# Dead, 250 Hurt In Soccer Stadium Melee

more than 250 injured as fans of rival British and Italian soccer teams clashed at the start of a championship match in Brussels. Belgium.

The riot apparently started when British fans broke through a wire fence and plowed into a section of Italian fans. A wall near the field collapsed under the weight of the Italian fans fleeing over it while being attacked by the British. The collapse of the wall brought down with it part of the stands, and scores of people were crushed under concrete and bodies.

Television crews on the scene to broadcast the game instead found themselves transmitting views of the disaster to millions watching worldwide

British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said from London the instigators of the riot "have brought shame and disgrace to their country and to football."

Broken metal crowd control barriers were used as stretchers to carry the victims out of Heysel Stadium. At least 200 of the injured were hospitalized

The game was played after a 90-minute delay. In the Cup of Champions, a final contest between Europe's best teams, the Juventus team of Turin. Italy, beat Liverpool of England. 1-0 on a

penalty kick. Belgian police urged the game be played. fearing more violence if it were called off. Large sections of the stands were empty during the contest, except for clothes and personal

belongings stained with blood. But West German television broke off its live broadcast in protest after officials of the European

Soccer Union decided to go ahead with the game. Louis Wouters, president of the Belgian Soccer Federation demanded an autopsy for two of the victims he said were either stabbed or shot.

At a news conference early today he said the victims were 25 Italians, 7 Belgians, 1 French

citizen and eight people still not identified Soccer, which stirs nationalistic passions almost everywhere it is played, has been plagued by hooliganism for years.

# Volusia Slams Dumping Into Lake Monroe

Sanford shouldn't count on getting any support in its sewage disposal fight with the state from its neighbors north of Lake Monroe

The Volusia County Council, perturbed it has not been informed of hearings on the matter, filed a letter of protest with the state Department of Environmental Regulation earlier this

In the letter, Jack Ascherl, chairman of the Volusia County Council, said the board voted May 2 to object to any downgrading of the water quality

classification in Lake Monroe. The DER wants Sanford to stop dumping treated effluent from its Poplar Avenue sewage plant into the lake. The agency wants Sanford to go to a landspreading system of sewage treatment. Sanford says that system is too coatly and is trying to convince the state to allow it to upgrade the Poplar

Avenue plant. The city received a temporary permit to keep duinping the effluent until January 1987.

In the meantime, the DER will decide whether Sanford must halt the practice

During hearings last month water experts testifying for the city said the treated sewage dumped in the lake is of

better quality than the lake water itself. But Ascherl said the lake already has water quality problems and that dumping sewage in it doesn't help.

Our efforts should be directed toward improvement and restoration of

the lake, not simply abandoning our objectives of 'fishable and swimmable waters.' Such an attitude is wrong and counterproductive to our entire pollution control programs," Ascheri wrote.

Many other local governments have been forced to seek alternative methods when the pollutant assimilative capacity of surface waters his been exhausted and Sanford should be no exception."

Ascherl also said Santord's request is ill-timed" since the St. Johns River Water Management District is starting a restoration program to improve the river's water quality.

The letter, included on the city commission's agenda, went without comment at the Sanford commission's regular meeting Tuesday, except for Commissioner Robert Thomas, who said, "We sure are getting some people upset with us."

But Commissioner David Farr today called the letter, "a complete misrespresentation of the facts."

"I didn't, quite frankly, appreciate it." Farr said.

Farr said the county should have entered the debate seven or eight months ago instead of now, when the matter is under final deliberation. A decision is expected by July. If the state doesn't allow Sanford to keep dumping in the lake, the city may challenge the decision in court.

Farr said he has been told by other Volusia County officials that a city in the county is also dumping sewage in a lake. But that wasn't mentioned in the letter, he said.

# Glenn Fumes A

A proposal to hire three new employees and create what an irked County Commissioner Sandra Glenn called "another layer of bureaucracy" was sent back to county staff's drawing board for further study.

Mrs. Glenn was responding to a recommendation by Deputy County Administrator Richard George Tuesday that the commission create three new staff positions; an in-house property acquisition coordinator, a construction projects coordinator for the Department of Public Works and a construction projects coordinator for **Environmental Services** 

George said the property acquisition coordinator would work out of the county attorney's office and would be responsible for all the county land acquisition including coordination of appraisals, title work and negotiations. Mrs. Glenn reminded, however, that the same "excuse" was used by County

Attorney Nikki Clayton to hire another attorney for her office a year ago and instead that attorney was assigned to

Noting that Robin Lillibridge has been hired as the county's construction program manager, George said the proposed two new construction project coordinators would report o Lillibridge. He added that the two new coordinators could not watch all of the 845 million worth of new construction of buildings the county is planning over the next three years.

He said in many of the larger projects a "clerk of the works" would be hired by the architectural firms of those projects to oversee construction and to make sure the architectural plans were followed.

