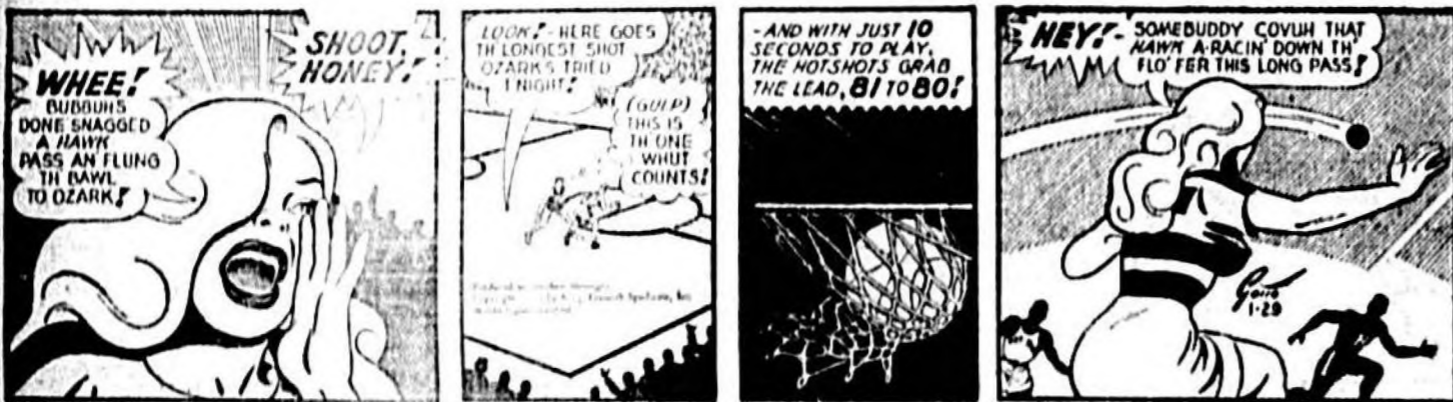

American Soldier Is Beaten To Death By Koje Prisoners

PUSAN, Korea—Three North Korean Communist prisoners of war beat an American soldier to death Wednesday in a compound on Koje Island, the U. N. POW Command said today.

The soldier, a private, was clearing barracks of prisoners prior to taking a head count when he was attacked, the POW command said. His name was withheld.

The soldier went into the compound with a Republic of Korea (ROK) Army sergeant. Later, the ROK sergeant noted the American did not come out of the building. Another South Korean searched for the soldier and reported he had been beaten.

Two ROK platoons and one American platoon were sent to the scene. The injured soldier was brought to the compound gate by prisoners. He was pronounced dead on arrival at the Koje hospital.

Ordered to send out the POWs responsible for the beating, the prisoners surrendered three inmates and said they did the killing.
After mulling about the compound, the prisoners refused to return to their barracks and started throwing rocks at the guards. Tear gas was used and order was restored.

The CWS, overseas relief arm of the National Council of Churches, announced its fund drive goal yesterday.

Last year the organization, aided by 36 denominations, dispensed about six million dollars in food, clothing, medicine and other help.
Harper Sibney, CWS chairman, said the extra million in 1953 is needed mainly to help refugees from Communist Eastern Europe and the homeless of Korea.

Besides Eastern Europe and Korea, the relief program also will concentrate on India and the near East.
The fund drive will wind up with the annual "One Great Hour of Sharing" on Sunday, March 8.

