New Law Raises License Taxes For Businesses

Businesses from their own...
The new law raises license taxes for businesses. The amount is \$15.25 for each pharmacist.
Building Contractors heretofore licensed at \$15.25 are raised to \$25.75 for every person engaged in any of its branches.
Photographers heretofore licensed at \$15.25 are raised to \$22.75.
Wholesale merchants who have been paying at the rate of \$2.25 for each \$1,000.00 of stock must now pay at the rate of \$40.00 for the first \$1,000.00 plus \$2.25 for each additional \$1,000.00 of stock. Calculated on the highest amount on hand at any time during the previous year, or the highest amount they expect to have at any time during the coming year, whichever is the greater.
The rate on barber shops is increased, the new rate is \$15.25 plus \$1.50 for each person employed in excess of five.
Under Trading in Tangible Personal Property, fruit and vegetable buyers are taxed \$37.75 heretofore they have been taxed \$27.75.
Practitioners of the professions including lawyers, doctors, dentists, pharmacists, registered nurses, etc. are taxed \$15.25 for the privilege of practicing, which license tax shall not relieve the person paying same from the payment of any license tax imposed on any business operated by him.
Coin operated machines operated for profit of machines, coin-operated or device which is not in motion or made or permitted to function by the insertion of a coin or coin-like, shall pay a license tax of \$7.75 for each machine contrivance or device. Under this section each weighing machine, peanut vending machine, postage stamp vending machine, music vending machine, each pay toilet operated by slot device and each pay telephone are subject to this tax.
Job Printing Shops are increased to \$22.75 plus \$1.50 for each person employed in excess of five.
Fruit or Vegetable packing houses the rate is \$15.25 plus \$1.50 for each person employed in excess of five, provided the license shall not exceed \$27.75; plants operated by growers or by cooperative associations are exempt.
Every fortune teller, clairvoyant, palmist, astrologer, phrenologist, character reader, spirit medium, seer, fortune teller, or other person engaged in any occupation of fortune telling shall pay a license tax of \$15.25, provided that this section shall not be construed to require members of any recognized Christian denomination who pray for the sick, to obtain a license.
Every person who operates for profit any place where dancing is conducted in or entertainment such as variety programs or exhibitions, are provided, shall pay a license tax of \$15.25. The license required by this section shall be in addition to any other license required by law, and the operation of such a place as herein described shall not be construed to be subject to some other business; provided this section shall not apply to any place operated as a theater or moving picture show only, and provided further that this section shall not apply to hotels paying an occupational tax as provided by law.
"Farm and Groves products when offered for sale or sold by the farmer or grower producing the said products are exempt from State and County license tax.
"Fees or licenses paid to any Board, Commission or Officer for permits, registration, examination, inspection or other regulatory purposes shall be in addition to and not in lieu of any occupational tax required by this Act or other law of this State.
"This Act shall not be construed to authorize gambling or the operation of a lottery, or the operation of any machine, contrivance or device prohibited by law.
"The word "person" wherever used in this Act shall be construed to mean either person, firm, partnership, corporation, association, executor, administrator, trustee or other legal entity, whether singular or plural, masculine or feminine, as the context may require.
"While the new law includes, apparently, every business, profession or occupation not otherwise licensed, it contains a section providing that every person engaged in the operation of any business of such nature that no license can be properly required of it under any provision of this Act, or other law of the State of Florida, shall pay a license tax of \$150.25.
"License for Retail Stores has not been changed, this is known as the Chain Store Law and the amount of license is graduated from \$10.00 for one store to the amount of \$100.00 on each store of fifteen or more stores, plus one-half of one percent tax per month on gross receipts; this license is collected by the State Comptroller and becomes due on July 1st of each year. The proceeds after cost of collection is deducted by the Comptroller, goes into the General School Fund, and is apportioned to the Counties from time to time to be used exclusively for the payment of teachers salaries and transportation of pupils in the public schools.
"Under the new classification, wood yards, ice peddlers using trucks, peddlers of all kinds, restaurateurs and retailers of all kinds, fall under the provisions of the chain store law.
"Whenever any person who is subject to the payment of a license or privilege tax by this or any other law of the State of Florida, shall fail to pay the same when due, the Tax Collector, Comptroller, State Treasurer, or other official to whom the said tax is payable, shall issue a warrant directed to all and singular the Sheriffs of the State of Florida, commanding them and each of them to levy upon and sell any real or personal property of the person liable for said tax within his respective jurisdiction, for the amount thereof and costs of executing the warrant. The Sheriff shall proceed in all respects and in the same manner prescribed by law in regard to executions upon judgments of a Circuit Court.
In addition to the above, any person who shall carry on or conduct any business, profession or occupation for which a license is required, without first obtaining such license, shall, except in such cases as are otherwise provided by law, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than double the amount required for such license, or imprisonment not exceeding six months.
"Insurance Agents doing business without a license are subject to a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not more than \$200.00 for each offense."

