

Agnew To Help Nixon 'Mop Up'

A restructuring of the White House staff made necessary by resignations (of key aides) ... was discussed with the Cabinet.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon, seeking to put his White House in order, is said to be considering an expanded role for Vice President Spiro T. Agnew now that two top aides have left because of the Watergate scandal.

The President was closeted in the Oval Office with Agnew Tuesday, discussing the vice president's new responsibilities.

What they will be is expected to be announced shortly.

A restructuring of the White House staff, made necessary by the resignations Monday of chief of staff H.R. Haldeman and top domestic adviser John D. Ehrlichman, also was discussed with Agnew and at a 30-minute meeting with the Cabinet.

"It's a meeting that has to be seen as important," a White House source said. "We can assume that the subject dealt with the future more than such things as Watergate."

A participant in the Cabinet meeting said Kenneth R. Cole, executive director of the Domestic Council, will take over some of the duties handled by Ehrlichman and eventually may replace him.

It was also reported that Stephen B. Bull, assistant to the President, has taken on added duties in short-term scheduling and paper flow. It is not considered likely that he will replace Haldeman—but rather that the chief of staff's duties may be taken over in part by the Office of Management and Budget.

Haldeman and Ehrlichman were seen leaving the White House Tuesday carrying stacks of documents, even as the FBI mounted a 'round-the-clock guard in offices containing Watergate-related files.

Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the guard was posted "to physically protect the files to make sure that access and removal of any files were supervised in accordance with very strict procedure." He said FBI agents checked everything removed by the two resigned aides.

It was disclosed in Los Angeles that Ehrlichman learned last year that Watergate conspirators E. Howard Hunt and G. Gordon Liddy broke into the office of Pentagon papers defendant Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist.

Ehrlichman was interviewed by the FBI in his office last Friday.

Julie Reaffirms Confidence Of Father's Role In History

Mrs. Julie Nixon Eisenhower reaffirmed her confidence in her father and his role in history Tuesday night in a press conference at the Contemporary Hotel in Disney World prior to addressing the second annual banquet of OUTLOOK Central Florida.

She answered questions from the press corps after being greeted by poster children from several area organizations.

When asked if she was tired of answering questions from the President's daughter of representing the White House on many occasions, she enjoys taking an active role now that she is out of school and has free time to travel. The holder of a masters degree in education, she feels there will be time for teaching after her father leaves the White House. Her special interests are the handicapped, education, and ecology.

It was her concern for the handicapped that led her to Orlando as OUTLOOK's speaker as this Longwood based organization has the goal of "helping the community's 'non-handicapped' and 'handicapped' members feel comfortable with each other."

She said that she first became interested in OUTLOOK after hearing of it from Pat Hitt, assistant secretary of the Department of Health Education and Welfare and last year's banquet speaker, who is a personal friend of the Nixon family.

In her talk, Julie told the 300 persons attending the banquet that it is inconceivable that any country which would elect Franklin Delano Roosevelt to four terms in the presidency would not accept the ability of the handicapped person to do a job.

She pointed out that there are 18 million adults in the United States with physical handicaps which limit their ability to hold a job and 10 million mentally handicapped.

This a sizeable minority, she stated, which like any other minority deserves equal treatment, fair job opportunity and a chance to lead a full life.

Both handicapped and non-handicapped displayed their talents in a potpourri of entertainment during the evening.

A tough railroad crossing safety ordinance is set for further county commission action May 12 after Tuesday's run-through of the measure.

Commissioners set a May 12, 30-minute work session on the proposal to iron out current loopholes failing to regulate rates of speed and allowable delay to traffic caused by blocked crossings.

Commissioners suggested a public hearing to examine and identify all railroad crossings in the unincorporated areas, and define what might constitute "reasonable" traffic delays.

If his department finds the lights are not working he will recommend that manual controls be placed on the signals so that crossing guards can control them.

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Students Hostage Police Kill Gunman

By H. F. WOLLENBERG IV Associated Press Writer PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — A man shooting "Kill me! Kill me!" and holding a gun in one hand and a student hostage in the other, was shot dead by police Tuesday when he emerged from a Roman Catholic elementary school. The gunman and two other men sought refuge in the school after fleeing from police. The student was held hostage in the basement of the main building.

Sister Anne Dolores said that one of the gunmen was shooting at police through the windows, then turned to John Ardis, a 5th grader and son of Alderman James Ardis, and said "you come with me."

The other two gunmen later surrendered after talking with a Peoria police officer, the brother of the slain gunman and a community agency employee.

The three men burst into the school while fleeing from police investigating an armed robbery.

The dead man was identified as Melvin Burch, 25, of Peoria. The student he held hostage, John Ardis, son of a Peoria alderman, escaped unharmed, authorities said.

Capt. Sol Pisano of the Peoria police said the men rushed into the grounds of St. Cecilia's School at 2:30 p.m. following a robbery of a Peoria variety store. A number of guns were taken from the store in the robbery, Pisano said.

Sister Anne Dolores, a teacher, said the men first entered a classroom in a small building near the school, where she was working with a class of 24 students.

She said the men marched the entire class and about 20 other students they picked up on the playground into the cafeteria in the basement of the main building.

Brooke said Nixon's television address to the nation earlier this week helped dispel what he described as a feeling of "aback, dismay and loss of confidence in the office of the President."

He also praised Nixon for firing presidential counsel John Dean III and accepting the resignations of top aides H. R. Haldeman and John D. Ehrlichman and Atty. Gen. Richard G. Kleindienst.

