.

Vinton said Altamonte and Longwood Fire Departments were on the scene and combated the flames that quickly swept the frame structure.

"Cause of the blaze is believed to be the lighting of a supply of paint kept stored on the porch, Vinton said.

"He did a good job" is the way the deputy summed up the youth's actions in getting his family out of the burning structure.

Vinton said he felt young Donald should receive some form of commendation for his efforts in his official county report.

'Greater Things In Store For Area' Rathel Quits SIC Agency

Don Rathel, director of the Sanford Industrial Commission, yesterday informed members of the industry-seeking and airport operation commission that he would not renew his contract for his services with the city after Jan. 15.

Rathel read aloud written resignation to SIC members at the close of the regularly scheduled meeting but would not disclose his plans, except to say he and his wife would continue to live in Sanford.

"I feel that the project for which I was retained has been fulfilled, and that the industrial program for Sanford is well underway and its industrial future well established," he stated.

Rathel said the airport was now a solvent operation and the future progress of this facility will be realized with proper management. "The 20 new industrial commission-generated industries in Sanford is indication enough that Sanford is on the move and greater things are in store for this area."

The director listed the establishment of an airport authority for the operation of the Sanford Airport and the county-wide formation of a professionally operated industrial board as two recommendations he would like to make. "Every effort should be made to upgrade the Sanford board," he stated.

As a parting remark, Rathel stated, "The cooperation of all agencies is necessary because you cannot win the big outside battles when you continually have backyard brawl!"

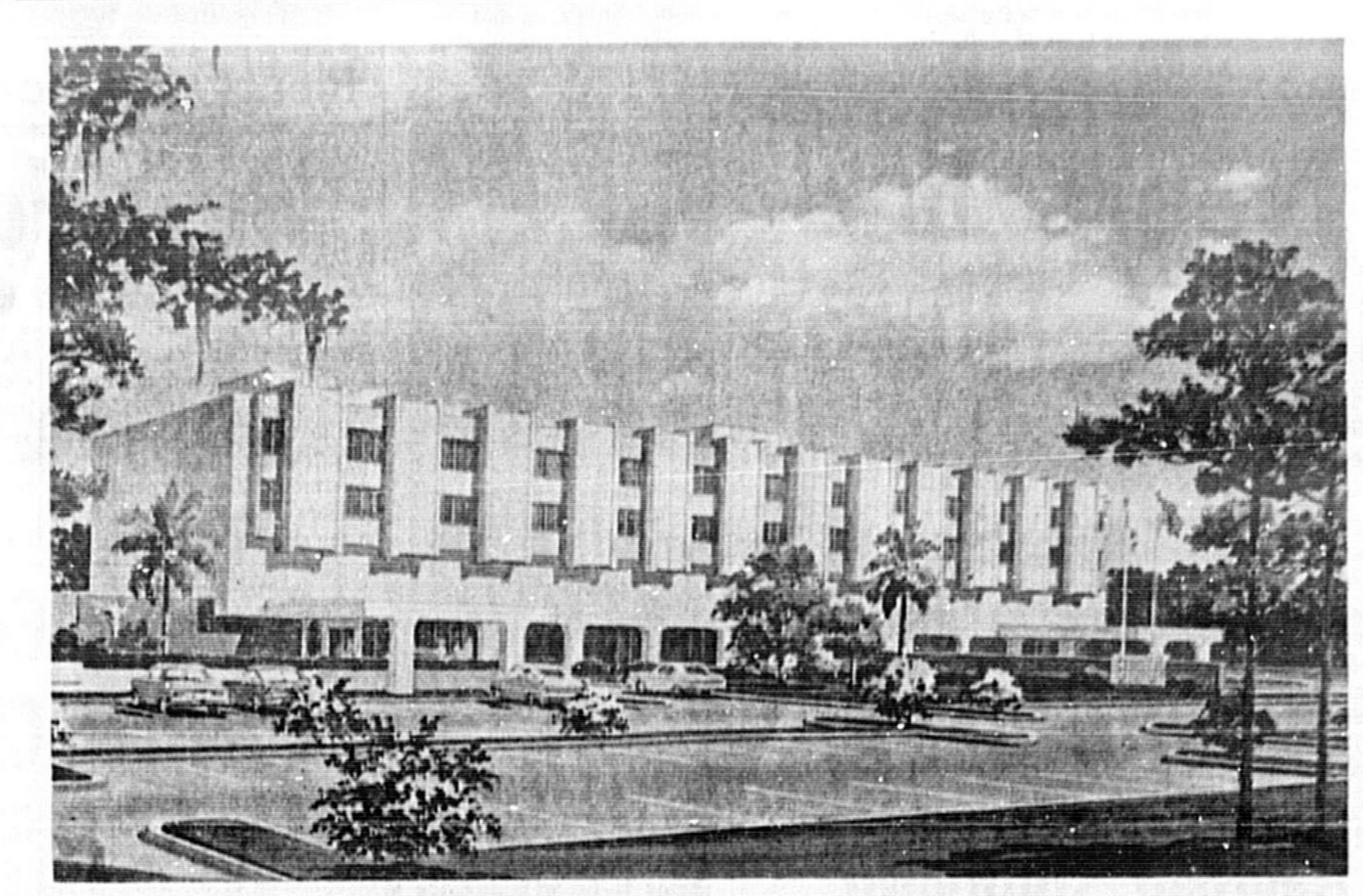
SIC members generally praised the work of the director and the W. Vincent Rathel, also a city commission member, said, "All of us regret that Don has arrived at this decision but understand why."

FLORIDA SANITARIUM AND HOSPITAL NORTH

Spectacular Plan Unfolded

Spectacular plans for a magnificent new Florida Sanitarium and Hospital were unfolded this morning by Donald W. Welch, Administrator of the facility. The impressive edifice will be located on Highway 430, one mile east of I-4 in South Seminole County, on a 20 acre plot.

Welch gave three criteria which were taken into consideration by trustees and administrators of the hospital, needs, location, and plans. Welch stated that Orange and Seminole Counties were ascertained to be the most rapidly growing areas within the state, percentage wise in the next ten years, and that it is projected that these counties will grow faster than the metropolitan cities of Atlanta, Ga. and Phoenix, Ariz.

Welch illustrated his point with demographic statistics and a population density chart. Welch elaborated that there was not a single month that patients were not turned away at the Florida Sanitarium and Hospital.

The new hospital will be a satellite operation to the main facility. Similar operations were studied in Raleigh, N.C., Greenville, S.C., Columbus, Ohio, and Houston, Texas. Welch feels that this satellite operation will be in the best interests of the community and provide the type of services needed.

Memberships dues are coming into the office of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce office in a steady flow that has been pleasing to John Krider, executive manager. He expressed the belief that even though present that actual sum received is \$600 under that in hand by the same date last year, the flow of funds will pick up.

Krider said that this mail campaign was a week late getting under way because of action required by the directors, the meeting for which could not be held sooner. In spite of this, the interest of forward looking businessmen indicates that as soon as the Christmas rush is over, they will call the 1970 dues for their firms are paid.

This billing was at a slightly increased figure over that of last year. Everyone knows that costs are higher and that in order to get the job done in 1970, the trade group will have to have more operating capital, the C of C manager said. For this reason there has been an encouraging acceptance of the new figures.

Before now and the campaign of personal contacts to swell the roll of active members — to be set for January — the hope was expressed that most of the business houses would have taken care of the membership dues by mail. This would, of course, save many calls by the campaigners.

Krider expressed glowing optimism for the area in the years immediately ahead. He added that effective work by the C of C would be determined to no small extent by the funds supplied them.