Austria Parakeets Placed With Birds At Municipal Zoo

A dozen Austrian parakeets have been added to the bird collection of the Sanford Municipal Zoo, James Moughton, superintendent of Parks here, announced today.
The Zoo required the birds from the Jacksonville zoo through an exchange with W. L. Bradley, superintendent of parks in Jacksonville.
Mr. Bradley was in Sanford some time ago and discussed the possibility of an exchange with Mr. Moughton and since that time Mr. Moughton has sent two Florida bobcats, a pair of snowy white egrets, a pair of white crowned pigeons and two pairs of fantailed pigeons. The parakeets were received from Jacksonville in exchange for the collection and each pair of the birds are a different hue.
Ralph Bagwell, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce received word today that the two Black Bear Cubs which the Chamber ordered recently from Henry Trefflich, importer and exporter of wild and domestic animals in New York City, would arrive in Sanford in the near future.
The old bear cage has been remodeled for the newcomers and every precaution is being taken to insure success in raising the Cubs. Their diet will consist of warm milk and mush until they are older, Mr. Moughton stated.

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Black Given Clear Title By Justices

Levitt Petition For Black's Removal On Technical Grounds Is Denied By Court

Ku Klux Issue Is Not Raised

Kelly Motion Is Also Denied On Same Basis As Levitt's

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The Supreme Court refused today to permit Albert Levitt, a former federal judge in the Virgin Islands, and Patrick Henry Kelly, a Boston attorney, to contest Justice Hugo L. Black's right to a seat on the bench.

This action gave Black a clear title to his judicial post so far as present challenges are concerned. Levitt has indicated, however, that he might start other proceedings.

The court refused to permit Levitt to file his petition which contended Black was constitutionally ineligible for the position. Levitt claimed Black was barred because he was a member of the Senate which voted to increase the "emoluments" of the justices by permitting them to retire at full pay after reaching 70 and serving 10 years.

He added that the retirement of Justice Van Devanter did not create a vacancy on the court and hence there was no place for Black's appointment.

Service by Black, the petition said, "will interfere with and prevent the due, proper, and lawful administration of justice in the Supreme Court of the United States."

Kelly's motion was denied on the basis of the action on Levitt's petition.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Ogden L. Mills, former secretary of the treasury, died at his home here today at 7:59 A. M. after an illness of two weeks.

Although "born with a gold spoon in his mouth" and with little inducement except the traditions of ancestors to carve out a career, his life was well-rounded.

After getting his law degree from Harvard in 1907, with high grades, he became an employee and then a partner of Stetson, Jounglin and Russell, a New York law firm, and soon was in demand as a corporation trial lawyer.

Two years later he was elected to the state senate and began to reflect the lively interest in social welfare displayed by his grandfather, Baruch.

Attorney J.L. Doggett Dies After Illness

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 11.—(AP)—John L. Doggett, 69, well known Jacksonville attorney and one-time judge of the Duval county criminal court of record, died at his home yesterday following a long illness.

