Customs Bureau Plans To Obtain Appropriation For Stopping Smuggling Evil

WASHINGTON, Apr. 17.—
(INS)—Steps to break up inter-
national smuggling rings, which
are shipping from \$20,000,000 to
\$30,000,000 worth of commodities in
the United States annually without
payment of duty were taken today
by the Customs Bureau.

If a request for \$100,000 appropria-
tion is approved by Congress,
the bureau will have a special dia-
mond in action by mid-summer,
operating on both sides of the Atlan-
tic, in an effort to reduce the govern-
ment's loss of 20 per cent in duty
on the value of smuggled out-
goes.

Carriers—the liner and steamer
who actually bring the goods from
Amsterdam and Antwerp
markets to the United States—are
reaping a profit estimated at close
to \$1,000,000 annually.

The smugglers guarantee a deliv-
ery to the United States for about
four per cent of the cost, no duty
being paid if the goods are not
found in the hands of the dealer, who
is divided between the foreign
merchant and the dealer, who dis-
poses of smuggled goods in New
York.

Customs officials said the Ameri-
can and Antwerp markets are
worth \$100,000,000 worth of goods
annually. Legitimate imports to
the United States from
about \$700,000,000 last year. Ex-
ports from the United States to
about \$1,000,000,000 last year, of
which about 20 per cent of the total output

of the foreign countries remains in
the United States.

The international smuggling
rings are highly organized and
some of them have agents in the
South American fields, where
legal dealing in diamonds is

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CANDIDATES OF G. O. P. INDICATE EVEN STRENGTH

Hoover And Lowden Enter
Home Stretch in
Race For Nomination
With Equal Backing

8 Weeks Remain
Before Meeting

Cabinet Candidate Is
Expected To Pick Up
As East Begins Poll

WASHINGTON, Apr. 17.—
(INS)—Eight weeks from to-
day the Republican National
Convention meets in Kansas
City to select its presidential
candidate.

The field heads into the
highly important six weeks
of April and May, filled with
primaries and state conven-
tions, with the situation only
slightly beginning to clarify.

Considerably less than half
of the delegates have been chosen,
either by primary, state conven-
tion, or action by state committees,
and those that have been chosen
are about equally divided between
the leaders—Herbert Hoover and
Frank O. Lowden.

Only six of the seventeen
primary states have gone to the polls.
Illinois, Michigan, Nebraska, New
Hampshire, North Dakota, and
Wisconsin. Lowden is estimated to
have won 48 in Illinois, the other
13 being doubtful; 13 in North
Dakota and 7 in Wisconsin, a total
of 68. Hoover has picked up 33 in
Michigan, 12 in New Hampshire,
and 4 in Wisconsin, total of 49.
Senator George W. Norris (R) of
Nebraska, has received the 19 from
his native state, and 15 in Wis-
consin, making 34.

The primaries to date admit-
tedly have thrown but little light
on the situation as a whole.
The action of various state con-
ventions and state committees
have thrown but little more. Aside
from the primary states some 14
other states have taken definite
action in the matter of selecting
delegates and instructing or pledg-
ing them, or leaving them unin-
structed, but favorable to the var-
ious candidates.

From reports reaching the
several headquarters in Washing-
ton, and from other sources, the
following table presents a picture