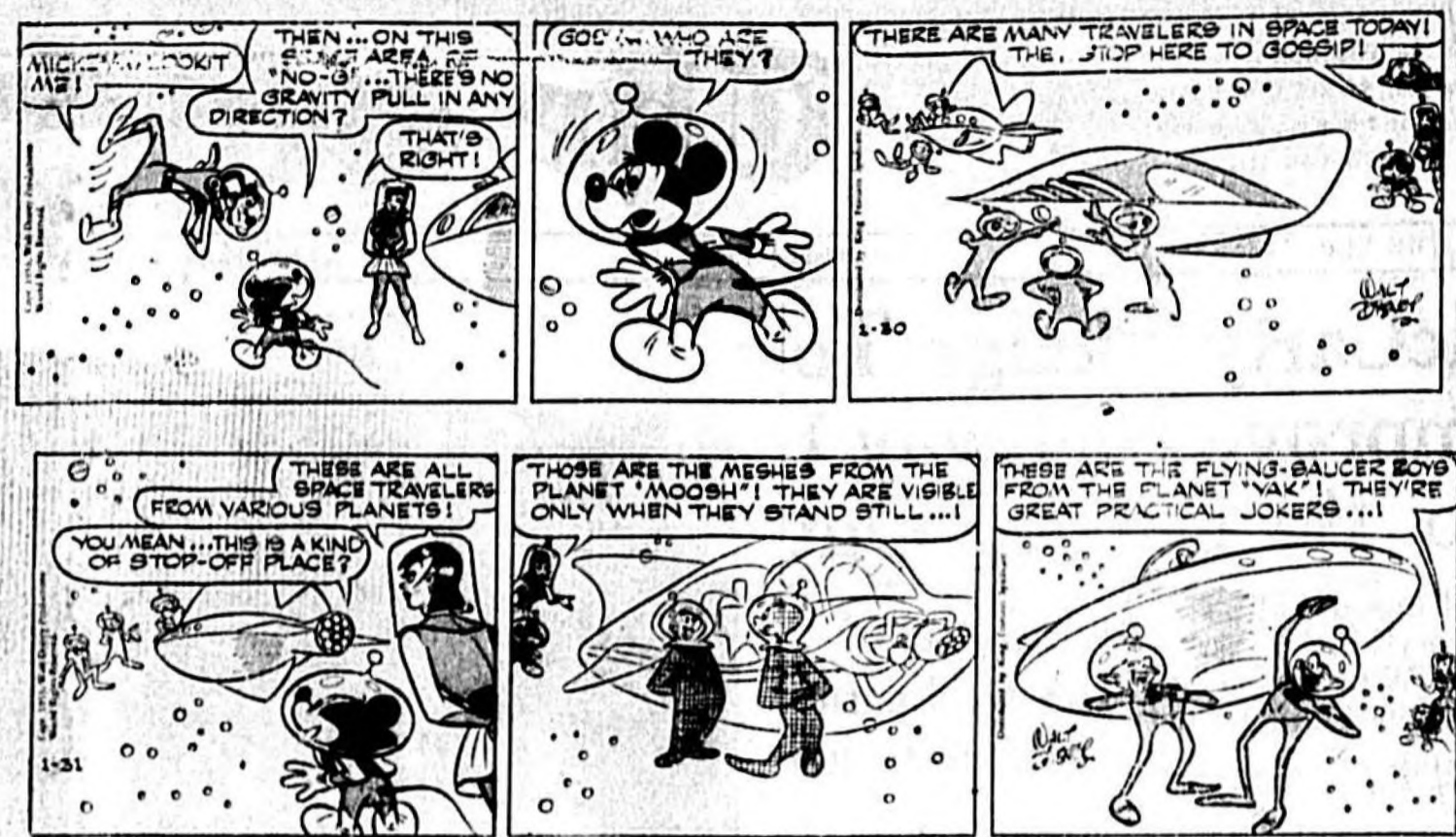

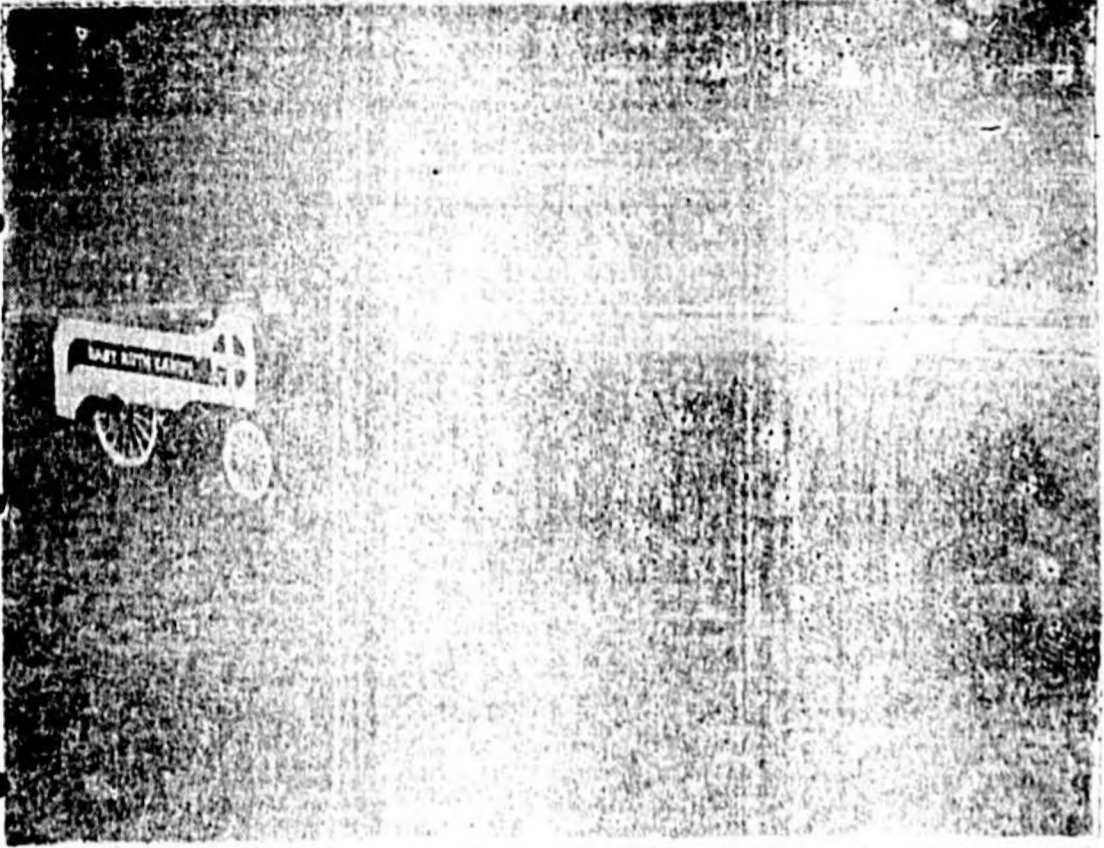

Frick and Giles also released a joint statement saying that Salih volunteered the program outlined and in so doing gave evidence of concern for the welfare of his community and the National League and baseball.

Salih was sentenced to 15 months in prison and fined \$15,000 on the tax evasion charges.

Chairman Short (R-Mo) of the House Armed Services Committee said he had sent word to the Army chief of staff, Gen. J. Lawton Collins, now in Japan, asking him to tell Congress what happened. Collins gathered details on the raid when he was in Korea last week. He has made no comment.

Short said he doubted that the raid was a staged show.

A U. S. 1st Corps spokesman who declined to be named, said the "prime mission" of the operation "was that of capturing Chinese prisoners."

None was captured.

The spokesman added: "When the full story is told about the carefully coordinated plans only praise will be forthcoming for the well-conceived operation."

"The observation of the actual attack from points of vantage along the front line provided commanders at all levels with valuable information on which to base future combat operations."

"The effectiveness of an attack provides lessons for all concerned."

Mal. Gen. Wayne C. Smith, commanding the 1st Division, said the raid was never aimed at taking the hill. It was only a strong probe, he said, to show the type of fighting and casualties the Chinese might face if they launched an all-out frontal offensive against dug-in Chinese and Korean Communist forces.

Commander Edwardis said he watched Allied planes, artillery and tank guns blast Spud Hill for hours, turning it into a volcano of erupting explosions.

"This was Operation Smack," he said. "I knew who it had been named—Spud Hill was getting specked and smoked hard."

Smith was thinking, "There can't be a Commie left in fighting condition on that hill."