In 1889, he was named clerk of the criminal court of record, and eight years later was appointed judge. At that time he was the youngest presiding judge in Florida.

He attended Bradford Institute, the East Florida seminary at Gainesville, and was graduated from the University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn.

YALLAHASSEE, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The gasoline tax situation became more involved today as the Supreme Court refused to lift an injunction case out of the circuit court and Judge E. C. Love, of Quincy ordered Comptroller J. M. Lee to pay the impounded money to Washington county.

Meanwhile attorneys revealed in arguments before the Supreme Court that Circuit Judge J. B. Johnson of Tallahassee late Saturday modified an injunction previously entered and authorized Comptroller Lee to release about \$3,000,000 of gasoline tax money to county interest and sinking funds to avoid defaults in bond payments.

Judge Love's order to pay Washington county money followed last week's even division of six Supreme Court justices on the constitutionality of a special act directing the payment of state gasoline tax money into the county road and bridge fund.

The order by Judge Love, lawyers said, does not conflict with an earlier order by Judge Johnson restraining Comptroller Lee from paying gasoline taxes to 39 counties which have special legislative acts seeking to control the disbursement of the fund.

Barnett Reports Many Tourists To Be Here Soon

There have been greater improvements in building and larger increases in property values in Florida than in any other state on the eastern seaboard, Seminole County Representative Gordon Barnett, stated today after his return from a trip to New York and Philadelphia.

Mr. Barnett stated that bascule is a far greater development in this state than in any of the localities he had visited, and intimated that the large influx of tourists into this state anticipated for the coming winter is largely responsible for the development.

From all appearances the delegations from the north seeking refuge from the biting winds and the driving snows in Florida's semi-tropical climate will far exceed all previous records, Seminole County representative in the State Legislature stated.

The disposal of 364 machines in Florida has also created a great amount of interest throughout the north, Mr. Barnett stated, adding that those who had been here and played the numbers were glad they had been barred from the State.

Aside trading in the nation's metropolises and other points above the Mason-Dixon Line, Mr. Barnett asserted that the complete absence of country to patronize the part of state checks was the most noticeable difference between northern and southern customs.

The representative commended the Sanford merchants for their courtesy to patrons and stated that it appeared to the northern shoppers who were used to being treated so rudely.

While in New York, Mr. Barnett attended the American Legion Convention and stated that the circumstances from this state received considerable excitement with their alligator sandwiches, composed of one live baby alligator and one large bread bun.

Before returning to Sanford, Mr. Barnett attended the International Florida Convention in Philadelphia and stated that he found a ready market there for a large quantity of ferns.

"Although I enjoyed my trip very much," the Representative stated, "I am very glad to be back in the 'Sunshine State'."

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today the people of the United States are determined to uphold that ideal of human society "which would substitute freedom for force in the governments of the world."

He spoke on a radio program broadcast in connection with the removal of the Arlington National Cemetery of the remains of General Wladimir B. Kravzanowski, a Polish patriot, who served in the United States Army during the War, between States.

The question of imports for warring nations was posed as a major issue today for the powers confronted by the conflicts on both sides of the world.

Japan seeking to pare its international bills and provide more cash for financing its war against China closed its door to almost 700 imported articles.

In the western world, France considered throwing open her Pyrenees frontier to allow aid and volunteers to go to the Volante government—the step was raised as a possibility aimed to break the stalemate in the Anglo-French-Italian Mediterranean crisis.

The Japanese emergency action was one of the most drastic in modern economic history. It was designed to offset a 1937 unfavorable trade balance of \$217,000,000 and the current estimated cost of \$,000,000 daily for the thinnest campaign.

Despite this extreme measure Japan will continue one of the United States' largest customers since its heavy purchases of oil, cotton, steel, and machinery from this country were classified as "urgent" national and exempted from the ban.

