

Seminole prepares for smallpox vaccine

Health Department gets ready to take part in Operation Vaccinate Florida

SANFORD — The Seminole County Health Department is preparing to administer the smallpox vaccine as part of Operation Vaccinate Florida.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is taking over the role of the state health department in the administration of the vaccine. Under the plan, the CDC will be responsible for two phases of the program. The first phase involves the distribution of the vaccine to public health agencies, followed by phase two which involves the actual vaccination.

"Based on the information we are receiving after the Homeland Security Bill is finalized on Jan. 24, Seminole County will begin administering the vaccine immediately," said Dr. Jerome Vance Fairman, administrator of the Seminole County Health Department.

According to Rosemary Zagmond, managing director of the Seminole County Health Department, during Stage 1 of Operation Vaccinate Florida, all voluntary immunizations will be administered.

Operation Vaccinate Florida involves the voluntary administration of the vaccine to those at high risk.

"It is important that we have enough vaccine to cover the entire state if we do it correctly," said Dr. Vance Fairman. "We want to make sure there are no shortages as possible. As we're moving slow and cautious, it's a new endeavor and we

will be tracking the information by talking with the persons administering the vaccine."

The first phase will involve approximately 40 days and include training public health personnel and essential workers. During that time, the CDC will be providing the vaccine to those who are at high risk.

One of the things that the CDC recognizes is that there is a real concern about the danger of an intentional release as a biological weapon right now. But there is always that possibility," said Health Secretary Vance Fairman.