George said groups from private enterprise recommended this fashion of handling the job.

Mrs. Glenn, however, said she would like to see the written reports from private enterprise, adding she doesn't like the idea of one level of county employees answering to Lillibridge. who would answer to George who would in turn answer to County Administrator Ken Hooper who would inform the commissioners. She said she saw no need for so many levels of bureaucracy.

We are assuming nobody is out to do us right, that all are out to do us wrong. You want us to hire a clerk to watch and an employee to watch him. What do our inspectors do?" she asked.

**Environmental Services Director Jim** Bible said the construction project coordinator in his office would cost a minimal amount - 5 percent to 6 percent of project costs - and would save the county much more. Public Works Director Larry Sellers said much of the work the new employee in his office would do is now being done by the county engineer and he had other work the engineer should be doing.

# Ex-Lake Mary Mayor Fined By Ethics Panel

The state Ethics Commission has censured Sorenson. The city comrecommended to Gov. Bob Graham that former Lake Mary Mayor Walter Sorenson be publicly reprimanded and fined \$500 for using his elected office for personal gain.

Sorenson, Lake Mary mayor for 10 years, accepted the commission's decision, said Michael Gray, his attorney.

The reprimand is the result of allegations made against Sorenson by a political adversary Ray Fox. also of Lake Mary.

After Fox, a former Lake Mary city commissioner, made the allegations to the city commission they investigated and subsequently mission's investigation showed Sorenson once received an advance on his stipend as mayor - without required commission approval twice used a city vehicle for personal reasons -- once for a house warming party five blocks from city hall - and used a city phone to call his employer in Orlando.

Sorenson lost a bid for re-election last fall to Richard Fesa.

#### NRC Says Three Mile Island Can Reopen; Groups Protest

WASHINGTON - The Nuclear Regulatory Commission authorized the reopening of the undamaged portion of the Three Mile Island reactor which was shut down in 1979. following an accident that destroyed a twin unit at the site.

The commission voted 4 to 1 to allow the reopening but said the decision is not final until Monday which gives opponents time to appeal the ruling.

A few minutes after the decision. Three Mile Island Alert, a citizens grouped based in Harrisburg, Pa., petitioned the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to reverse the ruling Pensylvannia officials may also attempt to get a court injunction to prevent the undamaged nuclear unit from

The plant site, in Middletown, Pa., was the location of the nation's worst commercial nuclear power accident.

The commission, which acted after six years of hearings which produced more than 30,000 pages of transcripts, imposed two conditions that could delay a restart.

One stipulation is that General Public Utilities Nuclear, the plant operator, submit a schedule for bringing the reactor into operation. The other condition is that the staff of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission be increased to oversee the plant operators.

#### 4 Killed In Tank Explosion

SAN ANTONIO - An ammonta tank explosion at an ice plant killed four people and injured at least 20 including 16 lirelighters Wednesday.

The midafternoon explosion was about two blocks from Hemisfair, the site of the 1968 World's Fair, and blew a huge hole in the back wall of the ice house owned by the Lone Star Ice Co., according to San Antonio Fire Chief Charles Angelini

The blast was so strong it knocked a 1,000 pound piece of metal off a truck, tossing it down an alley, officals said.

The victims, including the lirelighters, were taken to area hospitals were they were treated for ammonia burns, inhalation and heat exaustion. It is not known how the four victims died or whether they worked for the plant. Two men who were trapped in the plant following the explosion were freed by firelighters, a fire official said.

The explosion was apparently caused by an ammonta leak, according to San Antonio's Deputy Fire Chief Jim

WASHINGTON - FBI agents arrested a third member of the John Walker family Wednesday and charged him with trying to pass classified defense documents to the Soviets.

Arrested was retired Lt. Comdr. Arthur James Walker, 50, of Virginia Beach, Va. He was charged with espionage in connection with an alleged plot with his brother, John Anthony Walker, a former Navy communications specialist and his nephew, Michael Lance Walker, a seaman on the atreraft carrier Nimitz.

The men were charged in what officials believe may be the greatest breach of security in naval history.

FBI officials said they expect more arrests of Walker tamily members or business associates of John Walker, who ran a private detective business in Norfolk.

But sometime early Monday, she injured her other leg and the vet said the kindest thing was to put her

So, at 11:10 a.m. Monday she was humanely put to sleep. It was one of those freak accidents. It could have been something she was born with, but it did not show up on the X-rays. I just praise the Lord I have one super healthy stud colt left."

Apopka, Lawman is a grandson of the famous thoroughbred race horse, Man of War, and halfbrother to Eternal Prince, who ran in this year's Kentucky Derby and placed third in the Preakness.

Like a hot potato, the Sanford City Commission sent a rezoning request from a developer who wants to build a convenience store back to the Planning and Zoning Commission for more consideration.

