INCOME TAX DAY

The first installment of the income is due today, and by midnight your Uncle Sam should be the richer by a half billion dollars. Regularly thereafter, at quarterly periods, equal sums will be paid on personal incomes and profits.

A great army of more than 7,000,000 wage-earners are walking up to Uncle Sam's windows to pay their assessed share towards the expenses of government. That is more than one in every six of all gainfully employed persons more than ten years of age.

Millions more are exempted from making a report to the government by law. Single men with a net income, after lawful deductions of less than \$1,000 and married men with a net income, after deductions, of less than \$2,000 are not required to go through the formality.

That the government's revenue is depleted by evasions, however, has been repeatedly stated on high authority, even by the Secretary of the Treasury, and energetic efforts have been put forth to round up the "clackers."

of men impossible. Without health it was realized that no work could be done, no great enterprise accomplished. Hence, mosquitoes, discovered to be the main cause of sickness, were eliminated from the canal zone—and all the world knows what was accomplished—the construction of a great waterway, not only linking two great oceans, but shortening the distance between widely separated shipping points, bringing great benefits to commerce and transportation.

The other subject of the Atlantic National Bank has in view in this mosquito extermination matter, and that is making Florida a better place to live in—for home people as well as for its visitors, the latter bringing annually into the state and spending around \$20,000,000.

In making Florida more fit to live in, by mosquito elimination, Florida people have less reason to go away from the state in summer time, to escape the mosquito pest; also, people from other states and other countries, soon as they learn that Florida is rid of mosquitoes, or reasonably so, will come here in summer as well as in winter—and enjoy themselves, finding out that Florida is just as much a summer resort as it is a winter playground—with the mosquito banished.

ENCOURAGING THE BEEF AND DAIRY INDUSTRY IN FLORIDA

An interesting and important announcement is made by the Florida Development Board to the effect that the development of the beef and dairy cattle industries in tick-free counties in Florida will be given wide publicity through a series of articles by William Jackson, assistant live stock editor, U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry, who has recently visited Gadsden, Palmetto, Broward and Dade counties, by request of the Florida Development Board.

His articles on Gadsden county will feature the increase in price received for beef cattle as soon as the government authorized interstate movement to open markets; and the cattle feeding operations by the tobacco growers in that county to get high class fertilizer for their extensive production of fine quality shade tobacco.

He will correct the misapprehension existing in some minds that cattle have to be acclimated in Florida before they can attain their normal condition, by quoting official records. The pure bred Guernsey Glenwood Fairfax, 4899, made official record in three and one-half year old class at Herndon, Virginia, of 6,245.5 pounds of milk containing 308.0 pounds butterfat.

The White Belt Dairy at Lemon City has two world champions in that breed; Gem of Columbia 2038 produced 14,173 pounds of milk containing 559,108 pounds of butter in a year; and Ferndell 1961, produced 13,477 pounds of milk containing 685.64 lbs. of butter.

Marcus A. Milam of Miami has a herd of pure bred Jerseys containing ten cows which have made the Register of Merit class; and one bull which has seven Register of Merit daughters to his credit.

The value of the milk and dairy products sold by the 70 dairies in Dade county during the year ending June 30, 1922, has been itemized by County Agent J. S. Rainey, as totaling \$706,227.00.

PRESIDENT'S BOAT TRIP MAY PROVE A BLESSING

Because of the continual grounding of the Pioneer, the boat in which the presidential party has been slowly dragging down the east coast thru the near-canal, there may arise a sentiment that the waterway must be transformed into a real means of transportation; and the state may well feel ashamed over the language President Harding is presumed to have used on route.

For years the reputed canal has been something over which a land-lubber from the centre of the state could utter words of praise. But never a word from a navigator is favorable. Boats drawing thirty inches have frequently worked several days to turn about and "set sail" for Jacksonville.

It is needless to say that such boat-owners would long hesitate to attempt the trip again. Then there would be a sudden spasm among the men higher up, and a few resolutions would be resolved, each man voting for the adoption working with his fingers crossed.

Prominent state officials have been firm believers in the inability of the owners of the canal to ever carry out the terms of the contract under which millions of acres of Florida soil were obtained as subsidies. Data given by the owners, or their representatives, have shown that the proposition has always been a losing game; but these same men have never shown data telling of the immense sums received through the sale of this vast acreage.

It is possible that the next legislature, even those members who were elected as railway representatives, and even as railway attorneys, may be too ashamed to disobey their masters and will vote to retain the east coast canal in the same position as it now occupies in spite of the embarrassment of having a houseboat carrying the presidential party and the golf playing contingent, blocked at frequent intervals and the passengers being forced to either get out and push the boat off a bar or to go ashore for a few qualifying rounds at lawn billiards.

The contractors are not inviting to the visitors from the north who endeavor to enjoy the state by boat. Only the very wealthy or those traveling with extremely small craft ever make a second trip. It is apparent that the only way by which the waterway may be made inviting is to have government ownership—or state ownership; and the sooner steps are taken looking to that end the better it will be for Florida.

Red Cross Symbol

The Red Cross symbol is exclusively reserved for sanitary formations conveying wounded soldiers or sailors and for the institutions engaged in the treatment of such cases by a hospital in France in 1914 and since that time. The directors of French Red Cross societies, noticing that various pharmacists and laborers' first aid stations had put up the Red Cross sign, decided to demand the removal of all such emblems where unauthorized. As a result the courts are busy prosecuting the various drug stores, which refuse to take down the sign, alleging that it is perfectly justified because in reality they are first aid stations. However, a decree has been issued stating that the law of 1913 must be observed.

Columbus With a Spy-Glass

The medieval painter who in a picture of the crucifixion of Christ represented a Roman soldier armed with a blunderbuss must have a descendant in the British post office department. According to an indignant writer in the "Bulletin de la Societe Astronomique de France," the English government for its possession of Saint Kitts or Saint Christopher, one of the West India Islands, has provided a stamp showing Christopher Columbus surveying the horizon through a spy-glass.

To Determine Displacement

An apparatus by which the amount of water displaced by a vessel can be found at any time by means of a water tube or gauge installed in the center of a vessel has been invented by the French shipping engineer M. Augereau, and was on exhibition at the French national colonial exposition at Marseilles. It is said to be simple, practical and comparatively inexpensive as to installation. By this means an accurate indication of the weight of cargo aboard ship can be secured at any given moment.

South Africa's Corn Crop

The estimated production of corn in South Africa, as announced by the Department of Agriculture of the government, has been revised to approximately 34,135,714 bushels, instead of 35,454,300 bushels as formerly reported. With an estimated domestic consumption of 35,000,000 bushels, based on a five-year average between 1911 and 1919, the present season's output, together with the small carry-over stocks of last year, will just about meet the domestic demand, leaving no surplus for export.
