Philadelphia Train Crash Investigation To Begin

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — A team of federal inspectors will investigate "human factors" behind the collision Tuesday of four Philadelphia-bound commuter trains in which 443 passengers were injured, 12 seriously. The rush-hour collision stated when a Conrail train, traveling at 30 mph, slammed into a train waiting for a third train to pass at a disabled car into Philadelphia's Suburban Station.

Education Bill Now Law

Press Conference Spells Out Issues

The public has been deprived of little information under President Carter's decision to hold frequent televised press conferences with the Washington news people.
The wide range of questions the president fielded recently left little time for response in depth — even if he were so inclined.
But the 30-minute session — the first in 10 weeks — did provide a sharp picture of the issues that concern the press, and the press reflects the concerns of the American people.
Not surprisingly, inflation continues to dominate the list of problems that trouble the nation. As the cost-of-living advances steadily at a rate hovering at 10 percent or more annually, the president chose to defend administration policies. He cited labor-management contracts within his guidelines as evidence that restraints are taking hold. He expressed confidence that the decision of the Federal Reserve Board to boost its interest rate to a record 12 percent would prove effective.
But the president also conceded that some factors contributing to the price spiral are beyond his control.
And that focused on another priority national concern — the cost of energy and the uncertainty of energy sources.
Without the series of price increases initiated by the Organization of Petroleum Countries, the president said, inflation would be escalating at a rate no higher than last year or the year before — presumably acceptable levels.
Facing challenges to his renomination within his own party and a stiff contest from a Republican contender later next year, the president's chances for a second term rest heavily on an improved economic outlook.
He looks forward to the political tests, he told reporters at the press conference "with anticipation and confidence." We must assume that he is equally confident about the economy.
But the people expect more detailed reasons that he was able to offer within the limitations of his meeting with the press.

Protesters Wrong

The actions of the demonstrators at Seabrook protesting the construction of the nuclear plant near the small New Hampshire community are clearly in violation of trespass and vandalism laws.
In their attempt to seize the plant, they have torn down chain-link fences, disrupted the flow of traffic and stormed the gates of the Seabrook plant, itself.
The demonstrators have done all this at no little expense to public coffers, which have paid for state police and national guard troops.
This confrontation over the weekend and on Columbus Day resulted in several injuries — mostly to the protesters. Several were arrested and others were treated for eye and skin irritation from Mace and tear gas.
The anti-Seabrook demonstrations have been going on for five years but this is the first time that the groups opposing nuclear power plants have attempted to seize one of them. And at least one leader of the Coalition for Direct Action marks the action as a milestone, "a new approach."
Since the beginning, about 1,000 persons have been arrested for law violations that took place during demonstrations.
These plants are needed to carry this nation through this century. Those who oppose nuclear energy certainly have a right to protest, but they should keep their actions within the parameters of the law.

The death of a 12-year-old Longwood child Friday after his bicycle was hit by a car on his way to Teague Middle School heightened concern this week about the safety of school children in the community. Mayor June Lormann of Longwood said Monday night at the weekly city

commission meeting that she would try to set up a meeting between city officials and the county commission in an effort to expedite construction of sidewalks along County Road 427 for students walking to Lyman High School and Milwee Middle School.

The Seminole County School Board has agreed to pay for construction of the sidewalk in front of Lyman High School and Milwee and the city hopes to enlist the cooperation of the county in building the walkway between the two schools. "Let's get it done," said

Mrs. Lormann, "the city should build sidewalks from the existing one south to Lyman." Commissioner Ray Leibensperger suggested property owners should be asked to participate in paying for the sidewalks as they would increase the value of their property.

