

WRIGLEY WANTS RICKARD THINKS CHICAGO CLUB TO SOUTH WILL BACK WIN THIS SEASON BIG GO IN MIAMI

Pennant Would Satisfy \$6,000,000 Hobby, He Tells Reporters

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—William Wrigley, Jr., is a man with a \$6,000,000 hobby.

Wrigley, who built one of America's fortunes on a stick of chewing gum, has perhaps the most expensive hobby in the world. It is baseball.

Six million dollars has William Wrigley, Jr., invested in his hobby through ownership of three baseball clubs—the Chicago Cubs, the Los Angeles Pacific Coast League club and the St. Louis Internationals. Yet he adds, "I have linked a cent to his investment himself."

He wants just one return—thrills and he hopes to get his biggest thrill next season by entering his Cubs to a national pennant. Not since 1914 porters of his dream for a year but with Rogers Hornsby in their lineup Wrigley visions the great all but won.

Postponing a business conference, Wrigley, a husky man with a perpetual overflow of enthusiasm, told the assembled reporters of his dreams for a pennant, why he loves baseball, why he gets such a thrill out of it and why he thinks it is the greatest sport.

"I have—approximately \$6,000,000 invested in baseball, but I wouldn't get out of it for \$60,000,000, because I love the game and because it supplies me with thrills every time I watch a game," he said. "While I have never received a cent for myself from baseball, I have received thrills that money cannot buy. And think of the fun it gives other people get out of the game."

"My ambition, naturally, is to have the Cubs win the National League pennant next year. And I believe we have got the goods this time, barring injuries to two or three of our best players."

"Let the critics condemn. If they want to, I believe he has been blamed against more than he has earned. I think Rogers is not only the greatest left fielder in the greater than Babe Ruth, the greatest pitcher, but also that he is one of the greatest characters in baseball. Rogers Hornsby wants only one thing in the diamond—that is victory—it cost me almost a half million dollars in money and players to get Rogers, but he is worth it."

"Nothing can stop me from raising a baseball game that I can help. Last summer I turned down bank directors' meetings to which baseball games."

Wrigley likes fast games, but would rather see a game end 4 to 3 than 10 to 8.

"A pitcher's battle is a treat for grown people," he said. "But personally I like to see them play that applies."

An owner of the Cubs, Wrigley likes to remain in the background as much as possible.

Coast Guard Declares It Is Ready To Sweep Pacific Seas Clean

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 28.—On the way for Uncle Sam's navy! The annual report of the federal radio commission, just submitted to congress, goes far to explain the importance attached to broadcasting during the recent campaign and the degree to which it is used in carrying messages of various kinds into the home. The report estimates that there are 12,000 stations in operation at present, serving 40,000,000 people. This total will be increased materially by day purchases of receiving sets. One-third of the national population is thus a potential listener. Only on rare occasions are the radio fans hooked up in one vast network, but many thousands sit down in their favorite stations.

The report outlines the division of the country into zones and the approximate population and number of square miles in each. The first four zones each contain from slightly less than 27,000,000 to more than 28,000,000 population. The area in square miles ranges from 129,110 for the first zone to 361,005 for the third and 658,160 for the fourth. The fifth zone has only 11,000,000 population, but covers an area of 1,774,000 square miles.

The commission is still confronted with a number of problems relating to equality of broadcasting rights. It provides, or at least makes possible, the report states, excellent radio reception on 80 per cent of the channels. One of the problems of federal supervision has been to determine the extent and character of the advertising permissible. The commission recognizes that the broadcasters must resort to some form of advertising to get revenue for the operation of their stations, on the other hand it is equally important that the advertising must not be of a nature such as to destroy or harm the benefit to which the public is entitled from the proper use of broadcasting channels.

After all this is the real "acid test." Florida has shipped over four million boxes of citrus fruit already this year—Sanford Herald. Florida already is well above the horizon. Nothing in the foregoing should be interpreted as indicating belief that another speculative boom is in prospect. Conservative business men, the banks, the newspapers and the Chamber, will discourage any attempt at speculation. They will encourage, however, legitimate development of land, business and industry, and wise investment therein.

A newspaperman by the name of McCready Huston has written a novel titled "Dear Senator," in pictures success in politics as requiring not nearly so much of ability to win the voting public as of another and darker ability to keep in with the "right people." These "right people" are men behind the political scene, the wire pullers, the masters of the plot, the political dealers for war—politics is a cold and constant game.

The principal figure in McCready's novel is a young man of fine calibre, generous impulses, courage, taste. In the political processes which lead him from a law practice in a small town to a place in the United States senate, all of these qualities are destroyed piece by piece with the compromises and associations involved, and the hour of his political triumph becomes the hour of his final spiritual degradation.

It is a discouraging, disheartening story to those who are still naive enough to believe that there is distinction and nobility in the service of the public through political office. McCready leads his readers to the conclusion that those who would be public men whose talents are enlisted exclusively for great causes or services are merest callous in competition with the scoundrel-calibrated men whose wits are trained in the business of cunning, of counter-maneuvering, bargaining, tricking, trading. It is the lynx and not the lion that succeeds in politics, if the author of "Dear Senator" is right.

And of course he is absolutely right, insofar as he pictures the political conditions which have prevailed in many states and communities in the past. If there is any hope of error in his unhappy book that hope lies in the future. Born Called Helpful Factor By Administrator Of Idaho

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Senator Borah, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, is in charge of the Kellogg peace plan in the upper house, recently gave his view on the outlook for world peace and declared that no man he could see they were bright.

Senator Borah looks on the peace plan as a useful factor in efforts to promote the peace of the world. While he recognises that it does not have behind it physical force, he holds that it will be backed by a strong moral force.

Outlook Brighter Than Ever

"The outlook is brighter for world peace, in my opinion," said Senator Borah to-day. "The masses of the people the world over are against war and in favor of peace."

The greatest factor, however, is the vigilance of the people in the direction of preserving it. It seems to me the people are increasingly vigilant in that respect and I believe the outcome, for world peace, is as bright or brighter than it has been at any time in modern days.

The cause of peace will advance just in proportion as the peoples are vigilant in watching their representatives and diplomats who have to do with the making of peace or war."

Senator Borah in this connection discussed the prospects for the Kellogg, post and the cruiser bill. He believes the coast trail will be taken up in open executive session January 3 and expects it to be considered, along with the naval cruiser bill. He does not believe the debate on the treaty will be unduly prolonged, although there will be considerable discussion.

Opposes Navy Cruiser Bill

Senator Borah, as is well known, is opposed to the naval cruiser bill and will vote to reduce the number of cruisers authorised by it. He has no hope, however, that the passage of the bill will be prevented if it comes to a vote, as he believes it would contribute profoundly to the cause of limitation of armaments if the United States would decide not to add to its naval force at this time.

While Senator Borah did not indicate that he would engage in filibustering against the naval bill, he well understood that such maneuver is being organised among the progressive Republican group and among some of the Democrats of the Senate. They will try to prevent a vote on the cruiser bill.