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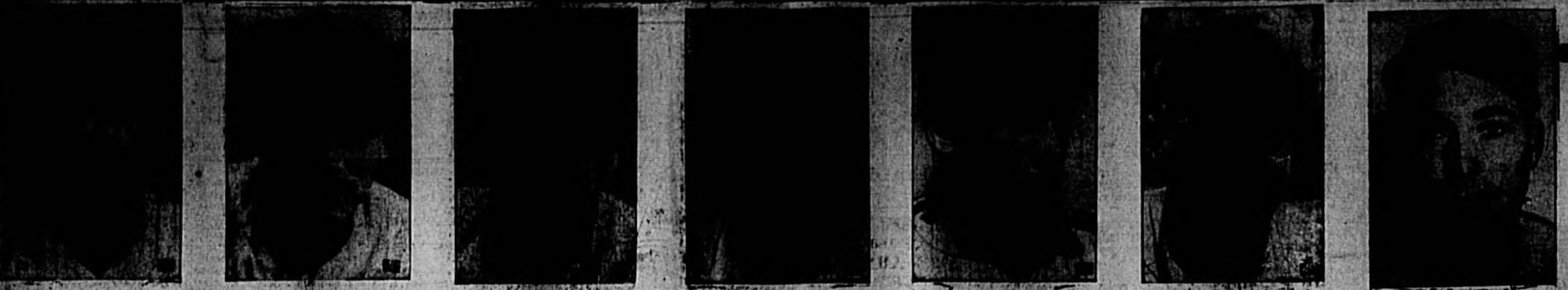

New York Yankees Bombard Giants For Fifth World Championship

Lefty Gomez Has Too Much For National Leaguers As He Sets Them Down 4 To 2

It Was The Second Straight World Series Victory Over Bill Terry's New York Giants; 38,216 See Chilly Game

POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Lefty Gomez, Yankees' cleanup hitter, set a new record in his book of amazing baseball accomplishments yesterday by overpowering the Giants in a booming finish to the second successive all-New York world series.

To the accompaniment of their biggest burst of long-range fire in the series, the Yankees blasted out a 4 to 2 victory on a rain-drenched diamond in the fifth and final game, while Lefty Gomez repeated counter-attacks by the Giants after Mel Ott's homer tied the score in the third inning.

The triumph by the Yankees, 4 games to 1, marked the second straight conquest of their neighborly rivals, their fifth successive victory in baseball's big-money title and their sixth since the war. They won previously in 1923, 1927, 1928 and 1936.

This set an all-time record. The Yankees broke a tie with the Boston Red Sox and Philadelphia Athletics, each of whom was victorious in five world series. The champions of the world now have captured 20 of their last 23 series games and their club in either league that, in two years, has come close to challenging their supremacy.

Gomez was the hero of the decisive game as the Yankees tallied all their runs off the portside delivery of gangling Cliff Melton, Giant freshman who failed for the second time in the series. Five of the eight Yankee hits went for extra bases, including a double, two triples and two home runs, but Gomez enjoyed the distinction of hitting home the winning run with a single as he repeated his opening game triumph over the Giants.

The lanky Castilian portlander, by winning two contests, ran his world series record to five victories, with no defeats. He beat the Cubs once in 1922 and the Giants twice last year. He is now tied in the record books with Jack Combs and Herb Eganck, each of whom posted five victories without a setback.

Despite penetratingly chilly weather and skies that ceased dripping only an hour before the game began, a crowd of 38,216 turned out to see whether the Giants, after making a winning stand behind the great Carl Hubbell Saturday, could dispel the issue with the Bronx Bombers. With the park less than two-thirds filled the gate receipts just failed to touch the million-dollar mark. The total for five games amounted to \$985,994.

3 British Automobiles Are Machine Gunned By Japanese Planes

No One Is Injured In Attack On Autos In Which Soviet Official Also Rode

Five Japanese Airplanes Hit Japanese Announce Big Push At Shanghai Ready To Begin

SHANGHAI, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Three automobiles belonging to the British Embassy were machine gunned today by two squadrons of Japanese warplanes. None of the occupants was injured.

