CHICAGO, Feb. 21,-A return to what he termed "family negotiations" between carriers and their employes, and a change in or the modification of the act creating the United States Railroad Labor Board, were advocated here last night by W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Rallroad Trainmen, speaking before the Western Railway Club.

Mr. Lee, the first union chief to speak before the club, composed al most entirely of railway operators, received round after round of ap plause.

The speaker acknowledged that the labor hoard had been instrumental in continuing railway service on more than one occasion, but asserted that rail employes "do not believe in enforced submission of their differences to any court."

President Harding's plan of a new division of the Interstate Commerce Commission to decide disputes between carriers and employes received no support from Mr. Lee.







SPEEDED UP POSTAL SERVICE

First Exclusive Transportation of the Malls, In 1875, Was Watched With Intense Interest.

The first exclusive mail train was placed in service Sept. 18, 1875. Leaving New York. It arrived on schedule time in Chicago the following day, after a journey of twenty-six hours. Great interest was taken at that time in this all-postal train, which carried he western mall from New York to Chicago at a greater speed than any passenger train could command, and, furthermore delivered that mail at Chi--cago distributed and arranged for linmediate dispatch to other lines, or

for delivery by carrier in Chicago, With the beginning of the year 1899 the mall between New York and San Francisco was also carried on fast trains, consuming less time than the fastest passenger train. Fast trains between Chicago and Omaha ran the more than 500 miles in less than ten hours. An important feature of the new service was that by which mail bags were caught without stopping the trains, and which brought even small towns the benefit of speedy service,