"But when infantrymen went up the hill, the Chinese Reds, far from being knocked out, threw smashing air strikes and thunderous barrages, were pouring rifle fire and machine gun bullets down the hill at the assault force."

Edwardis said mismanaged operation plans, such as those given the visiting generals and correspondents, are standard for any action in the Korean War.

Mountainous Tides Bring Fresh Peril To Europe's Coast

Holland Suffers Its Worst Disaster By Flood Waters Since Fifteenth Century

By The Associated Press
AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands—Mountainous new tides rolled in upon Europe's battered coasts today, bringing fresh peril to lands which already have counted more than 850 dead in a week end of hurricane and flood. The toll may pass the 1,000 mark when all bodies are recovered.

Towering waves pounded through ancient dikes at 70 places and covered a sixth of Holland with salt water, bringing the worst disaster since the 15th century. The death toll according to the best available count mounted to 464.

Britain counted 297 dead, 250 in floods, 132 in the sinking of the ferry Princess Victoria and 15 in the disappearance of a British trawler, Belgium had 17 drownings. All three countries mustered a heavy effort—army, navy, relief workers of all kinds—to save thousands threatened by death or cold or disease and to aid millions more whose homes were destroyed.

Property damage was in the millions of dollars.

The Thames River burst its banks at four new places today under the pile-driving force of the afternoon high tides, spreading more desolation. Hospitals at King's Lynn and Tilbury were flooded in part and isolated.

Scores of bodies floated among vast seas of debris on Britain's beaten coasts. There were corpses on rooftops of abandoned homes.

Canvey Island 25 miles down the Thames estuary from London reported at least 100 drowned and 300 missing. Many families were wiped out or broken. Sobbing mothers searched for their children. Homeless lads clinging to boys' sea-washed faces for sight of parents or other kin.

