

The firemen thought them means of saving lives in a fire. The hotelmen reasoned that fires came seldom, and that in the meantime their guests might use them to walk out without paying. Most fire escapes therefore led to lobbies, kitchens or cellars which might be in the path of the flames.

A useful form of fire escape is the outside one which stops some twelve or fifteen feet above the ground. The cheating guest trying to depart by means of it would find himself in trouble, whereas firemen can reach it quickly with a single section ladder.
