

## Tenants capitalizing on soft commercial real estate market

**With commercial vacancy rates in Central Florida high and showing no signs of improving any time soon, now is a great time to be a tenant.**

That is the observation of investors and business owners Paul A. Whiting, of Creative Office Environments in Altamonte Springs, who says the low demand gives him opportunities across the board for commercial real estate tenants.

"Today's commercial real estate tenants have more leverage than at any time in the last five to 10 years,"

and they are using that to compete to their advantage," says Whiting, whose 13-year-old company specializes in the moving and installation of office furniture and workstations for companies throughout the nation.

Whiting says there are many factors that are contributing to the lower rates — even beyond their long-term economic decline — in order to get the best deals from their landlords are now more competitive than ever before, period.

"This is now a buyer's market," Whiting adds. "They build the roads in a game of chicken and you can't afford to be a

monkey when a tenant will pay but only after the landlord agrees to sweeten the pot," Whiting adds. "It's not a blind, it's good business."

The higher vacancy rates coupled with record low mortgage interest rates also have fueled a buying spree by investors, according to Whiting who says it cheaper to own than it is to rent.

Interest rates are so low right now that commercial property is a great buy," Whiting notes. "It makes for better business sense to take your rents dollars and have it build equity in building ownership."

He cites his own situation as a

perfect example. Whiting is buying a little more than 10,000 square feet in the former Standard Deck off CR 427 in Altamonte Springs, Fla. 75,000 square feet would easily support a reasonable furniture and equipment investment.

"I'm buying it for \$100,000," he adds.

And while there are trends in the current market, there is also a downward shift in carrying capacity in investors' company.

Demand for new office furniture is slow down, and as a result, office manufacturers have scaled back production.

"The market is flooded with high quality furniture and work stations," he says. "Values are about 10 cents on the dollar until that used inventory is absorbed (12-18 months), demand for new furniture will continue to be low."

grouped as house-infesting

ants, yard-infesting ants,

and carpenter ants.

### Identification

Ants are related to bees and wasps. They are frequently confused with termites but they can be distinguished from termites by the strong constriction or "waist" between the thorax and the abdomen, and the two pairs of wings of which the front pair is much larger than the back pair. Termites have two pairs of wings approximately equal in size and do not have a constriction "waist."

### Florida Carpenter Ants

An large reddish-brown

insects with a black abdomen, about 1/4 to 1/2 inch long. They usually nest outdoors in stumps and logs where the wood contacts the soil and moisture is plentiful, but sometimes enter homes in search of food, water or nesting sites. Carpenter ants prefer to nest in wood that has been damaged by termite or decay.

These ants do not eat wood but in nests with termites bid excavate galleries in it to raise their young. They feed off honeydew from sucking insects and household food scraps, but do not damage sound wood to any extent. They eat the wood in the form of coarse sawdust. Carpenter ant galleries are kept smooth and clean. Other wood-infesting insects do not keep their galleries clean.

### Control

The best approach to ant control in the home is isolation. Any type of food or food particles can attract and provide food for ants; therefore, ante food in tight containers. The use of insecticides should never be substituted for cleaning and good housekeeping.

However, pesticides can serve as additional tools for use in ant control.

The key to the elimination of ants is locating and destroying or treating the nest with approved insecticides. Although most species of ants prefer nesting in certain locations, ants are highly adaptable. Outdoor nesting species may sometimes nest indoors, or indoor nesting species may nest outdoors. Find the ant nest by watching the movement of ants. Often children like to watch ants搬家 in very interesting ways.

Outdoors, ant nests can often be located by stems left on the ground, since ants deposit earth on the soil surface when they construct them. Red ants and several other species build conical mounds. Nests may also be constructed next to or under the house foundation, under walkways, in trees, shrubs, and bushes, in decaying logs or tree trunks, under stones, in crevices in walls, beneath rocks, or under the house. Often ant trails enter or leave through a crack but the nest may be some distance away. Some ants may also nest in water-damaged, decayed or rotting wood in the house.

Sprays, dusts, granules, and baits are useful in and around the home. Sprays and dusts include baseboards, door and window frames, around chimneys, cracks and crevices, around sinks and toilets, and between walls and flooring. Treat areas where ants appear to have trails and move sun or through the house. If the nest is located apply an insecticide to the nest. If the nest cannot be located pay particular attention to places where ants are gaining access to the house or room.

### Basic Acid Ant Bait

This type of bait can be purchased from a retail store or can be prepared at home by mixing 1 level teaspoon of boric acid in 2 1/2 fl. oz. of corn syrup or honey. Mix until boric acid dissolves completely, and let it cool. Dilute bait with an equal volume of water and place in areas where ants feed, or places in and near sets where ants have access. Bait is good for 2 weeks. Keep bait out of reach of children and pets.

### Precautions

All insecticides are poisons. Read the entire label, including the small print below, concerning the ingredients and read all directions and cautions on the insecticide. In their dry and liquid conditions and at reach of children, preferably under locks and keys.

Dispose of old insecticide materials and empty containers properly and safely.

state hospital system. "We are administering the vaccine to healthcare workers in an effort to be prepared, so they can effectively treat others when needed."

The Stage 2 group will be vaccinated shortly after completion of Stage 1 and will include first responders such as firefighters, law enforcement officers, and emergency medical crews. If the federal government deems necessary, Stage 3, which will include the voluntary vaccination of the general public, will begin in early 2004.

To prepare for the three stages of vaccinations, Seminole County selected a firm of professionals to oversee the three components of such a large-scale vaccination program by "education, outreach, and vaccination," according to Tracy.

"We are working with hospitals to educate them about the day, and the vaccination," said McCullum, public health preparedness planner.

Lee Devereaux, Seminole adds, "We want to make sure they are fully educated on the risks of the vaccine. They have to understand that it is solely voluntary and not an FDA approved drug."

Seminole County's health department is taking the lead and will utilize their sites to administer the vaccinations. For security reasons, the times and locations can not be disclosed.

It is important to note that the federal government does not believe that it enforces presents an imminent threat at this time.


