Nelson Eddy Reveals New Type Musical In "Let Freedom Ring"

Not since such memorable pictures of the past as "Grand Hotel" and "Dinner at Eight" has such a galaxy of stellar film performers been gathered together for one motion picture as that presented in the cast of the new Nelson Eddy starring vehicle, "Let Freedom Ring," a thrill-splattered drama of the romance and adventure in the western boom days of '50, which comes to the Ritz Theater Sunday.

With Eddy, fresh from his recent triumph in "Sweethearts," now cast as Steve Logan, a Robin Hood of the prairie who sings and fights his way through scenes of roaring excitement in the Ben Hecht drama, the lavishly cast production also features Virginia Bruce, last seen opposite Frederic March in "There Goes My Heart"; the redoubtable Victor McLaglen in "Gunga Din" and "Pacific Line"; fame; Lionel Barrymore in his first role since "Young Dr. Kildare"; Edward Arnold, who comes to the picture direct from his triumph in "Idiot's Delight"; and those two inimitable comedy stars, Guy Kibbee and Charles Butterworth. Also in important characterizations are H. B. Warner and Raymond Walburn.

The romance of the tale is handled by Miss Bruce as Margie Adams, typifying the courageous womanhood of the old West. McLaglen has a made-to-order part as Chris Mulligan, railroad section boss with a spike-splitting fist and a skull no bullet can dent. Barrymore's characterization as Eddy's father and

"Stagecoach" Is Unusual Story Of Early Westerners

Across a vast panorama of primitive splendor, several thousand feet above sea level under a burning sun, a solitary stagecoach careens and rocks behind six galloping horses. Every mile brings the coach and its odd assortment of passengers closer to a waiting band of murderous Apaches, led by Geronimo, fiercest of them all.

This is the tense and thrilling background of Walter Wanger's "stagecoach," a frontier drama of the 1850's when Indiana still roamed the sagbrush, which opens at the Ritz Theater next Friday, with Claire Trevor and John Wayne in the starring roles. Miss Trevor, appearing as Dallas, a girl of shady reputation who is a self-righteous group of women, and Wayne, impersonating Kid Ringe, another social outcast, are passengers on this coach. Among others in the coach group are a gambler of mysterious origin, a sordid doctor, a timid whisky drummer, a high-born lady about to have a baby, a pompous banker who has absconded with his bank's funds, the stagecoach driver.

The journey of the coach begins at Tonto, Arizona, with Lordburg, in New Mexico, its destination. The Lordburg set was erected inside a stage in order to obtain unusual lighting effects for the tense scenes having their climax at the end of the fabulous stage journey. Another spectacular set was erected for the scene showing the frantic dash of the stagecoach when Apache war signals are seen in the nearby hills. There is a river crossing ahead, where the stage driver plans to get fresh horses and additional ammunition. The coach winds through a mountain pass and dashes down a canyon to the river—but the relay station is in flames and its attendants have been murdered by Indians. It is shortly after this scene sweeps across the screen that the stagecoach is surrounded by the wild Apaches and the United States cavalry comes, to a thrilling rescue.

Portugal Studies Her Position in Europe's Affairs

LYBON, Feb. 25. —(P)—Portugal, busy for the last ten years putting her house in order, has begun again to look beyond her borders at the state of her neighbors' domiciles. She does not like, very much, what she sees. The nation was rescued from near-anarchy by the army coup d'etat of 1926 and then saved from bankruptcy in 1928 by the orthodox financial methods imposed by the army's choice for head of the Treasury, Dr. Antonio de Oliveira Salazar. So it has had little time since to think about anything else except its own internal reconstruction. Recent developments in Europe, however, are seen as threats to the domestic rehabilitation the Salazar regime seeks and so have drawn the nation's attention.

and his advisors have given thought. They realize that, as long as Great Britain remains mistress of the European sea, Portugal can not dispense with her ally. And moves have been made—many emanating from the British—toward the Portuguese to strengthen that alliance. A new British Institute in Portugal is busy fostering cultural understanding. A British-Portuguese military mission has just completed 10 months of liaison work. From the first, Salazar has envisaged the strengthening of Portuguese defenses; this year the record sum of \$51,000,000 credits (\$29,101,000), one-third the national budget, will go to the army and navy. Europe has been told, as firmly as Salazar and the nation can say it, that Portugal's African possessions are not to be touched. But uneasiness persists and Portugal, once again, has come to realize her destiny is inevitably linked with the destiny of Europe, although she occupies just one small corner of it. Faced with a cotton problem of its own, Egypt formed an advisory council of cabinet members, growers, merchants and spinners. Government farm economists predicted at the start of the year that 1939 would see improvement in the agricultural situation.