"If the county did it for us," said Commissioner William Mitchell, referring to the sidewalk built by Altamonte Springs with a federal grant from that city to Milwee Middle School along County Road 427. City Administrator David Chacey has

estimated the cost for the sidewalks would be \$2 a foot if the city does the work. "It will be in house how long will it take?" asked Leibensperger. "Let's get someone from the outside." —JANE CASSELLBERRY

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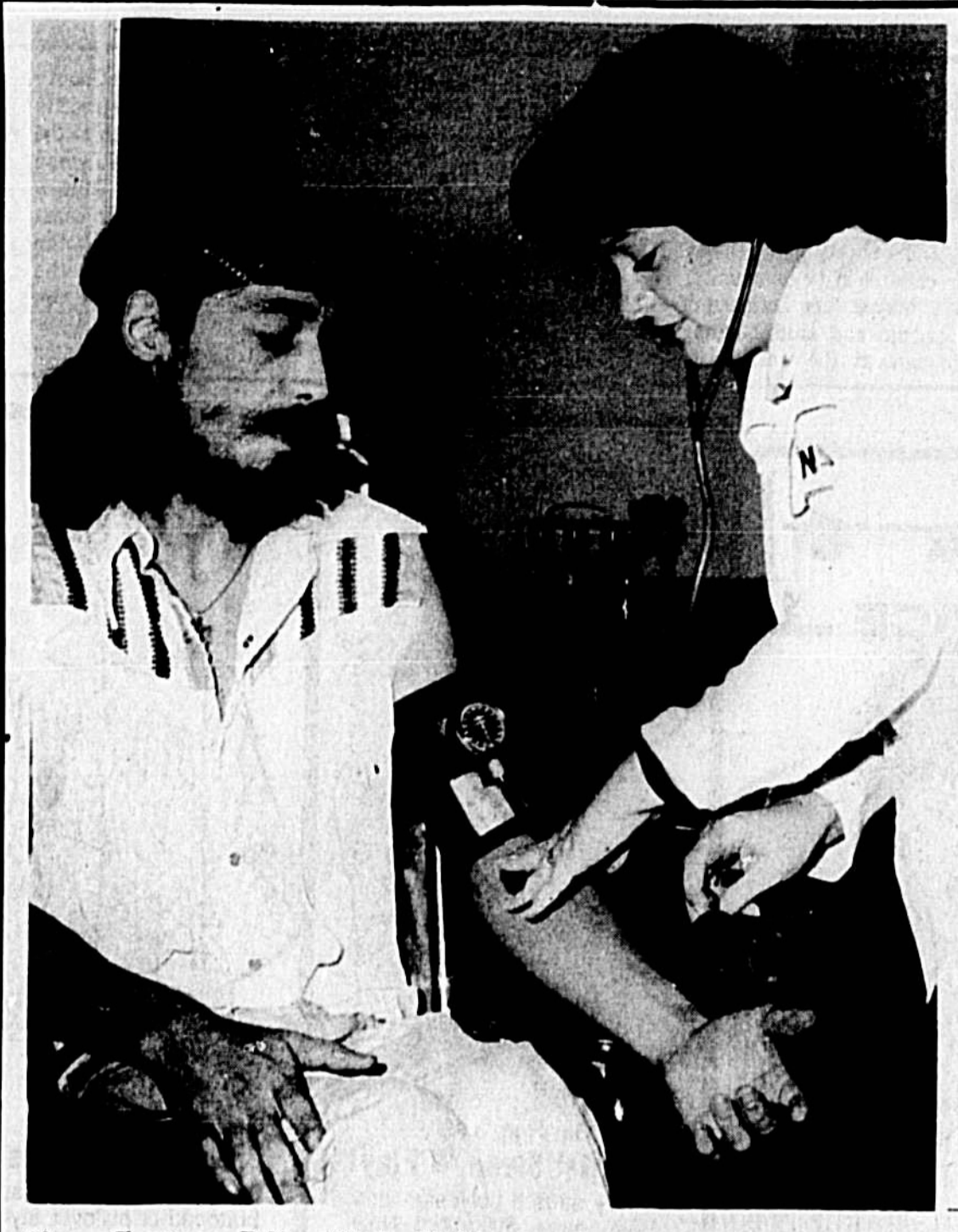

