Carnegie Bulletin Author Charged With Having "No Intention Of Being Fair"

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Jan. 23. (AP)—Professor Ralph W. Aigler, chairman of the board in control of athletics of the University of Michigan, in a letter to Dr. Howard J. Savage, of New York, author of bulletin 23 of the Carnegie Foundation, accuses Dr. Savage of having "no intention to be fair and accurate" in the bulletin which cites a number of colleges and universities as "subsidizing" or "receiving" all letters.

The letter, which was mailed yesterday, is an answer to a statement made in Dr. Savage's newspaper after Professor Aigler's annual report was presented to the university faculty Monday night. Professor Aigler gave out a copy of the letter for publication today after the original should have been delivered to Dr. Savage.

Professor Aigler accuses Dr. Savage of questionable tactics in sending to the president of the University of Michigan a report of conditions at Ann Arbor which is incorporated in bulletin 23, and of making misleading inference in his report of athletic conditions at Michigan. The professor reiterates his accusation that the investigator removed letters from the files of the athletic department to which he was allowed full access, and returned photostatic copies when the originals were requested.

Professor Aigler's letter follows: "I have read in the newspaper of yesterday afternoon and this morning what purports to be your annual report. You make the following points: first, that you were given the choice between returning our original letters, and returning copies thereof; second, that a statement as to what would appear in the bulletin regarding Michigan was sent to the president of the university a number of months ago; third, that you changed in the bulletin regarding 'betters' was to be read as applicable to more than the university named in the parenthetical immediately following.

"It is not my desire to enter into a prolonged controversy. I would observe that your first statement is untrue; that your second is only partially true; and that your third depends upon a matter of interpretation of language used in the bulletin. "If you will note the language of the letter in which you were asked about our letters, you will see that they were not spoken of only in connection with the possibility that you might not have the originals. It is true that you sent a statement of certain things that were in progress in the bulletin to President Lathrop in the Clarence Gould letter, but you will find that the statement you will find that the 'betters' were particularly objected were not asked. As to the matter of 'subsidizing' or 'receiving' all letters, I would say that I am very much interested in whether your reader of your bulletin would get the impression that as to Michigan you do not mean that they receive all letters, but that you have not received all letters.

"I have said to you before, I do not anticipate that I will continue to continue you of any kind. If you are correctly quoted in the newspaper accounts you have merely repeated what I have said to you. You have no intention to be fair and accurate."