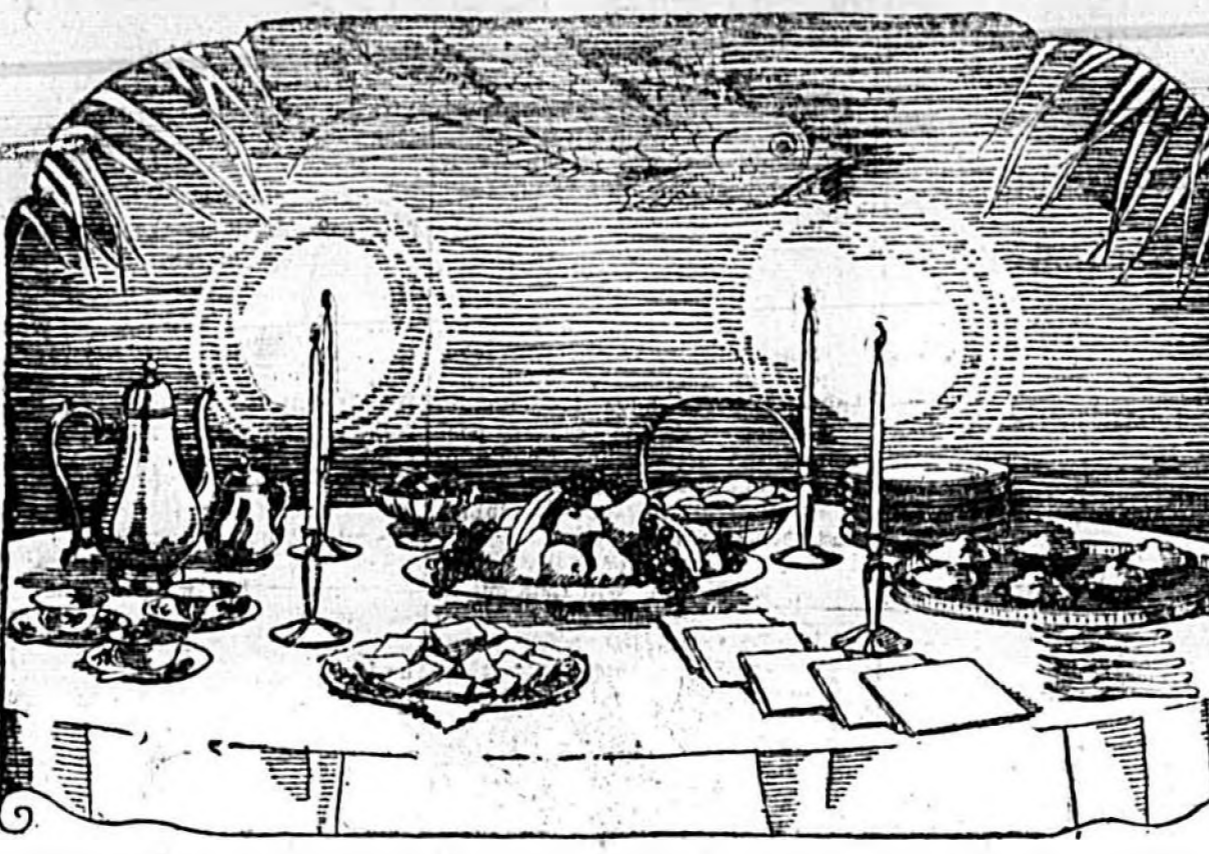

The Baseball Season

When the warm summer's sun begins to go farther south and people begin to talk of wood for fires, and tourists, young men and boys drag out their football togs and the pigskin soars through the sky. It's the football season. Newspapers are full of it. Millions of people on Saturday afternoons sit or stand, in fair weather or in rain or snow, and watch the thrilling spectacle of twenty-two men struggling to make gains against each other.

We think then that football must be the king of sports, that the appeal of this game must be even greater than baseball. And then the seasons roll around. Basketball comes and goes. Other sports have their day. And the first thing we know Spring is here and Babe Ruth's mighty wallop, Alexander's peerless curves, and Ty Cobb's stolen bases are on the lips of everyone.

Throughout America there is no more important engagement a man can have than to see his home team match hits, runs, and errors with another of the loop. The President of the United States tosses the first ball of the season. Wall Street capitalists take half holidays to hear the crack of Lou Gehrig's bat. Clerks and bank tellers dash away from business to see the final innings. School boys play hooky for the big games. And everywhere those not fortunate enough to get in, watch the big score boards in front of newspaper offices.

For this is America's game. This is baseball. There is no other sport, no business, no politics, no war even, which so grips and holds the attention of the American public as baseball. During season it is in the air, in the home, the office. It is in the blood. Men talk it, think it, dream it. There is nothing which is of such importance to them. It is the national pastime of the United States.

Whether Sanford will be represented by a team in the league this summer is a question now weighing on the minds of many local men. It is an expensive proposition, and in baseball as in everything else financing is the first problem to be disposed of. It is to be hoped that Asher, Tinker, Palmer, Wallace, Laney, Packard and the others will be able to find some solution which will give Sanford baseball this summer.

Zoning Plans

The city zoning decision recently rendered by Judge Wright seems to be quite in harmony with sentiment as expressed in other cities. Everywhere throughout this country municipal officials are adopting zoning plans as the people become more and more convinced of their desirability and practicality. The New Orleans Times-Picayune recently had this to say:

"It was noted at most of these meetings also that in the residential districts popular sentiment in overwhelming majority favored strict rather than lax restrictions against the encroachments of business. Thus in notable instances, where the tentative plan contemplated release to business use of additional sites on residential avenues and boulevards, there was vigorous and strongly supported protest against such releases. Not only were the hearings well attended, but opportunity was given for the filing of all protests, objections and proposals of change."

While the Florida Times-Union is quoted as follows: "It is rather remarkable, it may be observed in connection with this comparatively recent movement, that city planning and city zoning, generally, have been deferred so long. Hardly any individual starts to erect a structure of any sort without having definite plans, either in mind or comprehensively worked out in every detail, frequently at considerable cost, because it has been learned that such is the proper way to proceed."