Over the objections of about 30 residents who live near the proposed store's site, the city commission voted unanimously to return the request to the P&Z board, which recommended denial of the request two weeks ago. The vote came after Commissioner David Farr said the rezoning would be in keeping with the city's comprehensive land use plan.

Thomas Tompkins, of Centex Homes of Florida, Kissimmee, is asking that a lot at Lake Mary Boulevard and Sir Lawrence Drive be rezoned from multifamily residential to a restricted commercial district so he can build a convenience store.

P&Z Commissioner J.Q. "Sim' Galloway told the commission the board denied the request because residents of the nearby Groveview subdivision. also developed by Tompkins. were not expecting a convenience store to pop up next to them when they bought homes there.

Tim the one who made the motion to deny and I'm proud of it," sald Galloway, who was applauded by the residents.

**But city Commissioner Robert** Thomas said in the interest of fairness to the developer the request "should go back to the drawing board."

The decision riled the residents, who said they would start a petition drive to get their point across to the city.

Stephen Cameron, of 120 Anthony Drive, Sanford, said the ruling upset him because he was assured by all four city commissioners beforehand that they were against the request.

"They all said 'no,' they would not support It." Cameron said.

Two of the commissioners acknowledged talking to Cameron but said they were not supporting the request; they sent it back for reconsideration.

"I told him (Cameron) I was not in favor of it and I'm still not," Farr said. But, he added. the commission did not approve best use of the property. the rezoning. "We sent it back to P&Z.

Mercer said he told Cameron he usually supports the P&Z board's decisions but added if he found fault with the board's recommendation he would vote to send it back. Commissioners Thomas and Milton Smith said they never talked to Cameron.

Cameron said he supported Farr's attempt to get Tompkins to build another road but said no location around the subdivision was acceptable for a convenience store.

We don't want one out there-There are too many now," he

Cameron said there are three such stores within two miles of the site while another resident, Bob Raisler, of 327 Springview Drive, Sanford, said there are five within one mile. P&Z Commissioner Brent Carli says there within one mile of the lot.

Cameron, who presented 30 letters to the commission opgosing the rezoning, said the residents would gather more facts and plot a strategy to defeat the request.

The residents' chief concerns are increased traffic and crime they believe the store would bring to their neighborhood.

Cameron told the commission traffic counts on Lake Mary Boulevard are averaging 10,000 vehicles a day, according to a Seminole County traffic study. A store at the intersection would only add more traffic, he said, making the road more hazardous. He added that increased traffic would endanger about 50 students who catch a school bus at the corner.

But Sam Ackley, who represented Tompkins at the meeting. said traffic studies conducted by the developer's engineering consulting firm showed a convenience store would decrease traffic on the road.

As for the question of crime. Ackley said convenience stores don't breed crime and said there have been only five reports of criminal activity at Sanford convenience stores in recent months. He said a convenience store would be the "highest and

#### Radio Marti Makes Waves

Radio Marti, the Reagan administration's effort to counteract some of the propaganda Cubans hear from their own government, finally went on the air and promptly drove Fidel Castro right up the wall. That tells us that Castro understands more about Radio Marti than do some of its detractors in this country.

The critics on this side of the Florida Straits tend to regard Radio Marti as a pointless exercise in propaganda and, more importantly, an impediment to improving relations with the Castro government. They may have a point on the latter count. But then, the Reagan administration rightly doubts whether anything more than a bogus, or at best superficial, detente with the Castro regime is possible.

After all, Mr. Castro remains a convinced Marxist-Leninist allied with the Soviet Union and committed to the violent export of revolution from Ethiopia and Angola to Nicaragua and El Salvador. Where in that is there any real room for common ground with the United States?

Then too, a careful reading of Cuban-diplomacy throughout Mr. Reagan's first term-suggests that Castro has been playing a double game. Publicly, he blames the United States for the continuing enmity between Washington and Havana and hints that he wants better relations. Privately, he has spurned several invitations to meet the United States halfway in reducing tensions in the Caribbean and Central America.

So, hopes for a real detente between Washington and Havana look ill-founded at best. That leaves the United States with little to lose by attacking the Castro dictatorship at one of its most vulnerable spots — the daily failure to tell the Cuban people the truth.

Few Cubans know, for example, that fully one quarter of Cuba's entire economy consists of subsidies from the Soviet Union, a telling measure of the Castro regime's economic failures. Few Cubans know how many of their countrymen are dying in Ethiopia and Angola (it is official Cuban government policy to keep casualty figures secret). And few Cubans know how many political prisoners are locked away in Castro's jails (Cuban officials have acknowledged holding at least 3,000 persons).

Castro labels Radio Marti's plans to provide the people of Cuba with just such information as "ideological aggression." That is an overstatement. But beaming the truth into a totalitarian state built on lies and censorship is a form of ideological warfare. What else but subversive would one call telling the truth in a country where doing so is a crime?

