

Nixon Strategy in War Outlined

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, under increasing congressional pressure for a quick start in some U.S. troop withdrawal from Vietnam, evidently has begun a campaign to convince the public such a move is inadvisable at this time.

Following demands for some sort of troop pullback from two leading Republican senators late last week, top administration officials spent the weekend explaining Nixon's position. In talks with reporters over the weekend, White House officials said the President has a carefully worked out strategy that he feels still shows signs of getting somewhere and would be disrupted by starting troop withdrawals now.

Nixon's argument against any immediate withdrawal rests primarily on these points, as outlined by the White House officials:

1. There has been some progress in bargaining with the Communists at the Paris Peace talks, although not in terms of moving toward agreement on ending the war.
2. Nixon is planning some new moves with respect to Vietnam which he will take when he considers the time is right.
3. South Vietnam has been gaining steadily in both military and political strength for months now and its capacity to assume more of the war later will allow Nixon to withdraw some U.S. troops in the months ahead if he chooses to do so. He has no deadline, however, for withdrawal.

Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird also outlined the administration's position for a cut back in the American fighting force in a Saturday news conference at Warrenton, Va.

He said if any of these three positions are met then a withdrawal could begin.

1. Agreement on mutual withdrawal of U.S. and North Vietnamese troops.

2. Sufficient improvement of South Vietnamese forces so they can take over a major part of the fighting.

3. The level of Viet Cong and North Vietnamese activity is "substantially reduced" in South Vietnam.

Until Saturday, Laird had always declined to discuss the conditions for troop withdrawal. But his outlining of the points plus the weekend sessions of the White House officials had with newsmen indicated Nixon was concerned with the public effect of the recent demands for a quick beginning of the troop withdrawal.

Sen. Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, the No. 2 Republican in the Senate, Friday called for the return home of a substantial block of U.S. troops as a means of inducing North Vietnam to begin serious bargaining in Paris.

A day earlier Sen. George Aiken of Vermont, top Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, had called on the Nixon administration to begin pulling forces out.

They have been other calls over the last several months for a troop cutback.

Unicameral Body Endorsed By Kirk

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Fearing his dispute with legislators, Republican Gov. Claude Kirk has issued a call for a one-house lawmaking body for Florida to promote efficiency and economy in state government.

Kirk couched the endorsement of a unicameral legislature with a call for a cutback in legislative salaries to \$6,000 a year.

His statement Saturday brought sharp responses from legislative leaders, who accuse him of playing politics and setting the stage for his campaign for re-election next year.

"In the absence of action by the Legislature, it becomes necessary to go to the people to secure these changes, then I will mount the stump every day in every corner of the state to put these items on the ballot for the people," Kirk said.

"While he's out stumping every day, I hope he spends a little bit of time being governor," responded Sen. E. J. President John Mathews, D-Jacksonville.

"The Legislature is already making great strides to improve government despite road blocks the governor has put in our path," said House Speaker Fred Schultz, D-Jacksonville. Schultz added, "He knows little about the Legislature."

Kirk made his declaration in an extraordinary Saturday news conference.

"With two separate houses, each dealing separately with each proposal, pinpointing the responsibility for legislation is difficult," the governor said in his call for a one-house body, "passing the buck is quite common."

He suggested a 100-member lawmaking body as a substitute for the present Legislature, contending it would be less expensive and, with the proper safeguards, more effective.

The governor stated legislative activity lags last month when he vetoed a bill raising the lawmakers annual salary from \$1,200 to \$12,000 a year. The veto was overridden.

Lease-Sale For Schools

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Legislation to allow school districts to enter into lease agreements for school buildings was introduced in both houses of the Legislature.

Rep. Robert Hartnett, D-Coral Gables, sponsor of the measure in the House, said it would save the districts money.

Private contractors would finance and construct the buildings—with plans approved by the Department of Education—and the school district then would enter into a lease-sale agreement.

"It costs less per year for a few years and gives quicker production of facilities when and where they are needed," Hartnett said.

The bill would reduce the need for a massive bonding program for capital construction, he said.