Hilltribe Refugees Dying Of Disease And Malnutrition

"BAN WINAI, Thailand (UPI)—Swollen eyes streaming with tears, the Laotian hilltribe woman squatted before the fire, fanning smoke into her face.
"She thinks the tears will wash away the sores," explained an interpreter at Ban Winai refugee camp, 350 miles north of Bangkok.
"She says she tried the doctor's medicine but it stung, so she has gone back to the traditional cure, smoke."
One of the three doctors at the camp, Dr. Jacques Labeuue of Belgium, said the Meo woman's ailment could not help and could threaten her sight.
Labeuue said amidst beliefs and bad sanitary conditions have combined with the disease and malnutrition the Meo refugees brought with them out of Laos to create a serious health situation in the camp.
In the past month, Labeuue said, 35 hill tribe children and 12 adults in the camp died of a variety of diseases compounded by severe malnutrition. More than 43,000 Laotians are in the camp.
"Skin disease, malaria, pneumonia, severe diarrhea and very bad malnutrition—almost everyone has something and some have several problems at once," he said.
The hilltribe people, used to living their traditional, primitive lifestyle in isolated areas, find it difficult to adapt to cramped conditions of the camp and the changes in their customs that are required.
A Thai camp official said the Laotians use only makeshift outposts that overflow each time it rains.
The official said most of the hilltribe people also remain unconvinced they should boil

their drinking water.
A Finnish nurse, Vuokko Kukka, working for the World Vision relief organization said the refugees forced to flee from communist Laos still have not
"Only when the child was close to death did they bring him to us" given up their belief in traditional cures.
"They have their bark and root medicines and rites to appease the spirits. Most of it is worthless and some is positively harmful," she said.
The nurse, who has worked in the camp for more than two years, told of a Meo hilltribe boy who came down with a fever.
"They repeatedly doused the child with cold water to cool him off. But the treatment only

sent the fever higher," Miss Kukka said. "Only when the child was close to death did they bring him to us. He died in the hospital and then they blamed it on the doctors."
Doctors have been unable to do autopsies to discover the causes of the frequent deaths in the camp.
The Meos believe that if a corpse is cut up, the person will never be reborn, Miss Kukka said, so they refuse permission.
The inability of the doctors to speak the difficult Meo language has made it even more difficult to persuade the Meos to change their ways.
There also is a lack of adequate facilities. The three hospitals in the huge camp total fewer than 100 beds. When times are bad, the overflow patients lie on the floor between beds.
World Vision is increasing its medical staff at the camp and plans to have five doctors and three nurses there in the next few months.

Bicycling will be an important part of the Golden Age Olympics again this year and the quarter-mile bicycle race will kick-off competitive events on the opening day, Nov. 5.

"The talent gets better every year, but so does the competition," said Miss Knight. "So we feel we have to do everything we can to keep the highest edge."

"You see, volleyball is not controlled by a clock, it is by momentum, which is 90 percent mental discipline. A match is 2 of 3 games; 15 points, with at least a 2-point lead, being a game."

According to Miss Knight over 100 girls have taken part in the volleyball program at SHS in the last 4 years, and it is still growing with the addition of a 9th grade team at Crosson.

