Happy New Year.

They say we are going to have bad weather in 1947, but we'll bet it'll be easier sailing than in 1946.

A movie star is a gal who doesn't know where her next husband is coming from... According to the Lake City Reporter.

They are 'enjoying' sub-zero weather in many parts of the North these days. And those who do not enjoy such weather will soon be heading south.

Motorists who pick up hitchhikers are optimists and have a firm conviction in the quality of human nature. Such an optimist driving to Florida picked up a hitchhiker in New Jersey, was killed by him, Jerry Vero Beach with intent to rob. The would-be murderer later repented, did not rob the man and a he was sorry. Nevertheless, honest citizens who occasionally find themselves in the position of thumbing a ride must understand that incidences such as this discourage many courtesies of the road.

One wonders what's the rush, as Andre Gromyko calls upon the UN Security Council to work out a detailed disarmament program and allow three months to do it. Under the Russian plan all types of weapons for mass destruction would be outlawed. All modern variations of that well known "equalizer" would be done away with so that the man with the biggest muscles would be the king. It's a smart trick! And it may work. Not many in this century realize how much stronger Russia would be than we are if it were not for various "weapons for mass destruction."

The year of 1946 comes to an end in a blaze, if not in a blast of glory, as the explosion and burning of another airliner brings the death toll in such accidents for Christmas week to 114 and the number of those who have died in fires during any one month to a new high. What 1947 will bring to the world in the shape of accidental deaths is, it seems to us, impossible to say. The United Nations has adopted the atomic bomb and the various treaties to form a lasting peace for mankind show that the highways of the nation are more dangerous than the battlefields of the world. Unless some way is found to move people safely from one place to another, it will be a matter of time before the United Nations collapses or falls.

A New Year

To every one is given this priceless gift, a new year, a fresh page on which to write what every soul of us hopes will be a finer record than he has ever made before. Years are man's measures for limitless and illimitable Time. Few can grasp the vision of the poet who said: "I saw Eternity the other night; Like a great ring of pure and endless light, All calm, as it was bright; And round beneath it Time in hours, days, years, Driven by the spheres Like a vast shadow moved; in which the world And all her train were hurled." Eternity is too vast for every day understanding. But one can be held in human scope, planned as a whole, to be built slowly and carefully, day by day and hour by hour.

Fire! Fire!

What is the use of a hotel fire escape? Recent hotel fires in different parts of the United States causes one newspaper to look into its own city's hotels. It found that the local fire department and the hotel manager had two different theories as to the purpose of fire escapes. The firemen thought them means of saving lives in a fire. The hotelmen reasoned that fires came seldom, and that in the meantime their guests might use them to walk out without paying. Most fire escapes therefore led to lobbies, kitchens or cellars which might be in the path of the flames.

A useful form of fire escape is the outside one which steps some twelve or fifteen feet above the ground. The cheating guest trying to depart by means of it would find himself in trouble, whereas firemen can reach it quickly with a single section ladder.

The hotelmen have a real problem. Some of them have been solving it in ways which they may regret.

Costly Okinawa

Lonely island of Okinawa which cost the United States 40,000 casualties continues to be expensive in peace time. While its ultimate disposal is yet to be settled by peace treaty, this important air base, administered by the United States, probably will come under sort of permanent American jurisdiction.

Since the war's end the United States has sent large amounts of food stuffs there as well as seeds and farm equipment. Almost 13,000 houses have been rebuilt from salvaged materials with 90,000 more planned. Schools have been opened for the island's 100,000 children, sanitation and nursing projects have been started. The native population, less than half a million, is predominantly of women. Even when it was part of Japan, the island was not self-supporting and some observers think it never can be.

This continuing expense and responsibility of Okinawa is typical of the expanded obligations the war has brought. Peace has come, but no return to the old days, no going back to old "normalcy". A world war was fought and won, but the results are bringing new responsibilities, administrative and financial.

Forgotten Prosecutor

When Paula Welden, a student at Bennington College, Vt., disappeared the other day, her absence was investigated by State's Attorney William Travers Jerome, Jr. This name must have stirred old memories in many.

In 1901 Tammany was beaten in New York City chiefly through the fiery attacks of Justice William Travers Jerome, candidate for district attorney of Manhattan. He called spades spades and named names in a way that even New York, which has seen much, had never seen before. Four years later, when Tammany and the Republican machine ganged up on him and refused to renominate him, he ran independently and startled the cynical by being re-elected. He was then the most talked of Democrat in Greater New York and seemed a logical candidate for governor the next year and possibly president in 1908.