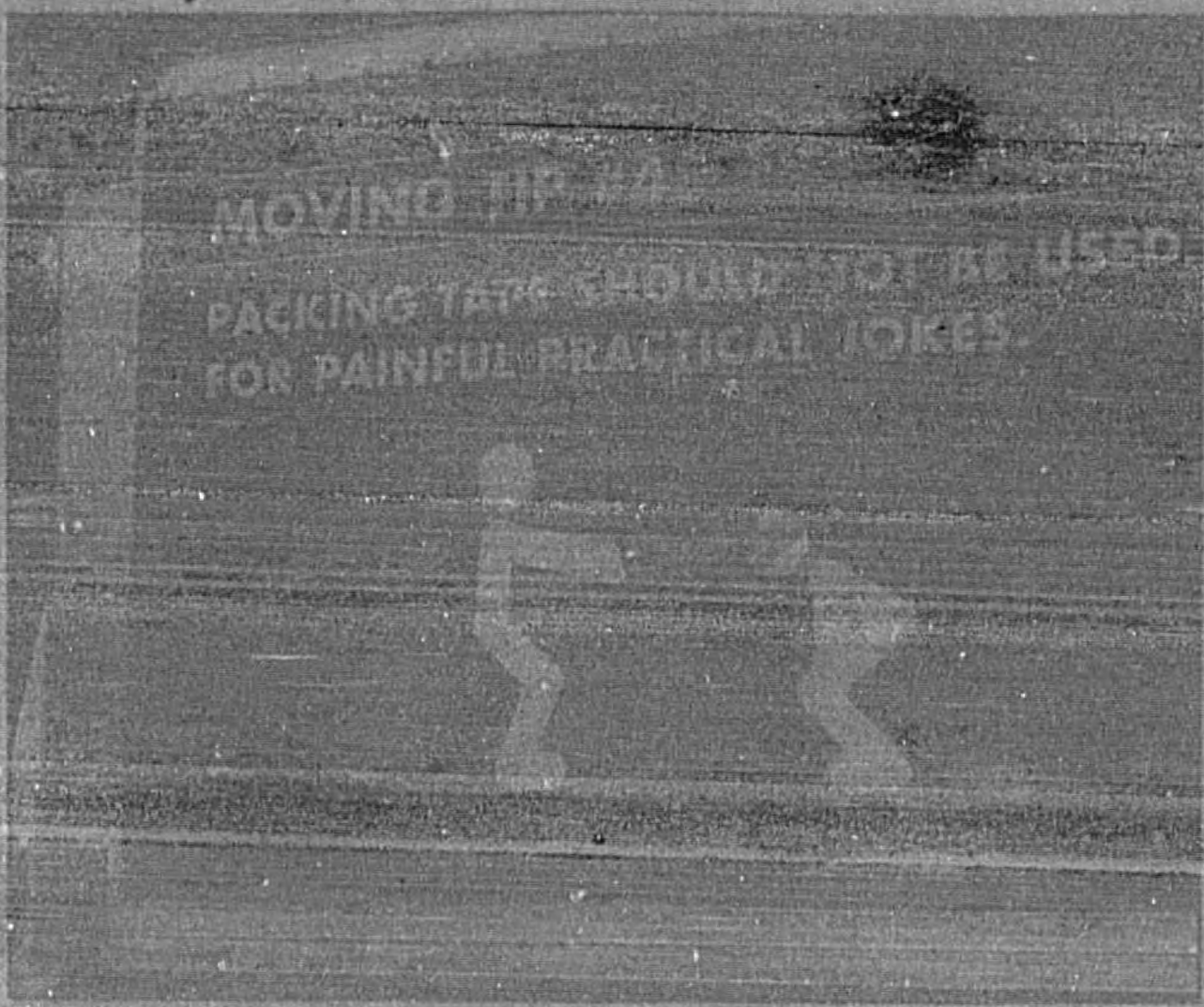

Tenants capitalizing on soft commercial real estate market

With commercial vacancy rates in Central Florida high and showing no signs of improving any time soon, now is a great time to be a tenant.

That is the observation of tenant and business owner Paul A. Whiting of Creative Office Environments in Altamonte Springs, who says the low financing rates offer a "greater opportunity to secure the lease for commercial real estate."

"Today's commercial real estate market has more leverage than at any time in the last five to 10 years

and they are using that leverage to their advantage," says Whiting, whose 13-year-old company specializes in the moving and installation of office furniture and workstations for company's throughout the area.

Whiting says that companies are aggressively negotiating their lease agreements — even beyond their lease expiration date — in order to get the best deals from their landlords. He notes that companies are now paying less for their space than they were a year ago.

"That is, there is now a tenant's market," Whiting adds. "They hold the cards in a game of commercial real estate and they are using it to

many cases a tenant will pay less only after the landlord agrees to increase the rent," Whiting adds. "It's not a bluff. It's good business."

The higher vacancy rates coupled with rental law changes, which also have helped a buying binge by tenants, according to Whiting, who says it cheaper to own than it is to rent.

"Interest rates are so low right now that commercial property is a great buy," Whiting notes. "It makes for better business sense to take your rental dollars and have it build equity in building ownership."

He cites his own situation as a

perfect example. Whiting is leasing a 16,000-sq-ft office space in the former industrial park at C.R. 427 in Altamonte Springs. His 75,000-sq-ft facility would easily support a comparable facility and a 200,000-sq-ft facility.

And while there is an upside in the current market, there is also a downside that is stirring an interest in Whiting's company. Demand for new office furniture is way down and, as a result, Business, Home and other high volume manufacturers have scaled back production.

"The market is flooded with used high quality furniture and work stations," he says. "Values are about 10 cents on the dollar (USD) that used inventory is absorbed (12-18 months), demand for new furniture will continue to be low."

Creative Office Environments is one of Central Florida's oldest business supplier companies serving the Greater Orlando area since 1980.