Putting Radio Marti on the air cost the Reagan administration its newly negotiated immigration agreement with Castro. That means Castro won't be taking back several thousand of the worst criminals he sent to the United States on the 1980 Muriel boatlift. It also means that Castro apparently won't be releasing up to 20,000 Cubans each year to join close relatives living in the United States. And unless the Cuban government is able to jam Radio Marti with fairly consistent success, Castro may consider other measures to discomfit Washington.

So be it. Castro spends vast sums to broadcast his gospel of violent revolution throughout the Americas. Radio Marti can right the scales just a bit by giving the people of Cuba information their government suppresses. Truth is the greatest weapon against totalitarianism. Let it be wielded against Castro like a cudgel.

# Prime Minister Thatcher's Luster Fades

LONDON — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, who only recently seemed to be solidly implanted in power, is suddenly looking vulner-

Her ratings in the opinion surveys have fallen to their lowest level in three years. A wide spectrum of political, academic and religious leaders are challenging her economic and social policies. And even members of her own Conservative Party are criticizing her arrogance.

In a sense, she is going through roughly the same difficulties that are facing her friend President Reagan, who enormous popularity has also been slipping. The reasons are different, however.

Thatcher, who took over the leadership of the Conservative Party a decade ago, has been the predominent figure in politics here since 1979, when she became the first woman prime minister in British history.

She has gone through some bad patches. But, after her sweeping victory in the general elections of 1983, she could almost claim to be forever invincible.

To a large extent, though her image is currently cracking for reasons beyond her control

Her Labour, opponents, after squabbling among themselves for years, have finally unified behind Neili Kinnock, a young and dynamic politician who performs exceptionally well on

If the voters dislike the Labour Party, they have an alternative in the Liberals and Social Democrats, whose movements are headed by attractive and talented leaders.

Thatcher's rivals are of course benefiting from the mid-term blues that always seem to affect administrations that have been in office for a long time. But there is more to the present impatience with Thatcher than weariness with her manner.

Her style has never been especially pleasant.

From the start, she has been dubbed "Nurse Thatcher" or the "Headmistress" because of her inclination to act bossy as if she and she alone knew all the answers. So it is substance rather than her personality that is eroding her influence.

She repeatedly emphasizes that her economic strategy has been successful because the inflation rate, which had soard to 22 percent in 1980, has since declined to 4 percent

The fall in inflation, however, has been achieved by tactics that have contributed to an employment rate that now stands at 13 percent, double what it was when Thatcher became prime minister. In short, her cure has been as bad as the disease.

A general election must take place in three years. In all likelihood, Thatcher will hold the election toward the end of 1987, and the schedule worries her Conservative Party collections.

# Courage Eludes Congress

In the first week of May, the U.S. Senate approved a budget proposal that appeared to be an authentic victory in the long war to balance the federal budget. The plan, worked out by the White House and President Reagan's allies in the Senate, would reduce federal spending by \$58 billion in fiscal year 1986, and \$295 billion over three years.

It did not seem unreasonable to hope that the House of Representatives would pick up the challenge thrown down by the Senate to make some further progress toward reducing the federal budget, which will ooze red ink for at least the next five years anyway After all, the Senate plan soared to the highest of the heights achievable in federal budgeting: actual program termination. Thirteen living, breathing federal agencies and programs were sentenced to death, including such all time losers as the Job Corps, Appalachian Research Commission, and Urban Development Action Grants. Of course, they also forced the President to swallow a near freeze on defense spending limiting any increase to the rate of rise of the consumer price index Still, the Senate package was thought to provide momentum to deficit reduction.

It took only a week for the House Budget Committee to bring the senators - and the rest of us back down to earth. On May 16, the Committee approved a budget proposal that represents the worst of the old school of paper spending cuts with a sly promise of higher outlays later. It calls for \$985 billion in expenditures after "cuts" of \$56. billion - cuts that Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole referred to as visible only with "blue smoke and mirrors." The only program terminated in the House plan is federal revenues sharing, which through a menagerie of bookkeeping devices can be preserved - hidden - in other programs. The important reduction of cost-of-living increases for Social Security, so painfully won in the Senate, is abandoned fullflight by the House.

As usual, the Budget Committee goes after national defense with a meat axe: 66 percent of the cuts called for in the proposal are in the defense budget, which comprises less than 30 percent of federal expenditures. Otherwise, by simply deleting spending for contracting with the private sector for certain government functions — a move urgently advised by the Reagan/Senate budget, the Committee shows only a 12.1 percent reduction.

# Education The Only Real Edge

This is the season of graduation. Young people are leaving high spechool and college and, in the process, getting advice from their elders in commencement addresses.

Talks on graduation day tend to be repetitive, and, in the excitement of leaving behind one phase of life and beginning another, graduates may not listen too closely. Nevertheless, commencement is an important ritual. Commencement speakers try their best to give some helpful advice.