Unfortunately 1906 saw the exposure of great laxness in the management of some big insurance companies. Indictments seemed called for, but to the general surprise Jerome seemed to turn timid and to have undue awe for the very wealthy. The governorship, which might have been his, went to another investigator who had no fear of malefactors, rich or poor. His name was Charles Evans Hughes, who started then on the career that later made him Chief Justice.

Jerome died in 1934, practically forgotten. Many would like to know more about his small-town son, hoping he may add brightness to an already good name.

WASHINGTON LETTER

By JANE EADS WASHINGTON, (AP)—The Army is trying to perk up jaded GI appetites with tastier chow more attractively served—maybe with a bit of parsley on top.

It seems the GIs are getting tired of stews and mass foods served in army mess halls. A lot of the boys can't stand lamb. Many more won't even take a taste of scalloped oysters. A great many do on beef and gravy.

A couple of months ago the chief of staff, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, sent out a directive ordering that several hundred officers and men concentrate on improving the Army's food.

Out in Chicago the Quartermaster Corps Food and Container Institute is already carrying on a research "directed toward the goal of making foods more acceptable."

Some eighty colleges and universities are collaborating with this group in a program to "evaluate and improve nutritional and physiological adequacy of rations as well as their acceptability."

In carrying out this program, the Institute has set up taste-testing groups. In one small dining room 20 persons are acting as human guinea pigs. Larger tests

are made with 250 persons participating. Generally the complaint has been that, while food quality was high, personnel not sufficiently trained or paid were assigned to preparing and serving it.

A suggestion has been offered that a good side of beef could be cut into steaks instead of being scrounged together in a soupy stew.

In addition to this program, a new field ration—E ration—is being tried out with mountain troops in Colorado. The Army says the boys seem to like the E ration and that it probably will be substituted for several others used during the war.

The E ration consists of canned foods in a package weighing 25 pounds, enough to supply five men for one day. The ration can be animal-packed, man-carried or dropped by parachute.

Meats selected for various packages include beef and gravy, bacon, frankfurters, pork sausage, hamburgers and pork and gravy. (All of these are not included in one package.)

The canned vegetables include lima beans, sweet and white potatoes, snap beans and corn. Fruits include fruit cocktail, pineapples, apricots and peaches. In addition each ration includes 20 cigarettes per man per day, towels, soap, heat tablets for warming the foods and tablets for purifying water.

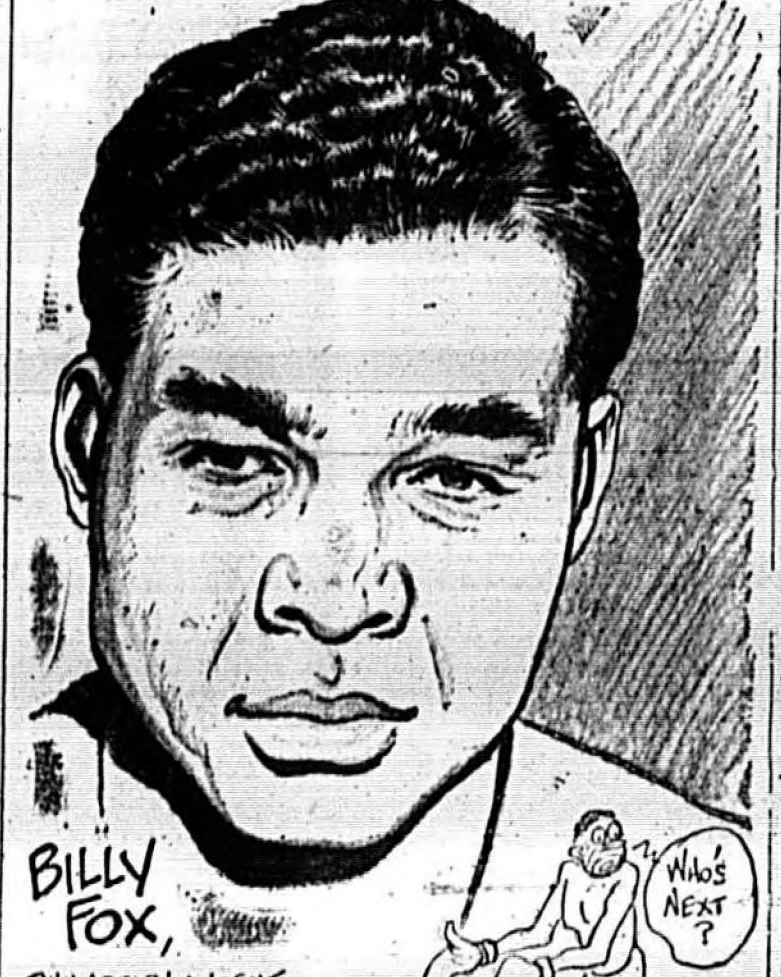
