TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Vigorous opposition to the proposed federal sugar control plan limiting cane sugar production in Florida to 60,000 tons annually was voiced yesterday by the State Internal Improvement Board.

One Signature Is Needed To Fix Up "Lost" Legislation

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Only the signature of President Truman G. Futch of the Florida Senate is now needed before the "lost" legislative resolution proposing consolidation of the offices of county tax assessors and collectors can be presented to voters for approval or rejection at the 1934 general election.

Peter Tomassello, Jr., speaker of the House of Representatives, yesterday signed the measure, which came to light in a legislative work room after having disappeared from the batch of approved bills.

When the Legislature adjourned in June, records showed the resolution had been passed by both branches, but had been signed by the presiding officers of neither.

Search Is Pushed For Kidnapers Of Young O'Connell

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The kidnapers of Lieut. John J. O'Connell Jr., and Nathan Bakowitz, Brooklyn real estate and book promoter, were hunted yesterday in two police searches that extended throughout the city's gangster haunts.

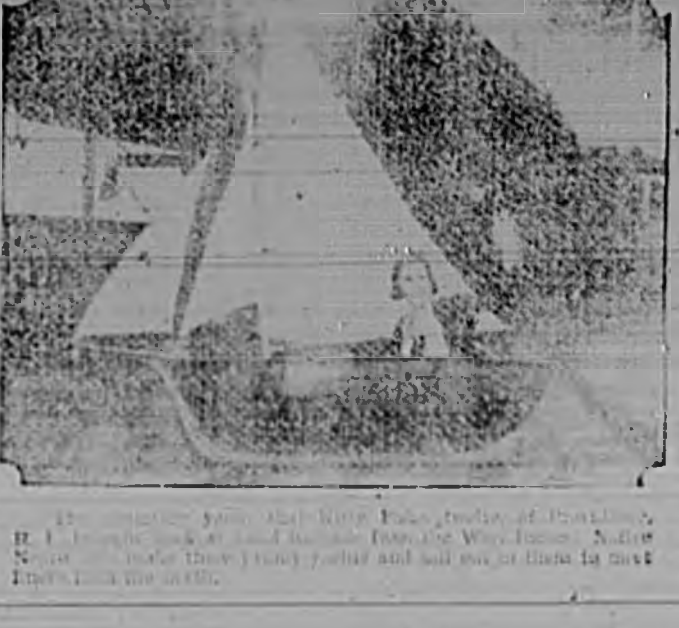

### GOVE CALLS UPON LEGISLATURE TO BACK MEASURES

#### Porto Rican Governor Seeks Economic Recovery For Island

SAN JUAN, P. R., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Governor Robert H. Gore inaugurated a month ago, called upon a special session of the Puerto Rican legislature yesterday to approve quickly a series of measures designed to bring economic recovery.

He urged the legislature to follow the example of the American Congress in its quick adoption of President Roosevelt's program, asserting that this hearty co-operation was leading to rapid recovery in the state.

Governor Gore recommended either amendments to or repeal of the workmen's compensation act so as to avoid recurring deficits, made up in the past by appropriations of taxpayers' funds.

Coverage of farm labor should be eliminated, he said, as present compensation premiums for farm labor amount to 8 per cent of farm operating expenses which he termed a "smothering tax" militating against general farm activities.

He advised adoption of a plan for payment of delinquent taxes over a five-year period, and recommended a reorganizing of municipalities under regional directors authorized to bring about economies through the abolishing of positions and the cutting down of less essential services. This was necessary, he said, to restore the confidence of taxpayers in the government.

To restore the Federal Farm Bank, Intermediate Credit Bank and Regional Agricultural Credit Corporation as sources of agricultural credit Governor Gore urged the necessity of amending island tax laws so that delinquent income taxes and government compensation premiums would not become first liens on property with prior rights over mortgages.

Taxes on beer and wine should be increased in view of the policy of the Federal Government not to tax beverages consumed in the island, he said.

Reduction of the legal interest rate from 12 to 8 per cent was necessary, Governor Gore told the legislature, if business and industry were to thrive.

He urged repeal of the law which now makes the operation of lot machines legal.

