### E. F. Housholder Is Elected State Senator

Unofficial Returns  
Give Attorney 4513  
While R. B. Chapman  
Polls 3642 Total

Leonard Gets  
Majority Vote  
Minority Vote

Hagan And Brady To  
Run Off In Second  
Primary Election

E. P. Housholder was  
elected senator of the 39th  
senatorial district yesterday  
to succeed J. J. Parrish by  
a majority of 840 in this  
county over his opponent,

Ralph Chapman. Incomplete  
returns from Brevard coun-

ty also indicated that Hous-

holder was the winner there.

Complete unofficial returns in

Seminole County gave Housholder

4513 and Chapman 3642, while

Hagan and one precinct

in Melbourne still missing gave

Hagan 1777 votes and Chap-

man 1745.

The total vote in the dis-

trict showed Housholder had

4513 and Chapman 3642.

John G. Leonard was re-nominated to the State Legislature with a majority over his two opponents,

George H. Townsend, 11,000; George H.

Warren, 5,850; and W. A. South-

Holland, 3,800. Another election

of 10,000 was declared, the

total being 24,750.

Leonard carried the two

city precincts, along with

1,100 votes to Leonard.

He also carried every precinct in

the county except Ocoee.

Leonard's total vote in the

district was 10,000 and H.

Chapman's 4,600.

Mr. Leonard carried Sanford

by 1,604 votes to 600 for South

and 611 for Brady. Mr. Brady

carried his home precinct of Long-

wood by 1,022 to 96 for Leonard

and 12 for South. He also carried

Goldsboro, Forrest City, and Bear

Lake while Mr. Leonard carried

Wynona, Magnolia, and Clancy

and the Van Roy 4.