Poor Not A Class

Evidence Mounting On OEO Corruption

"One of the most insidious parts of the antipoverity program," observed Robert Hawkins Jr., director of the California Office of Economic Opportunity, "is to make us think of poor people as a class. The poor have attitudes and aspirations as varied as any group."

This refusal of liberal OEO warriors to look at poor people as individuals, with varied problems, is one of many reasons why the "War on Poverty" was lost, degenerating into scandal, corruption, and mismanagement. "The people who have suffered in this have been the poor," Hawkins states. "They've just been ripped-off."

A recent federal court ruling in Washington sought to stop the Nixon administration from dismantling OEO, arguing that only Congress has the power to terminate it. This judicial decision raises the question, once again, of the separation of powers between the executive and legislative branches of the federal government. Not, however, in a way many liberals contend.

Observe, for example, that in and out of Congress those fighting to keep OEO have sought to use the courts, not the Congress, to keep OEO intact. Most liberals realize that the antipoverity agency is run by a man, Charles J. Felt, who is contempt and that they are feeling the mounting pressure of public opinion over what has come to be called "The Welfare Racket."

The recent inability, moreover, of congressional liberals to muster sufficient votes to override presidential vetoes on a number of spending bills is a clear index that liberals cannot save OEO by congressional action if it came to a showdown.

Thus, they sought via the courts to prevent OEO's dismantlement while crying about the

executive usurping the power of the legislative!

In reality, the congressional liberals are asking taxpayers to condone and continue to subsidize with their hard-earned money political radicalism, mismanagement, inefficiency and shocking waste within an agency created during the Johnson administration.

A large body of evidence is at hand to prove that OEO is corrupt and scandal-ridden. Here are three more recent examples:

In early April the General Accounting Office, the congressional watchdog, reported that millions of dollars of OEO have gone

unaccounted for across the country.

The radical Indians who have held Wounded Knee, S.D., hostage first got their start because of OEO funding.

Despite the fact that the principal leaders of the militant American Indian Movement (AIM) had long arrest records, including violent assaults, OEO gave AIM its start and paid for the return trip home of those AIM leaders who laid siege to the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C., last year. This enabled the AIM leaders to lay siege, first, to Custer, S.D., and later Wounded Knee.

Indochina Fighting Intensifies

Hanoi Rejects Effort For Peace

When the Paris agreements were signed in January, hope ran high on the American side that the Vietnam cease-fire would provide momentum for an end to the fighting in Laos and Cambodia. In fact, there were "understandings" to that effect. It is now obvious that any moral or political force generated in Paris toward peace throughout Indochina is no match for the far greater momentum of Communist armies still bent on military victory.

A formal cease-fire was indeed proclaimed in Laos three weeks after the signing of the Vietnam truce. The branches of that agreement by the Communist Pathet Lao and the North Vietnamese became so flagrant recently that the Laotian government was forced to call for the aid of U.S. bombers. In Cambodia, it was left to President Lon Nol to proclaim a one-sided truce and invite the Communist forces in his country to negotiate a two-sided one. This was greeted with an intensification of Communist attacks on his capital of Phnom Penh, and a threat so grave that daily U.S. air strikes may be all that prevents the massing of troops for a drive to seal off and capture the city.

It is hard to escape the conclusion that North Vietnam is using the truce in South Vietnam — with the promise of no more bombing of their homeland and the reopening of the port of Haiphong — as the opportunity to carry out the encirclement of South Vietnam which has been its goal all along. The collapse of the Lon Nol government and the return of exiled Prince Sihanouk from Communist China would open

Cambodia as a supply route and staging area for new thrusts at Saigon.

Thus it is not surprising that the South Vietnamese are reluctant to look at the Cambodian border as an inviolable line if the opportunity presents itself to help prevent the fall of Phnom Penh. Truce or no truce, South Vietnam still remains in a contest for survival.

The United States of America, with its last troops withdrawn from South Vietnam and its known prisoners of war repatriated, is poised to begin the task of accounting for 1,300 men listed as missing in action. The Paris agreement calls for Communist cooperation in this endeavor. Other terms of the cease-fire have been ignored to such an extent that the level of military activity is so high on the fringes of South Vietnam, that it is questionable whether we can expect more than token cooperation from Hanoi.

It is disappointing to see U.S. planes still flying bombing missions nearly three months after the peace formulas of Paris were proclaimed. We are faced with the truth, however, that what the Communists negotiated at Paris was a cease-fire on just one front of what they have been fighting as a multi-front Indochina war. As much as we hoped to bring tranquility to Indochina one step at a time, it should be plain now that we are dealing with an enemy who has not yet shown the willingness to take even the first step toward peace.

Non-Indian Side Of Wounded Knee

The Battle of Wounded Knee is still being fought, but happily the weapons and ammunition now are pen and ink.

This is the last major battle (or massacre, if you will) between Indians and U.S. troops that took place at Wounded Knee, S.D., on Dec. 29, 1890—not the current confrontation between militants of the American Indian Movement (AIM) and U.S. marshals.

Millions of Americans, who never heard of either the place or the battle before AIM splashed it onto the front pages, have learned that Wounded Knee was a frontier My Lai in which brutal American troops shot down some 280 defenseless Indian men, women and children. Or so they have been told.

It was not quite that way, objects military historian Brig. Gen. S. L. Marshall in a new book on the Indian Wars, "Crimsoned Prairie."