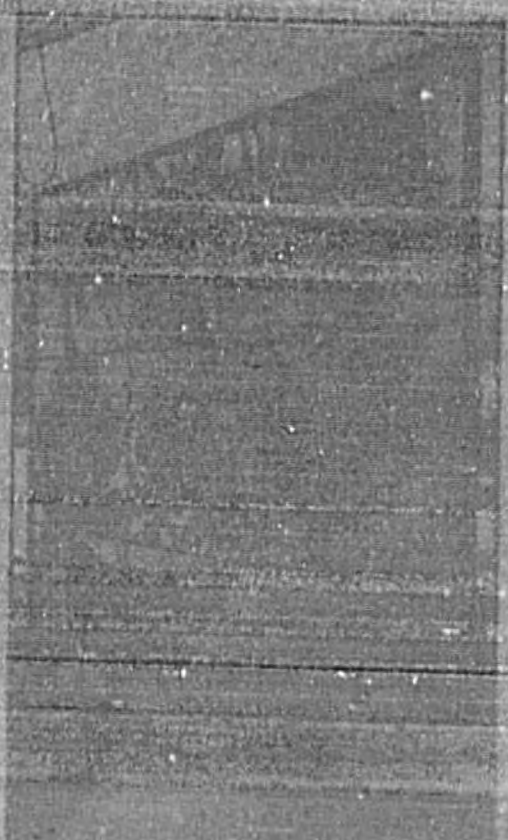

Ants: Central Florida pests can be controlled

Ants are pests around the home because they feed on and contaminate human foods, insect structures or build unsightly mounds in lawns. In some cases, ants are able to inflict painful bites or stings. Ants do not attack or eat fabrics, leather or wood in houses, however, some species can establish nests in decaying wood in structures. Several species of ants are found in or around houses in Florida.

In general, the most common ants in Florida can be grouped as house-infesting ants, yard-infesting ants, and carpenter ants.

Identification

Ants are related to bees and wasps. They are frequently confused with termites but they can be distinguished from termites by the stinging construction or "waist" between the thorax and the abdomen, and the two pairs of wings of which the front pair is much larger than the back pair. Termites have two pairs of wings approximately equal in size and do not have a constricted "waist."

Florida Carpenter Ants Are large reddish-brown

insects with a black abdomen, about 1/4 to 1/2 inch long. They usually nest outdoors in stumps and logs where the wood contacts the soil and moisture is plentiful, but sometimes enter homes in search of food, water or nesting sites.

Carpenter ants prefer to nest in wood that has been damaged by termites or decay.

These ants do not eat wood (as in termites with termites) but excavate galleries in it to eat their young. They feed on honeydew from sucking insects and household food scraps, but do not damage sound wood to any extent. They elect the wood in the form of coarse sawdust. Carpenter ant galleries are kept smooth and clean. Other wood infesting insects do not keep their galleries clean.

Control

The best approach to ant control in the home is exclusion. Any type of food or food particles can attract and provide food for ants, therefore, store food in tight containers. The use of insecticides should never be substituted for cleanliness and good housekeeping. However, insecticides can serve as additional aids for use in ant control.

The key to the elimination of ants is locating and destroying or treating the nest with approved insecticides.

Although most species of ants prefer nesting in certain locations, ants are highly adaptable. Outdoor nesting species may seek nesting sites indoors, or indoor nesting species may nest outdoors. Find the ant nest by watching the movement of ants. Often children like to watch ants and can be very helpful in locating their trails.

Outdoors, ant nests can often be located by seeing ants hills on the ground, some ants deposit earth on the soil surface when they excavate the nest, and ants will scatter other debris build conspicuous mounds. Nests may also be constructed next to or under the house. Such as, under sidewalk, under ways and porches or in decaying logs of tree trunks. However, ants may nest in walls behind a baseboard, or under the house. Often ants will enter or walk through a crack but the nest may be some distance away. Some ants may also nest in water-damaged, decayed or rotting wood in the house.

Spills, crumbs, granules and bits are useful in ant control. Areas to be treated should include baseboards, door and window frames, around chimney cracks and crevices, around sinks and toilets, and between walls and flooring. Treat areas where ants appear to have trails and move into or through the house. If the nest is located apply an insecticide to the nest. If the nest cannot be located pay particular attention to places where ants are gaining access to the house or room.