School \$5 Pondered

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The House Appropriations Committee has approved a \$26 million construction program for universities and junior colleges as part of a \$66 million building package.

Chairman Ralph Turlington, D-Gainesville, said the overall building program proposals were cut back by about \$14 million because construction bonds finally were sold for the universities and revised enrollment figures for public schools were announced.

The program includes \$16.2 million for state universities, \$7.8 million for junior colleges, about \$31 million for public schools, \$4 million for exceptional child education, \$4.3 million for state institutions and about \$1 million for the Capitol Center.

Including the \$66 million building program in the 1969-70 budget proposed by the House would mean about a \$2 million increase in funds, Turlington said.

They would be allowed a night away from the prison for visits with their wives. Originally the bill would have allowed the visits at special quarters in the prison.

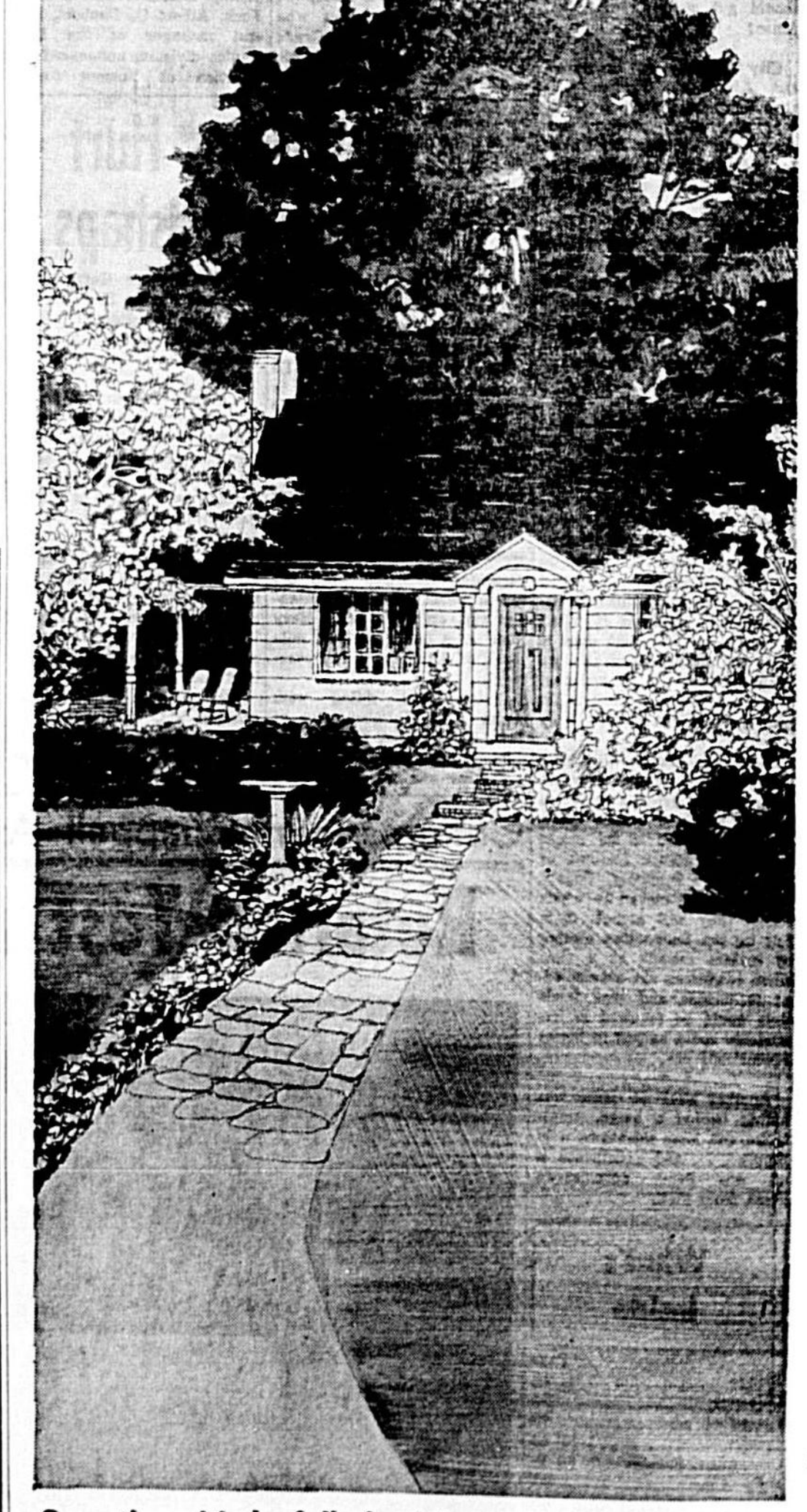

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. Command is withholding reports of damage to the H23 bombers are inflicting in their campaign along the Cambodian border, the heaviest of the Vietnam war.

About 100 of the big bombers have rained 112 million worth of bombs along the frontier in the past two weeks, but there has been no official announcement of any results.

"We have no bomb damage assessment to report," the U.S. briefing officer says each day. Informants said U.S. forces are constantly assessing the H23 strikes, but information officers for the U.S. Command have been instructed not to discuss damage to the money spent.

Some informants are skeptical, however. They said one reason for the withholding is that the U.S. Command fears an unfavorable public reaction to the skippy reports confirmable in gathering intelligence.

"We found some enemy bomb hits," said one officer, "at least four or five here and there."

But Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, commander of U.S. forces in Vietnam, and the Strategic Air Command commander, the US2A vital weapon in the war. Officers say the huge bombers harass enemy troops, deny them sanctuaries, keep them on the run and prevent them from getting organized for an offensive.

Everything Goes Speed Race Is On

NEW YORK (AP) — A jet plane reportedly capable of supersonic speeds and able to land on a strip the size of a tennis court roared over the Atlantic today headed for midtown Manhattan.

