



## Dorsett Stars As SPORT REVIEW Baby Gators Beat Tigers Of Clemson

Forward Passing Features Spectacular Freshmen Victory

ORLANDO, Nov. 12.—The first half of Milton Dorsett, Miami Dorsett forward passed the Baby Gators of the University of Florida, a spectacular 23 to 14, in victory over the Clemson Freshmen here yesterday afternoon before a capacity gallery of 10,000 fans, to take a heating in two or three touchdowns from the unopposed onslaught of Clemson into the Baby Gators' domain. ## BANKERS GATHER TO URGE BUYING ON INSTALLMENT

### National Association Of Finance Bodies To Meet November 20

**NEW YORK.** Nov. 14.—(INS)—Continuing and stabilizing the prosperity of the automobile industry through sound installment selling and the extension of the installment plan into new fields and the problems arising therefrom will be the theme of the two days session of the National Association of Finance Companies to be held at the Hotel Roosevelt, November 20 and 21.

Bankers, automobile manufacturers and financial analysts will lead the discussions, which will cover the relationship between manufacturers, merchants, banks and the companies which finance installment sales of automobiles and other merchandise in the United States alone, according to C. Hanch of Chicago, general manager of the association, who maintains that the present banner year in motor car production is made possible by the wide distribution resulting from the finance companies. More than sixty per cent of the automobiles sold last year were marketed through extended payment plans, according to his estimate.

#### Saturation Point

"Foundations for present motor stock values were laid fourteen years ago," said Mr. Hanch. "Automobile production had reached its peak sales 'saturation point' previously deemed impossible. Banks of the country wanted some evidence that this comparatively new scheme was sound and could keep within bounds. The answer of the finance companies was the adoption of standard terms. These terms have nothing to do with rates charged but with the conditions under which the purchase money is advanced."

"Experience showed that the purchaser must have a substantial equity before the deal was made. This led to the requirement that one third of the purchase price of all new cars must be paid cash. The only other requirement was that the balance be taken up within a year in equal, monthly payments. These terms reduced us to a point which entirely satisfied the bankers, and put the finance companies in the preferred list among the banks best customers."

#### Consumer Credit

At the conference the discussion of the place of consumer credit in the world's economic system will be led by J. Gibson Jarvis, general manager of the United Dominion Trust, Limited of London. The general credit situation will be covered by George E. Roberts, vice-president of the National City Bank of New York, and a bankers' impressions of time selling will be given by O. F. Meredith, vice-president of the Foreman National Bank of Chicago.

Other speakers include Milan V. Ross, economic analyst, who will evaluate the extension of installment selling into new fields of merchandising; George M. Graham, president of the Willys Overland Co., who will discuss the relation of the manufacturer to the finance company; and Major E. V. (Mike) Eichenbacher, famous war hero in 25 air duels, who is expected to draw a parallel between motoring and aviation.

(Continued from page one) life boat number 13, after swimming for some time. There were 23 others in boat number 13, he said. While he swam about in the wreckage-filled sea, Quirino said he saw many people swimming near him.

O. L. Maxey, of Richmond, Va., a survivor on the Berlin, and other passengers also criticized the slowness of the crew in getting the open boats into the sea. They said it required two hours to lower four life boats.

If the first S. O. S. had been sent out the night before I believe there would have been no occasion for loss of life," said Maxey. "The steamer failed to hurry up the life boats and the whole thing moved without any precision."

The confusion and panic in the water after the three boats with their precious burdens of human life had been lost was heart rending to the passengers still on board the sinking ship.

But the passengers left behind had fears and dangers of their own to face for the ship began to roll and pitch fearfully. Before the last of the small boats were cleared away it was struck amidships by a tremendous wave which rolled it up over keel up.

The Vestris, was rugged and helpless, floated like the carcass of a huge dead whale while the passengers and women leaping in the water tried to climb up the slippery bottom to the keel. During the ship would sink at any minute they dived from the keel back into the water in an attempt to swim to the nearest boat or to hold themselves afloat with flotation and stream until the rescue fleet could arrive.

OPENING OF NEW  
BOSTON STATION  
TO BE BIG EVENT

**Terminal Costing Ten  
Million Dollars Is  
Completed In Year**

BOSTON, Nov. 12 (INS). Just a year to a day from the first definite announcement, the New North Station on the Boston and Maine railroad will be dedicated and formally opened to the New England public on the night of November 14. Elaborate exercises and a banquet in the vast waiting room of the station will be attended by the Governors of each of the five states which the B. and M. serves, and by the mayors of every city on the Boston and Maine line, or their representatives.

Several of the Governors have already accepted invitations to take part in the exercises in which officials of the New England council, other representative New England organizations and officials of connecting railroads, have been invited to join. In addition the old-time engineers of the road, passenger conductors and locomotive engineers of the longest service, have been invited to attend.

**Resources Displayed** A group of displays of New England resources and products from the states served by the Boston and Maine, will be opened to the public on the day of dedication. These displays, arranged in ornamental cases built into the walls of the east and west entrances, were assembled by the New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont and Massachusetts councils of the New England council.

The formal opening will take place just a year to a day since the first announcement of the plans of the Boston and Maine for a modern passenger station to supersede the old North station, and auxiliary projects embracing a \$10,000,000 development of the terminal.