What advice should one give at this point in our country's history? First of all, one should recognize that this is a good time for young people to begin a new phase of life, The country is in pretty good condition. The young men who are graduating won't have to go to war. which was the case when I graduated from high school in 1943. If employment conditions aren't ideal for everyone, they are generally very good. The United States is free of depression and recession. Most importantly, our society affords ample educational opportunities. One may work and study at the same time.

True, education at a private college may cost \$10,000 or more a year, and costs at state universities are rising rapidly. However, most, if not all, states have community colleges and technical education centers which enable students to obtain good instruction at very modest cost while they live at home.

Not everyone is able to go to college or should attempt to do so, but everyone should endeavor to continue his education in one way or another. That's a message that should be incorporated in every commencement address.

Pierre du Pont, former Governor of Delaware, pointed out a couple of years ago that almost every young person in America will have to learn new skills several times in his lifetime. That's the nature of business and industrial life in the late 20th century. Young Americans. therefore, should clearly understand the central importance of continuing education. Indeed education provides the only real edge Americans have in a world full of industrialized and industrializing nations. The way for Americans to maintain their standard of living is to keep learning.

Technical skills are essential in an age of science and technology, of automation and robotics. However, technical knowledge isn't enoughtt's also important that young people receive instruction in the history and values of their country and civilization.

# FBI Kept Senate In Dark About Donovan

WASHINGTON — Slowly but inexorably, evidence is coming to light that shows how seriously FBI officials misled the Senate Labor Committee in 1981 on the relationship between an alleged mobster and the construction company headed by Raymond Donovan, then awaiting confirmation as Labor secretary.

During Donovan's stormy confirmation hearings FBI officials in charge of the background investigation deliberately withheld from the senators information gleaned from 892 tapes of phone conversations. These were secretly recorded in 1979 during a massive FBI operation known as

The Senate, having been deceived about both the existence and the content of the wiretap evidence, confirmed Donovan

Last year Donovan was indicted by a New York grand jury on the basis of evidence on 51 of the TUMCON tapes. The main reason FBI officials gave tor keeping the Senate in the dark was that disclosure would have endangered the bureau's key informant in the TUMCON investigation. But after studying nearly 20 pounds of FBI affidavits and tapes that were withheld from the Senate. Our associate Tony Capaccio has determined that the FBI informant was involved in virtually none of the contacts. When alleged mob figure William Masselli dealt with the Sehiavone Construction Co., the FBI informant was not involved.

Groping like blind men. Senate committee members asked FBI ofticials about the suspected Masselli-Schiavone relationship—only to be reassured that there had been "very, very limited contact" or "some contact but nothing that I would consider significant." One FBI official said wiretaps dating back to 1969 had been reviewed, and that "we located no reference to Mr. Donoyan or Schiavone Construction Co."

who are trying to get the TUMCON tapes disallowed as evidence against their client, have stated in court that Donovan or other company executives were mentioned 351 times in the 1979 tapes.

Here are some excerpts from the tapes that might have been of considerable interest to the Senate in considering Donovan's appointment:

— In early 1979, according to an FBI agent's affidavit quoting from the tapes. "Masselli discussed Schiavone' and the fact that 'we got a little connection with some people in Jersey. ... Whatever (contracts) they can give, we — we're gonna have ... first crack at. ... If 10 guys go to bid with them, he'll tell me, "Here's the 10 bids, Can you beat

them?" That's how close we are."

— During another taped conversation, according to an FBI affidavit,
Masseili called a Schiavone executive and "spoke with him about

Simonetti, son-in-law of the late
Mafia godfather Vito Genovese.

— Numerous times during the TUMCON investigation. Masselli was taped in discussions of a bribery scheme to get a dumping permit — and some of the discussions were with a Schiavone executive. "While no money will change hands until the dumping," an FBI agent explained in an affidavit, "Masselli is virtually assured of his right to dump and thus the success of the bribery scheme."

During one phone call to a Schiavone executive, Masselli said. The thing went through on the dump and passed the board," according to the alfidavit, which adds: "Masselli stated that he had the guy from the (Army) Corps of Engineers, and that his person could get the application (for the dumping permit) through."

In this same conversation, the FBI agent noted, Masselli said that "activities necessary to this possible success will continue while he obtains certain agency letters of approval."





#### Soviet-Made Helicopters **Used Against Indians?**

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras - Sandanistas are using highly sophisticated Soviet helicopter gunships to attack the Indian alliance fighting the Nicaraguan government. Raul Tobias, 29, commander in chief of the MISURA alliance reports

Considered a major escalation in the technical level of warfare in the Central American country, the attacks are the first reported using the Mi-24 helicopter gunships in combat since six of them were delivered last November to Nicaragua by the Soviets. The helicopters are considered the fastest in the world.

The Sandanistas used the gunships with devastating effects against the MISURA, an alliance of the Mesquite, Sumo and Rama tribes of Nicaragua's Atlantic coast. Tobias said the helicopters were used in attacks about three months ago near the isolated villages of WaWa. Haulover and Waunta in northeastern Nicaragua near the Honduras border.

