

Cards Nip Orlando, 7-6, For 5th Win In Six Tilts

Sanford Scores Six Runs In 8th; Locals Play In Orlando Tonight

Stealing a page from the New York Yankee book, the Sanford Cardinals used one big inning again last night to defeat the Orlando Senators, 7-6, in the Memorial Stadium before 679 spectators. Sanford liquidated a 5-1 Orlando lead with a devastating six-run outburst in the home half of the eighth.

The victory kept Sanford's pennant wheels rolling, marking the fifth success in the last six outings for the locals. It also brought the Redbirds' overall season record back to the .500 mark, having amassed 42 triumphs against the same number of losses.

Instead of his normal third base position for tomorrow night's engagement.

The huge 240-pounder bashed his first homer of the season in Cocoa Tuesday night. Last year he drilled 25 for Sanford to pace the State Loop. The total ranked second high in the history of the league.

Manager J. C. Dunn has assigned the flinging duties to rookie Jim Flannigan for tonight's Tinker Field fray. Just last Sunday the recent Albany, Ga., rookie transfer made a sparkling debut by handoffing Leeburg on two hits to pace Sanford to a 4-2 victory.

Flannigan has a string of seven consecutive shutout innings going, having blanked the Lakers through the third to ninth. In an incident concurrent with this scintillating feat, seven straight hitless frames, Flannigan will have to go some to equal the longest individual string of scoreless innings racked up by Ernie Palmer of 19 in a row.

As the Cardinal baseball machine slowly gathers momentum, Sanford stands sixth only one-half game behind the fifth ranking Senators. A victory this evening would elevate Sanford into fifth place within easy striking distance of the first division.

28,605 See Cards Play In 37 Games

Despite the recent Sanford Cardinal slump at the gate, this year's Redbirds have still maintained a better average than regulars of the last two seasons. In the first 37 games played in the Memorial Stadium, Sanford has attracted a total of 28,605 fans through the turnstiles.

Of this total, 24,388 have been paid, or exactly 5,100 more than paid their way into the old Municipal Stadium to see the Sanford Glens play their entire 1951 home schedule.

The average paid gate has been 658 as compared to last year's 691 and 1951's 597. As the present projected rate, Sanford will draw 45,500 paid fans this year, over 5,000 more than attended games of the Seminole Blues last season and 25,000 more than witnessed the Sanford Glens in 1951.

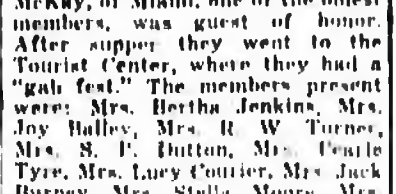

Sanford Takes Fifth Place On 7-3 Win Over Orlando

Cards Win 6th Of Last 7 Games; Lakeland Plays Here Tonight

Sanford's gentle hand of diamond stripplings has turned into a furious baseball machine, steam-rolling its way slowly over the opposition in the direction of first place and the second half pennant. The Cardinals made a successful one-night thrust into Orlando last night to flatten the sagging Senators, 7-3.

It was the third straight victory for the resurgent Cardinals, and fifth win in a row for Orlando. Sanford has now won six of its last seven games. Last night's win showed the Redbirds in fifth place — the highest position they have occupied so far in the second half.

With an 8-9 record, Sanford is a game-and-a-half out of the first division, 2 1/2 behind the third place DeLand Red Hats and 1 1/2 away from the promontory Daytona Beach Islanders.

Tonight, Sanford returns home to play Lakeland. Former manager of the Sanford Semite Blue — Chuck Aleno, will make his first appearance here since assuming the reins of the Pilots last month. Clarence Ingram will be Manager J. C. Dunn's choice to hurl for the locals.

Ingram will be seeking his 11th victory of the year after four unsuccessful bids this half. The 19-year-old right-hander from Albany, Ga., has a 10-9 mark this season, pitching brilliantly during the first half only to founder the second.

It will be Ladies Night this evening at the Memorial Stadium, and with the added curiosity of watching Chuck Aleno perform against Sanford, a large crowd is expected to jam its way into the park.

Lakeland, while only being tied for seventh place, brings to Sanford probably the best one-two punch in the Florida State League in the barrel-chested Al Pirtle and "Titanic" Chuck Aleno.

Last night rookie Jim Flannigan hurled seven innings, extending his scoreless inning streak to 10 before Orlando scored in the fourth. The fire-balling Flannigan from Atlanta, Ga., lasted seven complete innings to earn credit for his second straight victory of the season as against no losses.