Staff cars in which S. S. Murray, assistant air attaché of the British Embassy, was riding with several other Englishmen were attacked by the raiding Japanese planes near Minghong, 14 miles south of Shanghai.

British officers asserted the cars could have been identified easily and added that there was no doubt the attacking planes were Japanese.

With Murray and the other Englishmen in the cars, British officials said, was the Soviet Embassy secretary named Shabov. He had been picked up 10 minutes before the attack when his car broke down.

The Embassy staff cars were en route to Shanghai from Nanjing in the same highway on which two Japanese planes recently seriously wounded the British Ambassador to China, Sir Hugh Knatchbull-Hugessen, by bombing and machine gunning the automobile in which he was making a similar journey.

Japanese army launched heavy aerial bombardment on the strongly held Chinese Chapel Sector on northern fringe of the International Settlement, spokesman said that, weather permitting, the long overdue Japanese "big push" would get under way in the immediate future.

Five Japanese warplanes were brought down today during spectacular air raids on Nanjing, the Chinese capital, and nearby cities, the Chinese announced today.

Three of the planes were shot down during dogfights with Chinese aircraft over Nanjing. Other aircraft suffered destruction at the hands of enemy pursuit planes at Chinkiang, twenty-four Japanese aircraft took part in the raid on Nanjing.

Last night another communication from Mr. Leach was read to the Commissioners requesting an extension of time during which he stated he would come to Sanford and investigate the possibility of remodeling and completely remodeling the building.

An extension of time was granted Mr. Leach providing he took definite action on the matter in the near future. At the present time the building is in a dangerous condition and should be demolished before some serious accident results through delay, the Commission decided.

The first, Oct. 18, will be in Orlando and workers from Orange, Seminole, Osceola, Volusia, Polk, Lake, Brevard and Indian River counties will be in attendance. She will be in Tampa Oct. 19, Miami Oct. 20, West Palm Beach Oct. 21 and Jacksonville Oct. 22. On Oct. 9 she visited Pensacola en route from Louisiana to a week of work in Alabama.

Mrs. W. H. Spora, president of the Orange County Tuberculosis and Health Association and Mrs. Frank D. Gray, Orange County Seal Sale chairman, will be co-hostesses at the meeting to be held at the Colonial Orange Court Hotel in Orlando Monday.

Seven Local Blind PWA Distributes Are Eligible For \$610,846 During Social Security Month In Florida

Survey Reveals That 1,280 Blind Need Assistance In State

JACKSONVILLE Fla., Oct. 12.—According to a social security survey made by the former State Board of Social Welfare for the information of the legislature, 7,814 or near-sightless residents of Seminole County are eligible for joint state and federal assistance under a program that is to be set up in the immediate future.

The plan for blind assistance approved by the State Welfare Board is now at Washington where it awaits the approval of the National Social Security Board. When the act is obtained, investigations to determine the eligibility of applicants will begin in the 12 districts of the county, according to Clayton C. Codrington, State Welfare Commissioner.

There are 1,280 needy blind in Florida, the estimate revealed. Procedure in determining blindness is outlined in the plan as submitted to Washington, and permits some of limited vision to share in the distribution of funds. Economic blindness, is defined as central visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye with correcting glasses, permitting the identification of a standard object at 20 feet.

The maximum assistance that may be granted to an individual is \$30 per month by law. The federal government has appropriated \$100,000 to match Florida funds in a similar amount, limiting the total for distribution the first year to \$200,000.

Such blind as support themselves by solicitation on the streets or other professional methods are barred from the benefits of the plan.

Motor Bus Fares Undergo Revision

Revision of motor bus fares between most cities throughout the state was announced here today by J. H. MacDonald, agent of the Florida Motor Lines, upon receipt of notice from T. B. O'Steen, Jacksonville, Traffic Manager of the system. The new reduced rates become effective on October 12th.