The Indians suffered heavy casualties from rocket and automatic cannon fire from the helicopters. Tobias said, declining to give specific casualty figures.

#### Turk: I Gave Gun To Agca

ROME - A Turkish defendant testified Wednesday he provided the gun with which Mehmet Ali Agea shot the pope. It was the first public statement corroborating Agea's claim that he did not act alone.

Omer Baget also gave new information of at least two other Turks who are not defendants in the trial of seven men accused of complicity in the shooting. Prosecutor Antonio Marini said he may take legal action against Bagci and Agea, but wanted to study Bagei's testimony first.

Bagel said that he gave Agea the 9mm Browning pistol in Milan four days before Agea shot John Paul II on May 13. 1981, during the pontiff's general audience in St. Peter's

Bagel claimed, however, that he did not know why the Turkish terrorist wanted the weapon, which he had brought into Italy at Agea's request

#### Hussein Wants Peace Conference

WASHINGTON - Calling it a "last chance for peace," Jordan's King Husseln in talks with President Reagan Wednesday proposed an International peace conference involving the United States, the Soviet Union, Palestinian representatives, Jordan and Israel.

However, Reagan withheld judgment on Hussein's announcement that the Palestinian Liberation Organization accepts the concept of Israel's right to exist as embodied in United Nation's resolutions.

Reagan said some differences still haven't been resolved. 'We are still discussing the whole matter," he said:

# Divers Find Treasure At Shipwreck Site

# 300-Year-Old Sunken Galleon Yields Bonanza Of Gold, Silver, Jewels

The haul is the richest find since 1982 in the wreck of the Nuestra Senora de la Atocha. which was sent to the ocean depths by a hurricane in 1622

Treasure Salvors Inc., which discovered the wreck site in 1973, reported Tuesday its divers recovered Sunday and Monday 13 gold bars and bar pieces, a gold chain measuring 6 feet, 8 inches long, six intact silver plates and several hundred silver coins. The largest two gold.

Authorities have not gotten a value on the latest discovery at the Atocha wreck site, about 40 Spanish Galleon that sank off miles west of Key West, said Bleth Haley, spokeswoman for the salvage company

> She said until the new finds. Treasure Salvors had dislodged \$70 million to \$90 million dollars worth of gold, silver and artifacts from the site.

> Haley described the Memorial Day weekend finds as the richest recoveries from the Atocha since the summer of 1982 when divers discovered an emerald cross and ring, 20 gold bars and 23 jewel encrusted Spanish belt pieces.

Divers began bringing up the

Sunday, Haley said, when they surfaced with four gold bars They were found in a hole more than 40 feet underwater that had been blasted in the

sandy ocean floor by directed propeller wash from dive boats About 3 p.m. Tuesday, the lead salvage boat radioed that the divers had brought up a piece of wood, about six feet long with the diameter of an oil barrel, with square spikes em-

bedded in it. Duncan Mathewson, an archaeologist working with the salvage firm, said the wood chunk and spikes could be either a portion of the Atocha's hull or possibly from a buoy set by the Spanish to mark the wreck site.

KEY WEST (UPI) - A bars weighed about three latest finds around 3.30 p.m. The buoy was destroyed the next year by another storm and the Spanish were never able to find the wreck site again, according to records in the Spanish archives at Seville.





# Major-League Drug Problems Harm At Least 25 Careers

NEW YORK (UPI) - Baseball commissioner Peter Ueberroth announced May 7 a testing program designed to clean up drug abuse in baseball. Ueberroth said as a first step all baseball. personnel - other than major league players would be tested.

He is also asking the Major League Players Association join the program and have its players submit to testing

At least 25 major-league baseball players have rither admitted to, been arrested for, or convicted by the courts of drug related offenses, including possession and dependency since 1980. Among These are a number of former baseball players who have publicly confessed to having used drugs during their active playing years. A thronology follows.

# 'Celtics Pride' Talk Riles Riley

BOSTON (UPI) - Ask Los Angeles coach Pat Riley about the Boston Celtics' playoff domination of the Lakers and he'll say it is insignificant. But guests staying at the Lakers' hotel tell you different.

One day after the Celtics blasted Los Angeles by 34 points in Game 1 of the championship series. Riley gathered his team in a fifth-floor conference room at the Marriott Copley Plaza for a noon meeting before practice.

He told them Tuesday he was tired of hearing about the Celtics' 8-0 mark against the Lakers when a title was on the line, how he had heard enough about the "Celtics Pride" while he was growing up on the East Coast and he was "sick of it."

We've got a Lakers history too," he said. in a voice loud enough to be heard through closed doors and into the hallway.