The Indians, believing themselves immune to the white man's bullets, began the fight with a treacherous surprise attack on unsuspecting troopers of the 7th Cavalry, to whom the Indians had surrendered.

Marshall condemns the slaughter of Indians that followed the initial attack, but notes that 28 of the soldiers lay dead and 33 wounded—a loss "too commonly disregarded" or treated as insignificant by Americans bent on making of Wounded Knee something that it definitely was not.

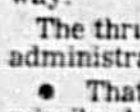
"Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee" is a lovely phrase, he says. "It is still a false and misleading sentiment, dignifying conspiracy and honoring treachery."

In a review of Marshall's book, Dee Brown, author of "Bury My Heart at Wounded Knee," charges that Marshall "accepts without question" a version of the incident that makes the Army look good. Indian survivors had a different story.

Let the fact that more than 80 seasoned troopers were casualties suggest that the 7th Cavalry faced something more than hapless opponents. There were no Army casualties at My Lai.

If by some mischance—or worse, if by calculation—violence erupts again at Wounded Knee, it is disturbing to contemplate that there will probably be as many versions of what happened as there are about the tragedy that occurred more than 82 years ago.

RAY CROMLEY Accuracy, Mercy Nuclear Shift Aim

WASHINGTON (NEA) — A major shift in U.S. nuclear strategy may be on the way.

The thrust of the new approach advocated by some high administration men: • That a new generation of intercontinental nuclear missiles be designed—so accurate they could take out an enemy nation's military and industrial complex and thus its power to wage war effectively while leaving vast civilian populations relatively unscathed.

By contrast, present nuclear strategy aims at insuring peace by mass destructive weaponry targeted at kill 30 million to 40 million or more civilians.

These new accuracies will be practical in less than a decade if the necessary research is begun now on a sufficient scale.

• That these new offensive weapons be secured so safely and so thoroughly that immediate reaction to a Russian or Chinese strike would not be necessary. Rather, the president of the United States would be able to take his time before retaliating or reacting.

Today, the requirement for speed could turn an accidental missile firing into an all-out atomic war.

That coupled with these shifts in offensive weapon technology, there is an agreement to develop in the United States, Russia and China advanced defensive weapons that would insure the safety of populations in the event of nuclear war, do away with the concept of making tens of millions of men, women and children hostages, as one administration advocate of the new policy put it.

The drive for a new nuclear strategy is sparked by three chilling realities, as outlined by Frederick Charles Ikle, President Nixon's nominee for chief of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency:

1. Today's strategy would not protect us from a madman. Under present concepts, some 40 million American lives and the existence of the United States as a nation may depend on Russia being ruled by sane, logical men who will weigh the pros and cons carefully before launching a nuclear strike on the United States.

If we make clear we can guarantee the destruction of Russia in return, the theory goes, no sane ruler will make the first move. But history is too filled with madmen rulers to take that chance.

2. As a practical matter, a U.S. president might find it impossible politically and psychologically to order the destruction of 30 million to 40 million Russians in retaliation for a Soviet first strike which aimed at a mass crippling of U.S. forces but spared the major cities.

The Russians most certainly can't do this. American reluctance, which diminishes by that much the effectiveness of our retaliatory power.

3. The need for instant retaliation under present policy gives the President and the country no time to think of the best answer for any given attack. The only answer for either country in case of real attack, or what seems to be a real attack, is what the word merchants call "assured mutual destruction."

Internal Improvement Trustees Vote 'Close'

By TOM RAUM Associated Press Writer TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A vote on a bill transferring the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund to the Department of Natural Resources is too close to call, says the Chairman of the Senate Governmental Operations Committee.

"I could go either way," said Sen. Jim William, D-Orlando.

The committee decides today on the proposal by the Senate Natural Resources Committee.

Three proposals were before the committee: —A measure by the Natural Resources Committee and its chairman W. D. Childers, D-Pensacola, that would put the IIF staff under the Department of Natural Resources. The measure is said to have strong Cabinet backing.

—A substitute proposal by the Department of Natural Resources, which he described as less likely to be voted by Gov. Reubin Askew, that would transfer only dredge-and-fill responsibilities of the IIF to the Department of Natural Resources.

—An amendment by Sen. Richard Pittgraw, D-Miami, that would consolidate all environmental agencies into one agency with a director nominated by the governor and confirmed by three members of the Cabinet.

The full Senate today reconsiders a proposal to abolish the office of lieutenant governor, but the sponsor of the bill, Sen. Dan Scarborough, D-Jacksonville, said chances of passage seemed dim.

The House, meanwhile, returns its attention to two bills already batted about during one round of floor debate.

A Senate-passed measure giving 18-year-olds rights of adulthood was given the top spot on the calendar after the House failed to reach it for consideration Tuesday.

Rep. Don Tucker, D-Tallahassee, the bill's sponsor, said he had the votes to revive the rights of drinking and gambling, which were eliminated in a 60-59 vote during the measure's first hearing two weeks ago.

Rep. Gordon is seeking passage of a law requiring distribution of contraceptive information and devices to all persons of child-bearing age, including minors.

It also would permit voluntary sterilization of married minors on their request and of other persons under 18 with the consent of their parent or guardian.

A House subcommittee Tuesday recommended disapproval of her bill, but Rep. Gordon predicted the full Health and Rehabilitative Services Committee would send her proposal to the House floor for a vote.

Wrecked In Senate Committee Labor Package Due Aid

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The sponsor of Gov. Reubin Askew's legislative labor package, virtually wrecked in a Senate committee, says there still may be hope of salvaging it on the floor.