The jet is a Royal Air Force Vertical Take Off and Landing (VTOL) — Harrier being piloted by RAF Squadron Leader T. L. Lecky-Thompson.

It was scheduled to touch down on a small cleared area on the bank of the East River near 23rd Street around noon.

The craft is one of the contestants in the "everything goes" 1969 transatlantic air race between the top of London's Post Office Tower and the observation deck of New York's Empire State Building.

How you get there is not important — it can be by jet, balloon, elevator, ambulance, antique car, scheduled airliner, or hiking.

The Harrier jet can climb 10,000 feet in under 10 seconds and land on "postage stamp" size clearings. The world's first operational fixed-wing VTOL, it was designed for close support and reconnaissance duties.

Tanker planes were escorting the Harrier to refuel her in flight.

Already one of the contestants claims a flight record.

Lt. Paul Waterhouse piloted a Royal Navy Phantom jet across the Atlantic Sunday in 5 hours, 4 minutes and 25 seconds. When he landed in London, a Navy spokesman said it was the fastest transatlantic flight ever. His trips to and from the airport took another 20 minutes.

The race, sponsored by the London Daily Mail to mark the 50th anniversary of the first nonstop flight over the Atlantic, offers \$14,000 in prizes. It has drawn 399 entries in 21 categories.

Solons Given Medical Aid

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Free medical care—even "hang-over pills"—for lawmakers in Tallahassee is being provided by volunteer physicians.

"A day last from work by having to go to a doctor's office can be important to these people," said Dr. E. C. Haskell, who help start the Capital clinic on a voluntary basis in 1967. "This clinic helps increase work efficiency."

"If we save one life in 100 sessions by saving a doctor here it's worth it."

He said physicians who come from all over the state to take a turn in the clinic, are also learning about the legislative process because of their volunteer efforts.

"They see patients in the mornings and then sit in on committee meetings," he said. Doctors are usually making the clinic from 9-11 a.m. Haskell said. He said drug companies provide free medicine.

Qualified nurses are on hand the whole day, the doctor said. But their salaries are paid by the legislature.

House Speaker Fred Schubarz said Wednesday that the number of legislators needing medical attention is on the rise.

"We're not too far into the session yet," he told representatives, "and I want to caution you to take care of your health."

Many local fans will miss the 67' forward next year when the Raiders hit the floor, but I am sure the "Big F" feels the same about leaving.

