

WRIGLEY WANTS CHICAGO CLUB TO WIN THIS SEASON

Pennant Would Satisfy \$6,000,000 Hobby, He Tells Reporters

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—William Wrigley, Jr., is a man with a \$6,000,000 hobby. Wrigley, who built one of America's fortunes on a stick of chewing gum, has perhaps the most expensive hobby in the world: he is baseball.

Six million dollars has William Wrigley, Jr. invested in this hobby through ownership of three baseball clubs—the Chicago Cubs, the Los Angeles Pacific Coast league club and the Reading International. Yet he admits he has never looked at a cent on his investment himself.

He wants just one return—a pennant. He'll next season by cheering his Cubs to a National league pennant. Not since 1914 porters of his dream for a team out with Rogers Hornsby in their lineup Wrigley visions the pennant all but won.

Positioning a business conference, Wrigley, a husky man with a perpetual overflow of enthusiasm, told the assembled press of his dream for a pennant, why he loves baseball, why he gets such a thrill out of it and why he thinks it is the greatest sport.

"I have approximately \$6,000,000 invested in baseball, but I wouldn't get out of it for \$90,000,000, because I love the game and because it supplies me with thrills every time I watch a game," he said.

"I have never received a cent for myself from baseball. I have received thrills that money cannot buy. And think of the fun of seeing other people get out of the game."

"My ambition, naturally, is to have the Cubs win the National league pennant next year. And I believe we have got the goods this time, having injuries to two or three of our best players."

"Let the critics condemn it if they want to. I believe he has been signed against more than he has signed. I think it is not only the greatest player in baseball—greater than Babe Ruth, the figures will show—but also that he is one of the cleanest men and one of the greatest characters in baseball. Rogers Hornsby wants only one thing—the pennant—that is, victory."

"I am almost a half million dollars in money and players to get Rogers, but he is worth it. Nothing can stop me from raising a baseball game that I can help. Last summer I turned down bank directors' offers to watch baseball games."

Wrigley likes fast games, but he would rather see a game end 4 to 3 than 1 to 0. "A pitcher's battle is a treat for some people," he said, "but personally I like to see them all that appear."

An owner of the Cubs, Wrigley likes to see in the background as much as possible.

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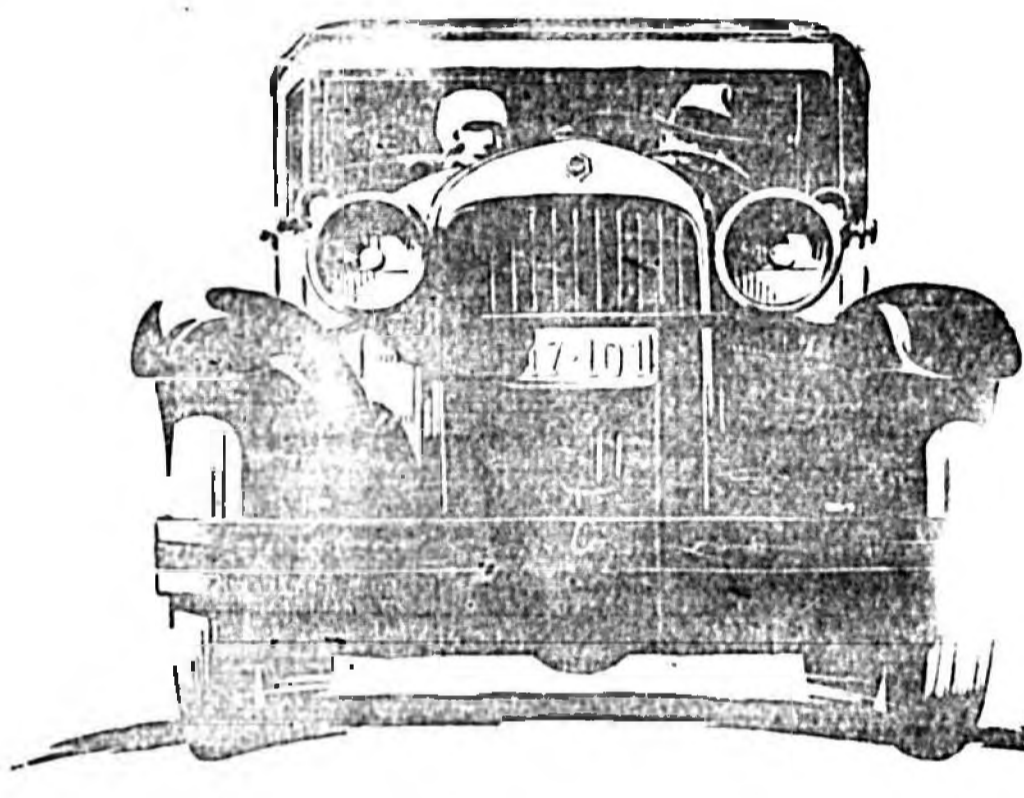

San Francisco, Dec. 23.—The United States Coast Guard has today declared that it is ready to sweep the Pacific seas clean of rum. The fleet of 100 patrol boats, which will be ready for duty by the first of the new year, will be the largest and most modern fleet of patrol boats ever built in this country.

Helpful Factor By Senator Borah

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Senator Borah, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, in charge of the Kellogg peace pact in the upper house, recently gave his view on the outlook for world peace and declared that he believed it would be a bright or brighter than it has been at any time in modern days.