Sen. Jack Gordon, D-Miami, said he'll support a floor attempt to reconstitute Askew's unemployment insurance, compensation hike proposal for the one adopted by the Senate Judiciary Committee Tuesday.

The committee turned down Askew's proposal that unemployment insurance be geared to the statewide average weekly wage, voting instead to increase the maximum from the present \$64 a week to \$70 a week.

Askew's bill would have permitted an out-of-work citizen to collect up to two thirds the average weekly wage of \$135, or \$90 a week.

Gordon and other sponsors said the committee's version was a poor alternative.

The committee also killed Askew's proposals to eliminate the one-week waiting requirement for unemployment insurance and to liberalize regulations on who may receive benefits.

"They really cut our program up pretty badly," said Hugh McMillan, Askew's governmental affairs adviser.

However, another Askew proposal that workman's compensation benefits be geared to the weekly wage—which would result in similar increases in benefits—is still alive in both houses.

Mayer Granville Brown, noted for injecting surprise elements into mandatory council meetings, said Monday "While I have no objection to city employees receiving pay raises, the main cog in the operation of the city should be raised in pay."

Following this remark the mayor recommended, and council approved, taking \$550 from the mayor's contingency fund and granting a salary increase of \$340 yearly to City Clerk Mary Norton. The increase is retroactive to May 1.

Board Of Adjustment

The city now has a board of adjustment with the appointment of a third member. Donald Smith, a new area resident, Council has been since the board since March 2, when with two vacancies existing, Brown recommended former Councilman Charles Kelly and Mrs. Mary Cook, neither of whose appointments were ratified by council. An attorney Herbert Fox then resigned saying "now you have a problem."

The lack of an adjustment board has resulted in postponing for many weeks a request by Cumberland Farms to erect a convenience store.

The discussion on the \$366,500 budget in which there is a \$87,627 deficit was tabled until a May 21 workshop meeting.

Engineering Plans

After considerable discussion and arguments, council accepted the final engineering plans for Wildwood subdivision with a proviso they meet the recommendations in a letter from the city engineer.

The main objection was over the fire flow to homes with the recent fire at The Springs.

The engineer recommended a fire flow of 500 gallons per minute for single family homes and 750 for cluster homes. The developers agreed, but Councilman Victor Miller said the cluster homes should have a 1,000 gallon per minute flow.

Hire Secretary?

In another issue Jordan recommended that the city hire a secretary for the zoning board or use a tape recorder. Brown said it did not pertain to Monday night's business, and Jordan requested it be placed on next Monday's council meeting agenda.

Two other matters received approval and included preliminary plans of the Highlands, section 5 and the Highlands, section 1, final plat and final engineering plans.

Tax Talk

Brown displayed a voluminous report to be transmitted for federal revenue sharing, likening it to an income tax form. STANFORD, Calif. (AP) — Scientists plan to put cultures of live human cells aboard the first Skylab space station to try to learn what effect prolonged weightlessness might have on them.

"We have no information regarding either subtle or perhaps even major effects that might take place at the cellular level," Dr. Leonard Hayflick said Tuesday.

The Stanford University professor of microbiology and member of the project's research team added: "It is probably not too far-fetched to assume that there are effects on the human cell's ability to divide normally at zero gravity."

There is possibility of chromosome breakage similar to that often produced by drugs, he said.

The living cells for the Skylab mission will be lung tissue from a fetus aborted in Sweden 11 years ago and preserved in the supercool of liquid nitrogen.

