

Howington Hurls Sanford To 5-4 Win Over St. Augustine.

Willie Skeen Drives In Howington With Winning Run In Eighth Inning

Kane Of Saints Allows But Six Hits And Strikes Out Eight, But Walks Nine; Play Twin-Bill There Tonight

Behind Jodie Howington's clever pitching, the Sanford Seminoles bounced back into the win column at the expense of the St. Augustine Saints last night at Municipal Ball Park by a 5-4 score. With the exception of the eighth inning in which he allowed four of the eight hits he gave up, Howington hurled fine ball, striking out six men and walking nine.

Charley Kane, who was on the mound for the visitors, yielded only six hits and struck out eight, but he walked nine and did not receive the best of support from his mates.

Tonight Sanford will journey to St. Augustine for a double-header. Lefty Frank Hudson is scheduled to first for the Seminoles in the first game and Cleo Jeter in the second.

The Daytona Beach Islanders rallied to beat Gainesville last night and remain two games behind the pace-setting Seminoles.

Ray Goolbsy, recently obtained from Leesburg, was a continual source of trouble to Howington last night. The hard-hitting third sacker knocked out a pair of triples and a single to bat in three of St. Augustine's four runs.

Buddy Lake singled to open the second for the Saints and raced all the way around as Goolbsy powdered a long one over Al Nix's head in right field for his first triple. In the fourth, Lake doubled and Goolbsy again drove him home, this time with a single to left field.

Sanford managed to come back in their half of the fourth with three runs and tie up the game. Red Roberts drew a walk and Tater Marion got an infield hit on a pop count that eluded Kane. Nixon drove a ground-out down to second which Miller touched enabling Roberts to score and Marion to reach third. Tater scored as Howington rolled out to second.

In the sixth, Howington pulled out of a hole by the alignment of mariners. Pines opened with a hit. Buddy Lake drove a grounder down toward second which hit Goolbsy making him automatically out, but driving Lake his third hit of the game. Wherever we have gone during the past week we have been confronted with the same questions, "What's wrong with Sanford?" or "How do you account for Sanford's losing streak?" and similar queries. As far as we are concerned there is nothing radically wrong with the Seminoles except they've had some tough breaks and most of the lads are in a hitting slump. Other things, such as injuries, lost morale, and desertion have also played a part.

FDR Sets Up \$50,000,000 For Refugees

Group Would Approve To Purchase Food-stuffs For Those Rendered Destitute

U. S. Boats May Remove Children

House Would Approve If Belligerents Guaranteed Safety

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt set up the machinery to purchase and distribute \$50,000,000 worth of supplies for European refugees "who have been driven from their homes or otherwise rendered destitute by hostilities or invasion."

In an executive order the President designated Secretary of Agriculture Wallace to purchase agricultural supplies under the program and Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau to purchase other materials and supplies. The order will be turned over to the Red Cross for movement to Europe.

Legislation authorizing the use of American ships to bring children from Europe was passed by the House yesterday. The bill provides for the safe passage, was approved unanimously yesterday by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

It acted after President Roosevelt said at a press conference the United States had a deep desire to do all possible to remove children from Europe, but that it would be a big responsibility to take them to the United States without guarantee that they would be accepted.

The committee report says it is "the policy of the United States to accept such children as are brought to this country, and to provide for their care and education until they are able to return to their own countries or to be placed in other countries."

At hearings on the measure, witnesses after witnesses told the committee that there would be no trouble in placing refugees in private homes here. The committee report says that in general, President Roosevelt had in mind to get parents on the basis of letters or reports from the parents or other persons who would be able to take care of the children in their own homes, or in other countries.