Invoking the names of former Laker great Elgin Baylor and Jerry West, he exhorted his silent players not to let Boston win yet another playoff series and said that some former Lakers are "embarrassed" to come

Riley, who played for Los Angeles from 1970 to 1975, reminded his players they are the Western Conference champions and

they needed to rally from their seriesopening blowout Monday on national TV.

Riley's pep-talk words were exactly opposite what he had said Sunday, that his current team hadn't lost the first seven title series to Boston and so these players weren't reponsible for the whole monkey on the Lakers' backs - "just the tail."

But the Celtics' hold on the Lakers when they are playing for a banner is extraordinary. Four times the best-of-seven series was ended early, but the other times the Celties always came through in Game 7

The carryover effect is that you just want to beat that team that much more," said Riley. "One thing to their credit - and it's been characteristic of their players and coaches throughout the years - you give them a break and they'll take advantage of

The closest the Lakers came was in 1962 when in Game 7 Frank Selvy missed a 12-foot jumper in the final seconds of regulation. It hit the rim, Bill Russell grabbed the rebound and the Celtics went on to win in overtime.

By 1969 the Lakers added Wilt Chamberlain to their lineup, which already included West and Baylor. Like the 1985 Lakers, that team was also being called by some "the greatest of all-time

Lakers owner Jack Kent Cooke had filled the ratters of the Forum with thousands of balloons, scheduled for release after the Lakers won Game 7. But Boston's Don Nelson hit the decisive basket with 1:16 left and the Celtics won 108-106. As Celtics general manager Red Auerbach walked to the locker room he looked up and said, "I wonder what they're going to do with all those bleeping balloons.

Former Lakers guard Rod Hundley said the 8-0 mark was called to his attention only

"I'd never even given it a thought," he said. "The Lakers have never beaten Boston, Maybe the Lakers will start thinking about that Maybe that's the way Boston could beat them, to call it to their attention

But this year Hundley thinks the Lakers have the better team.

"If they don't beat them this year, then somebody's doing something." he said Then somebody's controlling these playoffs from up above, I do believe.

A former UPI first-team All-America who spent most of his first three years in the NBA as a reserve. Ainge led Boston's first-quarter surge in Monday's Game 1 of the championship series against the Los Angeles Lakers. The 6-toot-5 guard scored 15 of his 19 points in the first 12 minutes and the Celtics were never again threatened.

"I play hard and I play aggressively, with a lot of emotion." Ainge said after practice. Tuesday. "And I think that emotion is more of a help than a hindrance."

He has seen the pictures of his anguished expressions after a referee's call goes against him. and I'm trying to change. But I've made those faces ever since I was a kid. My mom always used to tell me, 'stop making those faces," but I guess it's just me."

That willingness to show his feelings resulted in a technical in Monday's game, when he threw a ball at Lakers guard Byron Scott, who had just hit Ainge in the back of the head.

I just can't let that happen. You can't let someone take advantage of you," said Ainge. who says he laughs when he sees replays of his fights.





# 'I Felt Very Dumb'

# Slum-Dwelling Refugee Students Excel In American School

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - When Tin Lap Cao came from Southeast Asia six years ago, unable to speak English and consigned by poverty to live in a drug-infested, violent slum, he says, "I felt very dumb.

Next month, because of his straight-A record. he will be the valedictorian of his graduating class. at Galileo High School, and in the fall he will be one of the select few to enter the engineering school at the University of California at Berkeley.

Tin, 19, said he was good at math when he started school in San Francisco in 1979. But he spoke no English. "I felt very dumb, but that's what pushed me because I knew I couldn't go on

Tin and an estimated 4,000 refugee children from Southeast Asia live with families or friends

in the Tenderloin, where prostitution, drug dealing and alcoholism are as much a part of daily life as violence, robbery and overcrowded and dirty tenements

Van Vo. 11, who left Ho Chi Minh City in 1981 with his aunt and uncle on a small boat carrying 100 people, carries memories of his mother's tearful farewell. She had packed his belongings, prepared food for him and told him to find his American father. That search failed and the boy still lives with his relatives.

"He's one of my top students," says teacher Kathryn Wethington. "He writes beautifully. In math, he picks up in three minutes what it takes the rest of the class to learn in 45 minutes.

Van's uncle, once a policeman in Vietnam and now a hotel janitor, urges all six children in his

household to strive for A's. "I hope the children will be doctors and engineers and teachers. I hope they will be successful.

Helen Hatcher, principal of a school where many of the refugees go, said of the students. Considering the obstacles, and the background of turmoil, motivation is high. Their homework is always done, they treat books better than other students and they get upset at class time that is wasted because of discipline problems.

Darleen Lau, principal of another school that refugees attend, said, "These are children who were living in war-torn countries. Some have seen their fathers beheaded. Therapists working with these kids get back pictures of bombs exploding

School officials say many of the refugee pupils

have qualified for gifted children programs and school honor rolls, despite the odds against them.