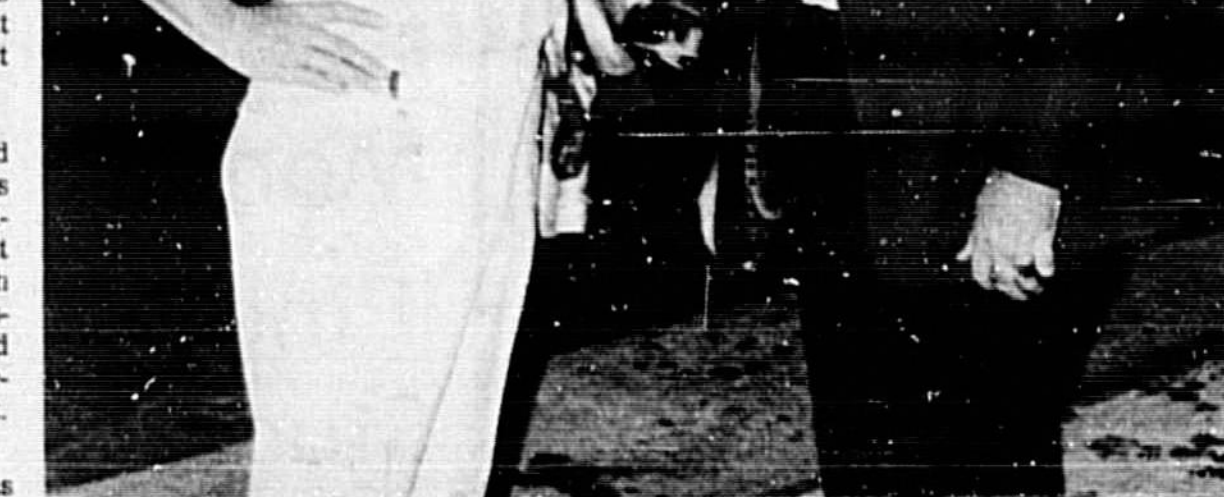

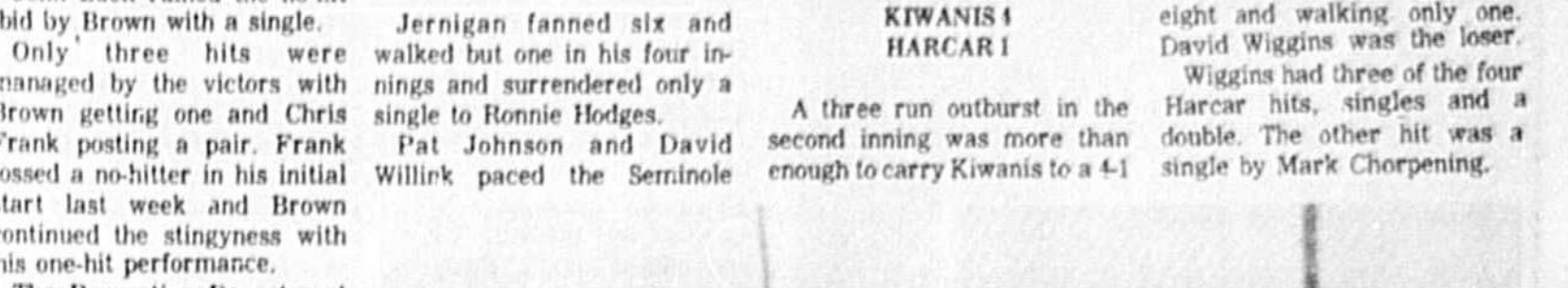

Cuba Prepares 'Latin Front'

MIAMI (AP) — Making an emotional appeal for a united Latin American front against "American exploitation," Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro has called for the formation of a new hemispheric organization excluding the U.S.

"We are willing to belong to such an organization... free of U.S. domination... united against American exploitation," Castro shouted to thousands of his countrymen gathered for a May Day celebration in Havana's Revolutionary Plaza.

He vowed that there would be no move toward normalization of relations with the United States until the American political and economic blockade of the island is removed. And even then, he said, Cuba will place its own interests second to those of the common problems of Latin America.

"Socialism is not going to come overnight in Latin America," he said, but added, "we know Socialism will come sooner or later."

Adams' End To Continue

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The sponsor of a proposal to abolish the office of lieutenant governor says chances of its passage seem dim for the 1973 session, but he won't abandon the attempt.

Sen. Dan Scarborough, D-Jacksonville, said that the measure still appeared a few votes short of passing the Senate.

"There are still two or three senators who are undecided, and they could swing the vote," said Scarborough. "But it doesn't look too promising. On this kind of thing you can be so close but yet so far."

The measure was up today for reconsideration by the Senate. It failed to pass last Thursday, two votes short of the required 24 needed for a proposed constitutional amendment. But a parliamentary ploy brings it up again today.

The Red Bug Road paving has passed city inspection and a check will be issued to the county for the \$17,500 cost of materials, Mayor Bill Greer reported to the council.

The city has been holding up the money while repairs were made on the participation project whereby the county furnished labor and equipment and the city cost of materials.

In other matters at the work session of council, Councilman Richard Wirz disagreed that the city should use receipts from the eight-cent gasoline tax to pay portions of cost for installation and maintenance of a traffic signal on Red Bug Road and SR 406.

The county is considering a change in policy where the cities at certain intersections would pay some part of the cost of traffic signalization.

City Manager Ron Bergman urged the board to approve an agreement with the state Department of Transportation to allow installation and replacement of utility lines at the U.S. 17-52 SR 406 intersection when modifications are underway there. Bergman said by doing the work then it will be less costly.

Councilman Edith Duerr termed "utterly fantastic" a proposal from the owner of 45 lots surrounding Lake Kathryn Estates that utility service be guaranteed to his property in exchange for a 15 by 220 feet easement.

Bergman said the city had been attempting to acquire the drainage easement, part of the paving program of Lake Kathryn Circle but another method of drainage could be used instead.

Bergman and the mayor are to negotiate with the man.

Court Decision Alarms

Wirz expressed "alarm" over the recent court decision declaring unconstitutional the subdivision ordinance requirement that developers donate a portion of their land for recreational purposes.

The decision was given in a suit brought against the City of Maitland. Wirz said Casselberry may have to amend its subdivision ordinance to comply with new law.

He contended that the city's swimming pool ordinance is outdated. He recently told the council swimming pool contractors are charging Casselberry residents \$1,000 more for pools because of the city's outdated regulations.

The councilman also argued that action be taken to revise the ordinance omits several categories and pointed to variations of commercial zoning in particular.

City Atty. Kenneth McIntosh said the health department is adequately staffed to handle the fly problem, depending on the degree of infestation, and is in a position to seek additional assistance at the state level, if necessary.

The board tabled action on ordinances setting water and sewer charges until the required number of days posting is complied with. Site plan for the Casselberry Funeral Home and the Budcock Furniture store was approved.

Tasty Treats Anytime

Fresh strawberries always are a treat. For eating at anytime, even breakfast, strawberries with a short-cake ring made with convenient flaky biscuits. When buying strawberries plan to use them as soon as possible.