Meteorologists said a million to one combination of wind and tide caused the great storm, a tiny cyclone developed in the Atlantic late last week and a belt of warm air stretching from Africa to Iceland began moving eastward.

Air from the high pressure area fed the cyclone which developed into a big storm center. At the same time, the warm air front pushed the storm east into the North Sea. The storm, at full development on Feb. 2, full of rain and snow, is still being tracked.

The first case on the docket when court convenes at 10:00 a.m. will be a \$100,000 damage suit brought by Naomi J. S. Shubert and husband against J. C. Gibbs and wife. An automobile accident in Sanford during 1951 was listed as cause for the action.

At 9:30 o'clock on the morning of Feb. 17, a \$50,000 damage suit will be brought by Hamilton Concrete Products Inc. against H. Leonard Alexander and James B. Alexander. Doing business as Alexander Bros.

The first afternoon case that same day will see action in the complaint filed by the Sanford Orlando Kennel Club Inc. against Walter G. Connelly. The case will come to trial without a jury and involve \$8,000.

Another accident in Sanford this one at the corner of First Avenue and Ninth Street on Jan. 28, 1952, will result in a hearing at 10:00 o'clock the morning of Feb. 23. A city truck driver, Frank Wheeler, is being sued for \$75,000 damages by Margaret F. Howell and her husband, Roy Howell Jr. of Lake Mary.

Winter Vegetable Crops Get Adverse Blow By Weather

WINTER HAVEN — The weather here has been treating Florida's winter vegetable crops right. State Farmers Markets at Florida City, Immokalee, Wauchula and Ft. Myers reported adverse affects last week from wind, rain and cold. Some other markets, however, reported good conditions.

Markets Director L. H. Lewis tells about it in his weekly summary: Florida City — volume and prices down after heavy rain brought more damage to water-soaked fields. Market moved 11,000 bushels of tomatoes for a return of \$48,000.

Immokalee — ground cold and damp after several rainy nights. Crop conditions are only fair. Last week, moved 8,115 units of produce for \$27,777. Cucumbers brought \$1.04 to \$1.53. No. 1 tomatoes averaged \$4.01 a field crate. No. 1 yellow crockneck squash \$2.77; No. 1 white squash \$1.15; No. 1 pepper \$3.95; and string beans \$1.

Wauchula — the early headed cucumber crop somewhat retarded in growth but looks good. Weather too cold for best growing condition. Plant City — strawberry sales totaled 307,038 plants for an average of 25¢ cents a plant and a total of \$78,460. Crop conditions excellent.

Sanford's Fire Department Has Good '52 Record

Losses Are Cut To 85 Percent From Preceding Year Report

The Sanford Fire Department, long known as one of the best in the state of Florida, added further laurels to its impressive record last year by answering a record 254 fire calls, while cutting fire losses down by 85 percent from the preceding year, the official 1952 fire report, issued by Fire Chief Cleveland, revealed today.

In addition to the 254 fire calls, which was three more than the 1951 all time record, the City Fire-which attended 29 alarms of various types other than fire calls for an aggregate total of 265.

The 1951 fire damage of \$98,292.47, which was the all time high for Sanford in any one year since the department was first organized in 1912, was cut to a record \$16,707.17 in 1952, the lowest damage figure since 1941.

The property lost from fire, as a percentage of population in 1952 was a record \$5.17. This loss was cut down to only \$2 in 1952.

Chief Cleveland attributed the improved record of 1952 to the fact that there was no major fire in the city like the previous year when over \$60,000 damage was caused by the Valley Hotel fire and the fire at the Pettie Factory on Celery Avenue.

"Of course we are improving our methods of fighting fires every year," Chief Cleveland added. "We are teaching those new methods to our staff in our weekly classes, which I instituted when I first became fire chief in 1945."

For the record 254 fire calls, 122 percent, or 145 were in the minor category of gas, oil and tree blazes. Next high were 77 fire calls involving fire and "flame" buildings and contents damage.

Among the 29 calls other than fire blazes, six called for fire trucks, one called for fire trucks and ladders, one called for fire trucks and ladders, and one called for fire trucks and ladders.

The deal, known as the "Taft-Hartley deal," was a controversial agreement that gave the United States a large amount of military equipment in exchange for a promise to bring about a truce in Korea.

Talbot said that the deal was necessary to bring about a truce in Korea, and that it was a good deal for the United States.

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Eisenhower, In State Of Union Message, Calls For End To Price-Wage Control

The president's message was a surprise to many observers, who had expected a more cautious approach to the issue of price and wage controls.

Eisenhower said that the controls were no longer necessary, and that they were a burden on the economy. He called for an end to the controls as of April 30.