Senator Borah looks on the Kellogg pact as a helpful factor in promoting the peace of the world. While he recognized that it does not have behind it physical force, he holds that it will be backed by a strong moral force.

Outlook Brighter Than Ever.
"The outlook is brighter for world peace, in my opinion," said Senator Borah today. "The masses of the people the world over are against war and in favor of peace."

The greatest factor in the vigilance of the people in the direction of preserving it. It seems to me the people are increasingly vigilant in that respect and I believe the outlook for world peace is a bright or brighter than it has been at any time in modern days.

"The cause of peace will advance in proportion as the people are vigilant in watching their representatives and diplomats who have to do with the making of peace or war."

Senator Borah in this connection discussed the prospects for the Kellogg pact and the cruiser bill. He believes the peace treaty will be taken up in open executive session January 3 and expects it to be considered, ahead of the naval cruiser bill. He does not believe the debate on the treaty will be unduly prolonged although there will be considerable discussion.

Opposes Navy Cruiser Bill.
Senator Borah, as is well known, is opposed to the naval cruiser bill and will vote to reduce the number of cruisers authorized by it. He has no hope, however, that the passage of the bill will be prevented if it comes to a vote. He believes it would contribute profoundly to the cause of limitation of armaments if the United States would decide not to add to its naval force at this time.

While Senator Borah did not indicate that he would engage in the filibuster against the naval bill, it is well understood that such filibuster is being organized among the progressive Republican group and among some of the Democrats of the Senate. They will try to prevent a vote on the cruiser bill.

New German Ships To Have Device For Landing Of Planes

LUBBECK, Germany, Dec. 26.—(INS)—A device enabling airplanes to leave or land on a regular passenger ship or merchant vessel has been developed by the German Lloyd Steamship Company, which plans to equip its new steamers "Ludwig" and "Erasmus" with air-planes, so that passengers who are in a hurry can get on shore without delay when it is still two days out.

He never imagined the American moving picture houses would find the success in them that has been reported to him and even now he does not believe that success will be permanent. He looks upon the stage and screen as two distinct worlds, neither of which can usurp the other's place in the amusement field. If the pictures continued to encroach upon the prerogatives of the stage, he said, the loss would be in Hollywood and not on the stage, for after the novelty of the new method had worn off the superiority of the stage, in the talking field would assert itself.

Dr. Reinhardt feels that the employment of sounds other than vocal can be of value, inasmuch as all people can understand. He sees in music a universal language which he will probably employ in his pictures.

"I see two dangers in talking pictures," he said. "One is that the films, which are universal in appeal and really international, can only tend to be destroyed as an international art through the addition of the limitation of language."

"The films have been an independent art. Great pictures have already been produced in Hollywood and elsewhere particularly in Russia, and they have proved that the film can stand on its own feet as an independent art. Talking pictures, by bringing to the screen stage plays without in their entirety, tend to make this independent art a subsidiary of the theater."

LONDON, Dec. 28.—(INS)—Basil Dean, acclaimed by many as Britain's leading theatrical producer, is leaving shortly for the United States, where he will direct a talking movie for an important American film corporation.

The subject will be John Galsworthy's "Escape," which played for months in packed houses in England but was more or less a failure in the United States this summer.

Dean, who until his breach with Sir Alfred Butt was responsible for many spectacular productions at the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane has had a diversified career, having been in turn analytical chemist, actor, manager, stage director and dramatic author.

His movie experience up to now has been confined to one film, "The Constant Nymph," in which he was associated with Adrian Brunel. The play of the same name was a tremendous success but the critics have been unkind to agree on the merit of the film. He recently visited the United States, Germany and France to gain a fuller knowledge of film production.

Dean was originally intended for the British Diplomatic Service. He made his first stage appearance in 1905 at Cheltenham. After a long career in repertory, he was appointed director of the Liverpool Cockroaches.

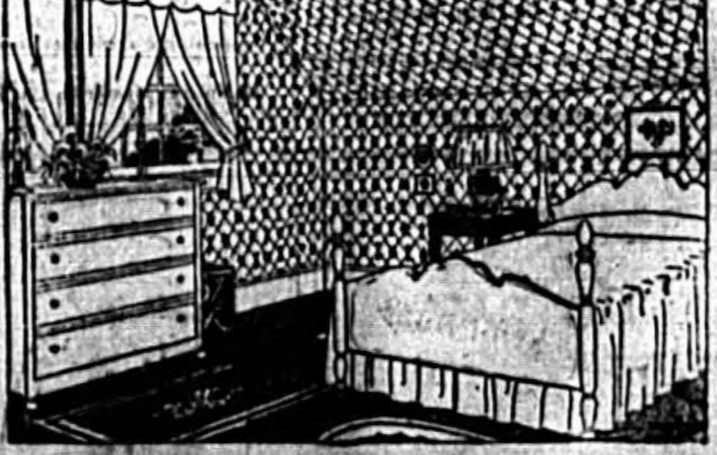

The Charm of the Attic Room

The regular diamond shapes are in a slightly darker tone than the background.

The bedroom furniture is composed of old pieces painted French blue to match the flowers in the design. The curtain and bedspread are of rose linen. On the dark stained floor, hooked rugs in blue and rose are scattered about and the lampshades of rose silk shed a soft glow over the room.

How much more sensible it is to utilize a room in this way. With a very small outlay, a bedroom can be created that will give the greatest joy to the lucky possessor.