STRAWBERRY BISCUIT RING SHORTCAKE

2 pints California strawberries sliced

Sugar

1 container (9.5 ounces) refrigerated buttermilk flaky biscuits

1/4 teaspoon lemon extract

1 cup cream or half-and-half

Sweeten strawberries to taste with sugar. Chill until needed. Form a ring using all the biscuits on an ungreased baking sheet. Biscuits should barely touch each other at the edges; press together with fingers to prevent separation during baking. Bake in 400 degree oven about 10 minutes or until golden brown. Remove biscuit ring to serving dish. Fill center of biscuit ring with prepared strawberries. Stir lemon extract into cream. Serve in pitcher to pour over shortcakes. Makes 6 servings.

STRAWBERRY LEMON SWIRLS

2 pints California strawberries, sliced

3/4 teaspoon grated lemon peel

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1/4 cup sugar

1 container (9.5 ounces) refrigerated biscuits with artificial butter flavor

Milk

2 cups sweetened whipped cream or whipped topping

To prepare strawberries: Combine strawberries, 1/4 teaspoon of lemon peel and juice in bowl. Sweeten strawberries to taste with sugar. Chill until serving time.

To prepare swirls: Mix 1/4 teaspoon lemon peel with 1/4 cup sugar in small bowl. Cut each biscuit in half so that total of 20 half circles result; twist each slightly. Brush top of each biscuit with milk and then dip into the sugar-lemon peel mixture. To make each swirl, press ends of 4 of the prepared twists together pinwheel fashion. Repeat procedure until 5 swirls result. Bake in 400 degree oven about 10 minutes or until browned.

To serve: Immediately remove each swirl to individual serving plate. Serve warm with prepared strawberries and whipped cream. Makes 5 servings.

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American Children Show Results Of Good Nutrition

Today we are told our children don't eat enough wholesome food. That instead they are constantly nibbling on non-nutritious snacks. Yet — and a very important yet — we now learn that American children rank among the world's largest. That report comes from the U.S. Public Health Service. American children, white and black, are just plain big.

Our white children are in the top group, both in height and weight, as compared to European children. Our black children appear to be taller than their tallest African counterparts.

In fact, there has been a steady and regular increase in the height and weight of American children over the past 90 years. During this period there has been an average increase of 30 per cent in height and 15 to 30 per cent in weight.

Obviously, our children do eat enough nutritious foods to grow on, despite their lamented constant snacking. "I would like to suggest to Mr. MacDonald, if there is such a person, that besides hamburger and french fries, he add a few spoonfuls of peas and a scoop of cole slaw to his famous plate. Then the ravenous hamburger fans would get more vegetables with their snacks and would probably grow even taller," says Dr. Fredrick J. Stare, chairman of Harvard's Department of Nutrition.

"Pizzas, hamburgers and small beef pies are O.K. as food. So are many other snacks. But only when other foods are eaten, too," Dr. Stare explains. "Children need lots of calcium (milk and milk products such as cheese and ice cream), phosphorus and protein in their diets. Lots of fruit, also. Too much fast food won't supply enough. That's why home meals are essential, too."

The Public Health Service states that between big cities and small farming communities there is no significant difference in height or weight among children of otherwise similar socioeconomic backgrounds — meaning, among children with the same life styles.

"The higher the family income, the taller and heavier the children will tend to be. But that doesn't necessarily mean the children will be taller and heavier if they persist in inadequate eating habits," the Harvard scientist warns.

"Likewise, the better edu-

ated the parents are, the taller and heavier the children usually are. But not necessarily so — unless the parents use their superior knowledge of nutrition and feed the children accordingly.

"Certainly, the more there is to spend on food and the greater the amount of intelligence in the family, the better the chances are for superior growth and weight among the children."

"But only if those children are guaranteed an ample supply of milk and milk products, fruits and vegetables, good cereals and first class protein. Snacks and quick service foods don't supply enough of these. The family refrigerator must supply the remainder—the very essential mainstay," he insists.