"While fares have been reduced to the lowest they have been in history, service and equipment of Florida Motor Lines have received a new height in convenience and comfort," Agent MacDonald said today. "With new Zephyr buses on most through runs and another new fleet of the latest type buses to be delivered within the next few weeks, transportation facilities from this city to all points in Florida and the North will reach a new high in efficiency."

More Than Half Million Is Advanced For Overseas Road

James E. Colton, acting State director of the Public Works Administration, has announced that during the month of September funds amounting to \$610,846.11 were released in Florida to aid in financing Public Works projects.

A loan payment of \$501,222.22 was made to the Overseas Road and Toll Bridge District for the Overseas Highway now under construction from Miami to Key West.

He was admitted to the hospital late, "sunday night and shortly afterwards his attending physician said his condition was "critical."

American Consul Is Assassinated By An Armenian

Marriner Killed By Man Whom He Refused Visa To U. S.

BEIRUT, Syria, Oct. 12.—(AP)—James Theodore Marriner, one of the best known of the American "Foreign Service" officers, was shot and killed today by an Armenian whom he had refused a visa to enter the United States.

The assassin's gun felled the tall, scholarly Consul General as he stepped from his automobile before his office for a start of the day's official business.

Marriner's chauffeur captured the assassin. The police, after a preliminary investigation, said the killer's name was Mejaridich Karayan.

They reported he pumped six bullets from his revolver into Marriner at close range. The Consul General died immediately.

Police said the prisoner admitted the American official's refusal to grant him a visa was the motive for his attack. Authorities said Marriner had blocked Karayan's entry on grounds of insanity in the Armenian family.

Two Sanford Youths Are Made Corporals

Two Sanford youths, Mills Boyd and Sam Bradford, have been promoted to corporals in the United States Marine Corps, according to information received here today.

Boyd is with the 10th Marines in the fleet force at San Diego, Calif. and Bradford is stationed with Marine detachment aboard the cruiser U. S. S. Pensacola at Long Beach, Calif.

Both Boyd and Bradford were graduated from Seminole High School in the class of '34 and joined the Marines shortly after their graduation.

Two Killed And 2 Wounded In G-Men Battle

Al Brady, Notorious Gangster And One Of Mob, Are Slain; G-Man Is Wounded

Traced To Maine From Middlewest

Gang Which Has Long Terrorized Indiana Finally Wiped Out

BANGOR, Maine, Oct. 12.—(AP)—G-Men wiped out the notorious Indiana gunman and gangster, Al Brady, and one of his mobsmen today in a sensational five-minute gunfight on Bangor's busiest downtown street. A third gangster was superficially wounded, threw down his gun and surrendered.

One federal agent was wounded. The dead: Al Brady, 35, wanted for three slayings and several robberies.

Clarence Shaffer, a Junior Brady mobman, was wounded: James Dalhousie Brady, a mobman, whose head was grazed by a bullet.

The name of the wounded federal agent and the seriousness of his injuries were not made known immediately.

The gangsters who long have terrorized the Midwest with their forays upon tanks and their armed bravado against officers of law, had been traced to Bangor by Department of Justice agents working with Indiana State police.

Brady and his two companions went early to a sporting goods store to buy ammunition. The G-Men, the exact number not immediately disclosed, stationed themselves on the opposite side of the street.

When Brady, Shaffer, and Dalhousie walked out of the store toward their car, the government men opened fire. The gangsters, whipped, sought cover, dodging behind posts and parked cars. They blazed away in a return fire that for the most part was wild for the G-Men, carefully deployed, made poor targets.

Additional advancements were made when Mr. Morris promoted Ernest Southward and Henry Tamm to the rank of Junior Assistant Scoutmaster and Eugene Harrison and Kent Rossetter, Jr. to the rank of patrol leader.