"And, yet, towns and cities have been built without the slightest planning, just permitted to grow. The result in most such instances is far from satisfactory; also, haphazard city growth has proved enormously expensive. In many instances, however, there is yet time and opportunity to make amends, to some limited extent, but more particularly to provide for further city growth in accordance with carefully prepared plans in order that past mistakes may not be repeated, and in order, also, that new city development and growth may give most satisfactory results to all concerned."

"Jacksonville only recently has manifested its serious interest in city planning and zoning, having due regard for present and future municipal advantage and benefits to be derived through practical, systematic planning and zoning. The best interests of all the people of this city are involved in this enterprise, and as there are open minds and vision action so will be enhanced, in value and importance, the asset that is in a city that is well and properly planned and wisely directed in the matter of improvements to be made by the city as well as by individuals."

EXTRAVAGANCE TAMPA TIMES

At the outset of his discussion of the road department Mr. Carlton dealt with expenditures by the equipment division at Gainesville. This division buys parts, materials, and overhauls cars and trucks. Some repair items exceeded the actual cost of a new car of the same make. Mr. Carlton gave the exact figures and the number of the vouchers. He was talking about things the crowd easily understood.

"Now let's talk in the language of the common people, using the item, 'repairs to a Ford,'" said Mr. Carlton. "A new Ford at that time cost \$495. One Ford repair job costs \$417.17. Another \$463.51. Here's an item showing repairs to the rear end of a Ford costing \$330. The department must have nickel-plated it."—Extract from the news column accounts of Doyle Carlton's speech in Tampa.

In his challenge of Fons A. Hathaway, chairman of the state road department, to a joint debate in connection with their races for the governorship Doyle Carlton laid a charge of extravagance against that department—which means a charge of extravagance against Chairman-Candidate Hathaway's conduct of that department. Newspaper supporters of the candidacy of Chairman Hathaway commended him, of course, upon his refusal to enter into such a debate with Doyle Carlton. They said there is nothing to debate.

Whatever the chairman of the state road department and his friends may think about it, most of the thoughtful people of Florida hold that extravagance in the conduct of the public's business is something worth being debated. Doyle Carlton has presented facts in reference to the repair bills in question or he has not. If he has presented facts he has instanced carelessness and extravagance in connection with Chairman-Candidate Hathaway's conduct of the state road department which it is fair to take as indicative of what will happen in connection with the conduct of the affairs of the state as a whole if the chairman of the state road department, who is at least responsible for these repair bills, is named governor of this state.

No attempt to laugh this off because what is involved is merely repair bills on four fivers will serve Chairman-Candidate Hathaway and his friends. Mickles make muckles still, and straws yet show the way the wind blows. There is that Orlando Sentinel straw ball in which Carlton, Catts and Hathaway finished in the order named, with Carlton some four to one over Hathaway, for instance. These repair bills are at least straws very clearly indicating extravagance—and extravagance in the management of public affairs is something from which the people much need to be delivered.

Nor is the statement that "the audit is the answer" sufficient explanation of these bills. So far as the audit is concerned all it probably shows is that the amount of money involved was expended upon

Comparatively, what is mentioned here is a small matter. The principle of the thing, however, is the same as if millions were involved. Multiply these amounts times enough and they will amount to millions. It is possible that in this fact is concealed the reason, or part of the reason, why the state road department sought to bond the state of Florida, under another name, for \$2,000,000 for the carrying on of its work.

Unthinkingly extravagant expenditures for repairs on some Ford cars may not be anything to have a joint debate about. Even so, they are things which need explaining. In common with the people of Florida, we shall wait to see what Chairman-Candidate Fons A. Hathaway has to say about them.



(Continued from page 1.) The slogan "a national problem at national expense," was the battle cry of the Mississippi valley forces leading the fight for the bill.

Madden proposed to require the Southern States affected to pay only the cost of levee rights-of-way, while the Frear forces stood by the Janwin plan to require a 20 cent local contribution. Frear also said he would propose amendments allowing the local districts to borrow money from the government and in extreme cases to waive local contributions.

Another fight was promised on the method of doing the job. President Coolidge, according to Madden, is insistent upon the Secretary of War being given authority to control the letting of contracts. Flowage rights or actual purchase of 4,000,000 acres of land for floodways will be necessary under any scheme of flood control, both sides agreed.

The Frear group declared that 70 per cent of the land is owned by corporate interests and that the possibilities of graft in the sale of land to the government would stir up another "Teapot Dome" fight.