In fact it was only the second appearance by the rangy Georgian. In those seven frames, he whiffed a pair and yielded nine passes, maintaining his bases-on-balls propensity. Old Fireman Harry Melis was called on for the second straight night to finish up. Melis has appeared in 24 games this year.

The Cardinals needed only eight hits, the same number Orlando garnered off the combined slants of Flannigan and Melis, to win. Manager J. C. Dunn was the booming hertha in the Cardinal assault, drilling across three runners on a pair of singles and his 21st double.

The daring Sanford pilot also swiped a pair of sacks to boost his theft total to 27 from 16. With Bill Batty copping his 23rd stolen base and Bill Samuels swiping his fourth of the season, Sanford now has 166 stolen bases. This is only 47 short of the FSL record of 213 set by Gainesville in 1937.

Outside of Dunn, all the hitting was done by the weak lower end of the batting order. Such jugglers as Tommy Leonard (.390), Bill Silverthorn (.330), Bill Batty (.307) and Bill Harris (.296) all scored for the call against Jack Loftis, who swiped the entire route for the losers.

Flannigan abetted his own cause with an eight-inning triple that followed Ben Benedict's first triple of the season. Benedict's 211 hitter, also smacked a single late in the game to drive in one run. Tony Barone (.252) and Bill Samuels (.255) both rapped singles.

Three sparkling double plays executed by the Sanford inner defense highlighted the snappy Cardinal play last night. CARD CAPERS: Tommy Leonard, currently batting Jack Card for the FSL batting lead, has been handicapped for the past several nights with a severe head and chest cold. Despite his aggravated condition, Leonard has played right on. However, the little North Carolinian's average has suffered. Leonard has gone zero-for-seven in his last two games, dropping from .383 to .377.

Senate, House OK Farm Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Both the Senate and House today passed and sent to President Eisenhower legislation setting up a multi-million dollar relief program for drought-stricken areas.

The legislation authorizes loans to farmers in regions declared to be "disaster areas," and permits special livestock loans above the \$2,500 limit the Federal Farm Administration now is authorized to make.

It also provides for special emergency assistance in furnishing feed and seed to the affected farmers and livestock growers. It is financed through a revolving fund of the Agriculture Department.

Dulles Puts Jap Security Force At Ten Divisions

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said today that the United States has been "thinking" of an "ultimate" Japanese security force of about 350,000 men or the equivalent of about ten divisions with supporting troops.

Dulles said in a statement that all decisions with respect to security forces "will of course be made by the Japanese government and people through their governmental process."

He pledged that once decisions are made the U. S. will be ready to help equip those forces.

Hudson Myers, retired auditor of the New York Times and president of the DeBary Civic Association, reviewed the growth of DeBary from a veritable "jungle" into a small, prosperous, expanding community of retired people at today's luncheon meeting of the Rotary Club in the Yacht Club.

"Today there are 266 residences and new people living in DeBary," he declared. "We have 21 business establishments and the net income of the retired families living on pensions and annuities is roughly between \$20,000 and \$30,000 every year."

"In 1919 there was only a fourth class post office with 100 boxes and a grocery store and a few small establishments. Today there are 506 houses and 21 businesses. Our civic club was organized with five charter members in 1950. The post office has 450 post boxes with a planned extension of 200 more."

He attributed the growth of DeBary to the fine facilities offered in Central Florida, the proximity to Sanford, and the intensive advertising campaign by New York publishers in New York newspapers.

"These realtors got in on the ground floor, purchasing this land cheaply, by increasing emphasis on retirement and pensions was also capitalized on by these realtors," he concluded.

Mr. Myers predicted even greater growth for DeBary and Central Florida in general. He thanked the Sanford merchants who have a center now being constructed. Program chairman Elton Moughton Jr. introduced Mr. Myers. B. L. Perkins Jr., president over the meeting.

More Attacks On Polio Planned With Gamma Globulin As Weapon

Further attacks on infantile paralysis with gamma globulin as a national weapon were planned today after history's largest mass anti-polio inoculation went off like clockwork in two New York state counties during the week end.

In police districts Stuyvesant and Chelsea counties, 31,900 youngsters received gamma globulin injections yesterday and Saturday in emergency clinics. About 2,000 volunteers in Montauk County, where officials said gamma globulin apparently nipped a threatened epidemic last week said they would give blood samples for the tests. The 2,000 would be made up of 1,000 children who got the injections and 1,000 who did not. The tests are planned to determine whether gamma globulin interferes with the body's normal ability to manufacture antibodies to resist polio.