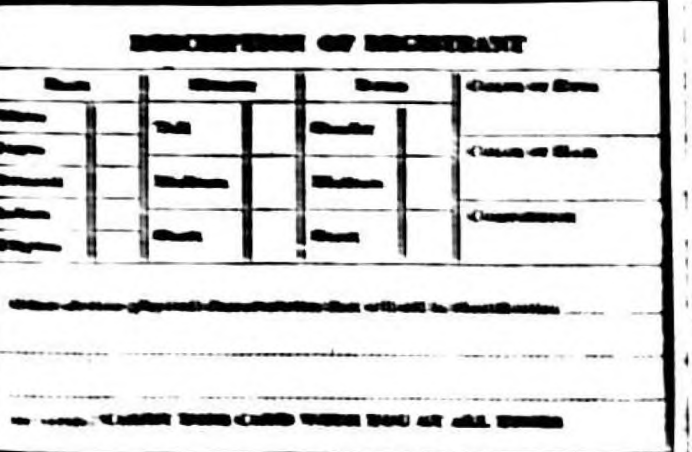
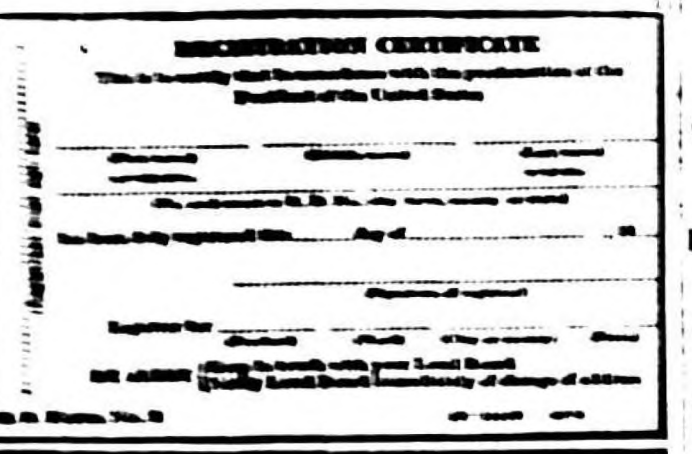

Teaching Men To Empire Maneuvers Not An Easy Task

OMAHA, Neb., July 27.—(AP)—The arduous task of schooling more than 150 officers for the gigantic job of umpiring the field maneuvers of the 7th corps army mobile units, beginning Aug. 11, near historic Camp Ripley, in Minnesota, is no pretty sight.

In charge of the recruits will be Lieut.-Col. Robert Mason, chief umpire, who will train all umpires for work during the maneuvers in a course of instruction at Little Falls, Minn., starting July 22.

The umpires, most of whom are graduates of service schools, take the place of bullets, shells and bombs and by the assessment of penalties against one side or the other, controls the action of the maneuver.

They are trained in reconnaissance, security, combat intelligence, liaison, coordination and control cover from air observation, and planned and organized defense against mechanized forces.

Training in field service and combined operation of the units participating rather than a test of higher commanders and their staffs in tactics and decision is the purpose of this maneuver.

Major-Gen. P. P. Bishop, commander of the 7th corps area, said the maneuver warfare, in army parlance, is known as a free maneuver. What will happen is not known in advance. This will change the battle situation marginally consequently the umpire's decision must be one that is fair and based upon its most expert knowledge.

The maneuver umpire—he has the last word. Even the "brass hats" soldier terms for commanding officers of high rank—can't talk back to him.

A complete communication net, entirely separate from that employed by the troops, using telephones, radio, airplanes and motor vehicles, will be organized for the use of the arbitrators in controlling the maneuver.

Colonel Mason's umpire force will be equipped with many flags. These flags will govern the action of troops and will be heeded and obeyed without delay or question.

A red flag means that the "red" troops have fire superiority and can advance in proper formation. A blue flag means the same for "blue" force. In night operations a red or blue flashlight is used.

NEW YORK, July 27.—(AP)—The question of the effect a compulsory military training law would have on professional baseball offers food for thought, not only on the part of the ball players themselves, but on the part of club owners who have full-grown money invested in these highly perishable pieces of merchandise.