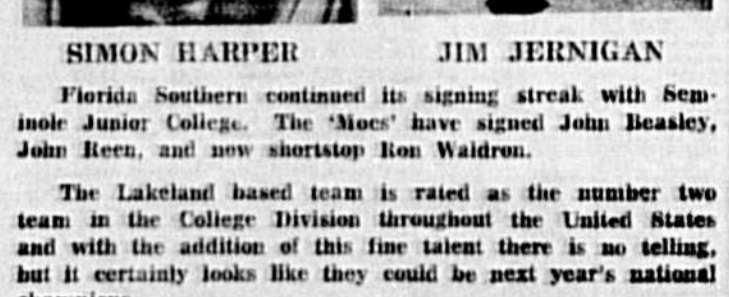

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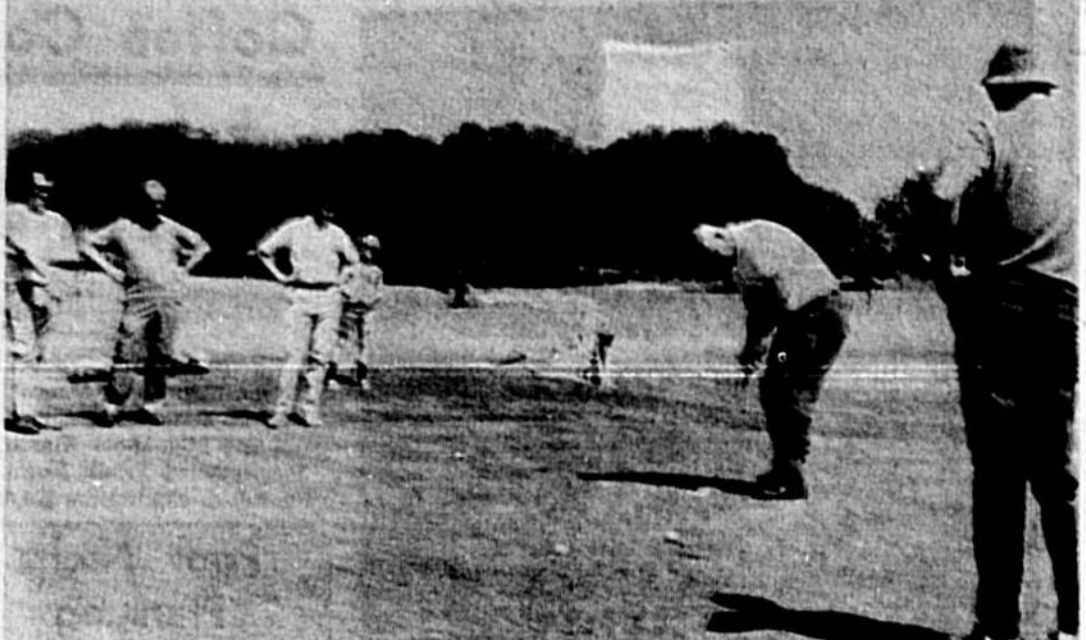

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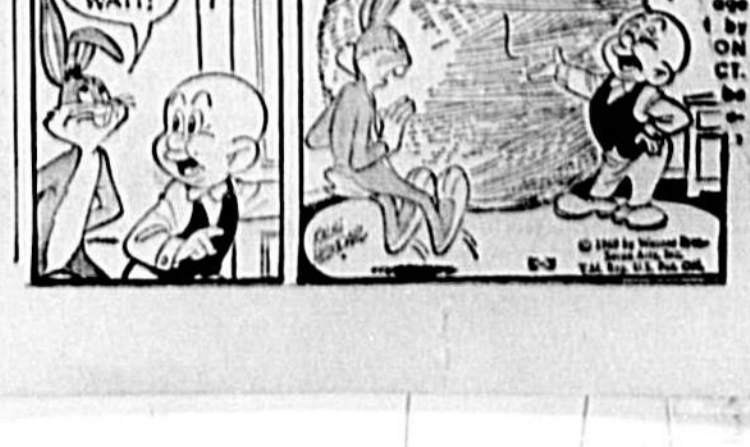
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