Boric Acid Ant Bait

This type of bait can be purchased from a retail store or can be prepared at home by mixing 1 level teaspoon of boric acid in 2 1/2 fl. oz. of corn syrup or honey. Feed until both ants die, soves completely, and let it cool. Dilute bait with an equal volume of water and with an eyedropper place in an 1/4" white ant bait, or place in small ticks where ants have access. Be sure to keep bait available for only two weeks. Keep bait in airtight out of reach of children and pets.

Precautions

All insecticides are poisons. Read the entire label, mentioning the most potent before opening the container and read all warnings and cautions. Avoid breathing in their dust and liquid. Avoid contact with food, feed and other products of human and animal life.

Dispose of all empty spray materials and empty containers properly and safely.

Fenton hospital liaison. "We are administering the vaccine to health-care workers in an effort to be prepared, so they can effectively treat others when needed."

The Stage 2 group will be vaccinated shortly after completion of Stage 1 and will include first responders such as firefighters, law enforcement officers and emergency medical crews. If the federal government deems necessary, Stage 3, which will include the voluntary vaccination of the general public, will begin in early 2003.

In preparation for the three stages of vaccination, Seminole County selected a firm to purchase and carry out the three components of each stage: education, administering the vaccination and monitoring of vaccination.

"We are working with health-care providers to educate them about the disease and the vaccination," said A.C. Gaudin, public health pre-epidemiologist.

Dr. David Fairburn adds, "We want to make sure they are fully educated of the risks of the vaccine. This law is intended that it is strictly voluntary and not an FDA approved drug."

In Seminole County, the health department is taking the lead and will utilize their sites to administer the vaccinations. For security reasons, the times and locations can not be disclosed.

It is important to note that the federal government does not intend that it will present an imminent threat at this time.