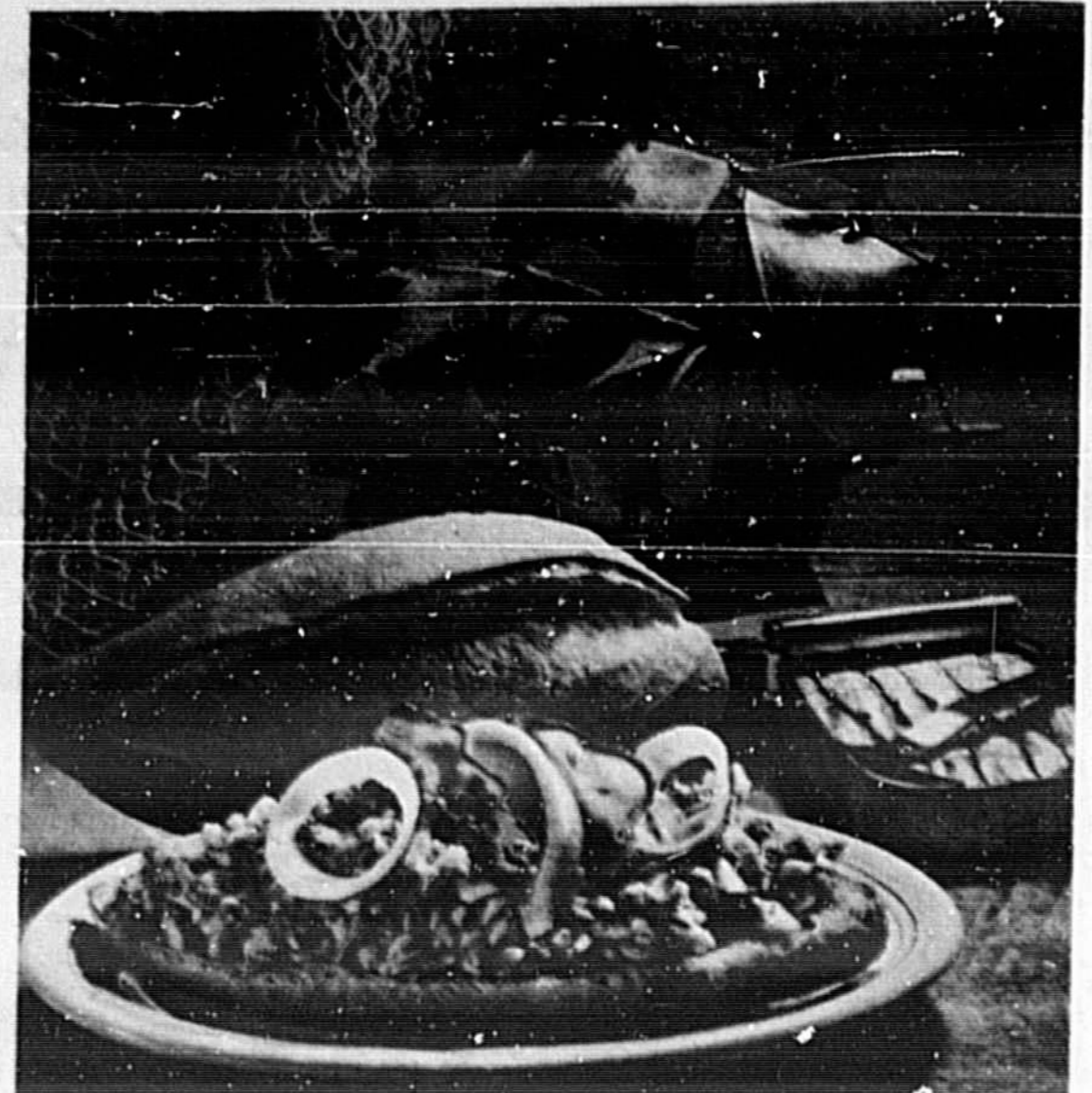

Not-So Fabulous '50s Revisited

These days, everyone is looking back warmly on the '50s... well, practically everyone.

"I figured I would never work again," says actor John Randolph, recalling the not-so-fabulous '50s.

"The '50s started off with my having twins and burying them," says Randolph's wife, handsome actress Sara Cunningham whose deep, resonant voice still has a hint of South Carolina, but not a trace of self-pity.

"After six pregnancies, I finally did produce a baby in 1952. The lowest point we ever had was after we both appeared before the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1955. That fall, John was picketed when he appeared on Broadway in 'Wooden Dish'—Louis Calhern's last show."

John leaned forward in his chair. He had just come in from a long rehearsal of the ABC Pueblo Incident, the television special in which he appeared with Hal Holbrook and George Grizzard. But he is buoyant and energetic, displaying a magnanimity and enthusiasm when he speaks of his colleagues, his wife, his friends that most actors reserve for themselves.

John and Sara had suffered from a '50s ailment not mentioned by nostalgia buffs—the blacklist.

Some actors died of it: some changed professions because of it. Others—like the Randolphs, Zero Mostel, Studs Terkel, Arthur Miller and Charlie Chaplin—survived it, becoming heroes, particularly lauded by that small group who suffered from another affliction of the time—subpoena envy.

"After the Calhern show was over, I figured I was finished. Christmas was coming. Sara was in her fifth month. I went to see Herman Shumlin who was cashing for the road company of 'Inherit the Wind' with Melvyn Douglas. I read for the part of the preacher, Reverend Brown, and I was preaching for my life."

When the sermon was over, John had the part. Producer Shumlin, who had brought an unknown named Spencer Tracy to the stage in "The Last Mile" and produced most of Lillian Hellman's plays, learned of Randolph's plight and promised him an additional \$50 a week.

Twenty years after that grim era, the Randolphs are having a terrific comeback, with John appearing regularly on TV and stage.

As for Sara Cunningham, John calls her the late bloomer, blossoming wherever she goes. She made her first movie last year—"The Cowboys" with John Wayne. Says Sara, "I've known my business now since I was 35, but it had always been terribly frightening to me. When I got past 50, I didn't care any more. There was a young fella at one audition who asked me, 'What have you done recently?' I answered, 'Darling, you're just too young to know.' Yet he called me back. Lately, I always get a call back."

So next time the disc jockey puts on Earth Angel or ShaBoom, remember the Randolphs who, in spite of misadventures and McCarthyism, survived the '50s together, with dignity. I wonder how many of us will be able to say that much about the '70s?