Appropriations of funds from the gasoline tax were asked for the following projects: \$100,000 for road maintenance; \$200,000 for the repair of public schools damaged by the hurricane last September; \$100,000 for the repair of other public buildings.

### Price Of School Books In Florida May Be Reduced

TALLAHASSEE, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The legislative committee investigating cost of school textbooks reported its findings here yesterday and members said they believed the price of books could be reduced.

Senator S. W. Geisen, chairman of the committee, said members, probably accompanied by Governor Sholtz and other state officials, would attend the meeting in Atlanta, Sept. 1 and 2, when representatives of nine southeastern states will discuss the possibility of adopting uniform textbooks.

The Atlanta meeting has been called by Gov. H. C. Blackwood of South Carolina.

Witnesses representing printing companies in St. Augustine, Gainesville and Jacksonville, appeared before the committee yesterday. They gave figures on printing costs of various types of books.

Under its present contract, Florida pays approximately \$300,000 annually for school books, Senator Walter P. Shelley, of Tallahassee, committee member, said. The contract was signed in 1922 for eight years.

Because of the heavy first day offerings, buyers could not get around to all of the tobacco and much of it was carried over for auctioning yesterday. This was particularly true at Tifton, Habersham, and several other markets.

The Douglas market was steady with offerings of approximately 200,000 pounds. The quality was some better there with domestic types commanding a better price. The market was somewhat weaker, however, on the lower grades, while a few fancy baskets were running in price from 14 to 20 cents a pound.

There was no change in the values of the leaf on the Vidalia market. Yesterday's estimated poundage was 40,000 with a low of 3 cents per pound and a high of 32 cents per pound, with an average of 11 cents.

### SPiRiT OF CALM IS SPREAD OVER COAL MINE AREA

#### Easier Atmosphere Is Pervading Whole Troubled District

BROWNSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Peace moves spread a spirit of calm over the troubled spots of Pennsylvania's strike-wracked soft coal fields yesterday.

An easier atmosphere pervaded the entire strike zone, where a walkout eight days ago of 25,000 men had spread to some 25,000 men-demanding recognition of the United Mine Workers of America.

Pickets congregated again in large numbers, and at Star Junction, where six strikers were shot and wounded in disorders Tuesday, nearly 1000 strike sympathizers taunted coal company police by snatching coal.

Machine guns, however, were set up by national guardsmen at four workings, scenes of the fighting Tuesday in which one striker was killed.

Hugh S. Johnson, recovery administrator, speaking at Harrisburg, pleaded for conferences between opposing factions in the strike and cited the federal rules and policies of President Roosevelt as a means of settling industrial disputes.

Governor Pinchot and Thomas Moore, president of the U. S. Frick Coke Company, near whose mines most of the disorders happened, arranged a conference.

The governor's agreement with union leaders, under which selected miners will serve as "union guides" to help keep peace, had a quieting effect.

Under the plan, more strict picketing rules were effective and demonstrators were barred from parading on private property without the owner's permission.

Approximately 11 mines of the Frick Company were closed after the company's decision to suspend operations until protection for its workers is guaranteed.

### NEW RULES TO GOVERN STOCK MART ADOPTED

(Continued From Page One) confirmed that they are sound and in the public interest.

The text of the new rules governing reports on pools and syndicates is as follows:

"The committee on business conduct shall require each member of the exchange and firm registered thereon to report, in form determined by said committee, all substantial pools, syndicates or joint accounts trading in specific securities listed on the exchange in which such member or firm has knowledge by reason of transactions executed by, or through such member or firm.

"The committee on business conduct may, in its discretion, disapprove of the connection of any such member or firm with any such pool, syndicate or joint account which it shall determine to be contrary to the best interests of the public.

"In accordance with this rule, the business conduct committee required an initial report on pools and joint accounts to be made on Monday as of the close of business yesterday, and weekly reports to be made on Fridays thereafter as of the close of business on Wednesday. No indication was given in the committee's rule as to what conditions might evoke the disapproval provided for in the exchange's new regulation.