Tin Cao's calculus teacher, Patricia Holleran, said she was unaware of his background. "Then we went to the awards banquet for an engineering scholarship he received. I dropped him off by his house and I watched him walk across the street. Here were all these crazy people, prostitutes - and this very bright young man.

"I thought. 'We don't know. We wander around this city and we don't know the richness here. We

forget what's behind those walls? Tin explains, "My dad forsook everything for me. He started a business when he was young and he lost everything in the revolution. I guess the only hope he has is me. I don't want to let him.





# Graduation 2,315 County Students To Get Diplomas

A total of 2.315 students are sceduled to four years at Lake Mary. A record number of graduated from Seminole County's six students (12) received National Merit Scholbe graduated from Seminole County's six high schools on Friday and Saturday, June 7 and 8

The 1984-85 school year has been a good one for Seminole County, according to School Superintendent Robert Hughes. Over \$5 million in scholarships and military academy appointments were earned by county high school seniors.

And Scholastic Aptitude Test scores were 21 points above the national average. Local students scored an average of 918 compared to last year's 915. The state average is 890.

Beasley admitted he carried a fake ID but said he did not use it to buy the drinks at Sea World.

The student's lawyer, Bill Waggoner, argued the bartender lied about the ID so Sea World would not get in trouble with the state for serving alcohol to minors.





# **Plumber Wants To** Fix Space Toilet

TARPON SPRINGS (UPI) - Richard Fagiano believes that when you have electrical work to be done, you should call an electrician, and when the space shuttle has a toilet problem, a plumber should be called.

But when the problem arises while the shuttle is orbiting earth, that's not possible.

However, Fagiano says that can be solved by taking a plumber along on the space flight and naturally, he wants to be that plumber.

Fagiano is chairman of Master Plumbing Inc. of Tarpon Springs and in addition to being a licensed plumber, he is a licensed pilot who flies single-engine planes.

Fagiano wrote the National Aeronautics and Space Administration two weeks ago volunteering his services as an in-flight plumber after problems cropped up in recent space flights with the shuttle's plumbing system.

"You don't call an aero-space engineer to fix your tollet, so it just seemed to me to make sense you'd call a plumber when you have tollet problems up in space," he said.

"Even if you couldn't fix things in space, a plumber could gather the knowledge to alleviate future problems from occurring." Fagiano said. adding many of the plumbing problems in space have been fairly repetitive.

Fagiano concedes his chances of being picked for a shuttle crew are virtually non-existent, but said he is willing to take the time to go through flight training in order to experience working with plumbing in weightlessness if it meant joining a shuttle mission.

#### 'Ponzi' Schemes Bilk Millions From Investors

WASHINGTON (UPI) Americans lost more than \$750 million in more than 30 major too-good-to-be-true "Ponzi" swindles during the last three years, business officials report.

The Council of Better Business Bureaus Inc., Arlington, Va., and the North American Securities Ad. ministrators Association Inc., Topeka, Kan. released results of a survey Tuesday that detailed the losses to modernized versions of the basic pyramid investment scheme named after Charles Ponzi, a notorious swindler of the 1920s, who bilked thousands of people out of millions of dollars.

High interest rates are puld to initial investors out of the funds of later investors who end up losing all or most of their money to the promoter.

We uncovered more than 30 major swindles in the last three years involving well over \$750 million invested by tens of thousands of Americans in all 50 states," said association President Wayne Howell during a news conference.

Ponzi schemes masquerade as high tech stock investments. mass market tax shelters, deferred delivery contracts in commodities, currency futures, oil and gas funds and leverage contracts in precious metals.







DEAR READER - There really is such a disease as hypoglycemia, but it is rarer than the proverbial hen's teeth. When most people talk about hypoglycemia, they are thinking about what you correctly refer to as a fad illness

Hypoglycemia means "low blood sugar." All normal humans experience low blood sugar once in awhile. particularly after strenuous exercise. Some people, however, develop striking complaints of dizziness and weakness that may be associated with a reduction in blood sugar.

There are several ways to diagnose hypoglycemia, and all of them have drawbacks. In my experience, the simplest test is a serum glucose determination taken at precisely the time a patient is having the sensations of weakness and dizziness. If the glucose is below 45 mg.-dl., the patient's problems may be explained by low blood sugar. Remember, however, that hypoglycemia is not a disease. It is a set of symptoms that is very popular among certain types of

You are again correct in pointing out that hypoglycemia is a short-term, but potentially dangerous, complication in diabetics who are being treated. Too much medicine can reduce blood sugar and cause shock.

DEAR DR. GOTT - What causes gallstones and gailbladder problems? Would a high fat diet cause these or simply aggravate them?

DEAR READER - Most gallstones are made of cholesterol deposits that gradually build up in the body's bile reservoir - the gallbladder. Some patients seem particularly prone to gallstones, probably



West captured the heart jack with his queen. but could no longer put East on lead with the club ace. Later, after the spade ace was gone. Joe got to dummy with a spade to take the marked diamond