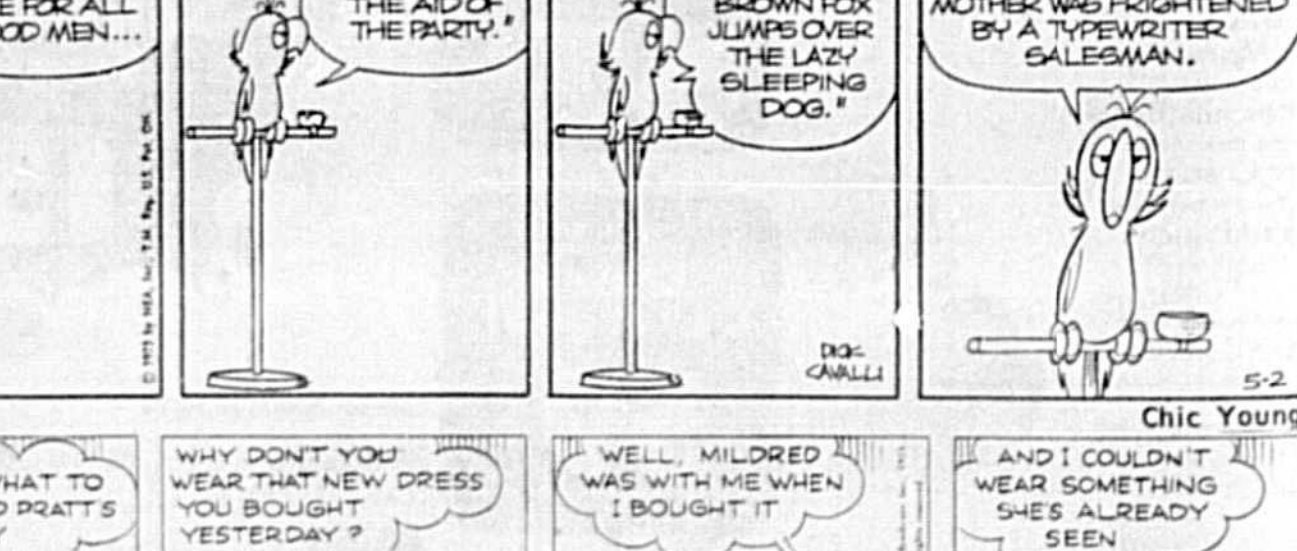

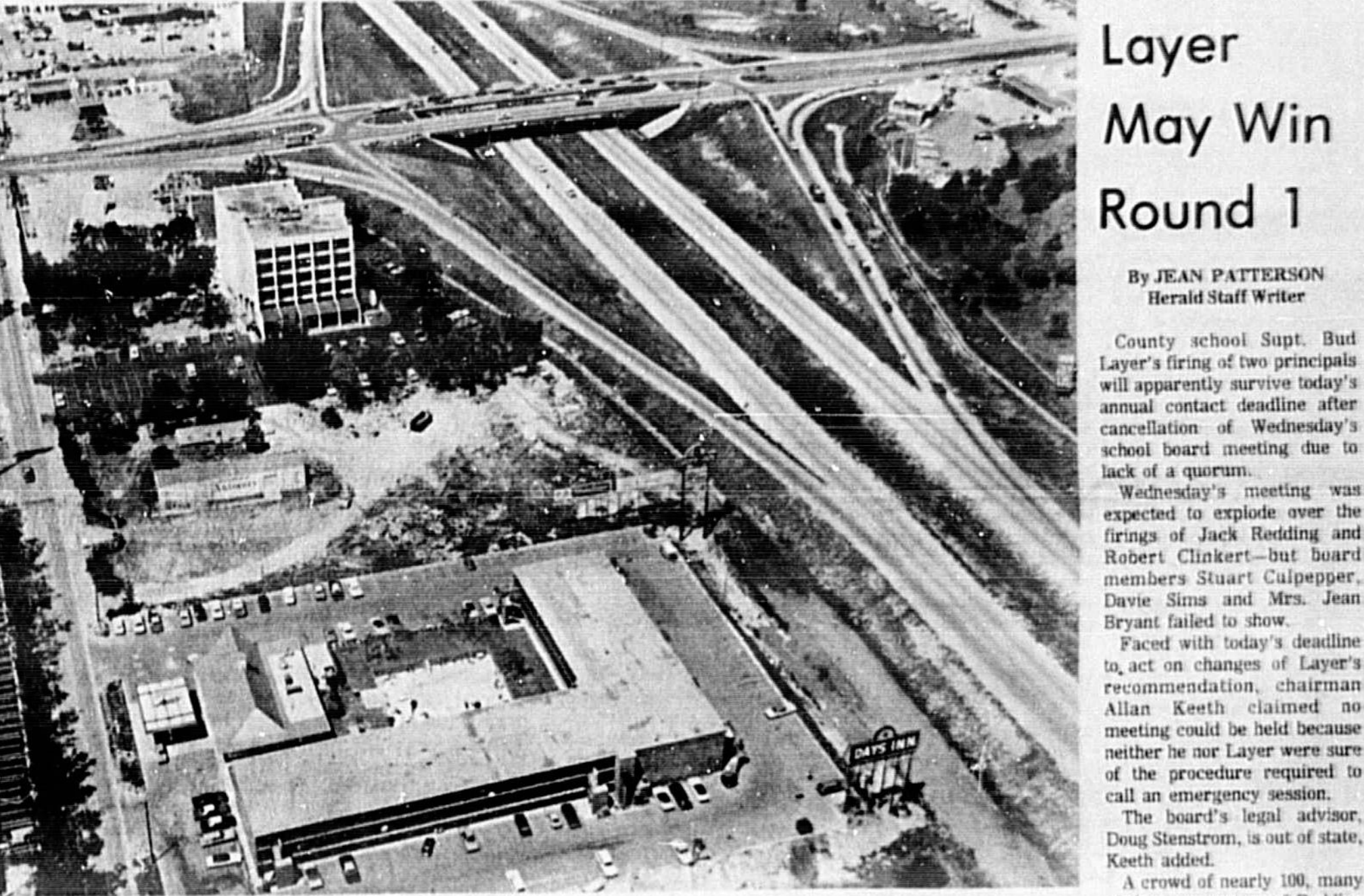