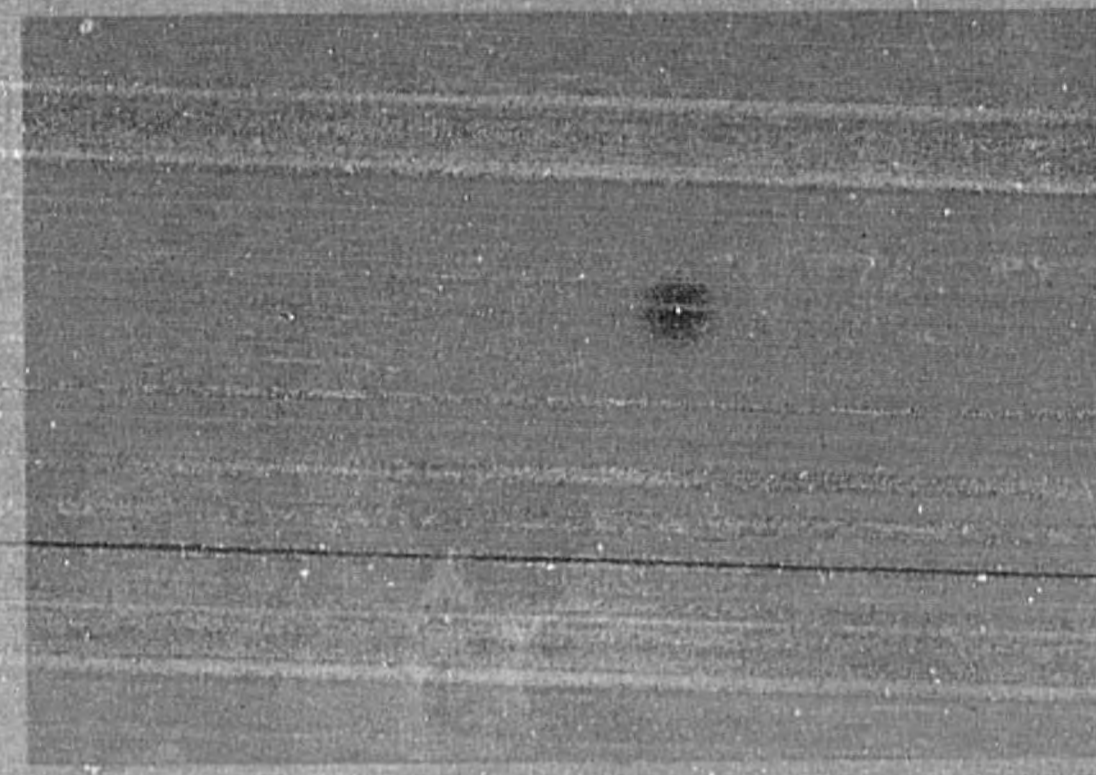

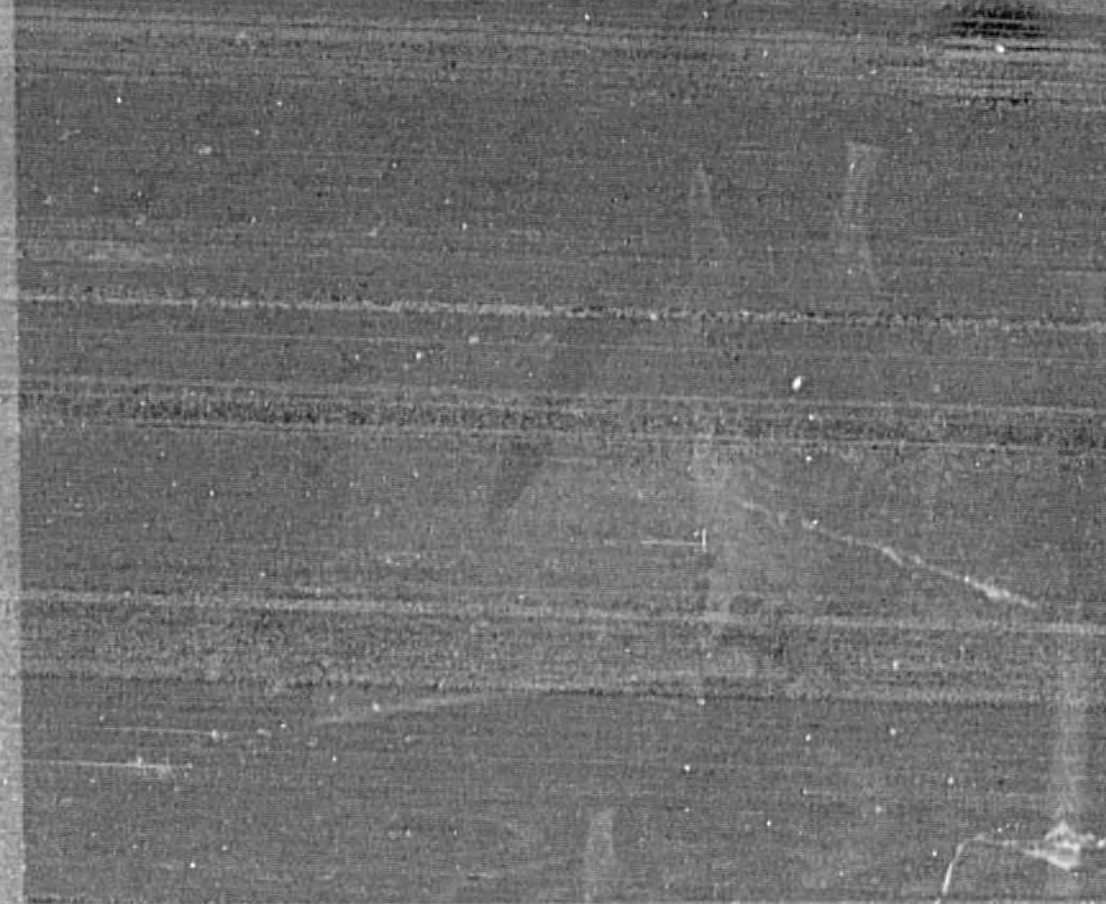