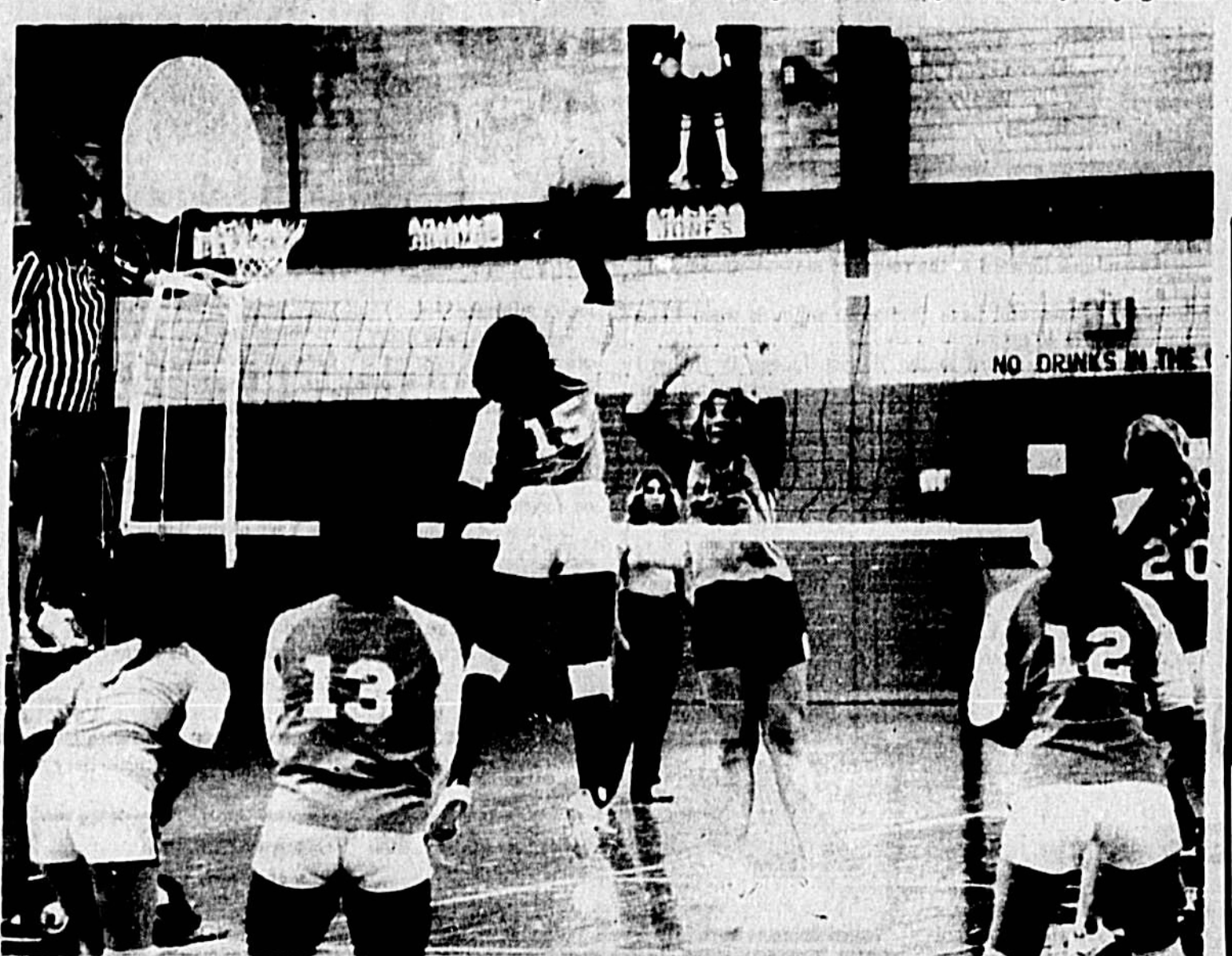
The main theme out philosophy is built around is as simple as the Golden Rule, said Miss Knight. "To treat others as you would like to be treated yourself."

