# RFK Takes Candidacy To Alabama

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy today took his presidential candidacy to the state of Alabama today where he overcame political integration in 1963 as an attorney general.

Young Democrats at the Tuscaloosa campus were waiting with an endorsement they expected from Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy and a resolution endorsing McCarthy to get out of the room.

On the Republican side, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller

for makes his long-awaited announcement on whether he's a GOP presidential candidate, challenging Richard M. Nixon.

Political observers agreed he'd run at the eleventh hour but a top Rockefeller aide said, "There is still a deep division in our own ranks" on the advisability of the governor's getting into the race.

McCarthy, meanwhile—with an array of Johnson administration officials campaigning against him in Wisconsin—said he'd like to see the President send his whole cabinet.

"I'd like to have them travel together," McCarthy said. "It would be good for the country to see them all."

McCarthy planned a stop at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, after his Alabama appearance, before a weekend of campaigning for California's 19th Democratic National Convention delegates.

He has scheduled appearances across the length of California from Saturday through Monday night.

The administration officials backing Johnson in Wisconsin include Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and McCarthy said he didn't think the vice president would hurt him.

"He might say something that would hurt," the Wisconsin politician said. "But the last time he

and I were in the state together campaigning in 1960 when I was campaigning for him for president, I don't think he will hurt me very much."

Other administration officials scheduled to visit Wisconsin, with the primary time days away, are Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman and Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Robert Weaver.

McCarthy said there is a strong chance his contest with Kennedy would get down to personalities because the two candidates agree on many issues.

The Minnesota also said he was not sure he would enter the South Dakota primary where sources close to McCarthy say some of his supporters have decided to do what Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., who is running for re-election, wanted. He said McGovern does not want a party fight in the state.

## Homemaker's Corner

**POTATO CHICKEN CASSEROLE**  
 1 cup diced chicken (cooked)  
 6 medium potatoes (thinly sliced)  
 1 can cream of chicken soup  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1/2 tsp. pepper  
 1/2 cup diced onion  
 Oil medium sized casserole. Add layers of potatoes and sprinkle with chicken until all is used. Mix soup, milk, salt, pepper and onion and pour over potatoes and chicken. Bake in 375 degree oven for 1 hour.

**SOUR CREAM DESSERT**  
 1 pkg. (3-oz.) Jello, any fruit flavor  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 3/4 cup boiling water  
 1 cup light cream  
 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
 1/2 cup sour cream  
 Dissolve Jello, sugar and salt in boiling water. Stir in light cream and vanilla. Mixture may look curdled, but will become smooth. Stir in sour cream. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat until smooth. Pour into 8 or 4 cup ring mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with fruit, if desired. Makes 2 cups or 6 servings.

**PEPPY PEPPERS (Stuffed)**  
 4-6 large firm green peppers  
 1 lb. ground beef  
 1 small onion, chopped  
 1/2 cup diced celery  
 1/2 cup diced pepper  
 1 large can tomato sauce  
 2 cups cooked rice  
 salt, pepper to taste  
 Cut peppers in half, lengthwise, remove seeds. Sauté ground meat, onion, celery, pepper in butter until brown; add 1/2 cup tomato sauce. Mix well. To this mixture, add the cooked rice. Mix well. Fill pepper cups with meat mixture, piling high in cups. Place in baking dish, pour the remaining tomato sauce over each pepper cup; cover tightly and bake 1 1/2 hours at 325 degrees. Serve 6.