Another rule requires members to report weekly "all options relating to securities listed on the exchange x x x in which they are directly or indirectly interested"

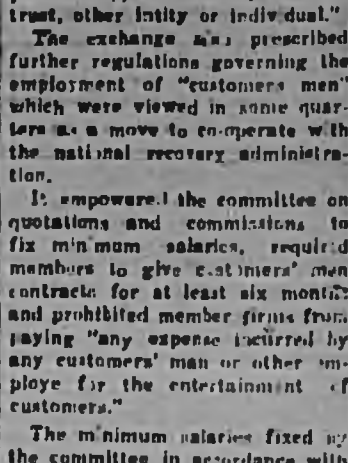
of which they are knowledge. Members are prohibited from lending money upon the security of stocks, bonds or other investment securities for the account of any non-banking corporation, partnership, association, business trust, other entity or individual.

The exchange also prescribed further regulations governing the employment of "customers men" which were viewed in some quarters as a move to co-operate with the national recovery administration.

# DOLLAR DECLINE ABROAD OFFERS STRANGE PUZZLE

## Exchange Margin Has Been Aiding Factor Rather Than Check

By GEORGE E. ANDERSON

NEW YORK.—It would be interesting to know, as a basis for sound reasoning upon the international position of the dollar, just what the volume of transactions in American exchange based upon actual transfer of funds has been necessary to force the American unit to a discount of more than 30 percent. These transactions cannot have been large as compared with normal years. The volume of foreign trade and the steadily narrowing margin between imports and exports of the United States cannot have afforded much of an exchange margin and what margin they have afforded was a supporting rather than a depressing influence.

The volume of the international security movement, as measured by business on world exchanges has not been very large and the movement of funds on this account in the last two years has been in this direction and there is no reason to believe it otherwise at the present time. Foreign withdrawals of foreign funds in this country must have been at a minimum for several reasons. In the first place, they have been reduced in the last three years to about so low a point as is consistent with the positive necessities of foreigners to carry on trade and meet maturities in this country. The general assumption has been that the transfers represent export of American capital, flight of capital from the dollar. Doubtless there has been a considerable volume of transactions along these lines and it is probable that the chief motive for the speculative transactions which have forced dollar exchange to so great a discount from this so far. Nevertheless, it is very doubtful that the movement of American capital out of the country has assumed or will assume serious proportions. That it has not been in great volume so far is indicated, whereas the far result of such a movement would be an increase in American bank balances abroad, it is understood that the latter, in fact, have not been increasing. So far as available goes, they have been decreasing. It is known that some American money has been going to the ill-fated British stocks and shares but the total volume, when measured to the terms of international movements, has not been large and much of it is known to have come from American funds previously placed abroad, largely upon the continent.

In short, the situation in Europe, even in countries of the gold bloc, is one of constant churning and shifting—certainly not one so stable as to invite capital seeking safety. Doubtless considerable capital has left the United States by various means as a part of the speculative movement. Doubtless also there has been a volume of exchange hedging or the fixing of exchange to cover actual commercial transactions which has served to bolster up the speculative movement. It would be futile to attempt any estimate of the possible net withdrawals of dollars from normal exchange channels in any such flight of capital as is supposed to have occurred, or of the amount of clandestine remittances in various forms, but an item-by-item review of practicable means of such remittances shows that transactions in exchange covering actual commodity or security transactions have given small support to the speculative movement against the dollar and the volume of speculative trading, which has been estimated at around \$500,000,000, rests almost entirely upon speculation, pure and simple.

This speculation is peculiar in the fact that it makes no allowance for the interplay of economic forces—imports and exports, the international movement of securities, the movement of short-term funds or otherwise. It is a political, not an economic, proposition. It operates solely in one direction, in opposition to known economic conditions, anticipating inflation or other action by the government in Washington, which will reduce the domestic value of the dollar, and basing this anticipation on the existence of governmental powers which may or may not be used. There has been no bear influence in the market save the natural strength of the dollar itself. Speculators have operated on a thin exchange market, with the result that the actual transactions have had far more influence upon the exchange rate than their volume has justified.

CHICAGO, July 30.—Alive with the whinnying of bronchos and pintos at their hitching posts, a grimy street swells with the rough-shod gaiety and six-gun sociability of the early West.

Dust clouds settling about the heads of the halted mounts bear testimony that claimstakers are seeking relief from the toil of their day, and, for all the noise and activity, it is a peaceful night in Gold Gulch.