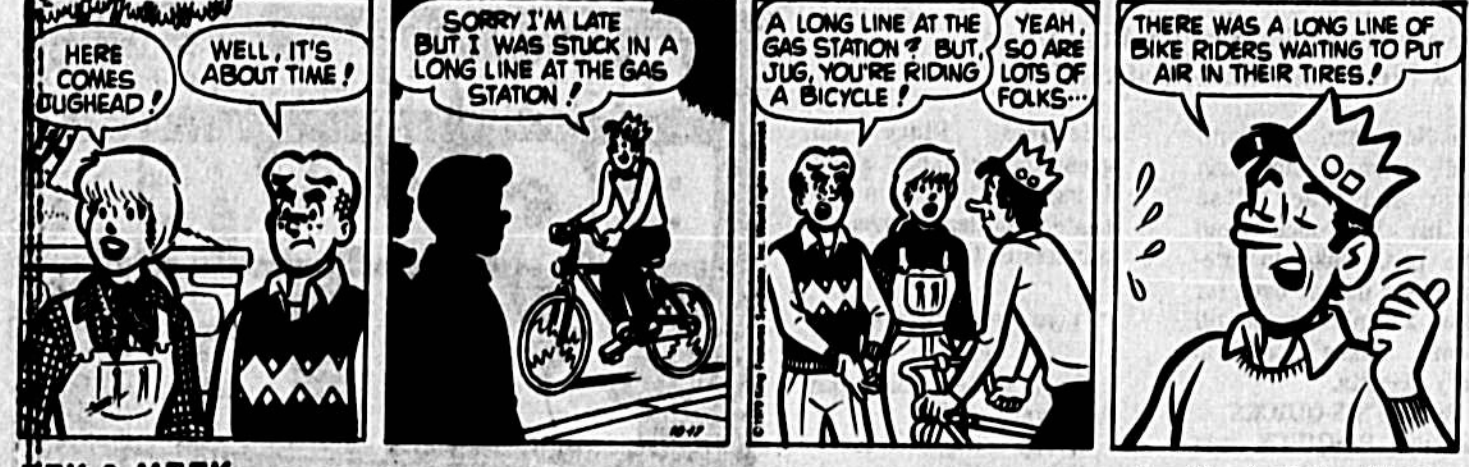

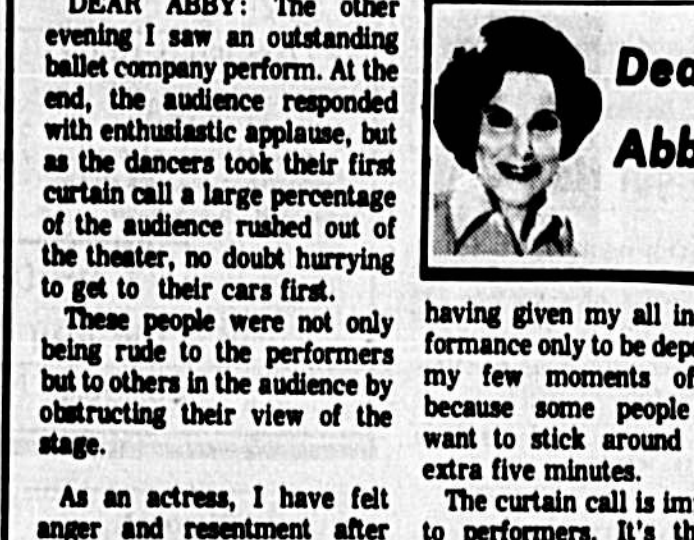

Goobers Not 'Nuts' But Jewels Of Gold

Peanuts are not nuts — that's right, "goobers", "ground nuts" or "monkey nuts", as peanuts are sometimes called belong to the legume family rather than the nut family. The name "peanut" probably came from its appearance and its texture.

Whether they are legumes or nuts does not matter to most folks as long as they can eat these little jewels of gold or the products produced from them. Have you ever known anyone who could eat just one and stop? There is a story about the peanut that says an American missionary introduced it to China in the province of Shantung in 1929. The missionary divided two quarts of peanuts between two Chinese and told them to replant the harvested peanuts each year for three years.

One farmer did that and his peanuts multiplied greatly, resulting later in Shantung becoming a famous peanut growing area.

The other farmer ate one of his peanuts and found them to be so good that he ate his entire crop. It's easy to understand how he couldn't stop after eating just one peanut.

Peanuts are a valuable source of nutritional goodness. They are noted mostly for their protein content. Nutritionally they are grouped with other high protein foods such as meat, poultry, fish and cheese. A wise consumer will take note of this and make use of peanuts and peanut butter in planning her meals. It's considerably cheaper than meat products and a tablespoon of peanut butter (costing about 16 cents) supplies the same protein as 2 ounces of lean cooked meat. Peanuts, for those of you on low cholesterol diets, are rich in polyunsaturated oil and contain no cholesterol.

Peanuts are one of the major field crops produced in Florida. Most Florida peanuts are grown in the panhandle portion of the state. Grouped together with Florida, Georgia and Alabama grow 61 percent of the peanuts grown in this country.

Approximately 3-3 of Florida's peanut crop is made into candies and processed products such as peanut butter and peanut oil. Most of the remaining 1-3 is used for seed production.

To add a nutritional punch to snacks try one of these kitchen tested cookie recipes from the Florida Department of Agriculture. Both of these tasty treats are made with peanut butter.

Cool the sauce before adding beaten egg yolks, or the mixture will curdle.