**AVOCADO PIE**  
 1 pkg. Jello lime or lemon  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1 cup boiling water  
 1 can (8 1/2-oz.) crushed pineapple  
 1/2 cup lime juice  
 1 medium avocado, peeled and halved  
 1 pkg. (2-oz.) cream cheese  
 1 cup whipped cream or prepared Cream Whip  
 Dissolve Jello and salt in boiling water. Drain pineapple, combining the syrup with the juice; add cold water to make 1/2 cup. Add to gelatin. Chill until very thick. Meanwhile dice half of the avocado. Mash

**PORK CHOPS WITH SOUR CREAM SAUCE**  
 6 pork chops, cut 1/2-inch thick  
 flour  
 1/2 tsp. salt  
 1/2 cup cooking oil  
 6 thin onion slices  
 6 tomato slices, 1/4-inch thick  
 1/2 tsp. pepper  
 1/2 cup water or bouillon  
 Drain chops in flour; sprinkle with salt. Brown lightly in hot oil. Turn and brown on second side. Top each chop with an onion slice. Cover and cook slowly until fork tender, about 25-30 minutes. Five minutes before end of cooking time, top each onion slice with a tomato slice and 1/6 of the sauce. Cover and allow sauce to heat. Serves 6.

You can count on having a smoother, better-looking white sauce every time if you add the flour to the melted fat, stirring constantly until it is well blended and smooth. Then remove from heat and pour the milk in slowly, stirring constantly as you add. Then return to heat to finish cooking, stirring all the while.

 1 cup shortening  
 1/2 cup powdered sugar  
 2 cups flour  
 1 tsp. vanilla  
 1/2 cup chopped nuts  
 Mix in order given. Roll into small rolls about the size of your finger. Bake at 350 degrees about 20 minutes. When cold, roll in powdered sugar.

**ORANGE RICE**  
 2 cups precooked rice (Minute Rice)  
 2 cups water

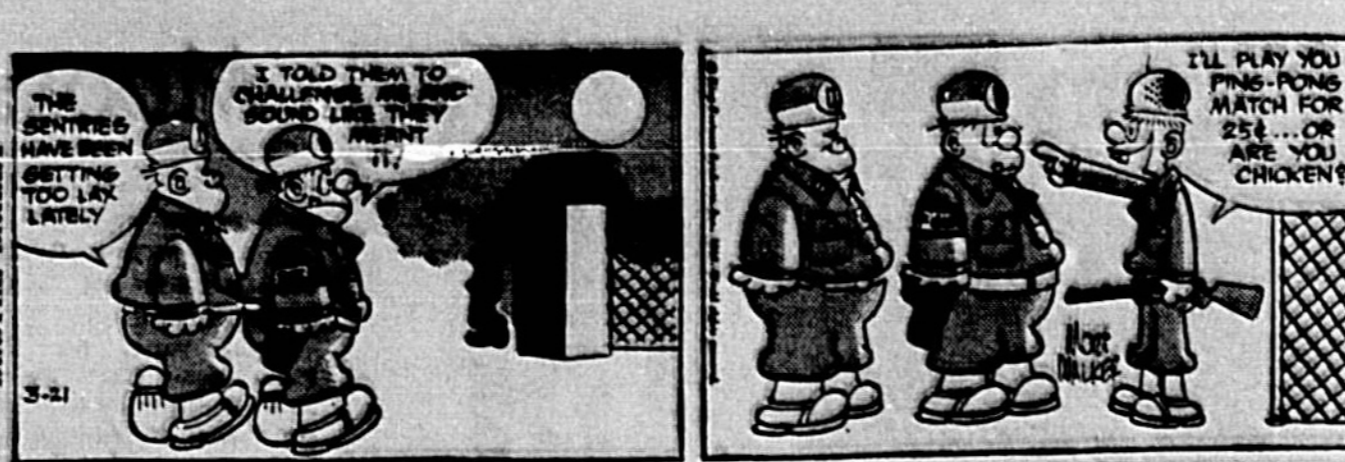

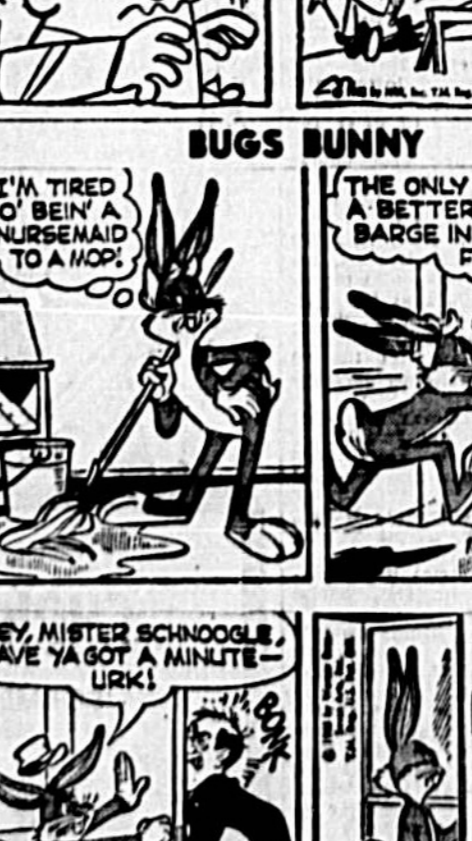

### Politics Muddling Murder Probe?

The ugly head of dirty politics has apparently reared itself and is becoming the real factor clouding the handling of the Bobby Joe Ray murder, which happened at the Interstate 4 rest area, west of Longwood, some time late Sunday night or early Monday.

Deputy Sheriff Jack Bushour found Ray's missing wallet containing checks of \$200 and \$250, credit cards and \$21 in cash, plus a watch in the victim's automobile glove compartment yesterday.

Thus, after four days, the robbery aspect of the case has been all but ruled out, according to Sheriff Peter Millot, Republican, in Sanford today.

The rather astonishing events leading to the present position in the murder investigation are as follows:

Monday 8:43 a. m. an unidentified motorist told Sheriff Millot that he had seen Ray between the hours of 9 p. m. on Sunday, March 17, 1968, and 8:30 a. m. on Monday, March 18, 1968, immediately contact the Seminole County Sheriff's Department.

Ray, age 39, was approximately five feet nine inches tall, and weighed 170 pounds. He had brown hair, he was driving a yellow 1966 Plymouth Belvedere convertible with a white top, showing Florida tag No. 10-11661.

He was last seen by his family on South Park Avenue, Sanford, at approximately 9:30 p. m., Sunday evening. He was found shot to death at the I-4 rest area north of Longwood the following morning.

### 'Snakes' Tax Eyed By Hoods

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — State Sen. John H. Chiles today called on legislators and all citizens to help prevent cigarette bootlegging to avoid increasing more bootlegging to Florida.

Chiles said his department did not have "enough money" to enforce collection of the new 15-cent-per-pack cigarette tax which goes into effect April 1 without help from all concerned.

Since cities and counties get the revenue from 3 cents of the tax, he said, the municipalities should be interested in helping the department locate any untaxed cigarettes.

Chiles said he was interested in avoiding a situation similar to New York where organized crime got into the cigarette bootlegging business, costing the state some \$60 million in tax revenue.

"It started as harmless, friendly cigarette bootlegging but it was taken over by organized crime," he said. "They moved into New York and I think they are going to move to Florida."

Now that Florida has what Chiles described as "the highest cigarette tax in the world," the director said his department would try to cut off the retail outlets for untaxed cigarettes to cut down on the potential profit.

"I am interested in avoiding a spiraling situation which would attract all the hoods in the world down here," he said. "We have enough already."

Chiles said a former newspaper man appointed to his post by Gov. Claude Kirk, said the main problem was the individual who doesn't think much of the 15-cent tax.

"Frankly," he said, "I don't think much of it as a smoker."

But Melkijohn urged citizens to find some other way to protest instead of buying bootleg cigarettes.

He said they could switch to cigars or chewing tobacco, "get a baby pacifier or just start sucking their thumbs."

Melkijohn said that it is sort of fun to beat the city, county or state out of some money," he said.

But the director warned that it was just as illegal to have a package of untaxed cigarettes as a truck load.
